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

SWOSU recognized as top blood donor

Southwestern has been recognized as the top contributor for the Oklahoma Blood Institute's Education Section of the Metro Oklahoma City & Western Oklahoma Region for 2007.

Michelle Stinson, blood program consultant for the OBI, said SWOSU had a total of 715 donations during the year. Finishing second was the University of Central Oklahoma with 647. Canadian Valley Technology Center in El Reno was third with 357.

Other top ten finishers (in order) were Yukon High School, Oklahoma Baptist University, Oklahoma City Community College, Western Technology Center, Westmoore High School, Oklahoma Christian University, and Edmond North High School.

In overall rankings for all sections of the Metro OKC and Western Oklahoma Region, SWOSU was third with its 715 donations. Air Logistics Center was the top contributor with 788 donations, while Norman Regional Health System was second with 737. Chesapeake Energy Corporation finished right behind SWOSU.

Dobson connects \$1 million gift endows chairs

verett and Jeanetta Dobson of Oklahoma City have donated \$1 million to fund four endowed chairs for the SWOSU School of Business. The funds will be used to recruit professors for the School of Business as SWOSU strives for accreditation in the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business.

The Dobsons challenged SWOSU Foundation trustees to match the donation. The original \$1 million donation plus the additional matching funds total \$2.1 million, and with the Oklahoma State Regents Endowed Chair program matching the funds, the total value is \$4.2 million.

The endowed chair program in Oklahoma was established to enhance the quality of higher education by providing state funds as a match for private donations for endowed chairs, distinguished professorships, visiting professorships, artists-in-residence, and lectureships.

"This exceptional gift—along with the

matching funds it has and will generate—is truly appreciated," SWOSU President John Hays said. "It is the students who are the ultimate beneficiaries of this most generous gift."

Dobson was a four-year golf letterman at SWOSU and was a three-time all-conference selection. He was inducted into SWOSU's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1996 and the SWOSU Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame in 2000.

Dobson, a graduate of Cheyenne High School, earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in economics from SWOSU. He has been very involved in the support of his alma mater serving on the SWOSU Foundation Board of Directors since 1991.

He currently is the second vice chair of the Foundation's Board of Directors and chairs the Foundation's Investment Committee.

Dobson is the founder and former chairman of Dobson Communications Corporation, which was recently acquired by AT & T. The Dobsons have three daughters—Amy, Dana and Haley.

Ed (Sr.) passed away in 1998 at the age of 83, while Winnie Ola continues to live in Weatherford.

Ed Berrong, always a leader, worker, and competitor, was college class president his freshman, sophomore, and senior years and was president of the Student Council his junior and senior years.

Ed graduated in 1937 from Southwestern and began working on his law degree at the University of Oklahoma.


Ed married Winnie Ola Post in 1938. Winnie Ola grew up at Eastview in Greer County. She graduated from Southwestern in 1936, at the age of 19, at which time she began her teaching career.

Throughout their lives, Ed and Winnie Ola have served the State of Oklahoma, the City of Weatherford, and SWOSU with many years of generous gifts of their time, talents, and monetary support.

The Berrong family established an endowed chair for the Music Department at SWOSU. The gift of \$250,000 was matched by the State Regents for Higher Education to create an endowment of \$500,000.

The family has also provided a large scholarship endowment through the SWOSU Foundation.

William Wedekind (known as W.W.) and Elsie Ward were long-time residents of Weatherford. W.W. retired in 1976 after spending 30 years at SWOSU. He was long-time chairman of the Division of Business and Business Education and faculty sponsor for the student government

association.

W.W. was a 1936 graduate of SWOSU. Before coming to the university, he was principal at Riverview, Texola and Putnam. He married Elsie Prock of Erick in 1933.

The Wards were active in the Weatherford community. W.W. was a past president of the Kiwanis Club and board member of the Weatherford Chamber of Commerce and Weatherford Community Fund Drive. Both he and Elsie were active members of the Federated Church.

The Wards' gift was made to the SWOSU Foundation.

Hodge named outstanding pharmacy alumnus

Jerry Hodge of Amarillo, Texas, has been named the 2008 Outstanding Alumnus of the Southwestern College of Pharmacy.

Hodge was recently honored during the SWOSU College of Pharmacy Awards and White Coat Ceremony held on the SWOSU campus. The award is presented to an individual demonstrating exceptional support of the SWOSU College of Pharmacy and outstanding personal achievements in the profession.

