SWOSU-Sayre to host blood drive

Southwestern Oklahoma State University-Sayre and the Oklahoma Blood Institute (OBI) encourage all healthy Sayre-area residents who are at least 16 years old to donate blood on Monday, October 12, at the Baptist Collegiate Ministries building next to the SWOSU-Sayre campus.
Individuals may donate blood from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the BCM, which is located at 1906 N. Watts, across the street from SWOSU-Sayre’s McMahan Library.
Each donor will receive a “Bleed Blue” SWOSU T-shirt, health screenings, and donor rewards

points, redeemable for items in OBI’s online store.
A single donation can save as many as three Oklahomans’ lives, according to John Armitage, M.D., president and CEO of OBI. Donations typically take about an hour.
“Someone needs blood every two seconds, and since blood can only be used for 42 days, we constantly need people to donate,” Armitage said. “This ongoing need is why we are asking Sayre-area residents to come to this blood drive and give.”
Oklahoma Blood Institute

provides every drop of blood needed by patients in Sayre Regional Hospital and Great Plains Regional Medical Center in Elk City.
OBI will also conduct a marrow registry to find marrow donors. Most marrow donations are collected through blood like regular blood donations. Most marrow donations are given to children. Every three minutes someone is diagnosed with a blood cancer and many of those patients need a marrow donation to survive. Most patients who need a marrow transplant must find a donor from outside their family.

SWOSU-Sayre to offer classes in Elk City


Southwestern Oklahoma State University-Sayre is teaming up with Great Plains Regional Medical Center to offer college classes in Elk City.
The Sayre campus’ 2016 spring schedule includes three classes that will be taught by SWOSU-Sayre instructors Tuesday and Thursday mornings at GPRMC.
Landry Brewer will teach U.S. History Since 1877 at 8 a.m., Bill Swartwood will teach College Algebra at 9:30 a.m., and Judy Haught will teach English Composition I at 11 a.m.
Each class lasts one hour and 15 minutes and will meet in Meeting Room A, next to the hospital’s restaurant, The Grill @ 1705.
“We’re excited to partner with Great Plains Regional Medical Center and expand opportunities for people who live and work in or near Elk City,” said Sayre Campus Dean Sheron Manning.
Manning expressed gratitude to GPRMC CEO Corey Lively for providing SWOSU-Sayre the space to

offer classes on the hospital campus
“We appreciate Corey’s graciousness, and we appreciate his foresight in working with us to benefit the entire community,” Manning said.
More than ever, education beyond high school is necessary to qualify for skilled jobs. Manning said with the recent economic downturn, now is a great time to re-tool and prepare for the kind of rewarding, stable career that a college education provides.
Manning said that bringing classes to Elk City is just the latest effort to meet the needs of students who may not be able to attend classes at Sayre.
“In addition to our brick-and-mortar classes at the Sayre campus, we offer several online classes each semester,” Manning said. “With classes coming to an Elk City campus courtesy of GPRMC, a college education for area residents has never been so convenient and attainable.”
Financial aid is also available for all part-time and full-time students who qualify. Enrollment for the

Three to receive Award of Merit

Three individuals with long ties to Southwestern Oklahoma State University will be honored with the prestigious Presidential Award of Merit at Southwestern Oklahoma State University's Homecoming activities planned this Saturday, October 10, in Weatherford.

SWOSU President Randy Beutler will present the awards at the 5 p.m. pre-game festivities to Dr. William G. Bernhardt, Midwest City; Everett Dobson, Oklahoma City; and Dr. Henrietta Mann, Weatherford.

The trio will also ride in the SWOSU Homecoming parade at 1:30 p.m. in Towne Centre of Weatherford.

Dr. William G. Bernhardt has served on the SWOSU Foundation Board of Trustees since October of 1990. He and his wife, Theta Juan, have been long-time supporters of the university and established the coveted Bernhardt Award for Academic Excellence that is bestowed each year on an outstanding faculty member at SWOSU.

Bernhardt spent his entire medical career in the Midwest City area. Bernhardt was admitted to the SWOSU Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame in

1991 and is a lifetime member of the SWOSU Alumni Association.

Bernhardt graduated in 1947 and 1948, receiving a B.S. degree in Biological Sciences and Chemistry in 1947 and a B.S. degree in Pharmacy in 1948.

