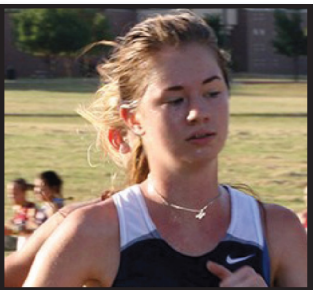

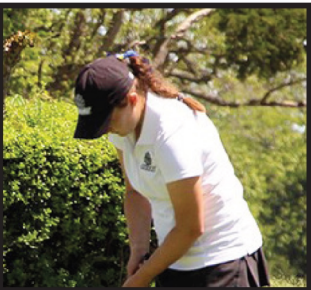

First theatre production runs October 6 through 8

Tickets are now on sale for Southwestern Oklahoma State University's theatrical production of The Laramie Project written by Moisés Kaufman and Members of Tectonic Theater Project.

The SWOSU Hilltop Theatre Box Office is selling tickets and taking reservations from 4-7 p.m. on Mondays through Fridays. Admission for the production is \$5 for adults, \$3 for non-SWOSU students and free for individuals with a valid SWOSU ID. Performances of The Laramie Project are scheduled for 7:30 p.m. nightly on October 6-8 during SWOSU Homecoming Week. On Tuesday, October 6, a talk-back session will immediately following the performance.

A panel of professionals will invite a discussion of the subjects raised in the play—specifically with the hope of trying to end violence, bigotry and hate crimes in society.

The Laramie Project is centered on the murder of Matthew Shepard. In October 1998, he was a 21-year-old student at the University of Wyoming. He was kidnapped, severely beaten and left to die, tied to a fence in the middle of the prairie outside Laramie, Wyoming. His bloody,



bruised and battered body was not discovered until the next day, and he died several days later in an area hospital.

He was the victim of the assault because he was gay.

Moisés Kaufman and fellow members of the Tectonic Theater Project made six trips to Laramie over the course of a year and a half in the aftermath of the beating and during the trial of the two young men accused of killing Shepard. They conducted more than 200 interviews with the people of the town. Some people interviewed were directly connected to the case, and others were citizens of Laramie.

The breadth of their reactions to the crime is fascinating, according to SWOSU's production director Steve Strickler. Kaufman and Tectonic Theater members have constructed a deeply moving theatrical experience from the interviews and their own experiences.

Thompson resigns as pharmacy dean

Dr. Dennis F. Thompson, who has served as Dean of the College of Pharmacy (COP) at Southwestern Oklahoma State University in Weatherford since January 2012, has resigned as Dean effective at the end of the 2015 fall semester.

His plans are to return as a full-time faculty member in the COP.

Thompson has been on the faculty of the SWOSU College of Pharmacy since 1992, serving as the assistant dean for clinical programs and associate dean for clinical programs. He was named interim dean of the COP in March 2011 before being named dean in 2012.

“SWOSU appreciates the effective leadership provided by Dr.

Thompson,” SWOSU President Randy Beutler said. “During his tenure, the COP has made great progress and was successfully re-accredited by the Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education.”

