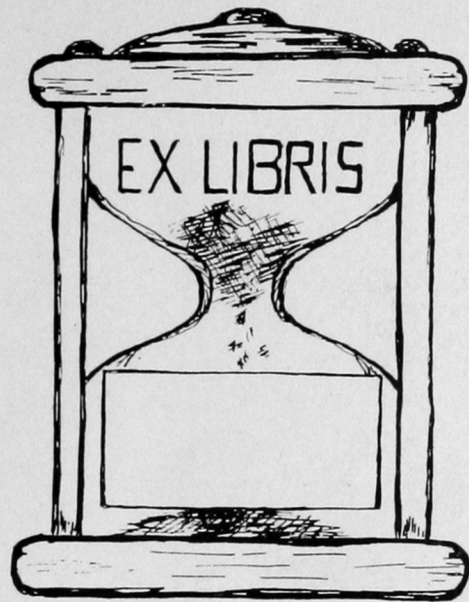

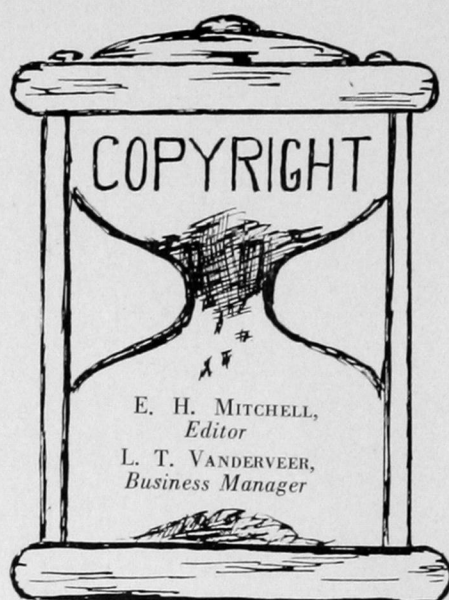

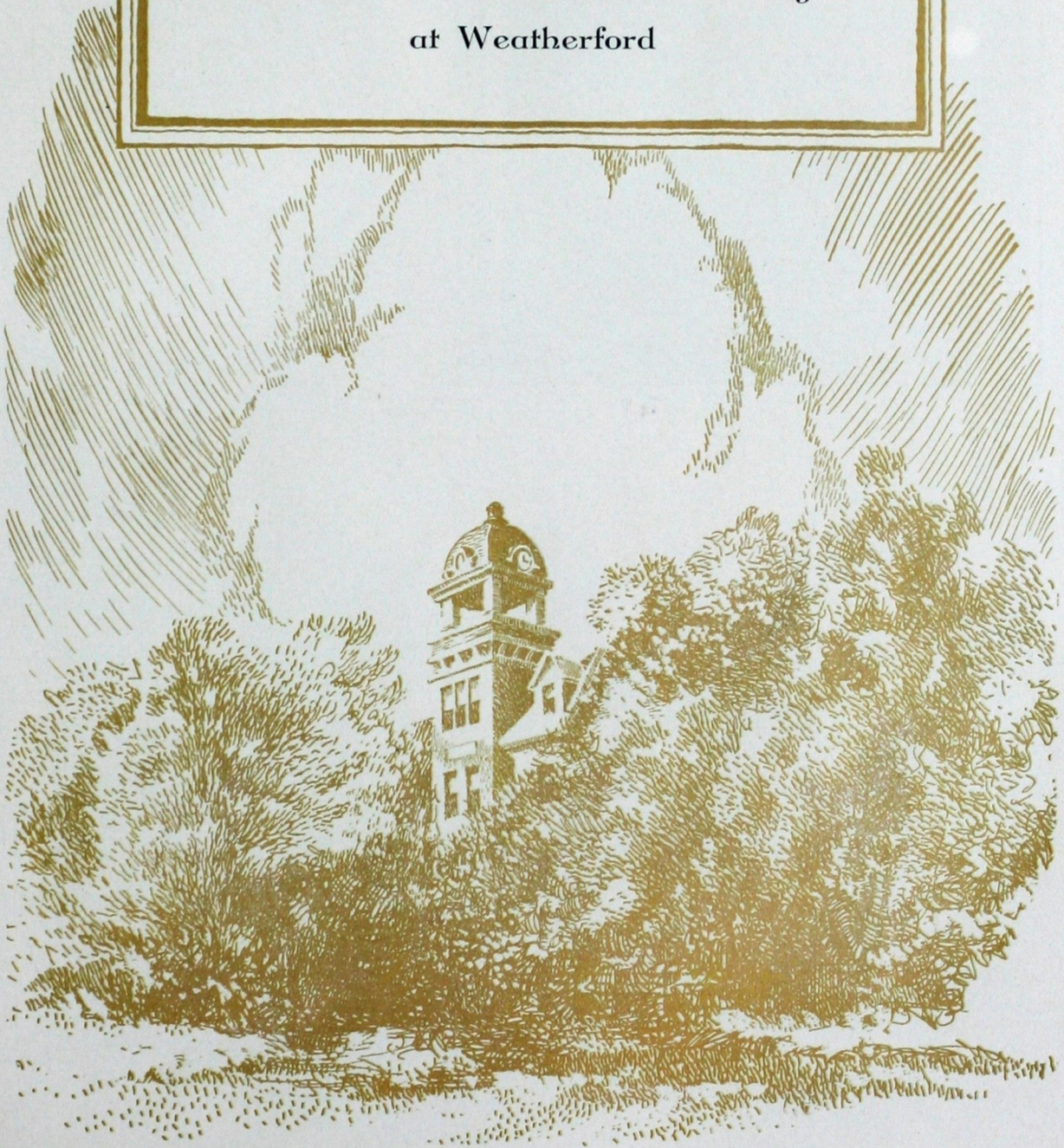

## Foreword


Yesterday Oklahoma was but a rolling prairie, habitat of the skulking