Appreciation

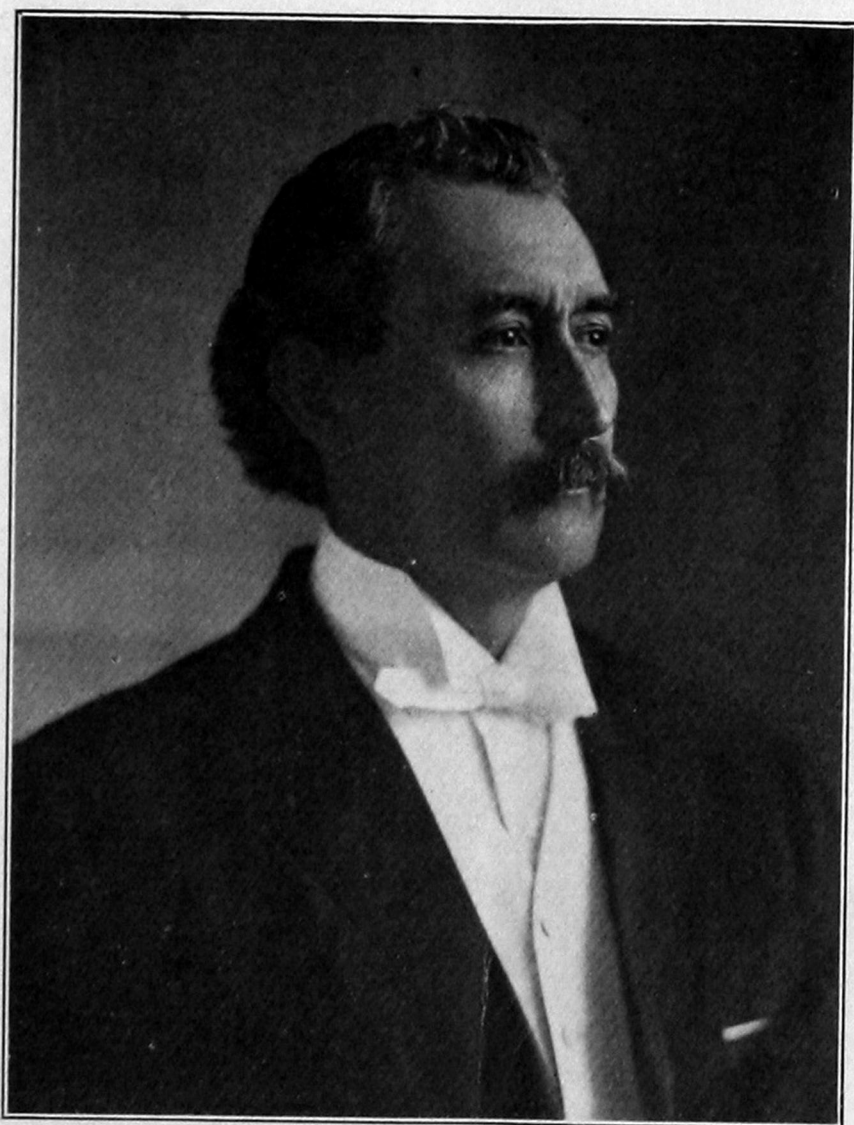

The Foundation

In the opinion of the upper classman, the relation of the Subnormal Department to the Southwestern as a whole is typified by the relation of the foundation to the whole structure of a building. 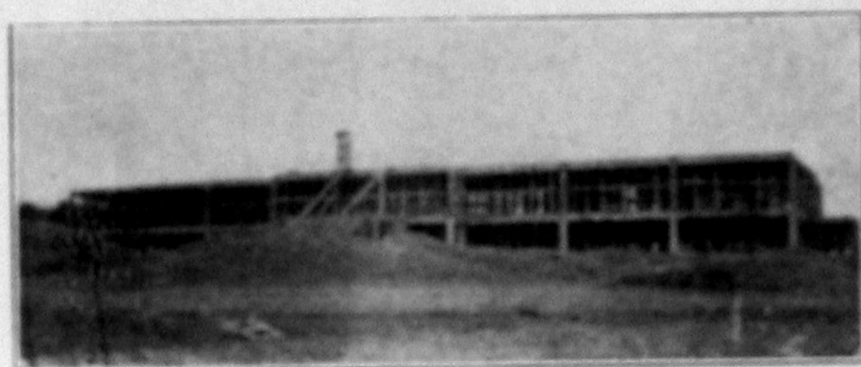
The Training School

