There's one thing for sure, you will discover a wide variety of people in the Desk Set at SWOSU at Sayre.





### People of Policy

From admittance standards to funds allocations, the Governor and Regents set the guidelines for Oklahoma colleges and universities. While some issues require legislative approval, the Regents catch the flak for yearly tuition hikes and controversial policies. Consequently, the year was marked by frequent resignations and replacements among the members of the two governing boards.

SWOSU administrators increased pressure upon the Regents to gain special status for Sayre which would result in lower tuition, out-of-state fee waivers, and a larger allocation of funds.



The "little things" are important.









Organization is the name of the game which Shawnda Moore tries to win in Records Management class.
















