Dean's Message: *The Times They Are A-Changin'*

*"Come gather 'round people wherever you roam
And admit that the waters
Around you have grown
And accept it that soon
You'll be drenched to the bone.*

*If your time to you
Is worth savin'
Then you better start swimmin'
Or you'll sink like a stone
For the times they are a-changin'!"*

Bob Dylan, 1963

I was raised during the '60's and studied Bob Dylan's lyrics. The man can't carry a tune in a hand basket, but he is a remarkable poet and philosopher. Monumental societal changes and events were the topics of his poetry -- Vietnam, the civil rights movement, Medicare. Dylan's words advised us that the events underway were unstoppable, were right for the nation, and you had better prepare and get onboard if you wanted to prosper. Dylan's clairvoyance gave Americans an opportunity to prepare for the changes that were coming.

Well, a number of events have come together recently that portend significant changes in the profession -- and we need to "start swimmin'" now -- Medicare Part D, Health Care Reform, and pharmacogenomic informed personalized care clearly are directed at professional services. Since the 1960's, the clinical pharmacy paradigm has advocated for pharmacists to use their education. It has been a long struggle, and it is not over yet, but after more than 40 years, pharmacists have been recognized in Medicare Part D and some are directly paid for their clinical activities. Pharmacists' ability to provide quality, direct primary care is a part of the health care debate; as is reimbursement for those services. We have again been given a chance to capitalize on opportunities that arise just every couple of generations.

Not so long ago, there was an acute demand for pharmacists. In the '60's, the strategy to meet the demand was to provide existing colleges with capitation funding and SWOSU had 130 students per class. By the mid-to-late 1970's, the supply of pharmacists met the demand and enrollment declined to its current level of 85 students per year. Up until a couple of years ago, graduating pharmacy students could pick where they wanted to work because of the number of unfilled pharmacy practice openings with six-figure salaries plus bonuses. This time, the entrepreneurial response to the shortage was to start new pharmacy schools and increase the number of graduates. Graduates are still able to find positions, but not with the same ease or degree of personal preference. The political process

is moving ever closer to universal health care coverage and improved access to high quality care at a lower price is the mandate. A shortage of primary care physicians is projected and government and private payers are looking to non-physicians to provide economical, high quality primary care. The paradigm shift from dispensing to clinical pharmacy began during the 60's. The shift has moved slowly over the past nearly 50 years, but we are on the cusp of the next paradigm shift in pharmacy practice. The changes being debated as part of health care reform have significant implications for changing practice. Nationally, Medicare Part D and personalized medicine provide significant opportunities for the enhancements in patient care. Pharmacists' responsibilities for their care will require a huge increase in the number of highly trained, patient-centered pharmacists; many more than available. Attracting exceptional faculty to SWOSU is vital to prevent our students from "sinkin' like a stone" in the upcoming decade of change. To meet these training needs, the college began a matching campaign to honor Dr. Homer Timmons by dedicating an eminent chair position in his name. So, here are the opportunities and challenges for the SWOSU College of Pharmacy in these "changin' times" and how you can help.

We have to do three things to prepare. First, until we get into the next "shortage" of pharmacists resulting from these practice-based shifts, only the top graduates will get the best positions. We want to ensure that SWOSU pharmacy graduates are competitive for the best positions. The college's faculty alone cannot provide students with the experiences they need for their professional development and the students need exemplary preceptors for their introductory and advanced pharmacy experiences. Please accept our heartfelt "thanks" to those who are invested in our students' education already. For those not yet involved; please consider getting involved.

SWOSU students also need enhancements to the Pharmaceutical Care Labs (PCLs) that provide them with the most contemporary training in medication therapy management and personalized care. Full participation on interdisciplinary teams in primary care environments and biotechnology advances such as pharmacogenomics, biosimilar medication products, sharable electronic medical records, enhanced home monitoring and diagnosis kits, and expansion of electronic prescribing are important to these advances. Most of the skills and technologies needed for these professional services are rarely found in rural communities where pharmacists may be the only health professional for miles around. Consequently, students need to receive cutting edge

training on campus. These skills will also be necessary for pharmacists already practicing in the community. One of the college's goals is to develop a center of excellence in continuing professional development where these new skills can be taught and practiced using distance education, adult learning models.

Finally, to ensure pharmacists a place on the primary care interdisciplinary team, SWOSU students need to participate fully in local, state, and national pharmacy organizations to experience the culture, pride and political power in being a pharmacy professional. We would like to extend our thanks to those who participate in the SWOSU "Pharmacy Job Interview Day" and pay a newly-instituted sponsorship fee for SWOSU students' leadership development. It will be used to enhance students' leadership development activities, including participation in the professional political process.