It is here the Senior's patience is developed and his sympathies broadened. He goes out with pleasant memories of the children and a feeling that it was time well spent.

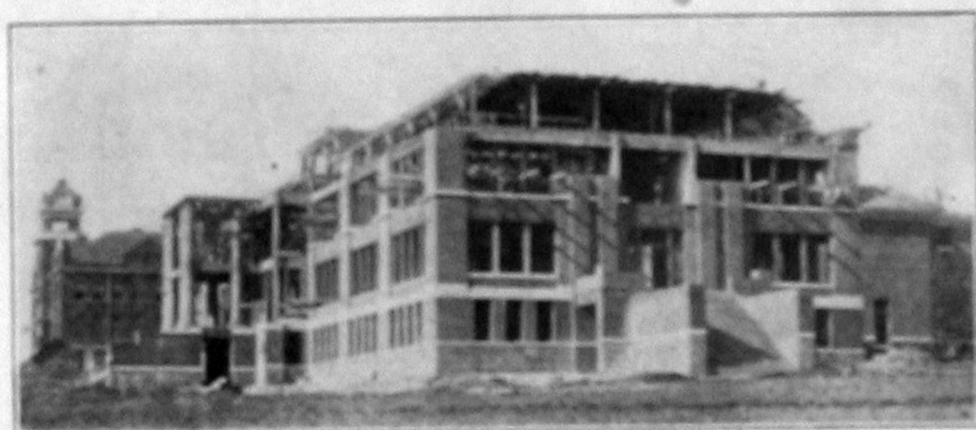

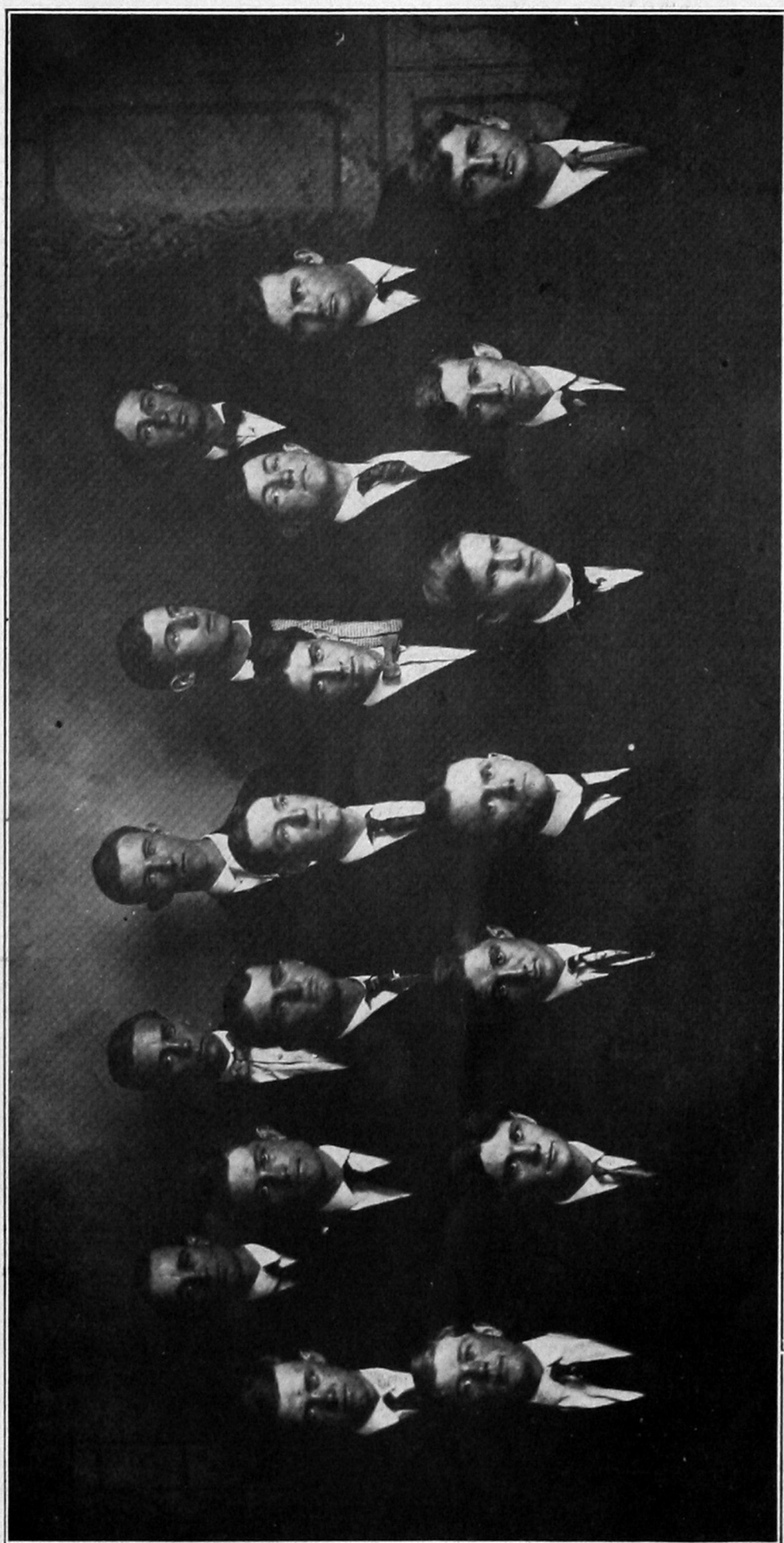
Senate

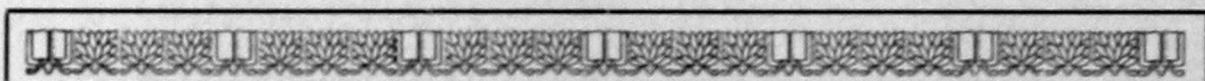
The Senate Debating Club was organized Wednesday, October 14, 1908. Very good work in debating and Parliamentary Law was done during the remainder of the fall term, and the middle of the winter term found the New Club well organized with a strong membership. A contract was made for a Triangular Debate with Central and Northwestern Normal Schools. Under the able supervision of Prof. Scott, and by the ardent efforts of the debators, Southwestern was able to count four out of a possible six points. This was very encouraging to the New Club, as it marked Southwestern's first debate with another school.

The Senate began its work last fall with the opening of the school year. Its interest and welfare were uppermost in the hearts of all loyal Southwesterners, and the several months of preparation and active Cooperation of the members served as hearty encouragement to the chosen debators. In spite of their best efforts, on March 29, the teams lost the debate both at home and at Northwestern. Notwithstanding the defeat this year, the Club has a strong determination to win next year.

The purpose of the Senate is set forth in Article II. of the Constitution. "The purpose of this organization shall be to train the members in public speaking, particularly in debate and extemporaneous speaking, also to give formal and definite study to parliamentary law and to give practical training in the practice and customs of deliberative assemblies." It has met regularly every Saturday night since its organization, and every member is doing his best to help carry out the spirit of the Club. 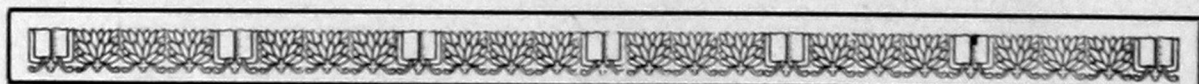
House of Representatives