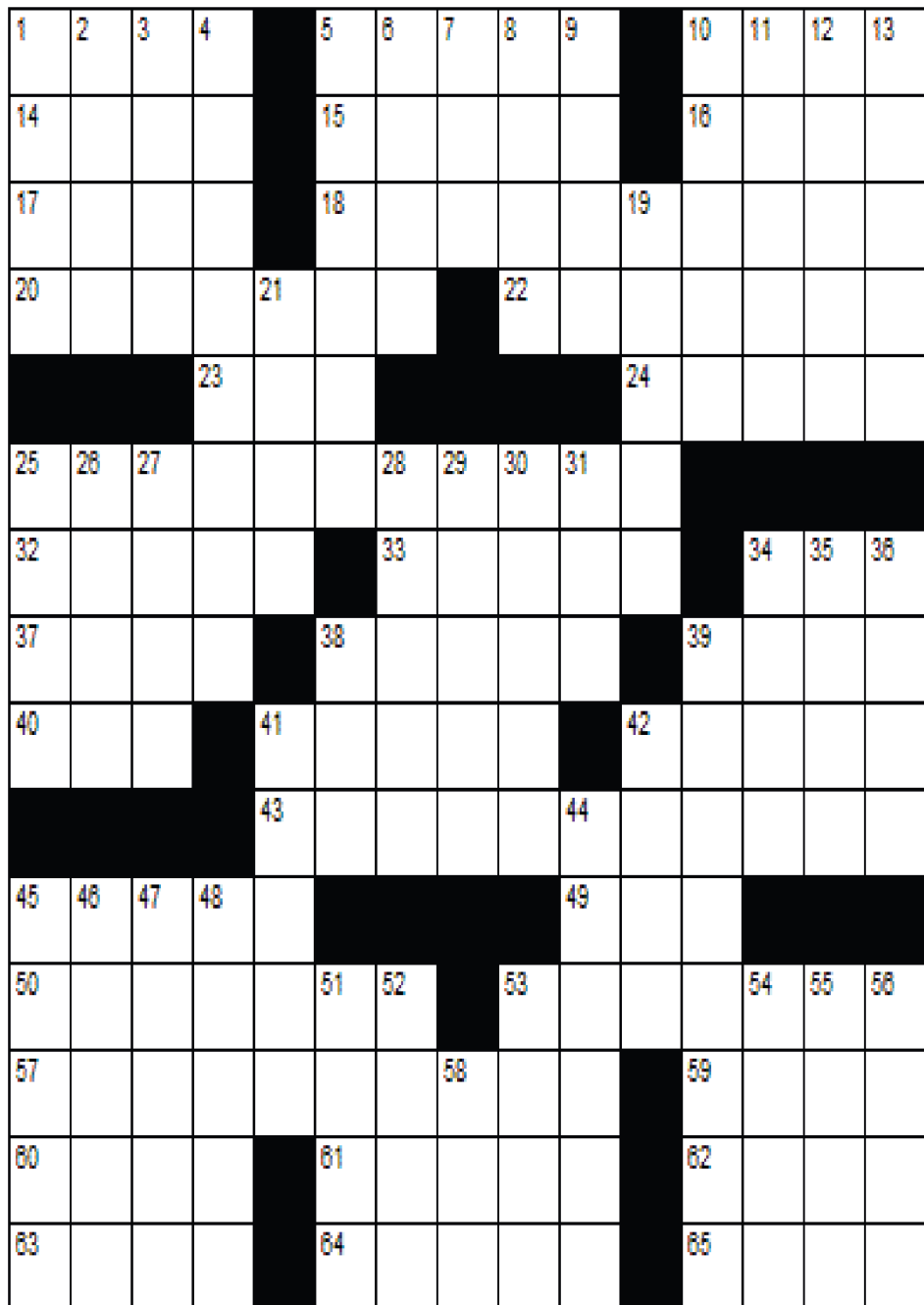

Book Review

A Child Called It

“Childhood should be carefree, playing in the sun; not living in a nightmare in the darkness of the soul.” –Dave Pelzer, A Child Called It.

In this autobiographical account, Dave Pelzer charts the abuse of a young boy. A young boy, that was so hated by his drunken mother, that he became a thing to her, a slave, an inferior to the family, he became an “it.”

In this book, Pelzer gives readers an inside view, from a child’s perspective, of one of the worst child abuse cases in California. The book begins with the day that he was rescued from his own personal hell. Pelzer then goes to describe the life of the family before the abuse begins.

They were an ordinary, happy, fun, loving family. Dave’s mother would hold him and treat him like any mother treats a child, with love. It all began to change when Dave entered the first grade. His mother would make up these terrible games, her favorite was mixing Clorox and ammonia in a bucket and locking Dave in the bathroom with it for long periods of time. One time, she tried to kill him by placing his body on the stove, but he fought her and she only burned his arm. “Gripping my arm, Mother held it in the orange-blue flame. My skin

seemed to explode from the heat” (Dave Pelzer, A Child Called It). This was the life that young Dave Pelzer had to live through. Every day he was tormented.

