Staff highlights CLEET program, pharmacy services at luncheon

At a recent media day luncheon, SWOSU staff highlighted innovative programs in the Parks and Recreation Department and the Pharmacy College.

The annual luncheon on August 28th was attended by 45 people, 26 of those being media reporters from Weatherford and surrounding areas such as Thomas, Elk City, Clinton, and as far as Oklahoma City.

Speaking for Parks and Recreation was Chad Kinder, Associate Dean of the School of Behavioral Sciences and Education. He spoke about the CLEET Collegiate Officer Program, which is a component of the SWOSU Parks and Wildlife Law Enforcement degree. CLEET stands for Council on Law Enforcement, Education, and Training.

He talked about how a lot of these jobs are becoming available for students.

"The baby boomers are really starting to move out of a lot of these state and federal agencies and our kids are getting hired, and kind of able to choose exactly what they want to do and at what location," Kinder said.

The Pharmacy program has been try-

ing to grow awareness for RHC (Rural Health Care).

"Our main goal is to be of resource and come long side these rural hospitals and pharmacies and help them do some things that typically aren't getting done out in the rural area" said Randy Curry."

Katy Kirk is in charge of the development in RHC in hospitals.

"Our purpose is to elevate RHC by fondling information developing services and assisting Rural of pharmacy in the advancement of improvement patient care. They provide multiple services that could help the patient such as iPad instructional videos done by the students of Pharmacy.

Curry also has completed surveys at hospitals and pharmacies and currently has 332 on the network. In doing this, curry said the program has gained trust in pharmacies and other health care professionals. They provide daily access to the hospitals and review medication orders in a 24hour period.

Another awareness that they spoke about was MTM. Medication Therapy Management is to enhance patients understanding of the medications that's being used to ensure that they are taking their meds when needed. MTM can also help generate revenue for SWOSU.