coyote, the majestic bison, and the roaming savage.

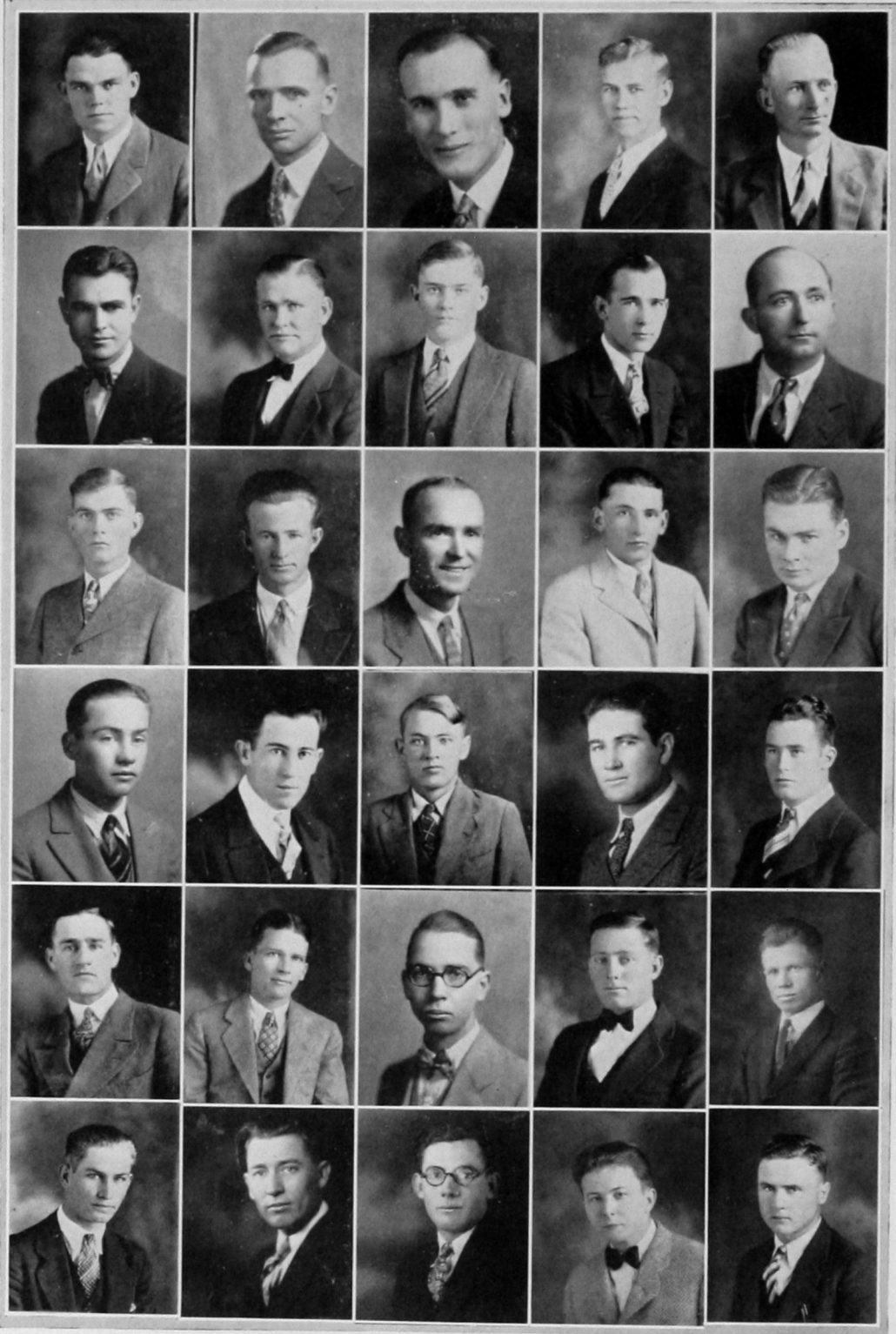
The Forensia society is the oldest girls' club in Southwestern, and is a member of the Federated Clubs for Women.

