2021 Admissions

The SWOSU College of Pharmacy (COP) admitted 71 students in 2021. Minimum requirements to make application for admission to the program include completion of at least 61 semester hours of specified pre-pharmacy courses with a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.50. The selection process is competitive and based on a number of factors. These include, but are not limited to, science and mathematics grade average, overall grade average, American College Test (ACT) or Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores, motivation, character, and communication skills. Welcome new COP students!

- Spring
 - o Thirty (30) students were admitted to the program. The mean age was 22 years old. The mean GPA was 3.35. The mean science GPA was 3.07. The mean ACT was 23. The class is 57% female (17) and 43% male (13).





- Fall
 - o Forty-one (41) students were admitted to the program. The mean age was 22 years old. The mean GPA was 3.45. The mean science GPA was 3.21. The mean ACT was 25. The class is

49% female (20) and 51% male (21).

End of an Era: Dr. Davis Retired December 2021

After 33 years of service, Dr. Tom Davis retired from the SWOSU COP. Dr. Davis earned his Bachelor of Science in Pharmacy degree from SWOSU in 1970 and went on to pursue his Doctor of Medicine degree at the University of Oklahoma. Following graduation from



medical school in 1974, he completed a post-graduate training program in pathology and internal medicine at Saint Anthony Hospital in Oklahoma City. From 1977 to 1980, he served as an Associate Professor of Clinical Pharmacy at SWOSU before leaving to start a private medical practice in Oklahoma City. In 1992, Dr. Davis returned to the COP, where he taught for 24 years in the Department of Pharmacy Practice, followed by 5 years in the Department of Pharmaceutical Sciences. During this time, he continued his affiliation with Saint Anthony Hospital, in the areas of pharmacy and behavioral health/substance abuse.

Dr. Davis was widely known as a gifted teacher with the unique ability of making the most difficult concepts easy to understand. His love for teaching was apparent to everyone, as he would always go above and beyond to make sure students were learning. This dedication to teaching is why he was selected by the students a record 13 times as the AACP Teacher of the Year.


Besides being an excellent teacher, Dr. Davis was passionate about his alma mater. At the university



level, he served on the Strategic Planning Committee, the 100th Anniversary Committee, the Presidential Inauguration Committee, Faculty Senate, and various other university committees. Within the COP, Dr. Davis served on countless committees and working groups. He was also part of the Pharmacy Alumni Council and was instrumental in the development of the SWOSU COP White Coat Ceremony.

Dr. Davis received numerous honors and awards throughout his career. He was named the Pharmacist of the Year in 2010 by the Oklahoma Society of Health-System Pharmacists. In 2018, he was selected by the Cardinal Health Foundation and the Oklahoma Pharmacists Association as the recipient of the Generation Rx Champions Award for his outstanding work in fighting prescription drug misuse. He was also honored by the SWOSU Pharmacy Alumni Association in October 2021 with the Dr. H.F. Timmons award.

We want to thank Dr. Davis for the remarkable contributions that he has made to the COP and to the lives of countless pharmacy students, faculty members, and other colleagues within the profession. We will miss him tremendously, but we are excited for future traveling adventures. Well done, Dr. Davis!

Annual Professionalism Banquet

The 11th annual Professionalism Banquet was held virtually on Tuesday, January 19, 2021, and was attended by over 100 participants, including all first-year pharmacy students. The banquet is held annually and serves to provide incoming students with an introduction to the standards of professionalism and ethics that are expected from pharmacists.

Dr. Randy Beutler and Dr. David Ralph, Dean of the COP, each addressed the attendees. Two special guest speakers were invited and spoke on topics related to their expertise in pharmacy.

The first guest speaker was Dr. Keevie Ridener from the Oklahoma State Board of Pharmacy. She graduated from OU College of Pharmacy and began her career in independent pharmacy. She

then moved to retail pharmacy management for several years before going to work for the State Board in 2017. Dr. Ridener gave a brief law overview and reminded the students of the legal and professional duties of a practicing pharmacist.



The second guest speaker of the evening was Dr. Travis Wolff. Dr. Wolff is a December 2011 graduate of SWOSU COP. He holds a teaching certificate from the University of Connecticut College of Pharmacy and a Psychology of Leadership



certificate from Cornell University College

of Management. He is also a Board Certified Ambulatory Care Pharmacist. He is the co-owner of two Oklahoma pharmacies, Med-World Pharmacy in Sapulpa and Apothecary Pharmacy in Mounds. He is founder of PharmFurther, where he is the lead business coach. Dr. Wolff is active in multiple local, state, and national organizations and has spoken at a multitude of professional engagements. He enthralled the audience with his energetic discussion over leadership and pharmacy ownership.

Rural Health Center

In January 2021, the SWOSU COP and Rural Health Center provided immunization skills training for pharmacists, so that they could help with administering the coronavirus vaccine.