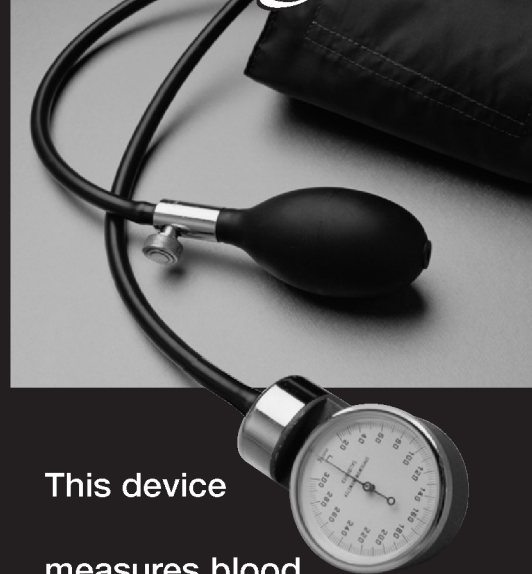

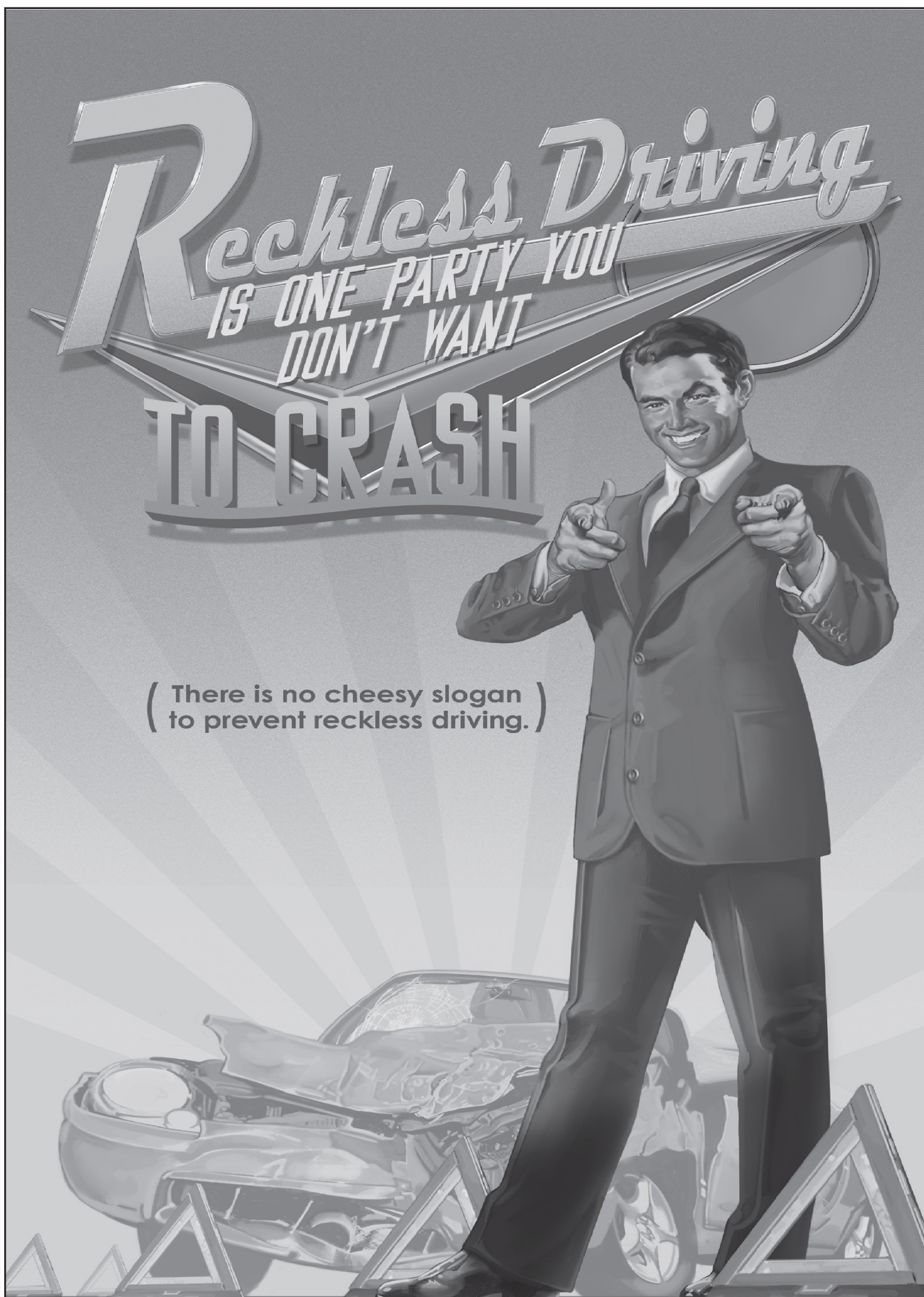

Christian sorority begins 2nd year

The Gamma Chapter of Eta Iota Sigma, a Christian sorority on campus, began recruitment last week.

Eta Iota Sigma has been on campus for a little over a year. The name comes from 1 Corinthians 3:5 and the abbreviated Greek letters ΗΙΣ stand for He Is Sufficient.

In 1992, the Alpha Chapter of ΗΙΣ was established at Texas Christian University and in 2001 the Beta Chapter formed at Southern Methodist University along with the ΗΙΣ National Board. The Gamma Chapter at SWOSU was founded in the fall semester of 2013 by Chelsea Blevins and four other charter members: Brittney Burton, Karlee Liner, Hailee Platt, and Randa Tracy. They began their first recruitment soon after being founded.

"I just woke up one day and it was just as clear as it could be that the Lord had called me to start a Christian sorority here at SWOSU," Blevins said. "The purpose of Eta

Iota Sigma at SWOSU is for Christian women to have that fellowship, to have that family, and to seek the Lord Jesus Christ in everything that they do—not just experience college and go through it, but go through it in a Christ-centered light."

Since their first recruitment, ΗΙΣ has grown to 20 members, four of whom are now alumni of the sorority. Blevins believes that having common ground in their faiths is what gives women from different backgrounds and fields of study a chance to connect.

On the one-year anniversary of their first recruitment, Information Night began on Sept. 2 as a way to let potential new members know what ΗΙΣ had to offer and upon what scriptures the sorority was founded.

"We don't just come out of nowhere. We have doctrinal beliefs that come from scripture," said Kiley Wilson, ΗΙΣ President.

The rest of the week was spent getting to know potential new members through games, a devotional, and a community service activity.

ΗΙΣ is unique in acceptance of new members into the sorority. Every potential new member that expressed an interest by the end of the week was given a bid and a celebration was held for new members accepting their bids on Sept. 6.

"Our calling here at SWOSU is to be a support group. We come to college and our whole lives are upturned, and it's essential to find a home, a group of people who have a common bond in Christ. Our goal is to be a home away from home—a family. We are an eternal sisterhood," stated Wilson.

