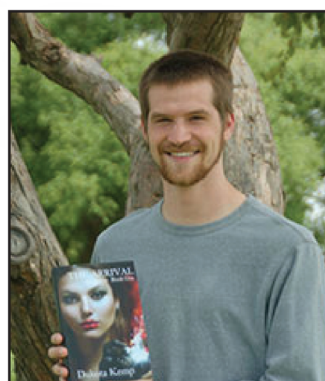
Alum publishes first novel

The editorial board meets every Wednesday at 2:00 p.m. in the journalism lab, Campbell 211.

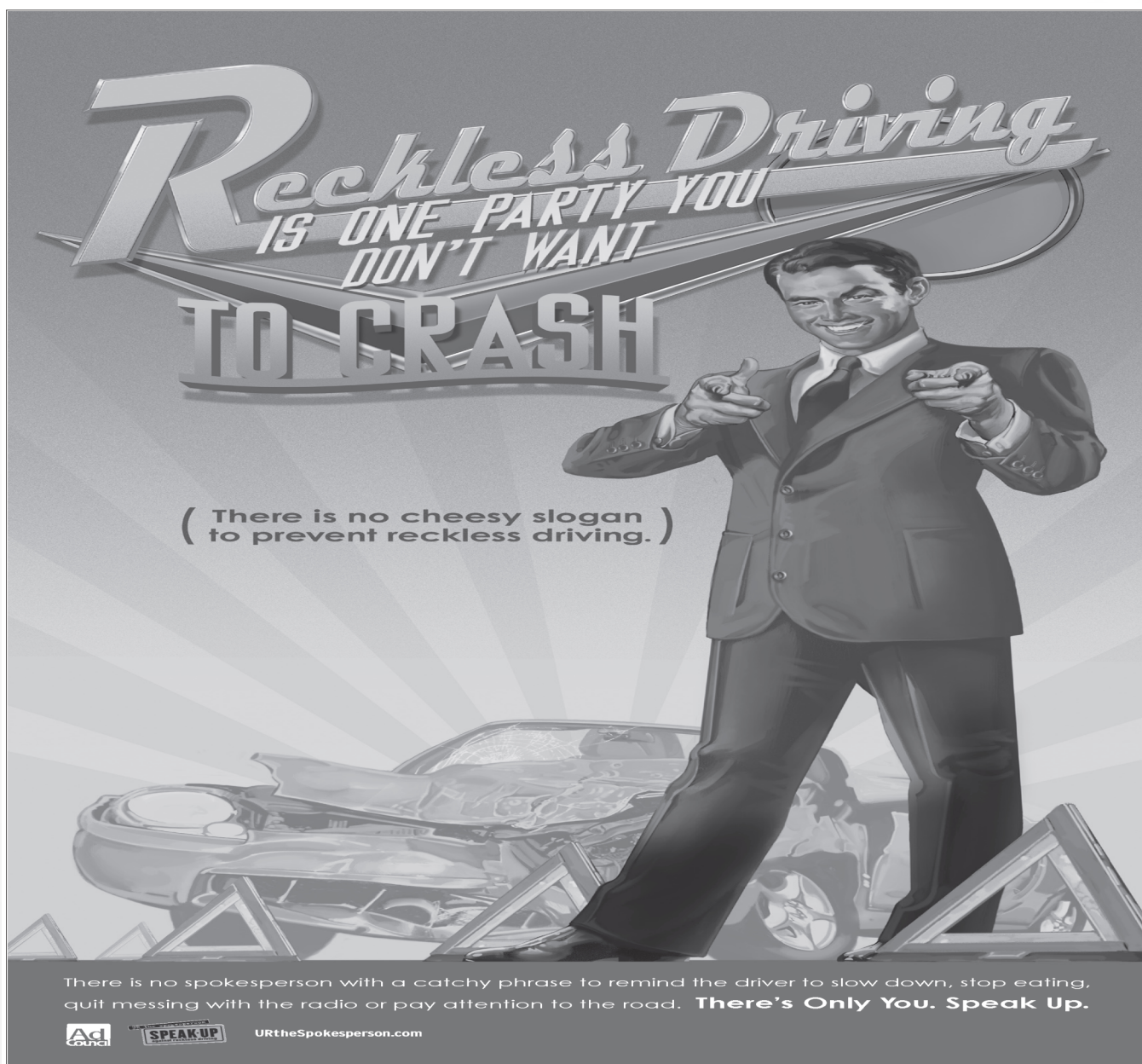

Okies still love Garth

Students excited about new tour

Garth Brooks just can't stay away from country music.

On Sept. 4, Brooks began his 2014 World Tour with wife, Trisha Yearwood, in Chicago. This is his first tour of this magnitude in nearly two decades.

Garth Brooks is a successful American country music singer, songwriter and guitarist. In 1989, Brooks released his first album but it wasn't until he released his third album, *Ropin' in the Wind*, that he found himself debuting at No. 1 on the country music charts in 1991. Brooks has been named the top-selling solo artist of the 20th century with 134 million albums sold. He has had 25 of his singles debut at #1 on country music charts and 13 albums debut at #1 "making him the highest country music debut leader of all time," stated by his official website.

The peak of his touring days was his 1996-1998 concert tour where he sold 5.3 million tickets. That tour is considered the top country music tour of all time, according to Amusement Business.

Along with receiving Artist of the Decade from the American Music Awards and the Academy of Country Music Awards, he has been inducted in the Songwriters Hall of Fame, Nashville Songwriters Hall of Fame, the Country Music Hall of Fame, and

many other prestigious honors.

Brooks retired from country music in 2001 to spend more time with his family. Although he wasn't touring, he performed many shows that benefited communities and brought awareness to disaster relief donations. In 2009, Brooks came out of retirement and played 180 sold-out shows in Las Vegas. After his four-year run in Las Vegas, Brooks made a shocking announcement that he would be touring again in 2014. In January 2014, he sold-out five shows in Dublin with over 400,000 tickets sold. He became the first artist to ever reach that number of tickets sold at one venue.

