



Jane Jolen

Our Writer Guest of Honor is both prolific and multitalented. Some of her more notable books for children include the National Book Award nominee, THE GIRL WHO CRIED FLOWERS (which also won the Golden Kite Award), and the Society of Children's Book Writers Honor Books, THE TRANSFIGURED HART and MOON RIBBON. Yolen's sf juvenile, DRAGON'S BLOOD (Dell, 1982), and THE GIFT OF SARAH BARKER, were American Library Best Books for Young Adults. Yolen is also a regular contributor to the major sf and fantasy magazines and anthologies. A poetry and story collection, NEPTUNE RISING, was published by Putnam in 1982, and TALES OF WONDER appeared from Schocken in 1983. Yolen's adult fantasy novel, CARDS OF GRIEF, will be published by Ace Books this fall.

In addition to fiction, Yolen has published two text-books: WRITING BOOKS FOR CHILDREN (Writer, Inc., 1973, 1982), and TOUCH MAGIC: Fantasie, Faerie, and Folklore in the Literature of Childhood (Philomel, 1981). She is the author of two songbooks, several non-fiction books for children, and many poems ("Neptune Rising" was a Rhysling Award nominee in 1983).

Yolen's work displays her deep interest in-- and knowledge of-- myth and folklore, and her respect for oral tradition and the craft of storytelling. She blends time-tested elements from the "cauldron of story" with psychological insight, to produce fantasy that is as harmonious to the ear as it is pleasing to the eye.

Besides writing, Yolen has been a lecturer at Smith College, and has served as Chair of the Board of Library Trustees and on the Arts Council of Hatfield, Massachusetts, her home. She holds a B.A. from Smith, a M.Ed. from the University of Massachusetts, and the Doctor of Laws degree from the College of Our Lady of the Elms.

Paul F. Ford

As our Scholar Guest of Honor, we have the author of COMPANION TO NARNIA (Harper & Row, 1980, 1983), which received the 1982 Mythopoeic Award for Scholarship. He has also produced an audiocassette program, A DAY IN NARNIA, for Franciscan Communications, and is the consultant for the series of films of the Chronicles of Narnia being developed by Glenray Productions of Pasadena (beginning with THE MAGICIAN'S NEPHEW in Thanksgiving of 1986). He is also on the Board of Directors of The Kilns, Ltd., which is purchasing and preserving Lewis' home in Oxford, and is a founding director of the Southern California C.S. Lewis Society and was the first editor of its quarterly journal, THE LAMP POST.

Ford received a B.A. in Philosophy and an M.A. in Religion with the thesis, THE LIFE OF THE WORLD TO COME IN THE WRITINGS OF C.S. LEWIS. He now teaches theology at Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles and at Fuller Theological Seminary in Pasadena, where he is working on his doctorate in Systematic Theology. His dissertation will be titled, C.S. LEWIS, ECUMENICAL SPIRITUAL DI-RECTOR, and there are plans for its publication by Harper & Row after Ford's graduation in June of 1985.

Ford studied for the Roman Catholic priesthood, though he was never ordained, and was a Benedictine monk for five years. He has not yet decided what he will do when he finishes his doctorate, but it will include both teaching and writing.

In the future, Ford would like to research and write on the human experiences of forgiveness, jealousy, acedia (restless depression) and intemperance. Ford is deeply interested in people, and hopes to help them by counseling, teaching, and writing that integrates theology and psychology.

George Macdonald

George MacDonald's well-deserved reputation as the finest of mid-Victorian fantasy writers, and the high regard in which he was held by C.S. Lewis (who edited an anthology of MacDonald's writings), and J.R.R. Tolkien (whose "Smith of Wooton Major" was partly inspired by "The Golden Key"), make him an excellent guest for Mythcon.

MacDonald was born in 1824 on a farm in northeastern Scotland. He received a Master's degree in Science from the University of Aberdeen, and worked as a teacher, a librarian, and a minister. By the time he was thirty, however, he had begun his lifelong career as a writer.

Many of MacDonald's novels are realistic romantic "potboilers" inspired by his Scottish boyhood, but he has always returned to his true love, the fantastic. Of his two major adult fantasies, PHANTASTES, published in 1868, was his first novel, and LILITH, which appeared in 1895, was one of his last. He also wrote the everpopular CURDIE books and other children's fairy tales, including many short stories, such as "The Golden Key" and "The Lost Princess".

MacDonald has been a major figure in the English literary world. His friends include such noted writers as Lewis Carroll and Charles Kingsley. He has taught literature at the University of London, gave a successful lecture tour of the United States in 1872, and was once considered for the position of Poet Laureate. Besides fiction and poetry, he has published literary essays and sermons, and has edited a critical edition of HAMLET as well as a series of children's magazines.

George MacDonald died in Surrey, England, in 1905.

Program Notes PAPERS David Bratman

Traditionally, the major activity at Mythcon has been the presentation of papers discussing aspects of the works of J.R.R. Tolkien, C.S. Lewis, Charles Williams, and other fantasy authors and members of the Oxford-based literary group known as the Inklings. It is also traditional to have papers which relate to the conference theme. Usually, Mythcon papers are read by their own authors—in cases where the author is unable to attend, the paper may be read by someone designated by the committee. Papers presented at Mythcon are automatically considered for publication in the Mythopoeic Society's journal, MYTHLORE.

PANECS

Diana C. Paxson

In addition to papers by readers of fantasy, we will have several panel discussions featuring writers of fantasy and experts in various relevant fields. year, our panels will be: A Tribute to George MacDonald, a discussion of the life and work of our posthumous Guest of Honor: Celtic Twilight or Celtic Dawn? Writers who have drawn upon Celtic culture in their work attempt to account for its peculiar appeal; Forests of Fantasy-- In our theme panel, writers discuss legendary forests from Broceliande to the Hundred Acre Wood and consider their significance; Collecting Fantasy Books, in which some knowledgeable book collectors discuss what is and isn't valuable, and locating rare finds; Children's Fantasy, a discussion of juvenile and Young Adult fantasy literature -- how it differs from books for adults, and in what ways it is the same; Music and Magic, which explores the wizardry of Sound; and The Ecology of Faerie, a consideration of the Natural Order of fantasy worlds. . .

In addition to appearing on panels, most of the writers who will be with us this weekend will also be doing readings. Come and listen to the sound of fantasy as read by its authors, get a preview of new work or a new appreciation of old. There will also be a group autographing session in the Revelhall at 4:00 on Sunday afternoon.