Hodge, a Carnegie (OK) native, graduated from the SWOSU College of Pharmacy in 1965 and was inducted into the SWOSU Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame in 1979.

After graduation from SWOSU, Hodge returned to Amarillo and purchased Maxor Drug. Eventually, his businesses grew to six locations in Amarillo and the surrounding area. Today, Maxor National Pharmacy Services Corporation has over 500 employees and operates retail pharmacies and a mail service pharmacy in Amarillo that provides prescriptions nationwide.

Other Maxor business divisions include pharmacy benefit management, infusion therapy, ancillary benefit management and pharmacy manage-

ment counseling.

Hodge has been very prominent in social and service activities in Amarillo as well as the state of Texas. In 1973, he was elected to the Amarillo City Commission and was re-elected in 1975. At age 34, Hodge was elected mayor of Amarillo, the youngest person to ever hold the position. He later won re-election.

Hodge has served as director of the Texas Municipal Retirement System and as president of the Texas State Board of Pharmacy. In 1987, he was appointed to the Texas Board of Criminal Justice and served as vice-chairman of the board from 1987 to 1994. During his tenure, many advances occurred which enhanced the efficiency and quality of the pharmacy systems in this environment.

As chairman of the Tri-State Fair long-range planning committee, Hodge was instrumental in developing a plan for expansion of the Amarillo Civic Center and construction of a special events center at the Tri-State Fairgrounds. This new center in Amarillo is a state-of-the-art facility.

Hodge and his wife, Margaret, have supported SWOSU for many years. They have four children and six grandchildren.

Distinguished Alumni Watonga, Anadarko natives honored

Brice W. Harris and Walter E. Lamar were recently inducted into Southwestern Oklahoma State University's Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame. Harris is Chancellor of the Los Rios Community College District in Sacramento, CA, while Lamar is president and CEO of Lamar Associates, which is a Washington, D.C., based professional services firm offering consulting services in law enforcement and security.


Both Harris and Lamar were honored at the May 10 SWOSU Convocation.

RICE W. **HARRIS** heads up Los Rios, which is one of the largest multi-college districts in America and covers more than 2,400 square miles of central California. The district includes American River, Cosumnes River, Folsom Lake and Sacramento City colleges and currently enrolls nearly 90,000 students each semester.

Also an active member of the greater Sacramento business community, Harris is a past chair of the Board of the Sac-

ramento Metropolitan Chamber of Commerce and chair of the Board of the Northern California World Trade Center. He is a member of the Editorial Board of Comstock's Magazine and the Sacramento Area Commerce and Trade Organization (SACTO).

Harris is a winner of the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education Steuben Apple for excellence in conference teaching. He has taught communications, published a number of ar-

ticles, and is active in the arts having served on the Board of the Crocker Art Museum, Board President of the Fresno Philharmonic Orchestra, and Board member of the Kansas City Museum.

Harris did post doctoral study at the Harvard University Institute of Educational Management, received his Doctorate in Education at Nova Southeastern University, his Master's in Communication from the University of Arkansas, and his Bachelor's in Communication from Southwestern.

as a special agent for the Federal Bureau of Investigation in San Diego, San Francisco and Oklahoma City where his primary assignment was the investigation of violent crimes, bank robberies, fugitives, kidnappings, extortion, and criminal gang activity.

Highlights of his FBI career include serving six months in Seattle investigating the Green River Murder case. This individual was responsible for the killing of at least 48 women in the Pacific Northwest. While assigned to the Oklahoma City Division, he was deployed as a member of SWAT to the Branch Dravidian standoff in Waco, Texas, and three years later he responded to the bombing of the A.P. Murrah Federal Building where he participated in the rescue effort and the investigation. For his effort, he was awarded the prestigious FBI Shield of Bravery.


Lamar later earned another FBI Shield of Bravery. While attempting to determine the whereabouts of a desperate fugitive prison escapee, he became engaged in a running gun battle with the escapee. For his actions under fire, he was awarded a second Shield of Bravery, making him only one of two agents in the history of the FBI to be so awarded.

In 1998 when Lamar was recognized by the American Indian Exposition in Anadarko as "Indian of the Year" in recognition of lifetime achievement.