According to garthbrooks.com, "Garth is known for playing multiple, sold-out shows in each city and for consistently breaking venue attendance records set by the likes of Elvis Presley, Paul McCartney, U2, and Billy Joel."

The world is thrilled that Brooks is back on the circuit and it seems several Southwestern students are reacting the same way. Despite that he achieved

fame in the '90s, Brooks is still popular in Oklahoma. He is an Oklahoma native, born in Tulsa and also a graduate of Oklahoma State University in Stillwater.

Of the students interviewed by The Southwestern, 75 percent said that if Brooks were to come to Oklahoma or surrounding areas, they "definitely" would go. Southwestern students are hopeful that Oklahoma makes the list of places that Brooks chooses to perform.

On Sept. 3, Brooks released his first single since August 2007 called "People Loving People." He is known for his innovative country style that began in his early recording days and now it seems that he is ready to shake things up in country music once again.

The last time he appeared on Good Morning America in December 2013, Brooks let it slip that he would be touring again. This time, he was not as revealing and seemed to be holding back a very important announcement that we are still waiting to hear.

"What we announced here nine months ago can't hold a candle to what we're getting ready to announce," Brooks told Good Morning America host Robin Roberts on Sept. 4. "Music history is about to change, we'll put it that way."

It seems that this cowboy's "good ride" is far from over.

Bulldogs cruise to victory in Event Center debut

Carly Zak put down a season-best 15 kills and Kiley Brennfoerder had one of the most efficient matches in SWOSU history as the Bulldogs made quick work of St. Gregory's in the first SWOSU Volleyball match in the new Pioneer Cellular Event Center. SWOSU downs the Cavaliers in three sets by scores of 25-8, 25-18, 25-21.