Everett Dobson, likewise, has served on the SWOSU Foundation Board of Trustees since 1990 and has been instrumental in the development and success of many projects on the Weatherford campus. Dobson and his wife, Jeanetta, have generously donated funds to establish five endowed chairs that benefit the Everett Dobson School of Business & Technology. In 2000, Dobson became the youngest benefactor among Oklahoma's endowed chair programs at universities when he established SWOSU's first endowed chair (\$250,000) with the SWOSU Foundation, Inc.

Dobson earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in economics from SWOSU and was a four-year golf letterman at SWOSU and three-time all-conference selection. He was inducted into SWOSU's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1996 and the SWOSU Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame in 2000. He continues to support the SWOSU golf program and recently donated funds to build a practice facility for the teams.

Dr. Henrietta Mann served as president of the Cheyenne & Arapaho Tribal College from 2006 until 2015. Mann, who received her bachelor's degree in English education from SWOSU in 1954, was inducted into the SWOSU Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame in 1997.

Mann has received numerous prestigious awards and has been active in Indian affairs throughout the nation. In 2014, she was

named by Money Magazine as one of the 50 Heroes in 50 States for her work in higher education.

Mann is a full-blood Cheyenne who has served in administrative and teaching duties at Montana State University in Bozeman, University of Montana in Missoula, University of California at Berkeley, Graduate School of Education at Harvard University, Haskell Indian Nations University (KS) and SWOSU.

The Presidential Award of Merit is an honor bestowed upon an individual who has shown outstanding achievement, on the state, national or international level, in the arts, sciences, business, industry, the professions, sports, social service or public service. This distinct honor represents recognition of great achievement that a member of the SWOSU family has attained.

