BUILDINGS

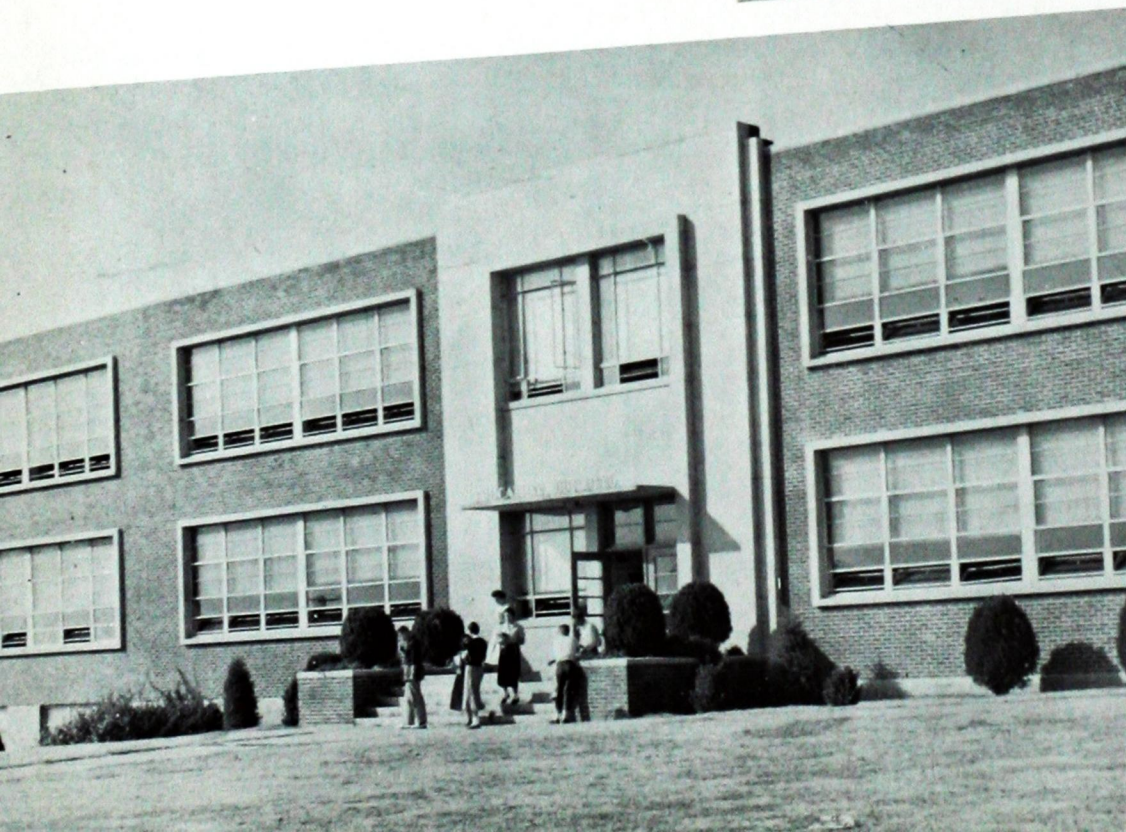
The Southwestern campus, situated around a semi-oval at the north end of the city of Weatherford, overlooks the beautiful Little Deer Creek Valley. The campus buildings present an inspiring view which dominates the countryside from the low ridges in the East to the sloping hills in the West. In these modern, well-equipped buildings Southwestern students play, study, train, and worship together.

The Library, which houses 45,000 volumes, has comfortable reading rooms conducive to good study. The departments of education, mathematics, English, and history have their home in the Education Building.

