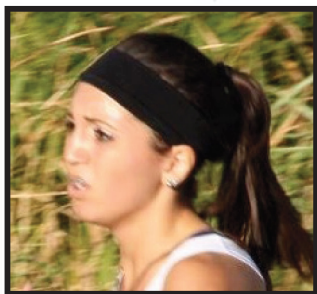

New counseling program focuses on self-esteem

Do you wake up dreading the day?
Do you feel discouraged with what you have accomplished in life?
Do you want greater self-esteem, productivity, and joy in daily living?
Students who answer yes to any of these questions are encouraged to participate in the new self-esteem program offered by the Counseling Services personnel.

The program is an eight- to ten-week program consisting of a 30- to 45-minute meeting once a week.

The Counseling Service's goal is to begin this program Wednesday September 23.

Kim Liebscher, the director of Counseling Services, is in charge of the program, and is hoping to have a group discussion the first week about meeting times that best suit the participants. The meetings will be held in the conference room of the Health and Counseling office inside the Wellness Center. Depending on the comfort of the participants, the location may be moved somewhere else on campus.

Liebscher would like to invite all faculty, students, staff, or anyone struggling

with any issues involved with self-esteem to attend this program.

"Everyone will benefit from this program," Liebscher said.

Self-esteem is a big part of our daily life. According to Liebscher, this program "is a non-medicated way to improve depression, anxiety, and stress."

The atmosphere of the program will be a relaxing, friendly, and comfortable for all participants to learn and improve self-esteem qualities, Liebscher said.

The program is free to all participants and the Counseling Services will provide free pizza. This program is based on the book *Ten Days to Self-Esteem*, written by David D. Burns, M.D. The Counseling Services office has purchased the books and will provide the book free to all participants. It will be a fun, educational way to interact with other people and peers suffering from the same daily struggles, Liebscher said.

Liebscher would like students to know that if they are not interested in attending this program or are unable to attend due to schedule conflicts, the Counseling Services offer individual sessions made by appointment. Holgado and Cothran represent SWOSU at science institute

Dr. Andrea Holgado and Dr. Rickey Cothran of the SWOSU Department of Biological Sciences attended the National Academy's Gulf Coast Summer Institute (GCSI) in Louisiana. The GCSI is one of six regional institutes on undergraduate education funded by the Howard Hughes Medical Institute and designed to transform undergraduate science education using a method of course design that provides students with conceptual knowledge that "sticks" while playing to the strengths of university science educators. Participating were 30 faculty from 15 institutions in eight states, one United States territory and two countries. Holgado and Cothran are now recognized as National Academies Education Fellows in the Sciences.

The Laramie Project is centered on the 1998 murder of University of Wyoming student Matthew Shepard who was kidnapped, severely beaten and left to die by being tied to a fence. Admission is \$5 for adults, \$3 for non-SWOSU students and free for individuals with a valid SWOSU ID. Tickets can be obtained at the box office on Mondays through Fridays from 4-7 p.m. by calling 580.774.6046.

Southwestern’s Department of Art, Communication, and Theatre is set to open the box office for the theatrical production of The Laramie Project written by Moisés Kaufman and Members of Tectonic Theater Project.

The SWOSU Hilltop Theatre Box Office will begin selling tickets and taking reservations at 4:00 p.m. on Monday, September 21. Performances are scheduled for 7:30 p.m. nightly on October 6, 7, & 8th; Tuesday, Oct. 6th includes a talk-back session immediately following the performance.

A panel of professionals will invite a discussion of the subjects raised in the play – specifically with the hope of ending violence, bigotry, and hate crimes in our society.

The play is centered on the murder of Matthew Shepard. In October 1998, he was a twenty-one-year-old student at the University of Wyoming. He was

kidnapped, severely beaten and left to die, tied to a fence in the middle of the prairie outside Laramie, Wyoming. His bloody, bruised and battered body was not discovered until the next day, and he died several days later in an area hospital.

He was the victim of this assault because he was gay. Moisés Kaufman and fellow members of the Tectonic Theater Project made six trips to Laramie over the course of a year and a half in the aftermath of the beating and during the trial of the two young men accused of killing Shepard. They conducted more than 200 interviews with the people of the town.

State Fair time means new state fair foods

The 2015 Oklahoma State Fair started last Thursday with a brand new set of events and attractions, as well as new food creations.

Tickets at the gate cost \$10 for adults (ages 12+) and just \$5 for children (ages 6-11). Children under 5-years-old get in for free. Season passes cost \$30 at the gate. Advanced tickets can be purchased online at a discounted price.

Deep-fried food this year includes a banana pudding, chocolate (A flaky pastry filled with Belgian chocolate and fried to a golden brown), mushrooms, and coffee.

Parfaits with mashed potatoes serving as the ice cream will include boneless rib parfaits and brisket parfaits.