While serving as an FBI supervisory special agent, Lamar was recruited to be the Deputy Director of the Bureau of Indian Affairs law enforcement program, which placed him in charge of Indian Country law enforcement nationwide. Understanding the Bureau of Indian Affairs falls under the umbrella of the Department of the Interior, he was called into Washington, D.C. immediately after the September 11 terrorist attack where he assisted the Department to develop protection protocols for the nation's icons, monuments and dams. Lamar retired from federal law enforcement nearly three years ago and formed Lamar Associates. He also recently founded Mountain Chief Institute—A Center for Tribal Excellence, which is a recognized not-for-profit organization dedicated to creating solutions for Indian

Country issues.

He is an enrolled member of the Blackfeet Nation of Montana and a descendent of the Wichita Tribe of Oklahoma. He attended high school in Anadarko and then chose Southwestern to continue his higher education. After graduation, he moved to Montana and taught school on the Blackfeet Indian reservation. It was during that time he became interested in the FBI.

Busey named to 'Top 40 Under 40' list

Southwestern graduate Philip Busey Jr. was recently selected as a 2008 Journal Record Achiever Under 40. He was honored this spring at a Rewarding the Climb banquet honoring 40 professionals from the state.

"The mission of The Journal Record's Achievers Under 40 is

to honor and recognize the accomplishments of Oklahoma's talented young leaders," said Journal

Record Publisher Mary Mélon. "This year, we received an amazing number of quality nominees, making the selection especially difficult. The upside is that we can all feel secure that our future is in good hands.

"This year's honorees – all under the age of 40 - have already proven both their leadership skills and their strong commitment to making Oklahoma a better place to live and work," Mélon said. The winners were chosen by a committee composed of area leaders and will be honored at the event and profiled in a special publication of The Journal Record.

The following is part of the Journal Record's article describing Busev's education and career

Philip Busey Jr. developed the knack to simultaneously undertake multiple projects while in college at SWOSU.

While a full-time student at SWOSU, he worked for the college newspaper and its public relations office as well as served as sports editor for the Weatherford Daily News - all at the same time.

Busey's multitasking abilities have also helped him succeed in the business world. During the 2006 elections, he served as communications director in Cody Graves's statewide race for Oklahoma Corporation Commissioner while managing day-to-day business operations as vice president of communications for Busev Group of Companies.

Within the last year he played an instrumental role in taking Busey Group of Companies, traditionally an aerospace-based company, into the energy industry. This expansion provided a big boom for the company, founded by his father, Phil G. Busey. The company reported 2007 revenue of approximately \$13 million and added 85 employees since November, increasing its number of total employees to more than 225.

"Because of the expansion, 2008

is projected to exceed \$20 million. This has allowed me the responsibility to take the initiative to continue business expansion and diversify the company brand and image I originally created in 2005," said Busey.

Busey has a bachelor's degree in communication arts from SWOSU and a master certification in government contracting from Rose State College.

As an intern for the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs in Washington, D.C., in 2002, Busey received a Certificate of Pride in Public Service. Last year, the Oklahoma City chapter of the American Indian Chamber of Commerce named him Co-Volunteer of the Year. His other civic involvement includes serving on the administrative board and finance committee of St. Luke's United Methodist Church in Oklahoma City. He also serves on the advisory council of American University's Washington Internship for Native Students Program and is a member of the planning committee for Oklahoma's annual Native American Heritage Day Celebration. In addition, he is a member of the Public Relations Society of America and the SWOSU Alumni Association.

BUTCH PETERS has retired after 35 seasons on the Norman High School football staff. "I just felt like it was time," Peters told *The Oklahoma*. "Thirty-five years, that's a long time to do what I do." Peters' teams compiled 75-54 record in his 12 years as head coach. In his 23 years as an assistant, Peters coached 13 All-State linemen.

Southwestern Oklahoma State from 1969-1972.





present check to college

The Cheyenn and Arapaho Tribal College, located on the campus of Southwestern, was presented a \$400,000 check on May 7 from the Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes.

Governor Darrell Flyingman made the presentation to Dr. Henrietta Mann, president of the CATC.

Mann said the presentation was another jubilant day for the college in terms of its continuing development. The \$400,000 added to an earlier \$100,000 appropriation, all of which comes from the Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes, represents half of the college's \$1 million budget.

"With its sole support of the college, the Cheyenne and Arapaho people are making a significant investment in the future higher educa-

tion of their youth," Mann said.