Over the years, I have found that students with the right skills and attitudes make the best pharmacists. The three "asks" of my first "Dean's Message" are directed at enhancing SWOSU students' skills and attitude. Please help me to: (1) provide students with the opportunity to hone their skills in the best pharmacies -- yours; (2) work with SWOSU's exceptional faculty to acquire the resources to keep our pharmacy care skill training program on the cutting edge of practice, and (3) help us to mold our students' attitude and confidence so that they will benefit themselves and the profession by being leaders and courageously taking first steps into the medical home. Let's not miss our chance for the second time in a generation to achieve the vision of the clinical pharmacy movement during the '60's -- "for the times they are a-changin'".

Oh, I almost forgot. The Dean of the College changed over the summer too. My name is Doug Ried and I am the new dean. I look forward to meeting you and finding out from you how we can make SWOSU College of Pharmacy and its students even better.

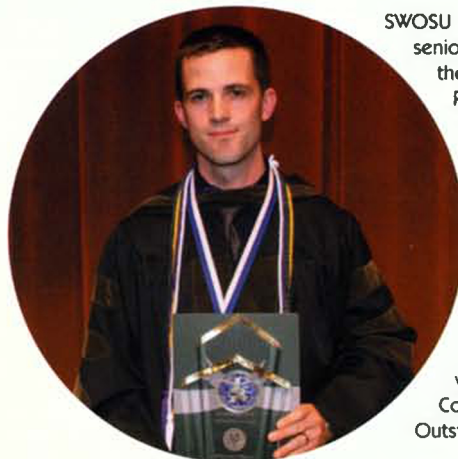

Lowell and Norberta Irby Donate to Pharmacy Foundation

Lowell and Norberta Irby of Artesia, New Mexico donated \$20,000 to the Southwestern Pharmacy Alumni Foundation, a non-profit organization that solely supports the College of Pharmacy.

The gift was designated to the Irby Family Practice Grant Fund that gives grants to pharmacy students on practice rotations who have demonstrated significant financial need. The Irbys established the fund in 1996 and have contributed nearly \$200,000 to SWOSU since that time.

"Southwestern gave me the education and training that has allowed me to be successful in the business world," said Irby, a 1955 graduate. "I have always believed that one should help those that have helped you, and our family believes that SWOSU is probably the premier pharmacy school for training retail pharmacists."

While at SWOSU, Irby played football for one year and was active in pharmacy activities and the Wesley Foundation at the First United Methodist Church. He was honored in 1999 as a distinguished alumnus of the SWOSU College of Pharmacy. He serves on the Southwestern Pharmacy Alumni Foundation Board of Directors and is a lifetime member of the Pharmacy Alumni Association.

Irby was not the only one in his family to attend the SWOSU College of Pharmacy. Brother Dillard Bayless Irby graduated in 1951, and sons Kirk and Wade graduated in 1995 and 1996, respectively. The Irbys' other son, Eugene, runs an oil field service company owned by the family, and their daughter, LaNette, is a biologist and zoologist.

Irby is very active in the Artesia community, especially with the Artesia Public Schools. In 2008, the school system dedicated their newly redesigned and remodeled board room as the Lowell Irby Board Room in honor of his service on the board since 1977. The Irbys recently celebrated 50 dedicated years of business with their Lowell's Pharmacy in Artesia.