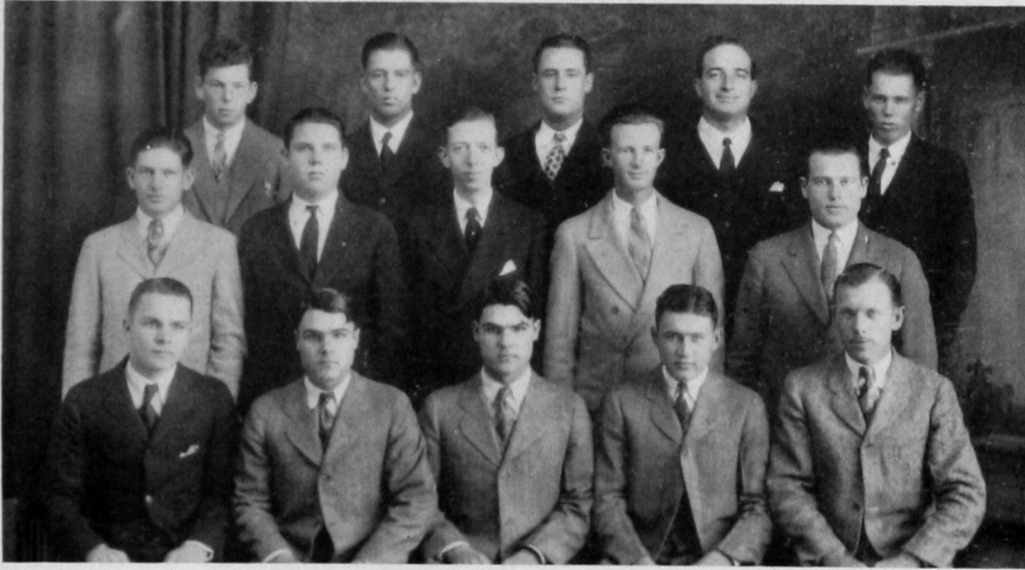

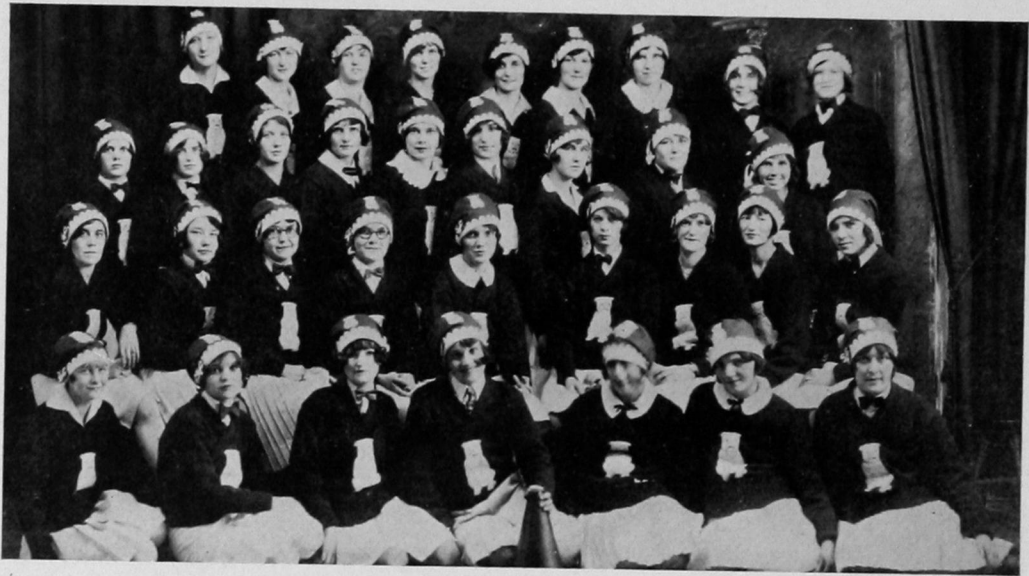

## Wrestling 1928

Southwestern enjoyed a very successful year on the mat. When Coach Milam and Captain Jackson issued the call for wrestling candidates, a good squad of inexperienced but willing men reported for work. The first meet was lost to Oklahoma university but Jackson and Kent gained falls over their opponents.

