One of the most-attended Homecoming celebrations ever took place Oct. 10, and winners of the various competitions have been announced.

Madison Murphy of Grove and Karch Bullard of Edmond (Christian Heritage Academy) were crowned Homecoming Queen and King during halftime of the SWOSU football game. Murphy was sponsored by Residence Life, and Bullard was sponsored by the Baptist Collegiate Ministries.

At the parade, SWOSU's Society of Women Engineers/Society of Manufacturing Engineers won first place and \$1,300 in the float competition for the fourth straight year. Eta Iota Sigma won second place and \$800, and the Department of Education finished third and won \$500.

The prize money was sponsored by the SWOSU Student Government Association and several Weatherford financial institutions.

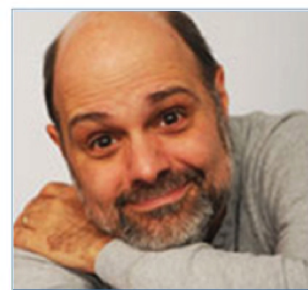
After the parade, the 1,500 plus high school students performed in a mass band at Milam Stadium before the SWOSU football game.

SWOSU Cookoff Challenge winners were Department of Education, first place; Kappa Epsilon, second place; and (tie) Communication, Art & Theatre Department and Travis Martin, third place. The challenge featured exotic/game food items.

The SWOSU Career Services Office and New Student Orientation won the staff/faculty contest with its office display.

And, in the Battle of the Bulldogs, the overall winner was the Student Government Association. SWOSU student organizations spent the week raising money for charities by participating in various activities.

The day ended with a spectacular fireworks show following the SWOSU football team's victory over East Central, 38-31. Also, earlier in the day, the SWOSU volleyball team won its third straight match by defeating Arkansas-Monticello.

## Panorama brings in free speech advocate

A fiery presentation on the First Amendment is planned Thursday, October 22, at Southwestern Oklahoma State University in Weatherford.

Mad Magazine Senior Editor Joe Raiola of New York City will take a humorous approach to First Amendment issues when he performs The Joy of Censorship, which has earned him critical raves for his sharp social satire.

Admission is free for the 7:30 p.m. event in the Fine Arts Center. The event is part of the Panorama series at SWOSU.

Ragging on politicians, religion and the media, Raiola has drawn comparisons to his comedy hero, George Carlin. His outspoken and smart comedy has won him fans from coast to coast. The Joy of Censorship sheds light on the endless arguments over banned books, movie ratings, the FCC, Supreme Court decisions, religious freedom and the true meaning of obscenity. It also traces the unlikely and colorful history of MAD Magazine, from renegade publisher Williams Gaines' historic showdown