In late 2003, the Cheyenne and Arapaho people through a resolution directed the tribal government to establish a tribal college. Quinton Roman Nose, director of the C & A Tribes' Department of Education, became the person responsible for putting the process into place. With the creation of a Board of Directors/Regents, planning led to a partnership with SWOSU, led by President John Hays.

Two highlights in its brief history include opening ceremonies on August 25, 2006 and the inauguration of its first president, Henrietta Mann, on April 3, 2008.

Attending the check presentation were: Flyingman; Mann; Roman Nose; Lawrence Hart, chair,





outhwestern's Bulldog mascot continues to make the news, this time in a national publication.

Duke, the university's 3-year-old dog, had his

portrait published in the March edition of the American Kennel Club Gazette.

Duke's photo accompanied an article, which was tied to March Madness, covering how many college athletic teams are called the Bulldogs. It also mentioned the news that the Bulldog had broken into the list of Top 10 Dogs in America, based on AKC's 2007 registration figures.

According to the article, bulldogs are the most common dog mascot of college sports teams. More than 30 United States colleges and universities have a Bulldog (real or costumed) as their mascot, the most famous being Yale's Handsome Dan, Georgetown's Jack and the University of Georgia's Uga.

But, it was a "high five" picture of Duke, taken by SWOSU photographer/graphic artist Kyle Wright, that was picked to appear in the national magazine.

Duke got involved when the American Kennel Club contacted the Bulldog Club of America's AKC Delegate, Bob Newcomb, to get his

thoughts on why the Bulldog might be such a popular choice for college mascots. Mr. Newcomb mentioned that both he and his wife had attended "Bulldog" schools, and they had provided one of

their own Bulldog champions, Duke, to Bob's alma mater, Southwestern.

Rebecca Wallwork, articles editor for the magazine, explains why Duke was such an easy choice

for the article.

"Originally I had called in photos of some of the most famous Bulldog mascots, such as Yale's Handsome Dan, and the University of Georgia's Uga," Wallwork said. "But after learning about Mr. Newcomb's many connections to this theme of Bulldog mascots, and seeing the fantastic picture he sent in of Duke giving a high-five, I knew I had to use the picture of Duke."

Bob Newcomb, Duke's breeder, said Bulldogs make a good sporting symbol for many reasons.

"They have characteristics that are admired in competition," Newcomb said. "Bulldogs are resolute, tenacious, and courageous. Their charming, friendly nature makes them wonderful ambassadors."

SWOSU's Duke was purchased from Newcomb in 2007 by the SWOSU Alumni Association. Duke attends various university events and sporting activities and

is a popular attraction. He was officially recorded a "Champion" by the American Kennel Club on February 18, 2007. Duke is housed in Weatherford by Rita Hays, a faculty member at SWOSU.



t has been nearly 100 years since a theatre was built on the Southwestern campus, but construction is now in the final

stages on the new blackbox theatre that is located just west of the Music Building on the Weatherford campus.

The project is part of an education capital bond issue that was signed into law on March 31, 2005, by Governor Brad Henry

Jay L. Walker Construction Company of Oklahoma City is the building contractor, while Meyer Architecture Plus is the architect. The \$2.3 million, 10,000 square foot building will

be completed this summer, according to Tom Fagan, SWOSU vice president for finance.

Robin Jones, chair of the Communication and Theatre Department, said the building will allow flexibility for various productions and other events.

"We're excited about this project and the possibility of bringing more students to our pro-

gram," Jones said. "We feel this will make our program more visible on the SWOSU campus."

The new theatre will allow SWOSU to reno-

vate the existing Old Science Building Auditorium to classrooms and laboratories. The old auditorium was constructed as part of the original 1909 structure with partial renovations taking place in past years.

Steve Strickler, theatre director and faculty member, is ready for the move.

"It will be exciting to get to work in a flexible space. It opens up lots of new educational opportunities for all of us – students, faculty, and audience," Strickler said. The various staging techniques are going to be endless. We will also have brand new state of the art

equipment.

outhwestern and Dong-A University in Korea signed an agreement of academic exchange during a February ceremony.

Three students will be exchanged per academic year from each institution. SWOSU and Dong-A University will also encourage visits by faculty to engage in research or other educational activities.

SWOSU President Dr. John Hays and Dong-A University President Bong-Keun Sim signed the agreement. Representing Sim at the ceremony in western Oklahoma was Dr. Dong-Gun Park, dean of the College of Natural Sciences at Dong-A University.