Dr. Randy Curry, Rural Health Center Coordinator, worked closely with the Oklahoma State Department of Health to obtain vaccine supply and organize vaccine appointments. He worked with SWOSU administration to provide clinics at the SWOSU Pioneer Cellular Event Center and to advertise these clinics.

Each clinic that Randy Curry organized was designed to conduct 1200-1300 appointments. Vaccine appointments were made available via the Oklahoma State Department of Health portal. Dr. Curry coordinated volunteers to screen for and administer both the Moderna and Pfizer vaccines. He utilized the services of registered pharmacists (from the community and SWOSU COP faculty), SWOSU nursing faculty, SWOSU staff, as well as SWOSU pharmacy and nursing students. A few Medical Reserve Corp (MRC) nurses also helped provide vaccinations.



During 2021, SWOSU clinic volunteers had the opportunity to provide vaccine education and administration services to 17,032 people. Most of the patients were from western Oklahoma, where it is often difficult to obtain medical services and answers to patient specific questions.

As the year progressed, he encountered new challenges. Currently the biggest challenge is getting young adults to consider taking the vaccine. He is working hard, together with the SWOSU administration, to encourage SWOSU students to get vaccinated.


Dr. Curry saw the opportunity to serve rural western Oklahoma in late 2019. He has found that the pandemic has been a tremendous opportunity to serve people. He also says that this has been a great experience for SWOSU students in getting a lot of hands-on practice with immunization skills, and also with patient communication skills.

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SWOSU To Receive Largest-Ever Single Donation for Healthcare Education Center

Published June 15, 2021 – Southwestern Oklahoma State University (SWOSU) in Weatherford is set to receive the largest single donation in the history of the university. Longtime SWOSU benefactors Jerry and Margaret Hodge of Amarillo (TX) have generously committed a record-breaking \$5 million charitable gift. The Hodge donation will enable SWOSU to take the next steps toward construction of a state-of-the-art facility dedicated to healthcare education and pharmacy, named in honor of the Hodges. The gift will also establish a substantial new endowment benefitting students enrolled in the SWOSU College of Pharmacy.

Jerry Hodge, former chairman and chief executive officer of Maxor National Pharmacy Services Corporation, is a 1965 graduate of the SWOSU College of Pharmacy and a long-time supporter of the university. He was inducted into the SWOSU Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame in 1979 and was honored by the SWOSU College of Pharmacy as Outstanding Alumnus in 2008.

SWOSU President Randy Beutler said the goal of the building project is to establish SWOSU as the center for rural health education in the region. An integral part of the center will be components of the College of Pharmacy and other health-related fields at SWOSU that will further the university's mission of enhancing outreach efforts across western Oklahoma.

"We are extremely grateful and excited about the opportunities that this provides for SWOSU," Beutler said. "This incredibly generous gift from Jerry and Margaret Hodge and the long-term, positive benefits it will provide to our students, faculty and programs is truly a watershed moment in the 120-year history of this institution."

"I am deeply indebted to SWOSU and the College of Pharmacy," Hodge said. "Without my pharmacy degree, I would not have been able to purchase Maxor in 1966, and Maxor would not have been able to contract with Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore to run their out-patient pharmacies in 1991. It was at John Hopkins Hospital that I met Margaret, and we married in 1994. With her support and her medical background, Maxor began to grow nationally. So, now you understand why I feel so indebted to SWOSU and the School of Pharmacy. This gift is from the two of us."

The Hodge donation will complement the \$7 million in resources provided by the recently passed sales tax by the citizens of Weatherford with a focus on rural health sciences and education. As SWOSU continues to expand its health sciences offerings, the Hodge donation will enable the university to proceed with planning for strategic partnerships with other higher education institutions. These partnerships could lead to SWOSU students having access to a Physician Assistant program and the possibility of a dual degrees program through the SWOSU College of Pharmacy. This is a long-term goal and priority of SWOSU that will be powerfully and positively impacted by the Hodge gift.

The endowment component of the donation is \$500,000 and the Pharmacy Foundation will honor the endowment by raising equal amounts of the matching funds. SWOSU has committed to working on matching that portion of the gift, according to Beutler. The Hodge gift and related endowments will be collaboratively stewarded by SWOSU's long-time institutionally-related charities—the Southwestern Pharmacy Alumni Foundation, Inc., (SPAF) and the SWOSU Foundation, Inc. (SWOSUF). The two Foundations will partner in raising matching funds to help further the ability of the Hodge gift to provide financial assistance to SWOSU College of Pharmacy students.

In 2005, the Jerry and Margaret Hodge Endowed Scholarship was established at SWOSU. Since its inception, the fund has provided a total of \$60,000 in scholarship awards to 52 pharmacy students.