At the age of twelve, Dave was put in a foster home, and he was finally free from his mother’s torment. “It is important for people to know that no matter what lies in their past, they can overcome the dark side and press on to a brighter world” (Dave Pelzer, A Child Called It).

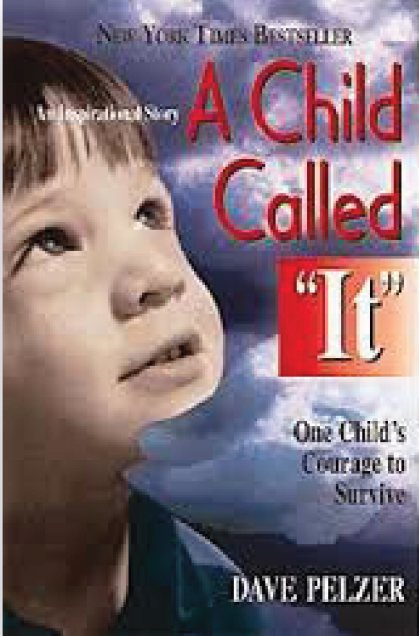
This book was written in 1995, but I think every person should read this book. Especially, students who want to be teachers, social workers, or nurses.

Multiple times while reading this book, I cried. I cannot comprehend how a mother can treat her child in this manner, and I cannot grasp how a father cannot take action against such terrible abuse. Parenica, Sandoval pace runners at OSU Cowboy Jamboree

STILLWATER, Okla. — Lauren Parenica and Isela Sandoval were again SWOSU's one-two punch as the Bulldogs took 10th after accumulating 269 points at the Oklahoma State Cowboy Jamboree. Going into the race, the Cross Country team decided to focus on their pack-running tactics, but Parenica and Sandoval were given free rein to place as high as possible. Parenica led the way with a time of 20:04.9, good for 13th overall, while Sandoval placed 14th in the field after crossing the line in 20:12.3.

The remaining five runners for SWOSU all finished within 1:33 of each other, led by Robin Sheehan who posted a time of 22:23.8 to claim 80th overall. She was followed by Lena Garrison who ran a time of 22:38.2 and finished 90th overall. The final scoring run was posted by Brooke Lizotte in 95th place with a run lasting 22:45.3. Rounding out the quintet were Sierra Campbell and Sierra Thompson who posted times of 23:30.7 and 23:56.8 respectively to place 118th and 126th

overall.

A trio of Oklahoma City-based schools took the top three spots at the meet, led by Oklahoma City with a score of 46 points. Layne Hammer of Oklahoma Christian claimed the individual title after crossing the line in .

"We came in with a game plan, and we ran about as well as expected given that plan," said SWOSU Head Coach Shane Brookshire.

"I was pleased with Lauren and Isela's high finishes, and it was great

to see how well Brooke and Lena worked together. We still need to focus on the closing the gap between our 'one' and 'five' runners, and we will continue to work on that leading up to our first 6000-meter event of the season."

The Dawgs have a couple weeks of rest before heading to Wichita Falls, Texas, for the Midwestern State Invitational on Thursday, Oct. 8, at 5 pm. It will be the first time SWOSU will run a 6k this season.

Nunez sets career mark as soccer team beats ECU

ADA, Okla. — Samantha Nunez led the way with two goals as SWOSU down East Central in a 4-0 romp on the road to stay perfect in Great American Conference play at 2-0.

Nunez tied the career scoring record set by Kelsey Visor with her fifth and sixth goals of the year to bring her career total to 22. Nunez has now scored two goals twice in the past three games, and has knocked in five in the same span.

Courtney Flores and the defense posted a fourth consecutive clean sheet. It's the first time SWOSU has shutout four opponents in a row since the 2012 series when the Bulldogs performed the feat six times on the hop.

The Dawgs ran rampant in the first half, putting three goals past Tigers' goalkeeper Chloe Hull. The first came in the 16th minute off corner by Olivia Butler which Nunez connected with in the middle of the box and slotted home. In the 25th minute, Cori Kelly picked up the ball on the breakaway and slid a ball in the gap between the two central defenders that Nunez was able to touch past Hull for her second of the outing to double

SWOSU's advantage. Finally, Shelley Mueller had an open look at goal, but was taken down from behind to earn a penalty kick. Erica Brunet made no mistake on her second penalty of the season, beating Hull despite the opposing keeper guessing the correct direction, to put the Bulldogs up 3-0 before the break.