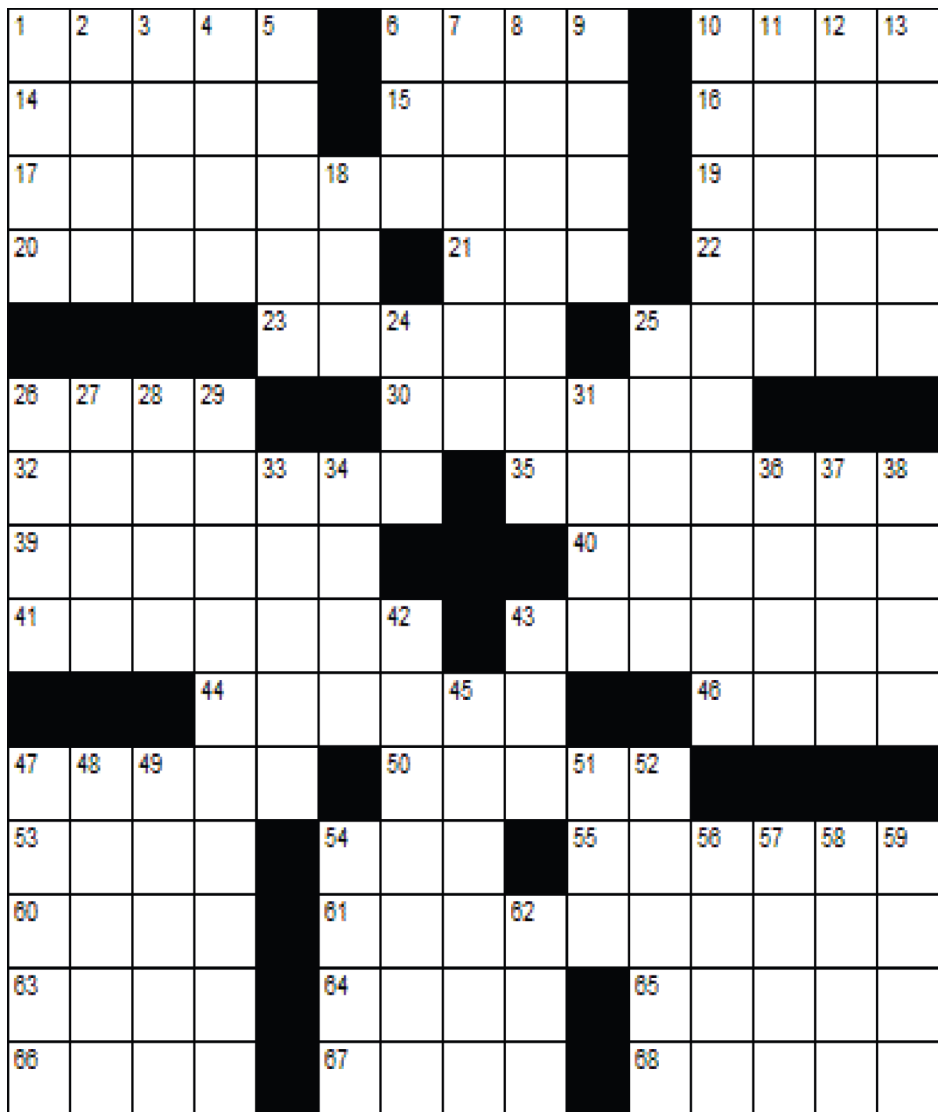

- ☐ Walk alone at night

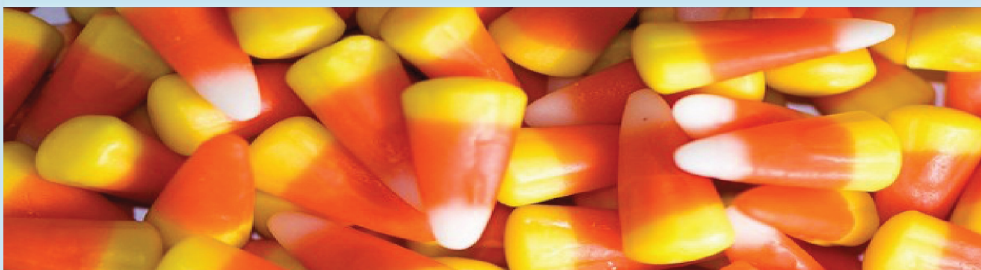


## Things to Do On Fall Break

## Bulldogs pull off Homecoming comeback

WEATHERFORD, Okla. – SWOSU scored four touchdowns in the second half as they came from 10 points down to defeat East Central 38-31 on Homecoming at ASAP Energy Field. The victory evens the Bulldogs record at 3-3 on the year.

A Dalton Jackson field goal and a 47-yard touchdown pass from Marc Evans to D.J. Jones accounted for the scoring in the first half as SWOSU went to the locker room facing a 20-10 deficit.

Evans found Derrick Styles for a 34-yard touchdown pass on the opening drive of the second half, pulling the Dawgs within three before ECU pushed their lead back to six with a 24-yard field goal. Evans found Karl-trell Henderson in the flat and the Bulldogs running back raced 56 yards past all Tiger defenders as SWOSU regained the lead at 24-23 with 6:09 to play in the third quarter. ECU used a six-play, 69-yard drive to answer the Bulldogs, scoring a touchdown and converting a two-point conversion to take a 31-24 lead into the fourth quarter.

On their first drive of the quarter, the Bulldogs took advantage of three unsportsmanlike conduct penalties on East Central and completed a 12-play, 86-yard drive to knot the score at 31-all when Henderson again found pay dirt, this time from three yards out. After the SWOSU defense held the Tigers, the Bulldogs struck quickly with a four-play, 80-yard drive, with Kwame Tate scoring the go-ahead touchdown with 8:08 to play.

In his return to the starting lineup, Evans was 23-for-46 passing for 369 yards and three touchdowns, with his

yardage mark ranking as the fourth-most single game total at SWOSU in the NCAA Division II era. His favorite receiver on the night was Jones, who had four receptions for 127 yards and a touchdown, while Henderson, Collin Bricker and Hunter Dinkines each had three catches.

Tate led the Bulldogs with 72 yards on the ground, including a season-long 61 yard scamper in the first half, while Henderson had 42 yards and a touchdown with Kenneth Martey totaling 31 yards on the ground as well.

The SWOSU defense was again led by safety Conner Bays, who reached double figures in tackles for the fifth time in six games with 10 stops and two pass breakups to his credit. Seven different players had a tackle for loss for SWOSU, led by Jake Doyle with 2.0, and Clinton Horn and Dejai Johnson each recorded sacks in the win. Trevon Hartfield picked off his first pass of the season and added two pass breakups to his season total.

“Early on, East Central was more physical than us and they were taking it to us,” SWOSU’s Head Coach, Dan Cocannouer said in his postgame interview. “I told our guys, the only way to shut them up is to give it right back and I think our guys did a good job of that. We had a couple guys on the second team step up and make plays and I’m proud of the way they handled that.”