Hodge was born in Carnegie and attended a two-room country school outside of Mountain View through the eighth grade before moving to Amarillo, where he graduated in 1960 from Tascosa High School. Following his graduation from SWOSU, he purchased Maxor Drug Company, Inc., in Amarillo and transformed it from a small community drugstore into Maxor National Pharmacy Services Corporation, a company that at one time employed nearly 500 people in Amarillo and more than 660 people nationwide. Hodge served as Maxor's chairman and chief executive officer until he retired in 2016. He served on the Texas State Board of Pharmacy from 1981 to 1987, including a stint as president from 1984 to 1985. He is a past

> president of the Texas Panhandle Pharmaceutical Association and was a charter member of the American Society of Consulting Pharmacists.

In 1973, Hodge was first elected to the Amarillo City Commission at the age of 30. After serving two 2-year terms as City Commissioner, at the age of 34, he was elected the youngest mayor in Amarillo history, serving two terms. In 2018, Hodge was named the Amarillo Globe-News Man of the Year for his many civic, business and charitable contributions to Amarillo. Known as a person always working behind the scenes to improve Amarillo, Hodge was honored for being a great asset to the city, region and state. One friend described him as a problem solver, tough businessman and to his family and friends, a real sweetheart. Hodge has also been involved in many past positions at the state and national levels, including: Chairman and vice-chairman of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice Board, Chair of the Mayors' Advisory Committee to the Governor of Texas, Personal advisor on utilities and utility rates for Texas Governor W.P. Clements, President of the Texas Municipal League Region endowment benefitting students enrolled in the SWOSU College of II, Economic Advisory Committee of the U.S. Conference of Mayors, Director of the Texas

SWOSU Provides Update on Jerry and Margaret Hodge Pharmacy & Rural Health Center

Published June 21, 2021 – Southwestern Oklahoma State University (SWOSU) has released additional information following the recent announcement of the largest-ever single gift in the university's history that will be allocated to supporting a state-of-the-art facility dedicated to pharmacy and healthcare education.

The facility will be named the **Jerry & Margaret Hodge Pharmacy & Rural Health Center** in honor of a major charitable investment from longtime SWOSU benefactors Jerry and Margaret Hodge of Amarillo (TX). The gift from the Hodges will complement the estimated \$7 million in resources, which will be provided by the recently passed sales tax by the citizens of Weatherford with a focus on rural health sciences and education.

"Jerry and Margaret Hodge's historic gift to SWOSU makes immediate provision for increased student scholarships while also investing in our long-term strategic vision of SWOSU becoming the premiere center for rural health education in our region," said SWOSU Assistant Vice President for Institutional Advancement Garrett King.

As part of the gift, the Hodges have generously committed \$500,000 in new pharmacy scholarships to the Southwestern Pharmacy Alumni Foundation, Inc., contingent on SWOSU raising a matching valuation of \$500,000 in new pharmacy scholarships for the SWOSU Foundation, Inc.

"We are asking SWOSU's generous community of alumni, emeriti and friends to unite in raising the \$500,000 matching total of scholarship gifts to support our College of Pharmacy students and to recognize Jerry and Margaret Hodge's generosity," King said.

SWOSU is currently strategizing the next steps towards construction of the Hodge Pharmacy & Rural Health Center. University and Foundation leaders are working to secure additional funding for the facility from a variety of governmental and nonprofit entities, as well as from private donors. The construction timeline and detailed plans for the Hodge Pharmacy & Rural Health Center will be formulated and solidified as funding is secured.

SWOSU and OSU-CHS Sign MOU to Explore Expansion of Rural Healthcare Education

Published June 29, 2021 - Southwestern Oklahoma State University's (SWOSU) College of Pharmacy in Weatherford and Oklahoma State University Center for Health Sciences (OSU-CHS) in Tulsa have signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) to cooperate to serve students and the citizens of Oklahoma through expansion of rural healthcare education.

The MOU was signed by SWOSU President Dr. Randy L. Beutler and OSU-CHS President Dr. Kayse Shrum, who will take over as president of Oklahoma State University in



Stillwater on July 1. SWOSU and OSU-CHS will explore options for a dual-degree partnership involving SWOSU's Doctor of Pharmacy (Pharm.D.) program and the OSU-CHS Physician Assistant (P.A.) program.

"We greatly appreciate the opportunity to begin a closer relationship with Oklahoma State University Center for Health Sciences that will lead to future enhancement of health-related programs at both institutions," Beutler said. "This is a partnership with great potential."

SWOSU recently received the largest single donation in the history of the university (\$5 million) from longtime SWOSU benefactors Jerry and Margaret Hodge of Amarillo (TX). That gift is enabling SWOSU to take the next steps toward construction of a state-of-theart facility dedicated to healthcare education and pharmacy.