Despite a keeper change to start the second half, SWOSU still lit up the board once more after the interval. After she saw her shot blocked, Charlotte Eastman was the first to her own rebound and she threaded the ball through to Mueller on the far right wing. Mueller put a curling shot on a postage stamp in the top left corner of the goal to make SWOSU's lead 4-0 in the 72nd minute to truly seal the victory

As a result of the victory, SWOSU tied the third-best winning streak in program history at four. The mark was set in 2013, and ended by the Bulldogs' next opponent, Harding.

The Bulldogs (6-2, 2-0 GAC) are back in action on Thursday, October 1 as they welcome the Lady Bisons to Weatherford for a 3 PM kickoff.

Turnovers doom Bulldogs in 33-0 loss to Henderson

ARKADELPHIA, Ark. — After committing just one turnover in the first three games of the season and leading the Great America Conference in turnover margin, SWOSU was done in by their miscues on Saturday at Henderson State, falling 33-0 to the Reddies at Carpenter-Haygood Stadium.

SWOSU's best chance for points in the first half was their opening drive, which was rolling along until Marc Evans was intercepted for the first time this season deep in Reddie territory. SWOSU punted on their next three drives before two more interceptions by Henderson State led to 10 of their 17 first-half points. A 49-yard screen pass from Evans to Karl-trell Henderson got the Bulldogs into the red zone late in the half before a 23-yard field goal by Michael Perez was wide right as time ran out on the half.

The Bulldogs went three-and-out on their first two drives of the second half and had their best drive of the half stopped on downs at the Henderson State 24-yard line, the first failed fourth-down conversion of the season by SWOSU. Evans was picked off on each of the next two drives, with both turnovers leading to field goals for HSU and two more three-play drives allowed the Reddies to run out the clock in the fourth quarter and add 10 more points to their total.

SWOSU was held to a season-low 220

yards of total offense and they were shut out for the first time in five year, since a 23-0 defeat at East Central on September 25, 2010. Evans finished 23-for-43 passing for 178 yards, but he threw five interceptions, a school-record at SWOSU from the NCAA Division II era. DJ Jones was his top receiver, catching five passes while Henderson totaled 80 yards on three receptions. The Bulldogs were limited to just 42 yards rushing, with Henderson gaining 33 yards on 14 carries to lead the way.

Conner Bays led the Bulldog defense with 11 tackles and one tackle for loss while Austin Loomis had nine tackles, including a sack and 1.5 tackles for loss. SWOSU allowed 323 yards to the Reddies, including 227 yards on 43 rushing attempts, good for 5.3 yards per carry.

"We didn't prepare as coaches and our players weren't prepared to play today," SWOSU Head Coach Dan Cocannouer said in his postgame interview. "The defense played well, had little breakdowns here and there but they did some good things, the problem was our offense didn't do anything."

SWOSU has now evened their record up at 2-2 (2-2 GAC) on the year with both defeats coming on the road. The Bulldogs are again away from home next Saturday, with a visit to Durant to face Southeastern Oklahoma State, beginning at 2:00 pm.

Folsom named Golfer of the Month

RUSSELLVILLE, Ark. — Emily Folsom of the SWOSU Women's Golf team was announced as the Great American Conference's Women's Golfer of the Month for the month of September.

Folsom, an Oklahoma City native, helped the Lady Bulldogs to a pair of Top 10 finishes at the Central Region Preview and Northeastern State Women's Classic. She turned in a third-place performance at the NSU Women's Classic in Tahlequah, Okla., after turning in back-to-back scores of 75 while picking up three birdies and 24 pars. For the month of September, Folsom's average score was 77.8 through four rounds, with a low round of 75.

A sophomore, this is

the first time Folsom has earned the GAC's monthly award. It is the first time a Lady Bulldog has been named Golfer of the Month since Margaret Musser earned the honor in March 2014. This also marks the second time a