Zak had six kills in a quick opening set as SWOSU hit .242 en route to a runaway 25-8 for the Bulldogs in the first. The hitting improved in the second set as the Bulldogs committed just two hitting errors in 31 attempts and took another quick set despite the best hitting from SGU in the match. Zak added her final five kills in the third set while Brennfoerder stonewalled the Cavaliers at the net with four kills, enabling the Bulldogs

to earn their first three-set victory of the season.

The Bulldogs hit .202 for the match, behind Brennfoerder, who matched a career-high with seven kills in just 10 attempts without committing a hitting error. She also added five blocks in the match as SWOSU had 10 for the match. Zak had 15 kills and just four hitting errors for a .275 percentage, the highest by a Bulldog this season when putting down 12 or more kills.

Joey Collins matched Brennfoerder with seven kills and added a game-high 19 digs and one block while Kaila Lancaster recorded 12 digs from her libero position. Brandy Mader had another strong match, directing SWOSU with 33 assists to go along with seven digs, four blocks and two kills.

New cross country coach named

In June, SWOSU's Athletic Director Todd Thurman announced that a new cross country coach had been hired.

Shane Brookshire was officially hired, after volunteering with the team last season. Brookshire brings four years of coaching experience to the program along with five years of experience as a collegiate competitor.

Brookshire was successful as a collegiate runner at Cal State Stanislaus, where he led his team to finish second in the California Collegiate Athletic Association. He also earned a bachelor's degree in

Physical Education from Cal State and is currently completing a master's in Sports Management at SWOSU.

San Jose State and Bemidji State, both of California, were Brookshire's previous coaching homes.

"Workouts are a lot harder this year, but he is making us tougher and that makes us stronger competitors," Says Taylor Scott, a member of the cross country team. Brookshire is working out his team twice a day, once at 6 a.m. and again at 3 p.m.

The hard work the team has been putting in is paying off. They opened their season on Saturday, Sept 6 at the UCO Land Run

Bulldogs win in wild finish

Facing a 23-7 deficit entering the fourth quarter, the SWOSU Football team scored 20 unanswered points in the final stanza to defeat Arkansas Tech 27-23 in the Fast Lane Kickoff Classic on Saturday evening.

Steven Townsley intercepted a Dennis Robertson pass and returned it 63 yards to paydirt to put the Bulldogs on top for the first time in the game with 5:11 to play. The pick six came on the heels of back-to-back touchdown drives spanning more than seven minutes as SWOSU picked up an onside kick in between.

After getting little going offensively through three quarters, Ryley Claborn led the Bulldogs 72 yards in eight plays, getting a trio of big runs from Karl Hodge before hitting Teverick Boyd from seven yards out to get within 10 at 23-13. On the ensuing kickoff, Dalton Jackson tapped the ball forward and Tanner Thompson was able to recover and give the Bulldogs offense another chance. Claborn and company would convert, taking 10 plays to march 53 yards, converting a 4th and 12 with a 27-yard TD pass from Claborn to Carlos Smith that made the score 23-20 with 5:39 to play.

ATU got the ball at their own 35-yard line following Jackson's next kickoff but Robertson's second pass sailed high of his intended target and instead found Townsley, who raced past the remaining members of the Wonder Boy offense to find the end zone and complete the improbable fourth-quarter comeback.

Arkansas Tech built their on the heels of three Randy Velazquez field goals, but Velazquez did miss a 52-yard attempt off the left upright in the third quarter. His third made attempt gave the Wonder Boys a 23-7 lead late in the third quarter.

It was around that time that SWOSU got their run game going behind Hodge, who finished the game with a career-best 167 yards and one touchdown on 28 carries. His yardage mark is the seventh-most in SWOSU during the NCAA Division II era.

Claborn finished 24-of-42 for 253 yards and two touchdowns to overcome two interceptions and earn his first win as the Bulldogs starting quarterback. He

found Brad Smithey and Boyd five times each while Collin Bricker and X'zavious Harrison hauled in four catches apiece.