SWOSU and OSU-CHS will cooperate on intra-professional education opportunities through electronic or physical means at the earliest possible opportunity. The two higher education institutions will be looking at possibilities and planning methods to utilize selected clinical rotations from one institution's program to meet requirements for clinical rotations of the other institution's program.

In addition, discussion will take place about the guaranteed admission slots into the OSU-CHS P.A. program for SWOSU Pharm.D. graduates, once the probationary accreditation class size cap on the OSU-CHS P.A. program is lifted, provided pre-requisites are met. And discussion will take place on the logistics of guaranteed admission slots into the SWOSU Pharm.D. program for OSU-CHS P.A. graduates, provided pre-requisites are met. Beutler said the two entities will explore other methods in which SWOSU can collaborate with OSU-CHS to expand rural healthcare opportunities for students and citizens, including the physical expansion of the OSU-CHS P.A. program into western Oklahoma at a site on SWOSU's Weatherford campus, when OSU-CHS' P.A. accreditation and funding levels allow consideration of such an expansion.

IMPORTANT CLARIFICATION Regarding the SWOSU June 29, 2021 Press Release

The announcement of the generous gift from Jerry and Margaret Hodge to support the development of a rural health center on the SWOSU campus will provide an invaluable opportunity to expand rural healthcare in western Oklahoma. As was announced in the June 29 press release, another component of this plan is the possible creation of a PharmD/Physician Assistant (PA) program in collaboration with the Oklahoma State University Center for Health Sciences (OSU-CHS).

Since the June 21 announcement, we have received inquiries regarding this proposed dual-degrees program. Although there has been a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between SWOSU and OSU-CHS, **planning for the dual degrees program is just in the beginning stages**. Since the PA degree offering at OSU-CHS is new, the program is required to undergo a probationary period for 5 years before formal accreditation. During this time, there is a cap on the class size. Once the probationary accreditation class size cap on the OSU-CHS PA program is lifted, we hope to have a dual degrees program in place to allow matriculation of PharmD students and graduates. Moving forward, we will send periodic updates to the SWOSU College of Pharmacy community as new developments take place. Specialty adherence rates rep r the insurance groups XYZ represe ere 82.5%, 87%, 89.6%, 89.75% and 92.54%.4 The adherence rates reported by XYZ do not correspond to rates in previous retroactive reviews performed by the pharmacy, which were between 90% and 94%.⁵⁻⁶

The most recent report was broken down into the five major insurance groups represented by XYZ, and their DIR goals. The total ort was 13 pages in length.

Two new scholarships have been established this year because of generous gifts made by Bryan and Deanne Hammons of Kennedale (TX), and by Vonya Streetz of OKC.

Graduation

The SWOSU College of Pharmacy Convocation and Graduate Recognition Ceremony was held on April 30, 2021. Speakers included Dean Ralph and SWOSU President Dr. Beutler. Awards were presented by Dean Ralph and Dr. Ramos. Dean Ralph donned each graduate with their doctoral hood, and President Beutler conferred the Doctor of Pharmacy degrees. Eleven students completed the dual degrees of the Doctor of Pharmacy and the Master of Business Administration. Ten students in the Nelson Sims Leadership, Innovation, and Quality Outcomes degree specialization program graduated. They are recognized as Sims Scholars.

Organization News

American Pharmacists Association Academy of Student Pharmacists (APhA-ASP)

Over the past year, the SWOSU chapter of the APhA-ASP worked diligently to provide improved patient care and education through numerous projects and activities.

Operation Immunization assisted the SWOSU Rural Health Center and the Custer County Health Department with recruiting student volunteers and developing large-scale clinics, located on campus at the Pioneer Cellular Event Center. Several members spoke at a local radio station to answer questions about the COVID-19 vaccine and the clinics. SWOSU's Operation Immunization was also featured on the national APhA-ASP's Instagram page. During the fall, members created an informational slide that addressed current myths about the COVID-19 vaccines, which was displayed on campus monitors all across the campus. They also hosted flu vaccine clinics for the entire COP.

During the first two weeks in February, Operation Women's Health, Operation Heart, and Operation Brain collaborated to host a mental and physical health challenge open to all COP students. Over 30 students participated in the challenge and set goals to develop new healthy habits, with 2 students winning health-themed gift baskets.

Operation Women's Health worked with the local Girl Scout chapter in a demonstration of successful handwashing to help combat the spread of illness. They were also able to teach the girls about the importance of self-confidence and the negative impact social media and photoshop can have on their mental health. This operation also held a women's shelter drive and encouraged student pharmacists to donate items that women and children might find necessary in the escape from a difficult situation. The items were then donated to YWCA Oklahoma City for distribution.

Operation Heart and Operation Diabetes assembled and dispersed informational resources and materials relating to heart health and diabetes in the waiting and recovery areas of the COVID-19 vaccination clinics. 