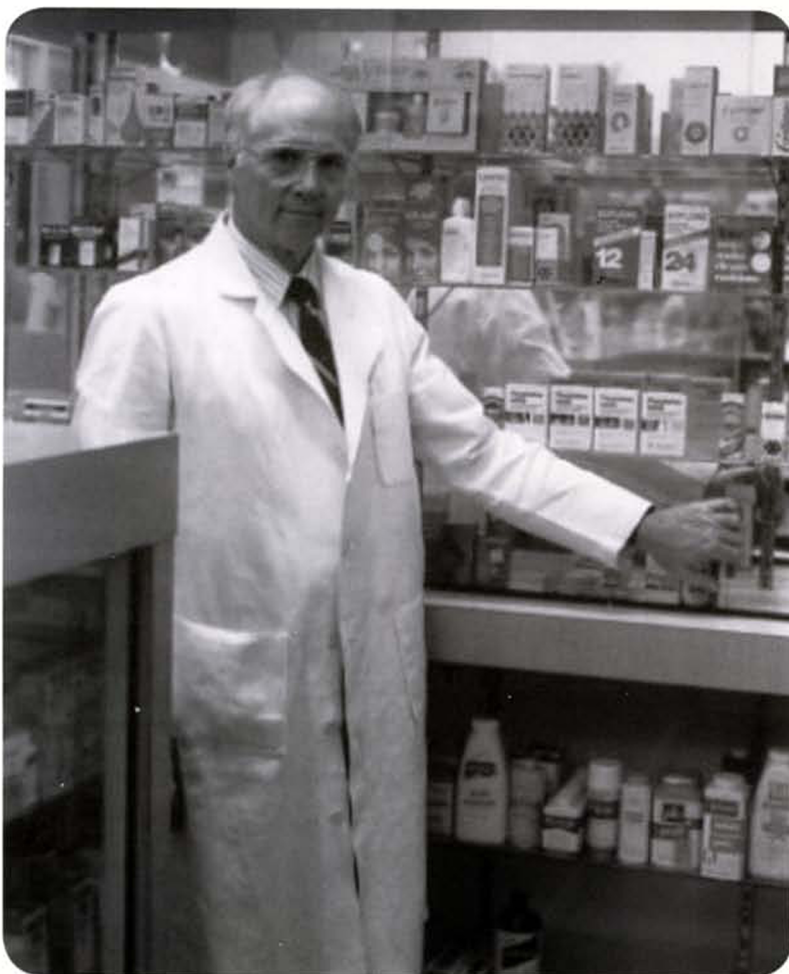

H.F. Timmons Endowed Chair in Pharmacy

The First Endowed Chair for SWOSU College of Pharmacy



To honor Dr. H.F. Timmons for his long and productive career with SWOSU, the H.F. Timmons Endowed Chair in Pharmacy Fund was established to be used to supplement research, scholarly activity and other efforts for the SWOSU College of Pharmacy.

During his almost four decades of service to SWOSU, Timmons served as acting dean of the School of Pharmacy, taught courses throughout the physiology area of the pharmacy curriculum, served on numerous SWOSU committees, as well as School of Pharmacy and School of Health Sciences committees, was president of the Faculty Association, faculty advisor to the SWOSU Student Senate and School of Pharmacy organizations, established a variety of new courses in the School of Pharmacy, new programs in the School of Health Sciences and was instrumental in securing a variety of health care related grants and contracts for SWOSU.

Dr. Timmons continues to serve the community and SWOSU. He remains a volunteer ombudsman for the Oklahoma State Department of Human Services. He has returned to the College of Pharmacy several times during his retirement to teach courses for faculty who have needed time off because of illness. Dr. H.F. Timmons was named the 2009 Outstanding Alumnus of the SWOSU College of Pharmacy and was awarded honorary alumni status. In addition, Timmons serves as an ex-officio trustee for the SWOSU Foundation. He has served on the Board of Directors of the Southwestern Pharmacy Alumni Foundation for more than 30 years, most recently as president, and has been instrumental in major fundraising efforts with the Pharmacy Foundation to support the SWOSU College of Pharmacy and its students.

Creating an endowment honors the distinguished career of Dr. Timmons and his influence on many generations of pharmacy

students and pharmacists. By helping to fund this endowment, you will have a vital role in linking the traditions with the future of the SWOSU College of Pharmacy.



The rapidly emerging field of pharmacogenomics deals with the influence of genetic variation on drug response in patients by correlating gene expression with a drug's efficacy or toxicity. Pharmacogenomic-based responses to medications have been shown to predict improved efficacy of cancer, hypertension, and anti-coagulant medications. Although there is still a long way to go before routine implementation of pharmacogenomics in clinical practice is achieved, pharmacy colleges are responsible for preparing students and practicing pharmacists to be familiar with the latest developments and to meet the future demands of more personalized medication therapy treatment plans.

One of the goals of the SWOSU College of Pharmacy is translation of science into practice. We are committed to "improving our students' training in pharmacogenomics". This can be achieved by implementing changes and new directions in the education program that will provide future pharmacists with knowledge, skills and attitudes to be more competitive in the health care system. The purpose of the endowed chair is for us to meet these new technology-based, patient-centered training needs for students and practitioners alike.

Pharmacogenomics will extend pharmacists' ability to provide drug therapy management services. It will further integrate pharmacists into the mainstream of service provision to physicians and patients. The patient-specificity of pharmacogenomics promises to foster the development of new patient-oriented pharmaceutical care practices and enhance the value of pharmacists in optimizing patients' drug therapy management. In the long-term, it is likely that all pharmacists, regardless of practice site, will need to understand and apply pharmacogenomic skills in practice. With adequate preparation, the broader incorporation of pharmacogenomics into clinical practice should bring with it greater opportunity for pharmacists to use their expertise regarding drug therapy, with a greater chance to positively impact patient care, and to solidify pharmacists' place on the patient's care team.