The Administration Building includes the pharmacy department and the chief administrative offices. Standing on the white-pillared steps of the Science Building, you can see the two most popular structures on the campus: the new and impressive Memorial Student Center; and the Y-Chapel, home of the student-sponsored devotional services held three times a day. 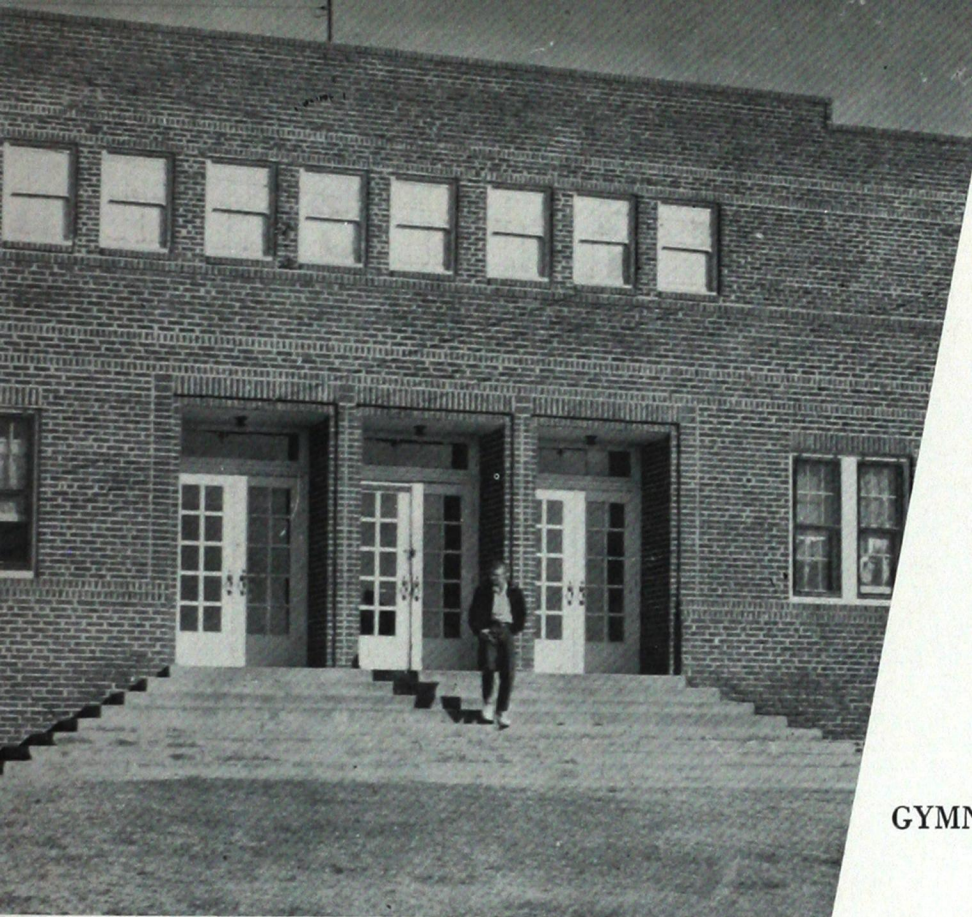