SWOSU racked up 406 yards of total offense while the defense held Arkansas Tech to 334 yards and forced four Wonder Boy turnovers. Devin Benton was a constant force for SWOSU and a nuisance to ATU, registering 5.0 tackles for loss and a half sack as part of his team-high eight tackles. Tanner Thompson joined Benton with team-high tackling honors while Kevin Joseph added seven and a pair of interceptions off of Robertson.

The SWOSU defense was constantly making plays behind ATU's line of scrimmage, finishing with 12 tackles for loss and three sacks as part of a performance that also included three interceptions, four pass breakups and two quarterback hurries. Kapena Olsen and Collier Ward each had seven tackles while starting linebackers Kale Sawatzky and Austin Loomis had six apiece. In total, SWOSU had eight players record a tackle for loss – including Jake Doyle with 2.5, including a sack on the final play of the game – and four who notched a sack. Tyler Follis recovered an ATU fumble late in the third quarter as the Wonder Boys had driven the ball into SWOSU territory.

The win for SWOSU is the second consecutive come-from-behind victory in the Fast Lane Kickoff Classic and the 17-point deficit is the largest overcome by the Bulldogs under head coach Dan Cocannouer. Cocannouer earned his 19th victory as head coach to tie for eighth in the SWOSU all-time wins list.

"These guys never give up," Cocannouer said following the win. "That's a great indication of us. The way the game was going into the fourth quarter, didn't look like we had much of a chance but we just went in there and kept on believing in ourselves."

SWOSU evens their record at 1-1 (1-1 GAC) with the win, giving them so momentum they will hope to carry over into next Saturday's home game against Southern Arkansas.

That game will kick off at 6:00 pm from Fast Lane Field.

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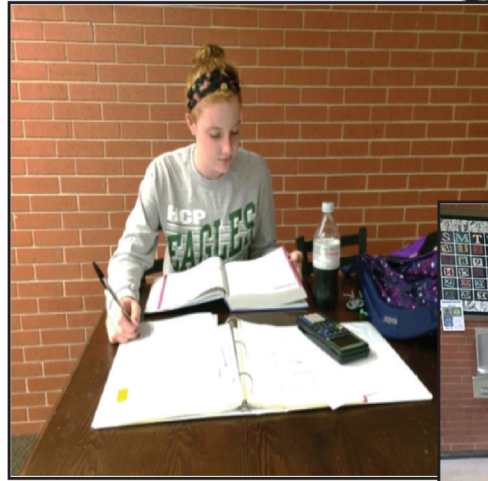
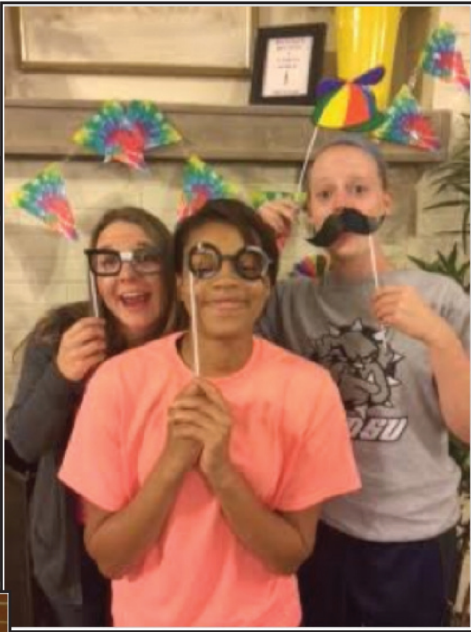

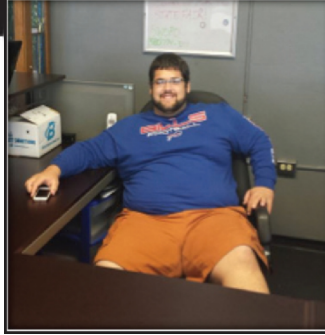