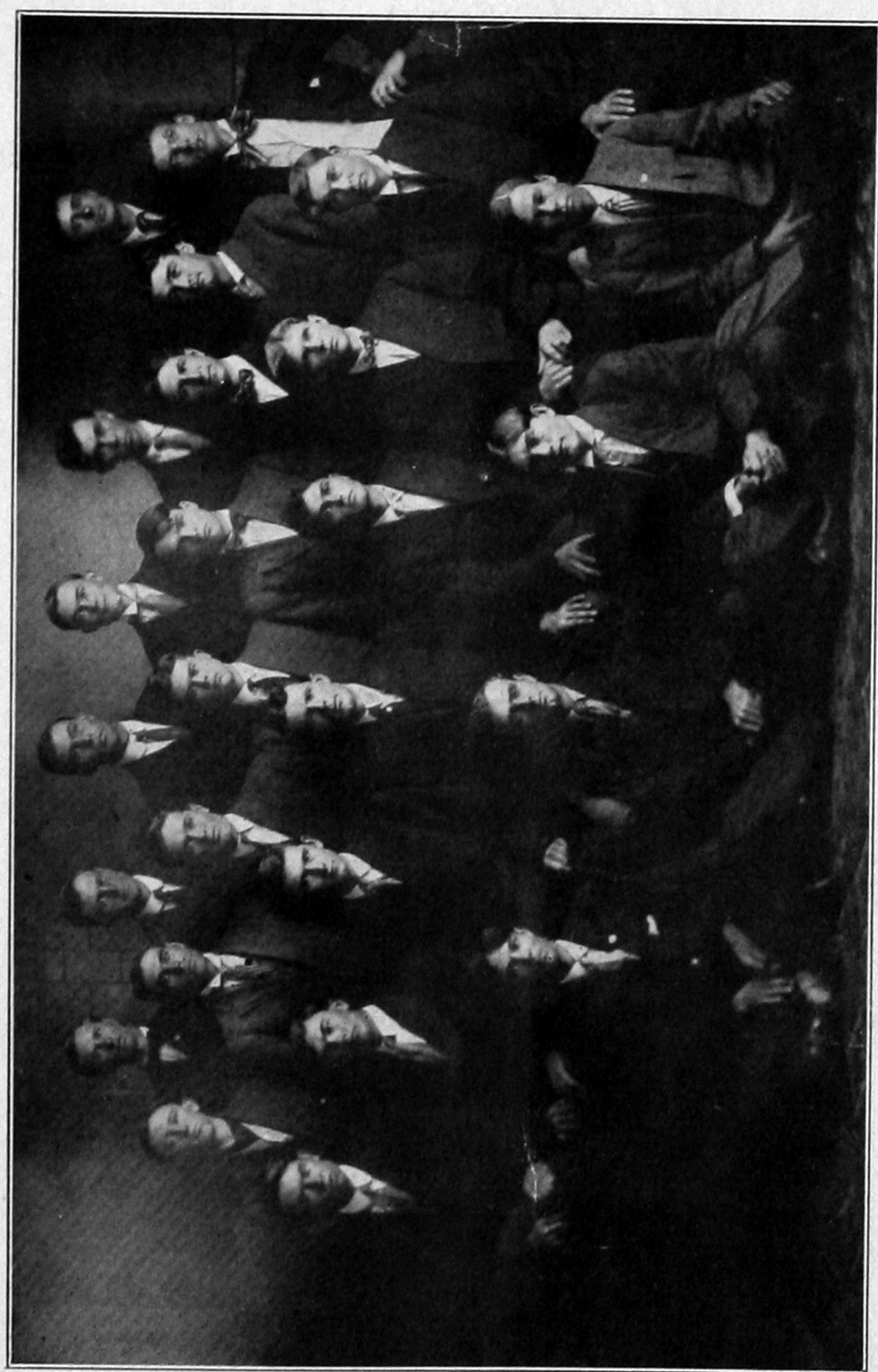

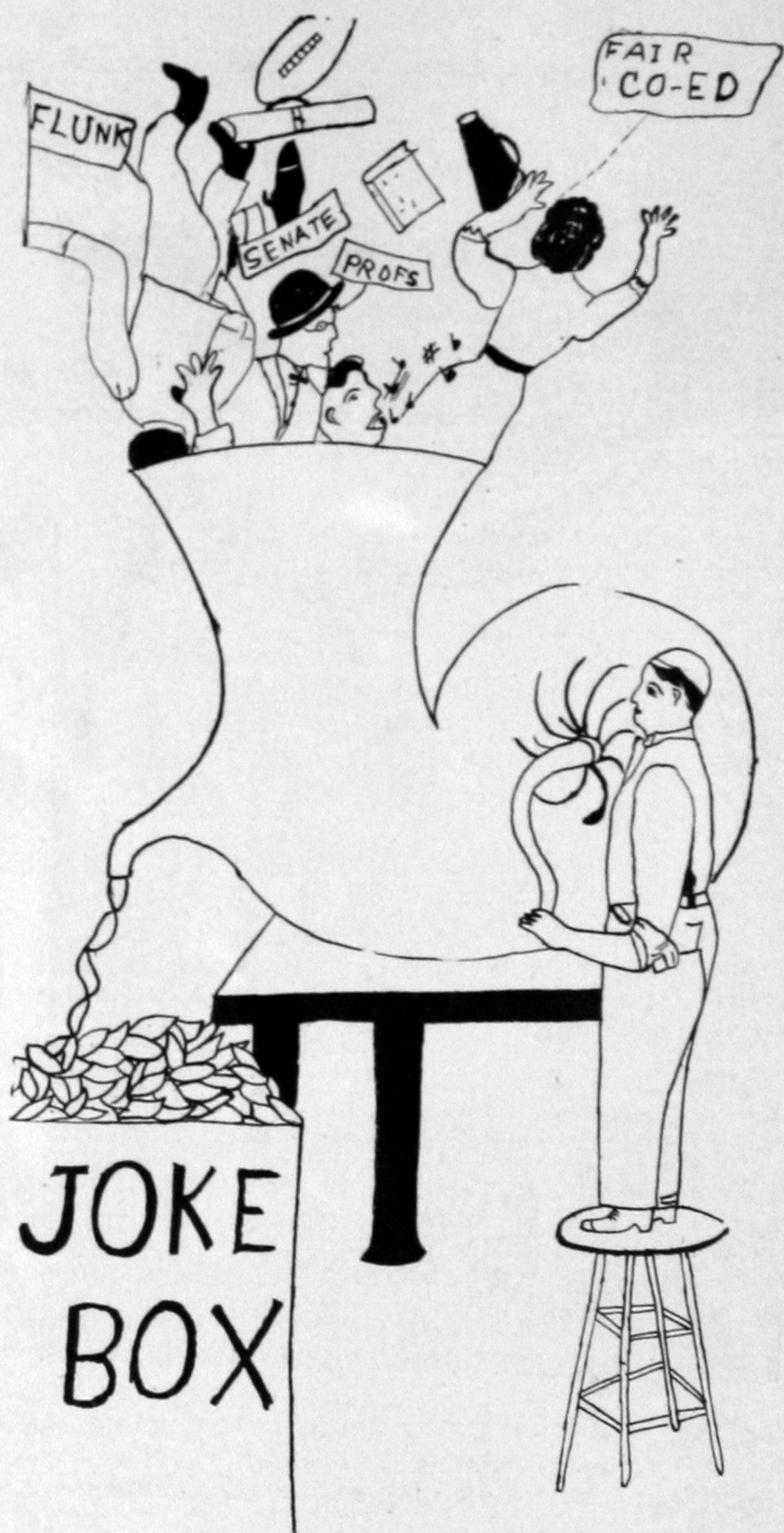
Taking all facts into consideration we have certainly turned out winning teams in Athletics during the past year.