In the next match, East Central was overwhelmed in the local gymnasium, Jackson, Fariss, Anderson, and M. Norman winning falls. At Edmond the Bulldogs lost a hardfought match to Central, inexperience counting against the young Bulldogs. At Weatherford the Bronchos were defeated decisively, Norman and Kent pinning their men.

In the annual championship tournament at Edmond, Southwestern was again nosed out by Central, 25 to 23. Oklahoma Baptist university was third and East Central fourth with 11 and 10 points, respectively, while Oklahoma City university and Northeastern each scored three points.

Three Bulldogs were crowned state champions, Maurice Norman winning by a fall over Johnson of Central in the finals of the 125 pound class, while Tom Kent, 135 pounds, and Roy Anderson, 145 pounds, won their final bouts by decisions over Davidson of East Central and Grossman of Oklahoma City. Captain Perry Jackson lost to Cramer of Central in the heavy weight class by a time advantage of only 18 seconds, after two extension periods.

In the opening rounds of the tournament, Maurice Norman pinned Legg of O. B. U.; Kent won the decision over Barnes of Central; Anderson won a fall over Brandt of O. B. U. and a decision over Compton of Central. Keen lost to Potter of Central by a fall in the 115 pound finals.

Captain Jackson will be lost to the team next year but enough men will return to continue Southwestern's high rank among the teams of the conference in wrestling.

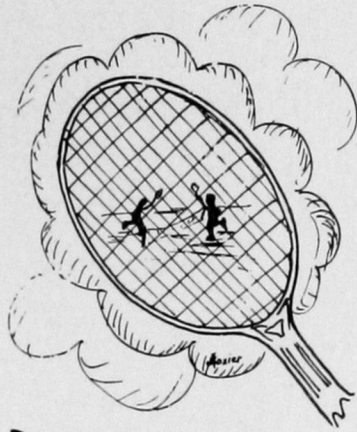
## Track 1928

Besides these many new men are displaying great promise in the early workouts and all indications point to a victorious season.



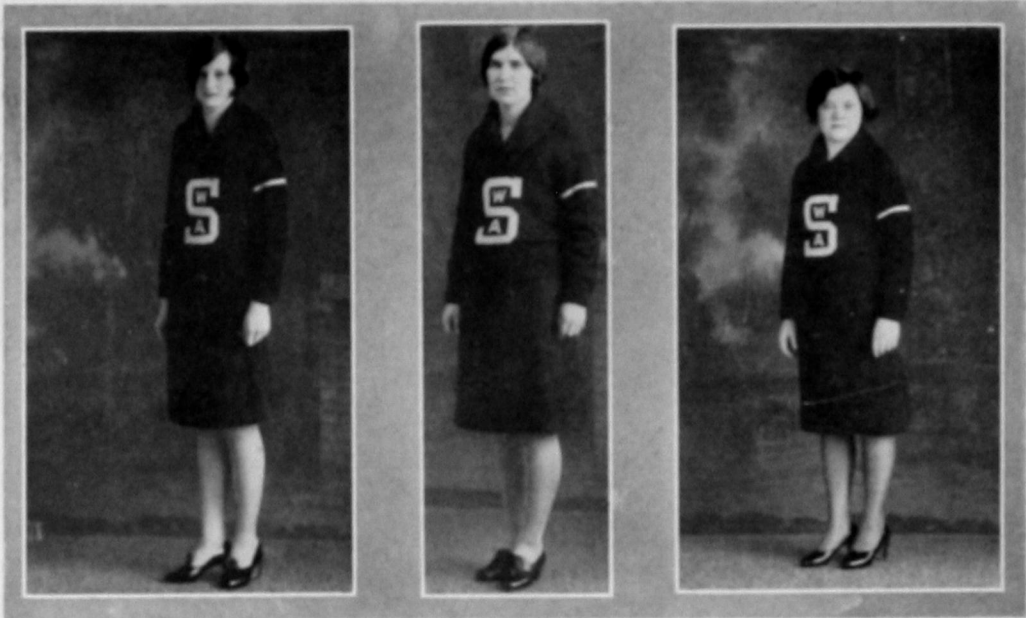