PRESIDENT'S HOME

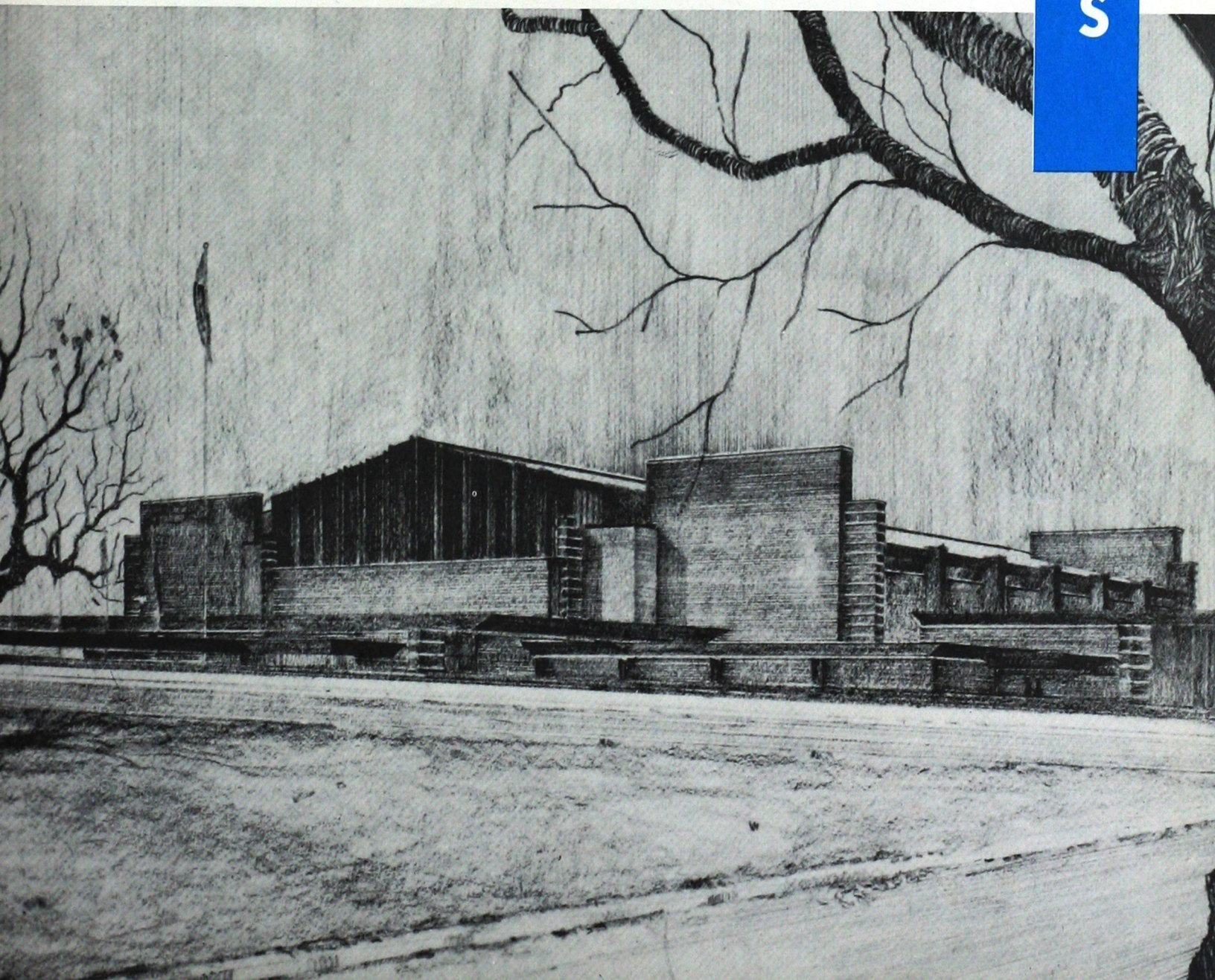

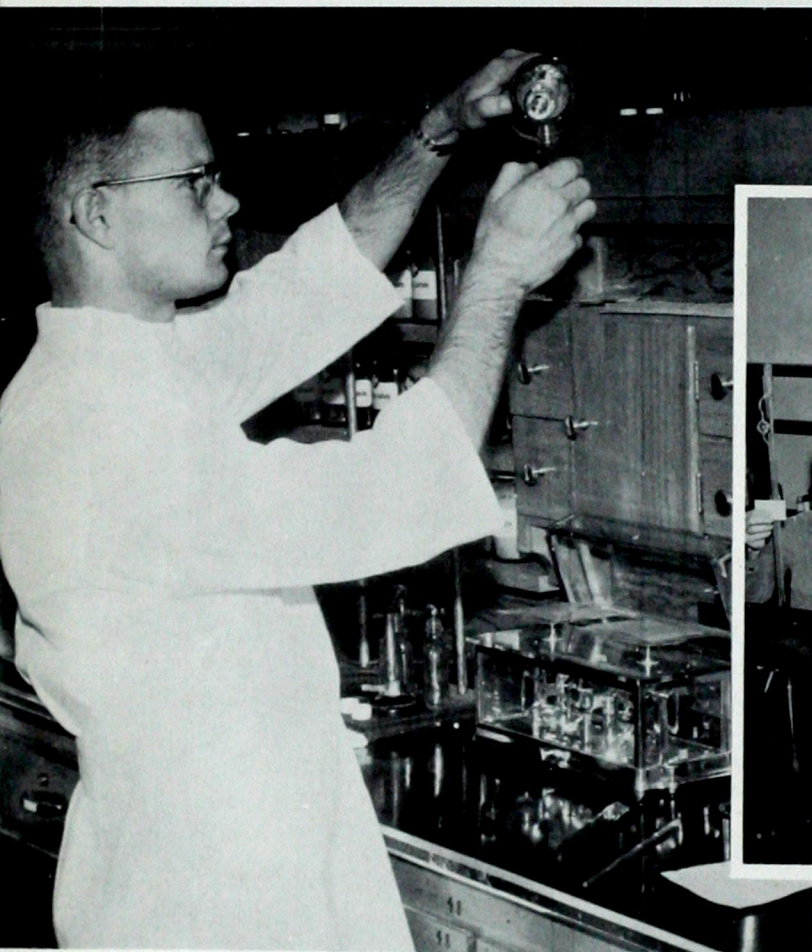

Personal and professional training by skilled chemists and teachers is one of the trademarks in the chemistry laboratories.