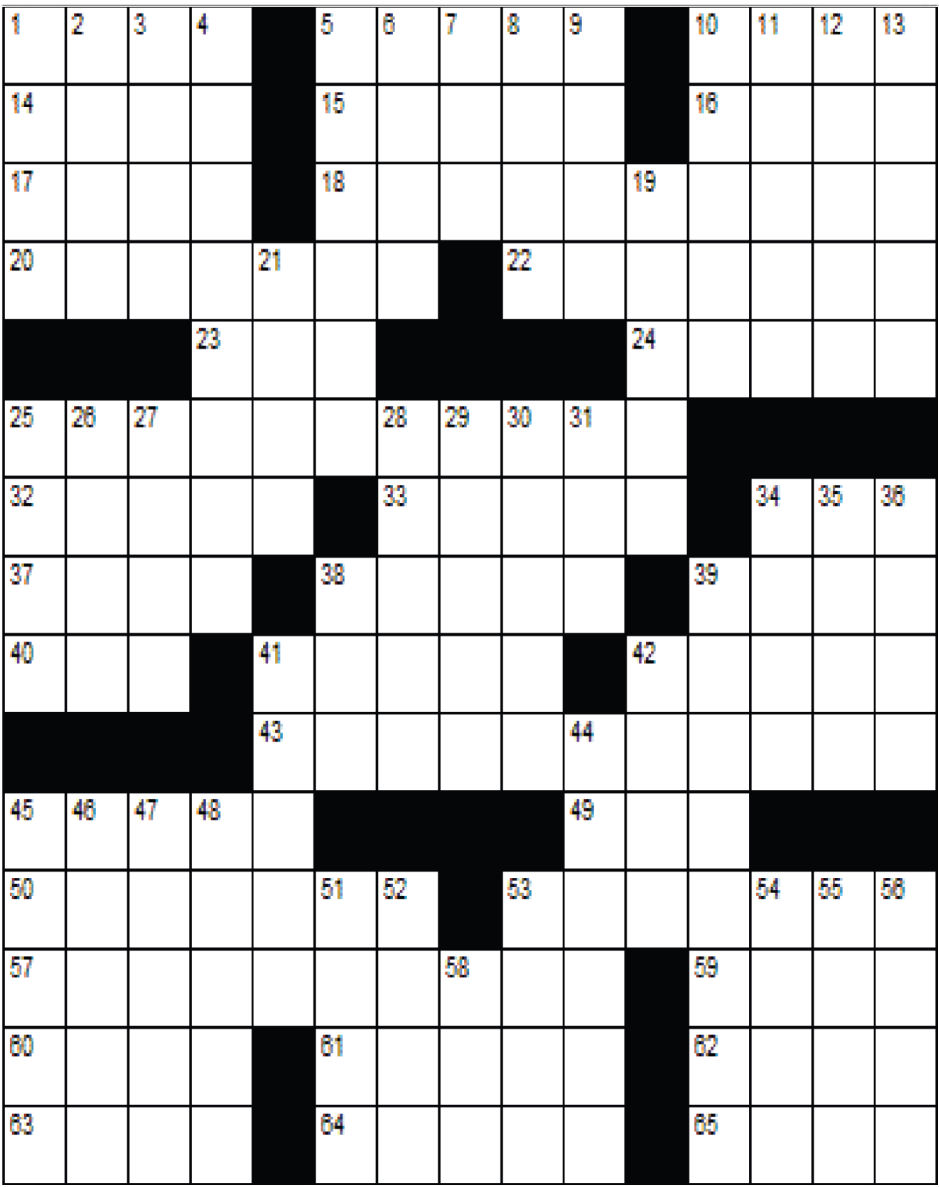

The Visit directed by M. Night Shyamalan, is a movie that will keep the audience at the edge of their seats with suspense. The children, Becca (Olivia DeJonge) and Tyler (Ex Oxenbould), have never met their Nana (Deanna Dunagen) and Pop-Pop (Peter McRobbie).

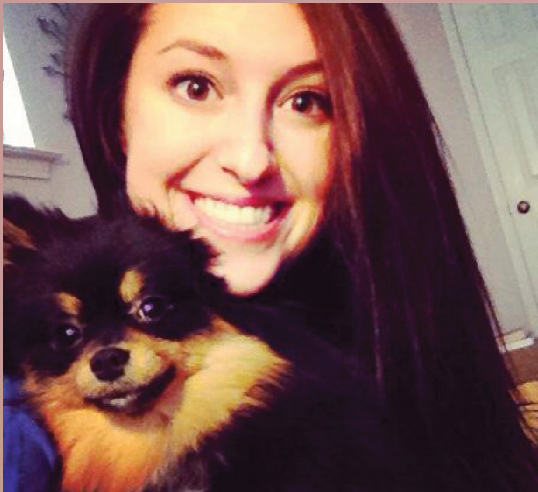

Women’s rodeo team wins second straight event

WOODWARD, Okla. – Behind another championship effort from senior Jacoby Hotsenpiller, the SWOSU Women’s Rodeo team won their second straight event, taking first at the Central Plains Regional in Woodward while the Men’s team placed fourth over the weekend.

SWOSU’s Women’s team totaled 300 points at the event behind Hotsenpiller, who won the long round of goat tying in 7.6 seconds and took second in the short round in 8.7 seconds. Her combined time of 16.3 seconds on two head won the average as she finished just ahead of teammate Mikayla Harrison. Harrison split third in the long round and claimed fourth in the short round for a combined time of 16.9 seconds on two.

Freshman Paige Wiseman also placed in both rounds of goat tying and shared sixth and seventh in the average with a time of 18.4 seconds on two rides. Alexis Christen was sixth in the long round in 8.8 seconds before a no-time in the short round.

KeAnn Kelber had a strong weekend in breakaway roping, winning the long round in 3.0 seconds before breaking the barrier in the short round. Her time of 17.0 seconds on two was still good enough for fourth in the average.

On the men’s side, SWOSU was strong on the rough stock, getting two top-three finishes in both bareback and saddle bronc. Hunter Green won the long round of bareback while Connor Hamilton and Jake Stemo split first place in the short go and all three finished among the top seven in the average for the event. Green was second with 139 points on two while Hamilton was third with 127 points on two rides.

Nick Shenold was third with 67 points in the long round of saddle bronc and second in the short go with a 59-point ride as he took second in the average. Drew Spencer had rides of 49 and 53 points and his

102-point total on two head was good for third in the average. Nathan Hatchel was third in the long round of bull riding with a 78-point ride and finished second in the average despite no score in the short round.

Panhandle State won the rodeo on the men’s side with 455 team points while Northwestern was second with 410 points. SWOSU accumulated 280 team points for a fourth-place finish at the event.

“The Woodward Rodeo was really good for us,” SWOSU Head Coach Mike Visnieski said. “We had 15 team members in the short round and a lot of people who are pushing themselves and getting better. It’s going to be really exciting all the way until the end if they keep up what they’re doing.”

SWOSU has a short week of recovery as they quickly return to action at the Oklahoma State University Rodeo, which will be held in Stillwater, beginning on Thursday evening.