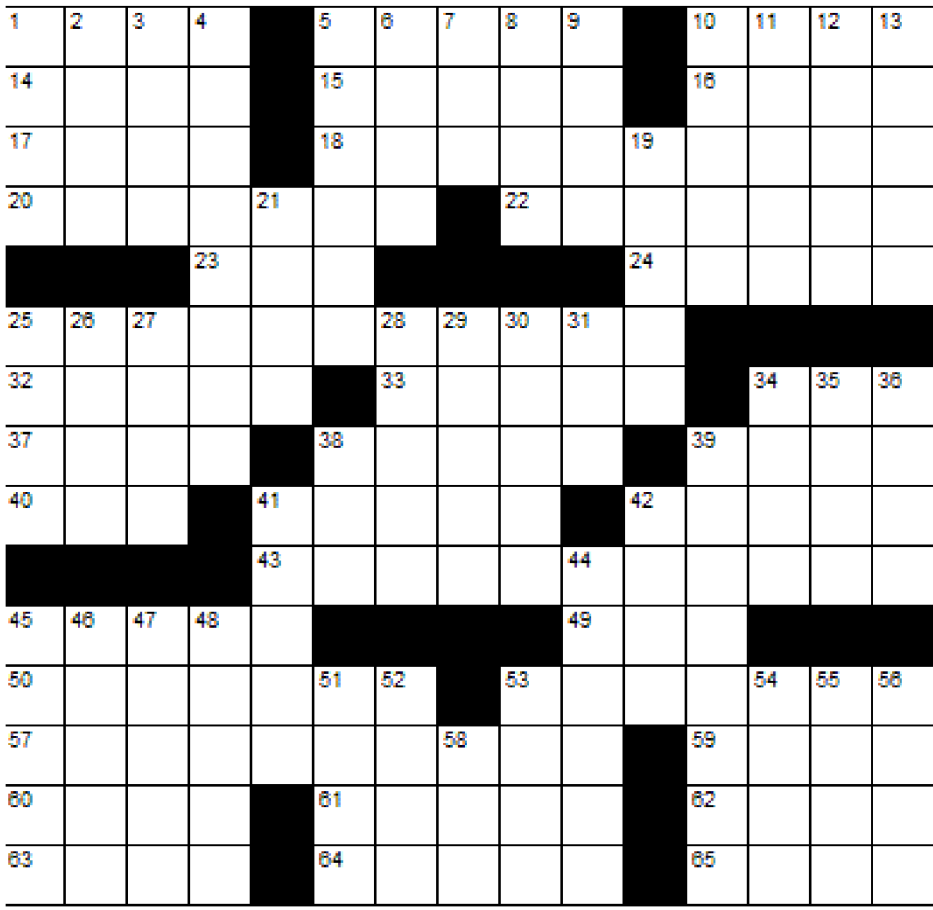

Science to the rescue!

Study reports that early classes are not healthy for students

A new study backs up what college students have claimed for years—8 a.m. classes are too early. An American Academy of Pediatrics study shows that early classes and tired students lead to poor academic performance, obesity, traffic accidents, and depression.

Other studies show that a lack of sleep causes kids to eat more carbs and fats, with the odds of obesity increasing by 80% for every hour of sleep lost. Staying up until midnight or even later can cause them to suffer more from depression and suicidal thoughts than those who go to sleep earlier.

In another study Lexington, KY delayed secondary classes by one hour. The result was a decrease in the teen crash rate by 16.5%. SWOSU student Wes Hayes said that he didn't like 8 a.m. class do to his experience. He was on his way to one when he was in the accident that caused him to break his back.

He was going 60 mph when he experienced Micro-sleep, a period of sleep that can last up to a few seconds. When he opened his eyes he was further down the road than he thought. In the blink of an eye he was driving into a car that was stopped and had no time to stop. Wes said that "driving while tired is worse than driving drunk".

Students also claim to have a better time paying attention, less tardiness and daytime sleepiness in classes that start later in the day. Studies show that students who take later classes have a better attendance rate and higher academic achievement than schools that start early.

SWOSU student Dylan Abner took an 8 a.m. class his freshman year and did not like it. He states that he cannot wake up early and didn't learn as much because he was tired. If he was to go to a 9 a.m. class, he would be paying more attention due to having another hour of sleep.

His brother was in an accident due to a student being up to early for class and pulling out in front of him.

The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that schools start no earlier than 8:30 a.m. to reduce public health. They recommend that teens get at least 8.5 to 9.5 hours of sleep every night. Parents can help their kids by making a set schedule for bed.

"Setting the stage for good sleep now is an important habit that can make a difference in your child's future health," said Dr. Jennifer Shu.