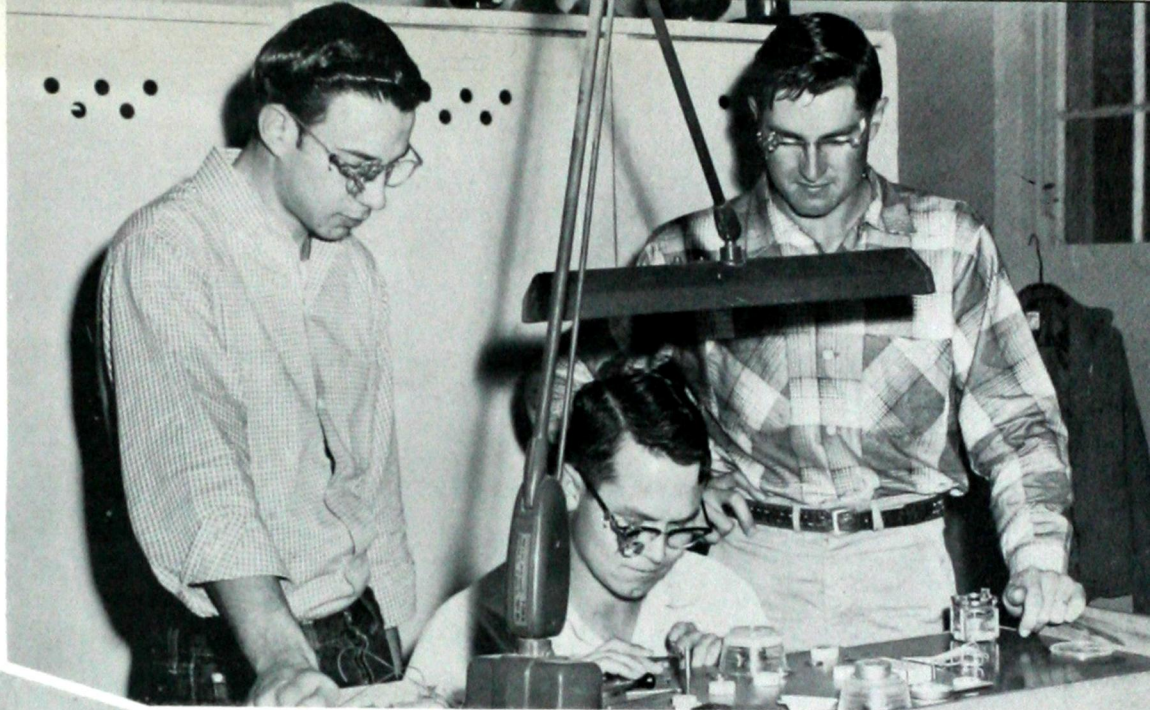

Student teachers confer with their supervisor on teaching problems.