Soccer hands Ouachita Baptist first loss

WEATHERFORD, Okla. – Following over two hours of weather delays, the Bulldogs earned a 1-0 decision over the Great American Conference-leading Ouachita Baptist Tigers through Payton Warren’s late goal. SWOSU handed the Tigers their first loss in conference play, and are now one of just two teams that has yet to lose against GAC opposition.*

A slightly overpowered shot clanged off the crossbar, and SWOSU was unable to capitalize on the rebound. Following that, Courtney Flores pulled off an impressive kick save at point-blank range with one second remaining on a shot by Bryson Thomas to preserve the score line at the break.

SWOSU dialed the pressure up a notch in the second half of play as the outshot the Tigers 12-3. The Dawgs

Courtney Flores and the defense of Amaris Garcia, Kylee Bertrand, Dajhane Turner and Erica Brunet picked up their fifth clean sheet in six games.

SWOSU (7-2-1, 3-0-1 GAC) moves into a tie for first place with Harding on points with 10 to their credit as a result of the victory on Saturday afternoon. The Bulldogs now face a three-game road swing, starting with Southern Nazarene on Thursday, October 8 at 7 pm in Bethany,

Bulldogs blanked by Southeastern

DURANT, Okla. – The SWOSU Football team was held to 177 yards of total offense and shutout for the second straight game on Saturday afternoon, suffering an 8-0 defeat against Southeastern Oklahoma State in the lowest-scoring game in Great American Conference history.

The Bulldogs best chance for points came in the first quarter when first-time starting quarterback Brooks Robertson was intercepted in the end zone to end a 13-play drive. SWOSU’s defense routinely kept the Savage Storm from scoring until they cashed in a 12-play 66-yard drive for a field goal with 1:14 to play in the first half. After a SWOSU three-and-out, Southeastern used four plays to

again get in field goal range and kick a 30-yard attempt as time ran out in the first half.

After the defense held Southeastern on their opening drive of the second half, the Bulldogs had their best drive and again got into Savage Storm territory before stalling. On the ensuing drive, SWOSU crossed midfield with back-to-back long runs from Robertson but they would get no further before being forced to punt.

SWOSU’s defense was again up to the challenge early in the fourth quarter as Southeastern looked to put the game away. The interior defensive line for SWOSU, led by Clinton Horn and Dejai Johnson, stopped Southeastern

on downs at the goal line, leaving the deficit at 6-0 with 12:34 to play and the offense coming back onto the field. With their backs up against the goal line, SWOSU attempted a screen pass on third down and Karltrrell Henderson was hauled down in the end zone for a safety, giving Southeastern the 8-0 lead with 11:29 to play.

The Bulldog defense again rose to the challenge, forcing a three-and-out and providing another chance for the offense, which again barely passed midfield before stalling. SWOSU punted, but would get the ball back one more time, with just under one minute to play. The final drive ended on downs, leaving Southeastern to take a knee and run out the clock.

CANYON, Texas – SWOSU Volleyball split a pair of four-set matches on Saturday in Texas, defeating Oklahoma City 3-1 before being dealt a 3-1 setback against triangular host West Texas A&M. The Bulldogs’ record remains even at 7-7.

SWOSU 3, Oklahoma City 1 (23-25, 25-23, 25-23, 25-18)

Carly Zak had a team-high 15 kills and the Bulldogs set a new season-high with 12 blocks as they overcame a first-set defeat and earned the victory in four. Zak was efficient as always, putting down her 15 kills with just one hitting error for a .412 hitting percentage while adding four blocks and three digs.

Paige Holt had nine kills, Kayla Hebert added eight and Kelsi Schmidtberger had seven as the Bulldogs hit .237 for the match. Schmidtberger had eight block assists, the most by a SWOSU player this season, while Hebert led the Dawgs with 37 assists and Kaila Lancaster had a team-best 19 digs.

West Texas A&M 3, SWOSU 1 (25-20, 15-25, 19-25, 14-25)

The roles were reversed in the night cap as SWOSU won the first set 25-20 before the Lady Buffs came roaring back and won the next three sets to take the match. Blair Dressendorfer set a new career-high with 14 kills in the match while hitting .217 and also recording two blocks. Zak and Schmidtberger each had 12 kills, while Zak set a new career-high in digs for the third time in the past five matches with 20 digs.

Hebert set up SWOSU with 35 assists to go along with six digs, four kills and two blocks. Schmidtberger and Holt shared team-high honors with three blocks apiece while Kaila Lancaster added another 15 digs to her total.