Mistakes cost Bulldogs in opener

SEARCY, Ark. — The SWOSU football team entered Saturday's game with Harding looking for back-to-back season-opening wins but it was not to be as the Bisons exacted revenge from a year ago with a 42-6 victory at First Security Stadium.

The Bulldogs turned the ball over seven times, including a snap over the head of first-time starting quarterback Ryley Claborn on the third play of the game that setup Harding's initial score less than two minutes into the game. Following a three-and-out on the ensuing drive, Harding marched 65 yards in three plays to take a 14-0 lead with 10:14 to play in the first and they would not look back.

SWOSU finally got some offense rolling late in the first quarter, but a 15-play drive that spanned the first and second quarters came to an end on downs less than a minute into the second period. Another extended drive finally got the Bulldogs on the board as an 11-play, 62-yard drive was capped off with a 3-yard touch-

down run from Karl Hodge that was setup following a 31-yard pass from Claborn to Brian Robinson on 3rd and 10. Dalton Jackson was unable to convert the extra point attempt, leaving SWOSU behind 21-6.

Harding took the opening drive of the second half 66 yards in five plays and added a 43-yard touchdown pass to go up 28-6 and they added two scores in the fourth quarter for the final margin.

Defensively, SWOSU battled the vaunted triple option offense of the Bisons admirably. The Bulldogs stopped Harding on downs twice in the first half after being put in tough situations, including sniffing out a fake field goal attempt in the first quarter. Leading the way on defense were Steven Townsley with 12 tackles while Kale Sawatzky and Devin Benton had 10 apiece. Benton added 2.5 tackles for loss as SWOSU totaled 10 tackles behind the line of scrimmage for the game.

Harding finished with 485 yards of total offense, including 324 on the ground while holding SWOSU below

200 yards of total offense. The Dawgs passed for 157 yards while rushing for just 39 in the game, averaging just 2.8 yards per play.

Claborn had glimpses of success in his first start, finishing with 157 yards passing after completing 22-of-42 attempts, but he was intercepted three times. Brad Smithey had six receptions for 34 yards to lead the Dawgs, with Jared Rayburn chipping in four in his collegiate debut and X'zavious Harrison had three for 21 yards.

The biggest struggles for the SWOSU offense came on the ground, where they were limited to just 39 yards on 28 attempts. Hodge and Matt Farris, the Bulldogs main running backs, each toted the rock ten times but combined for just 26 yards, the same total as Claborn who finished as the leading rusher for SWOSU.

SWOSU looks to get on the right track next week when they host Arkansas Tech for the Fast Lane Kick-off Classic next Saturday (Sept. 13) at Fast Lane Field in Weatherford.

Soccer team ties Minot State, 1-1

Weatherford, Okla. — On a cool Sunday afternoon, the Bulldogs hosted Minot State at the SWOSU Athletic Complex. The game was a rematch of the 2012 NCAA II Tournament first round that saw the Bulldogs come out 3-0 victors. Olivia Butler opened the scoring for the Bulldogs before the Beavers pulled one back before the half. Through the second half and two extra time periods, neither team would find the game winning goal.

After being held goalless in their season opener on Friday, the Bulldogs came out much more positive in Sunday's match. Almost immediately after the opening whistle blew, Cori Kelly found herself through all alone with only Minot State keeper Gemma Biasetto to beat. Kelly put in a low shot, but Biasetto was equal to it and the ball went out for a corner. Alyssa Bagley provided the restart from the corner flag, but it sailed over the box.

Shortly after that attacking foray, freshman Ryle Danker intercepted a failed clearance from the Beavers' defense midway down the right hand

side of the field. Danker spotted fellow freshman Olivia Butler making a back post run and sent in a diagonal ball. Butler was able to beat her defender to the ball and put in a low, bouncing shot that got the better of Biasetto, nestling into the bottom right corner of the goal. The 14th minute goal was the first of Butler's career on her first career start.

The Bulldogs enjoyed the majority of possession over the next 30 minutes of play, with the Beavers only really threatening on the counter. In the 44th minute, Maya Hay was called for a foul in a dangerous area in front of goal. Jamie Ayala hit an out-swinging kick into the box, which fell to the feet of Taylor Bachman-Williams for the goal.

On the restart for the second half, the Bulldogs came out on the back foot as Minot State pressed for the lead. Eventually Randa Castleberry and Charlotte Eastman were able to regain the backline's composure after Courtney Flores pulled off a tremendous double save and Lauren Williams cleared the ball off the goal line to preserve the tie. The next

20 minutes saw neither team really threaten to go ahead.