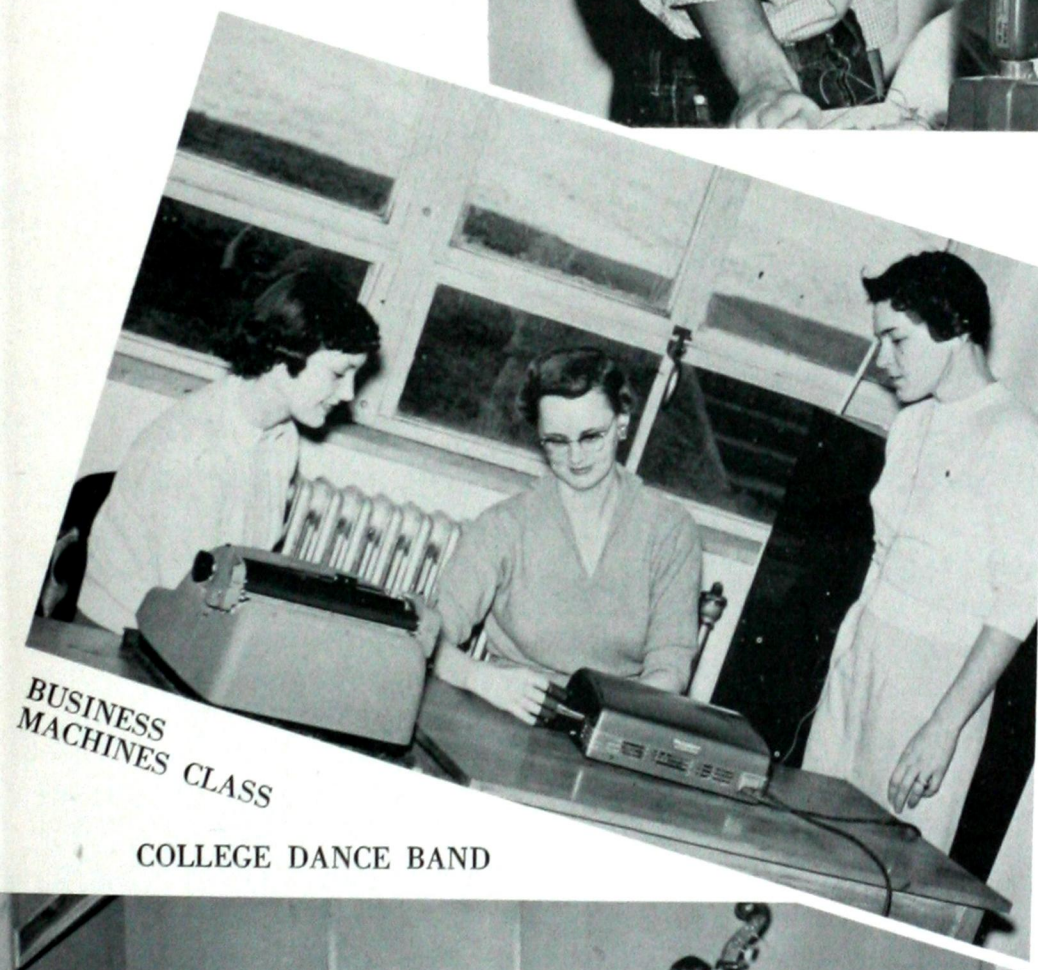

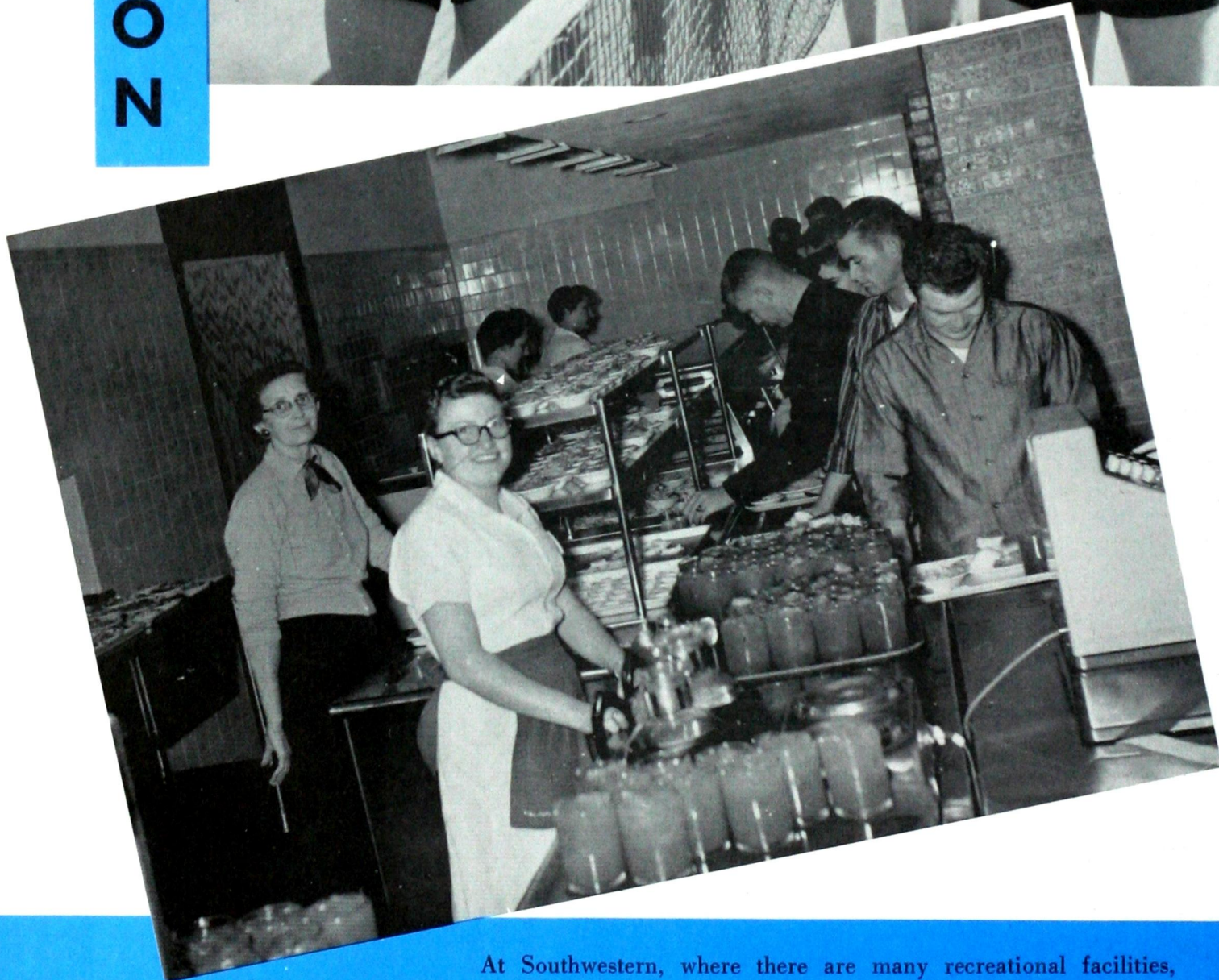