"This will allow several of our students to benefit from this extraordinary experience," Hays said. "We are excited and pleased to get this program started."

The first exchange of students or faculty is expected to be this fall.

The program was developed after Dr. Radwan Al-Jarrah, dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, visited Korea in late November of this past year. Al-Jarrah arranged the agreement, which will be reviewed after a five-year period The first exchange program is already underway. Dr. Ja-Hong Koo is on campus and is a visiting artist with the Department of Art.

Dong-A University is located in Busan, Korea, located in the southeast part of South Korea near the South Sea. Busan is a city of 3 million people, and Dong-A University has over 20,000 students.



The 2008 SWOSU Athletic Hall of Fame inductees include: Travis Flippin, 1950s baseball and basketball star; Jimmy Peck, basketball scoring sensation; Tom Bergman, two-time NAIA football All-American, Louis Mendoza, 1977 football All-American; and Valerie Fariss, All-American basketball player and standout on SWOSU's fifth women's NAIA Championship team.

Flippin, a graduate of Retrop High School, starred on the 1952 basketball team that finished the year with a 24-6 record and won the conference title. Flippin played minor league baseball with the Boston Red Sox organization before eventually settling on a career as a coach and teacher.

Peck was an all-state basketball player at Leedey High School and began his college career at the University of Oklahoma, where he led the Sooners in scoring. Peck transferred and played his final year-and-a-half at SWOSU. Peck ended his senior year in 1957 leading the Oklahoma Collegiate Conference in scoring, averaging better than 25 points a game. He is best known for winning four state titles as head girls coach at Woodward High School between 1974 and 1989.

Mendoza was the top player on what many consider SWOSU's best-ever football team in 1977. Mendoza starred as a 225-pound linebacker and was the ringleader of a team that cruised through the regular season with an undefeated 10-0 record and advanced all the way to


the NAIA Championship Game. After graduating in 1979, Mendoza coached both at SWOSU and Mangum High School. In 1988 he took an assistant football position at Clinton High School where he remains today. In Mendoza's 20 years at Clinton, he has helped the Red Tornadoes to eight state titles.

Bergman became SWOSU's first-ever, two-time NAIA All-American when he received first-team football honors in both 1974 and 1975. In his final collegiate game a rash of injuries forced him to play offensive center, defensive tackle, and deep snapper against Central State. He was on the field approximately 140 plays. He signed a free agent contract with the NFL's Chicago Bears, but opted to finish his degree, which he completed in 1976. He has been at Weatherford High School as a coach and teacher for 31 years, helping coach Weatherford to three football and one golf state championships.

Fariss was all-state selection at Leedey in both basketball and volleyball. Fariss led the Bulldogs to the 1990 NAIA title, their fifth in a span of nine years. She was twice named to the All-American teams. She concluded her career as the second-leading scorer in school history with 1,891 points and owns free throw accuracy records for season and career, both above 85%. She now is a Partner in Homestead Title & Closing Company along with current SWOSU Alumni President Mary Regier and a Tag Agent in Cordell.

Bulldog best Teams enjoy success in 2007-2008

SWOSU's football created a five-way knot atop the LSC North at 3-2. The shared LSC North title is SWOSU's first since 1997 when the Bulldogs were co-champs with UCO. SWOSU ends the year at 6-5, the Bulldogs first time since the 1991 and 1992 seasons they had back-to-back winning campaigns. Austin Ellis, Matt Wakefield, Johnathan Haggerty, Josh Postin, Ruzell McCoy and Corey Lenahan were all among 29 players chosen to the LSC North First team All- Conference.





Finishing the year with a 21-8 record, SWOSU men's basketball earned one of the best records the school has had in recent years. The team was consistently ranked in the top 20 nationally in Division II. The senior **Nate Perry** (shown left) was selected first team All-Conference and second team All-Re gion. Junior **Abdullah Lawal** received North Division Defensive Player-of -the- Year.

SWOSU's women basketball was 15-12 overall and 6-6 in the Lone Star Conference North Division. SWOSU ended up tied for fourth in the division. Lucy Ramon (shown right) was chosen as the Lone Star Conference North Division Freshman-of-the-Year. Allie Burdan was recognized by coaches as one of the two top defensive players in the North Division. Grace Anne Fath was one of five Lone Star Conference North Division players to be voted to the all-academic team.

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
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
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