Bacon is a big attraction. This year, bacon will be featured on a bacon-wrapped corn on the cob, bacon-wrapped donut burger, and beer-battered chocolate-covered bacon.

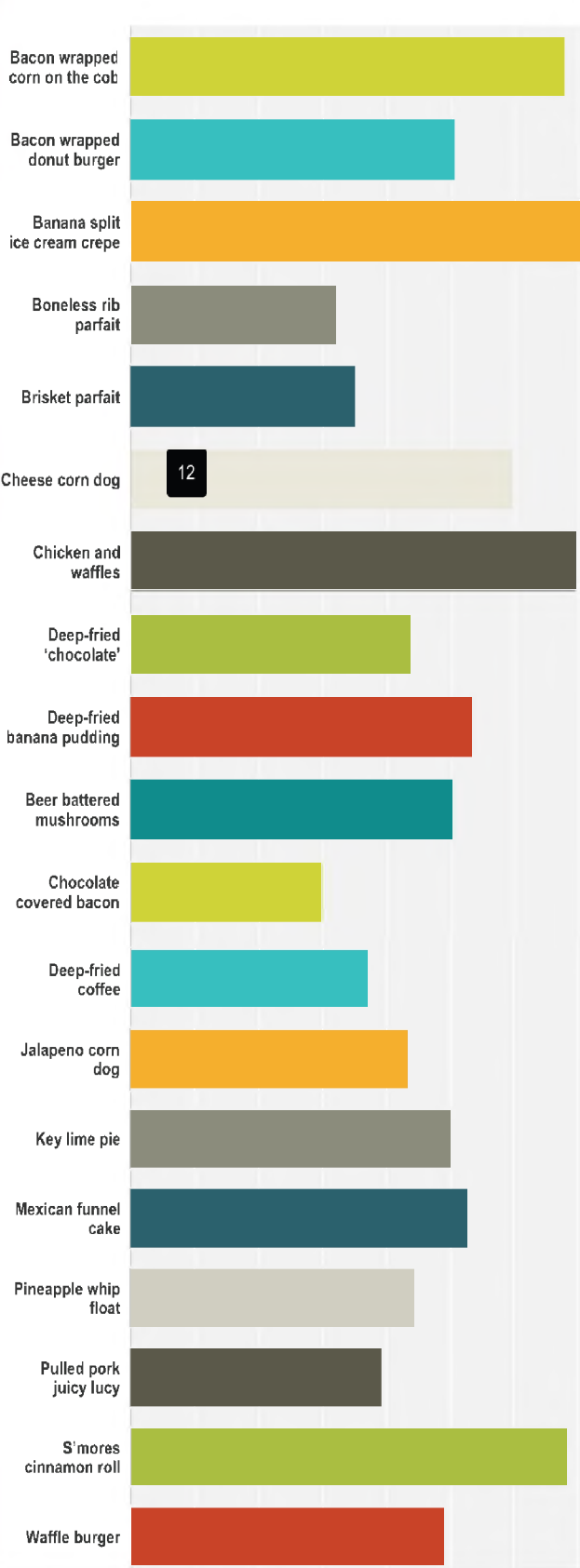
Believe it or not, the fair offers even weirder food. Back this year is the cricket pizza (with real crickets), Cap’n Crunch chicken on a stick, deep-fried giant Gummy Bears, the French toast burger, bacon-covered chocolate chip cookie dough, cuban pork crepe, and bacon-wrapped Jack Daniels.

Of course, the standards are still around. Silver Dollar’s famous cinnamon rolls are still considered a must-eat, as are corn dogs, turkey legs, and funnel cakes.

The Oklahoma State Fair will take place on September 17-27. The gates open daily at 8 a.m.

Bulldogs demolish OBU

Team racks up 58 on highly-ranked Tigers for second home win

WEATHERFORD, Okla. — For the second consecutive week, the SWOSU Football team scored better than 50 points and earned a league victory, making a statement with a 58-38 victory over defending Great American Conference champion Ouachita Baptist, the No. 9-ranked team in the latest AFCA Top 25 poll.

The victory is the first by the Bulldogs over Ouachita Baptist since the inception of the Great American Conference in 2011 and it snaps a 12-game regular season winning streak by the Tigers, who won the GAC and advanced to the NCAA Division II playoffs last season.

Marc Evans again directed the efficient SWOSU offense magnificently as the Bulldogs rolled up 549 yards of total offense, including 365 yards through the air. Evans had his second straight 300-yard performance, completing 31-of-46 (67.4%) passes for 365 yards and four touchdowns, all without being intercepted for the third straight game.

Karltrrell Henderson did the bulk of his damage on the ground in the second half and he finished with 152 yards rushing on 22 carries along with two touchdowns, and he added a 38-yard touchdown on a screen pass that gave the Bulldogs the lead for good.