SWOSU evens their record at 3-3 on the year and earn their first victory over East Central since 2012. ## Two awarded ‘Player of the Week’

RUSSELLVILLE, Ark. – For a fourth straight week the SWOSU Soccer team has produced Great American Conference Players of the Week, with Amaris Garcia and Courtney Flores taking home Defender and Goalkeeper of the Week honors after standout performances against a pair of the top teams in the conference.

Garcia, a native of Lawndale, California, started and played all 200 minutes against Harding and Ouachita Baptist as SWOSU went 1-0-1 to remain unbeaten in GAC competition. Her defensive work held the Lady Bisons to just 12 shots in a 2-2 draw, the lowest total for Harding in league play this season. Garcia followed up that performance with an even better one in a 1-0 victory over then league-leaders Ouachita. Garcia’s defensive prowess limited two-time GAC Offensive Player of the Year Haley Hatcher to just two shots on goal as the Bulldogs

picked up their league-leading sixth shutout. A freshman, Garcia is the third SWOSU player to earn the GAC’s weekly defensive award, and it is the first time she has earned such an award.

Flores, a native of Plano, Texas, earned Goalkeeper of the Week honors for the second time this season after she played 200 minutes in goal. She picked up

three saves against Harding, the GAC’s best offense, in a double-overtime affair. Flores then picked up and additional three saves and a conference-best sixth clean sheet against Ouachita. For the week, Flores held a .900 goals-against average. Her shutouts per game average of .600 ranks 14th in NCAA Division II. A junior, Flores has now earned the weekly goal-

keeper award six times in her career.

The Bulldogs have earned GAC weekly honors conference-best six times this season. SWOSU is the only team to have multiple Defenders of the Week, and three different players have earned the award. Additionally, SWOSU is the only team to have a keeper earn the weekly award twice in 2015.

## Flores breaks record in Bulldog 2-0 win

SHAWNEE, Okla. – The Bulldogs picked up a 2-0 victory over Oklahoma Baptist on Saturday night as Courtney Flores posted her eighth shutout of the season to see SWOSU back into a tie with Harding for the conference lead.

With the clean sheet, Flores now owns 17 clean sheets in a sterling career for the Bulldogs. The mark sets not only the program record, but also the Great American Conference record for most shutouts in a career. Former Bulldog Corey LaMooureux previously held both records with 16 in a two year standout career.

The Bulldogs got on the board early thanks to Charlotte Eastman. After bombarding the Lady Bison’s goal throughout the first nine minutes, Eastman collected the rebound off a blocked Dajhane Turner shot and slotted it past OKBU’s Emma Beck in 10th minute. Despite a dominating 12-2 advantage in shots Beck picked up three more saves to keep the flood-gates from opening. Flores, for her part, was untroubled by the one shot Oklahoma Baptist managed to put on goal in the first 45 minutes of play.

Though the second half was relatively tame, the teams combined for 11 shots, Eastman found a way to bag her second of the match off a free kick in the 80th minute. It was the second goal Eastman has scored directly from a set piece this season, with the first coming against Northwestern Oklahoma State. With the brace, the senior now has three goals on the season.

SWOSU (9-2-1, 5-0-1) remains unbeaten in conference play this season, and needs just one more win for the program’s third 10-win season.

## Volleyball team buries Arkansas-Monticello

WEATHERFORD, Okla. – Behind another strong performance of 15 kills and nine digs from junior Carly Zak, SWOSU Volleyball earned their third straight victory, a 3-0 sweep of Arkansas-Monticello on Saturday afternoon at the Pioneer Cellular Event Center.

The Bulldogs led throughout the first set, hitting a match-high .371 with just three hitting errors. The second set saw five ties and three lead changes, with SWOSU overcoming an early 4-1 deficit and using a six-point run on the serve of Kayla Hebert to take control with a 13-9 lead.

SWOSU scored the first three points of the third set and never looked back, building a lead as high as eight at 11-3 and 16-8 to stay in control. Zak nearly recorded a double-double with nine digs, three assists and one block also to her credit. Dressendorfer added 10 kills and five digs as the duo helped SWOSU hit .274 for the match.

Hebert had a double-double with 38 assists and 11 digs while Lindsey McCauley led the Bulldogs with 12 digs. Each team had three blocks for the match, with Schmidtberger leading the Dawgs with three (one solo, two assist). Schmidtberger also had eight kills and three digs in the victory.

With their third straight victory, the Bulldogs are now three games over .500 at 10-7 for the year, while they also improve to 5-2 in Great American Conference play. The Dawgs are on the road for three games next week, beginning with a non-conference match at Southwestern Christian on Thursday evening.