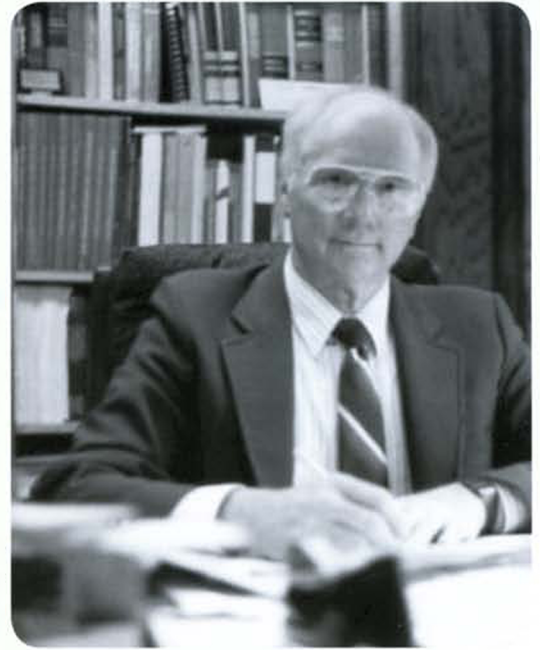
Matching Endowment Program

In 1988, the Oklahoma Legislature established the Oklahoma State Regents Endowment Program, an innovative way to strengthen the state's colleges and universities. The program is funded by the state legislature and matches private gifts for endowed faculty positions established in academic disciplines that contribute to the cultural, business, scientific or economic development of the state. Income from these endowments can be used to supplement the salary of the faculty member, provide other scholarly expenses related to the faculty member's teaching and research, buy equipment, or fund graduate assistance.

One of the most powerful tools for **attracting and retaining excellence in educational leaders** is the endowed faculty chair. Distinguished chair holders also generate external support from public and private sources, bringing added prestige to the college and reducing the dependence on tuition and fees. Endowed chairs enable a college to recruit and retain faculty whose national reputations elevate its prominence and whose experience and expertise make an exceptional contribution to its teaching, research and public service.

As a state institution, SWOSU participates in the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education (OSRHE) matching endowment program. To create a chair position, a permanently restricted **endowment gift of \$250,000 will be matched by OSRHE** with an additional \$250,000.

After spending many years in the pharmaceutical industry as well as hospital pharmacy practice, Dr. Steini joined SWOSU College of Pharmacy as the Regional Experiential Coordinator for Eastern Oklahoma. She resides in Tulsa with her husband and three children.



New Program - Introductory Pharmacy Practice Experiences (IPPE)

During the summer of 2009, SWOSU College of Pharmacy's first group of 82 students completed their institutional IPPE rotations at sites throughout Oklahoma and the surrounding region. Comments from both students and preceptors have been positive regarding the program and the learning opportunities. The only way this program has been successful thus far is due to the efforts of that legion of dedicated pharmacist-preceptor-adjunct faculty members, many of whom are SWOSU alums, who understand the value of teaching students early on in the "real world" environment. The College of Pharmacy is very grateful to the individuals (about 100 pharmacist-preceptor-adjunct faculty members) and the 38 facilities that made this first venture successful.

The purpose of the IPPE rotations is to provide students an early introduction to the practice of pharmacy and begin building a knowledge base to become the foundation for the advanced pharmacy practice rotations (APPE). All pharmacy practice programs help students apply knowledge learned in more traditional "classroom" courses to the practice of pharmacy and to ultimately help benefit patients who utilize those pharmacy services.

At Southwestern, the IPPE experiences are an integral part of the curriculum. The IPPE experiences are divided into three primary areas. (1) The **Integrated IPPE** portion occurs as a series of activities such as shadowing rotations during the first semester of the professional pharmacy curriculum, service projects with health care organizations, emergency room rotations, interviews with patients, interviews with health care providers, and more. All of these activities are actually scheduled activities in other more traditional "classroom" courses, but the specific IPPE components take place outside of the classroom or laboratory. (2) The second area of IPPE at SWOSU is the **Institutional IPPE** component. During this course, students are assigned to a typical institutional pharmacy for a three-week block of time during the summer months. The students have an opportunity to experience the typical activities that take place in this type of pharmacy setting. Students earn both academic credit and intern hours credit for the course. (3) The third area for IPPE is the **Community IPPE**. Students are assigned to spend three weeks in a community pharmacy practice site. Again, students earn both academic

credit and intern hours credit for the course. The community IPPE is also scheduled to occur during the summer months of May, June, July, or August. Students typically enroll in IPPE courses during the fall semesters, but the rotation assignments take place during the summer months (May to August) with the exception of the Integrated IPPE component.

IPPE is more than a job "shadowing" program, but does have elements of the "shadowing" type of experience. Students should also have opportunities to perform the work of a pharmacy intern, within the confines of state pharmacy law and the particular circumstances of the sites to which students might be assigned. Students should have the opportunity to be as involved in the day-to-day operations of the pharmacy site as is reasonable and appropriate to that site.