SWOSU scored first after taking advantage of two Ouachita Baptist fumbles, going on top 7-0 after Kenneth Martey scored from two yards out. Ouachita responded late in the first quarter and the game went into the second frame all square at 7-7 before the Bulldogs broke the game wide open with 28 second-quarter points.

Henderson scored his first rushing touchdown early

in the quarter and added the screen pass score with 9:05 to play before halftime. Evans added touchdown passes to D.J. Jones and JR Omigie late in the half as the Bulldogs took a commanding 35-17 lead to the break.

The opening drive of the second half by SWOSU was aided when Evans was hit late for roughing the passer and the drive ended in a 21-yard field goal by Michael Perez. After a Tiger touchdown, SWOSU scored the next 14 points on a 6-yard pass from Evans to Omigie and a highlight reel 60-yard scamper from Henderson. OBU added two late scores while Kwame Tate made his end zone trip as a Bulldog with a 34-yard run late in the fourth.

SWOSU's defense was led by Conner Bays, who recorded a career-high 14 tackles (seven solo, seven assist) and 1.5 tackles for loss from the safety position while Trevon Hartfield added nine stops, one tackle for loss, a forced fumble and a pass breakup. Kapena Olsen and Gentry Rogers both picked off passes with the Tigers in the red zone while Tyler George and Jake Doyle recovered fumbles in the game.

"I told our guys to go make a statement in the fourth quarter and I think they did that," SWOSU Head Coach Dan Cocannouer said following the game. "Our kids know what they need to do to win and now we've done it two weeks in a row. Our offensive line has matured a ton since the first game and they did a lot for us that helped us get the win tonight."

With the victory, SWOSU improves to 2-1 on the year for the third straight season heading into a showdown with Henderson State next Saturday in Arkadelphia.

Cross country squad sets individual marks

JOPLIN, Mo. — Isela Sandoval and Lauren Parenica turned in a pair of the fastest times in program history as SWOSU finished 20th in the Missouri Southern Stampede with 530 points. The course featured several prominent teams from outside the Central Region as MSSU's Tom Rutledge Cross Country Course has been selected as the site of the Central Region and NCAA Division II Championships.

Sandoval, running her second career race for the Bulldogs, turned in the fifth-fastest time in school history by crossing the line in 19:00.26, finishing 57th overall. Parenica moved her name up in the record books after posting a 19:11.23, the eighth-best time program history, to claim 69th place. Additionally, both times represent personal bests.

Three freshmen rounded out the scoring for SWOSU, with Robin Sheehan posting the best time at 20:06.45, good for 113th overall. Lena Garrison recorded a personal best with a time of 20:52.84 to take 144th place. Completing the scorers

was Sierra Thompson, who took 153rd place after crossing the line in 21:52.78.

Two others ran for the Bulldogs as well. Brooke Lizotte ran a 22:13.08, placing 155th in her first race of the 2015 season as she works her way back from injury. The fourth Bulldog to post a personal record at the Missouri Southern Stampede was Sierra Campbell, crossing the line with a time of 22:20.05 and a 156th place finish.

Kelsey Bruce from Dallas Baptist claimed the individual title with a time of 16:47.89.

"We had several personal bests," said SWOSU Head Coach Shane Brookshire. "Isela and Lauren ran phenomenal races, both running personal bests. Overall, as a team, we are looking great. They've worked hard every practice and it definitely showed today. The Regional Championship is on this course, and it will be a great race when we come back in November."

SWOSU is back in action next Saturday, Sept. 26 in Stillwater, Okla., for the Oklahoma State Cowboy Jamboree.

Rodeo teams excel in first fall competition

COLBY, Kan. — The SWOSU Rodeo team competed this past weekend at Colby Community College, the first rodeo on the Central Plains Region circuit. The Bulldog women's team won the rodeo with 330 points while the men's team placed sixth with 200 team points.

Jacoby Hotsenpiller led the way for the event champion women's team by winning the short round of goat tying in 7.7 seconds and taking the average with a time of 15.8 seconds on two runs. Mikayla Harrison also competed in the event, finishing sixth in the short round and the average.

In her first collegiate event, Paige Wiseman was 2.7 seconds to win the long round of breakaway and 3.6 seconds in the short go to finish second in the average. Stacey Bailey won the short round of barrel racing in 17.00 seconds and took fourth in the average.

On the men's side, Levi Nicholson was steady with rides of 76 and 72 points in bareback, taking third in both rounds and the average with teammate Jake Stemo right behind in third. Stemo had rides of 74 and 69 points, finishing in at least a share of third place in each round.

Ben Engleman won the long round with a 76-point saddle bronc ride and took second in the short round to finish second in the average. Mickey Andrews got one qualified ride in bull riding, scoring 77 points in the long round to place second and he held on for third in the average. Luke Madsen finished sixth in tie down roping with matching times of 11.2 seconds, which included taking sixth place in the short round.

SWOSU Rodeo has a week off before returning to action on October 1-3 at the Central Plains Regional, held this year in Woodward.