Then, with 15 minutes remaining, Minot sent in a dangerous corner that was headed down at Flores' feet. She dropped quickly to the ground for the save. On the 81st minute, Jamie MacFarlane looked to have broken through for a one on one with Flores, but Danker committed a smart, professional foul to deny the opportunity. She would receive a yellow card for her efforts. The Bulldogs would finish the half unleashing three shots at the Beavers' goal, but none of them gave the Bulldogs the winning goal.

Tied 1-1 through two halves, the teams went to golden goal extra time to find a winner. The first extra time period saw the Bulldogs again provide a staunch defensive effort that ensured none of the Beavers' three shots truly threatened to go in. Kelly would also get one shot off, but it was blocked.

Action resumes Friday when the Bulldogs travel to Edmond, Okla. to take on the University of Central Oklahoma Bronchos at 4 PM.

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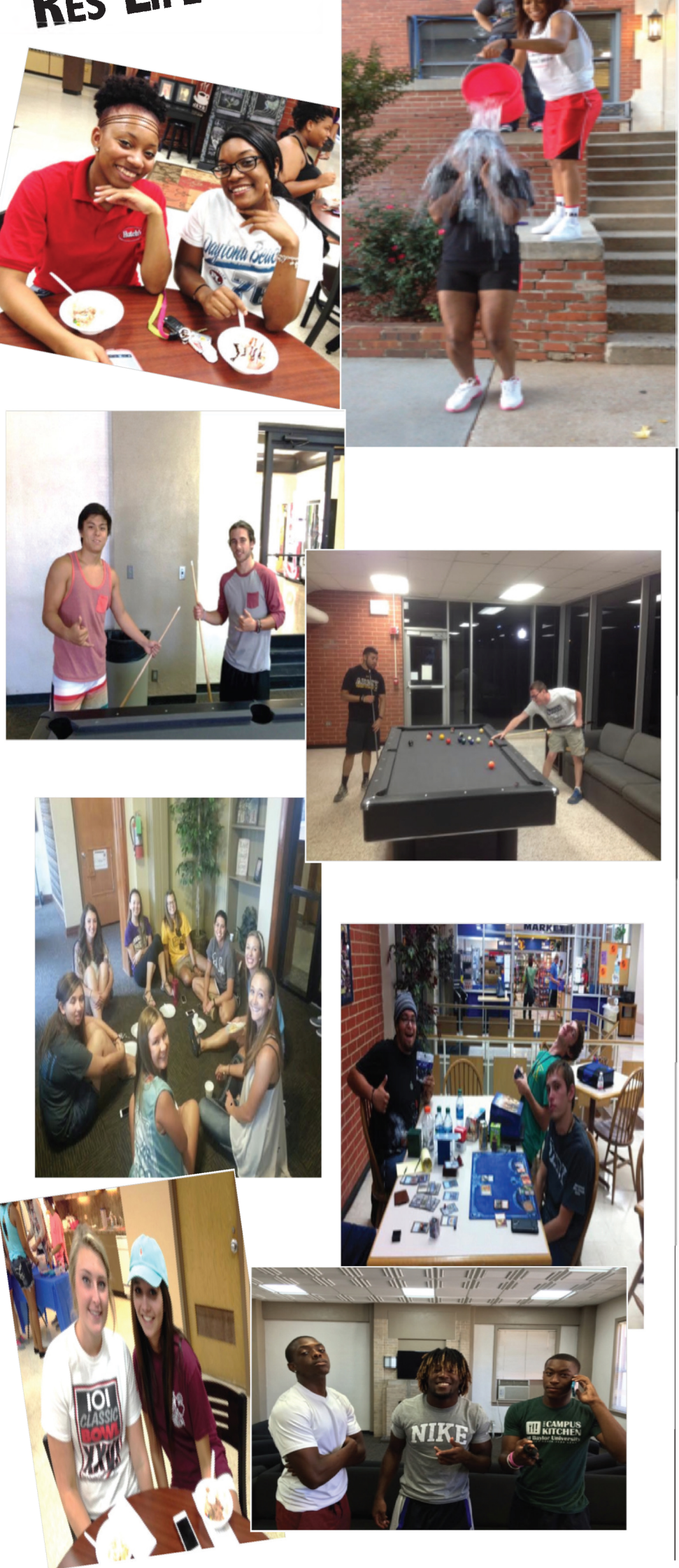