R E C R E A T I O N



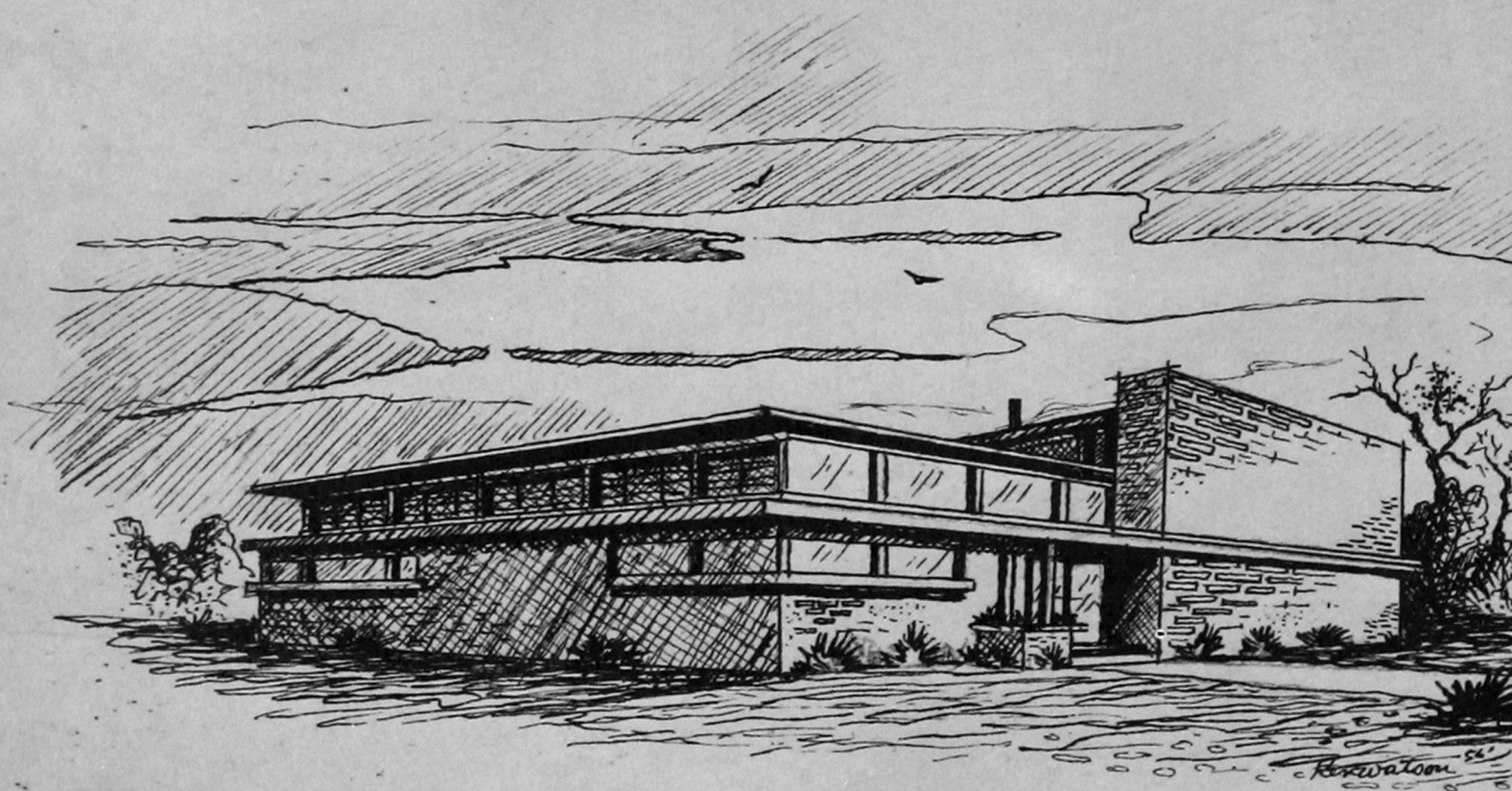

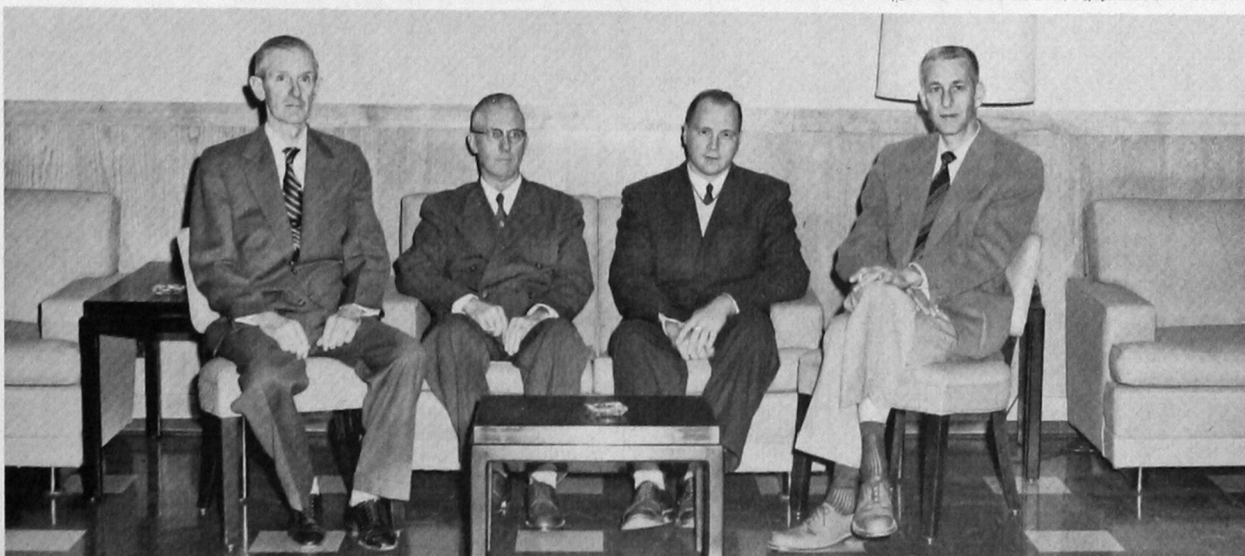
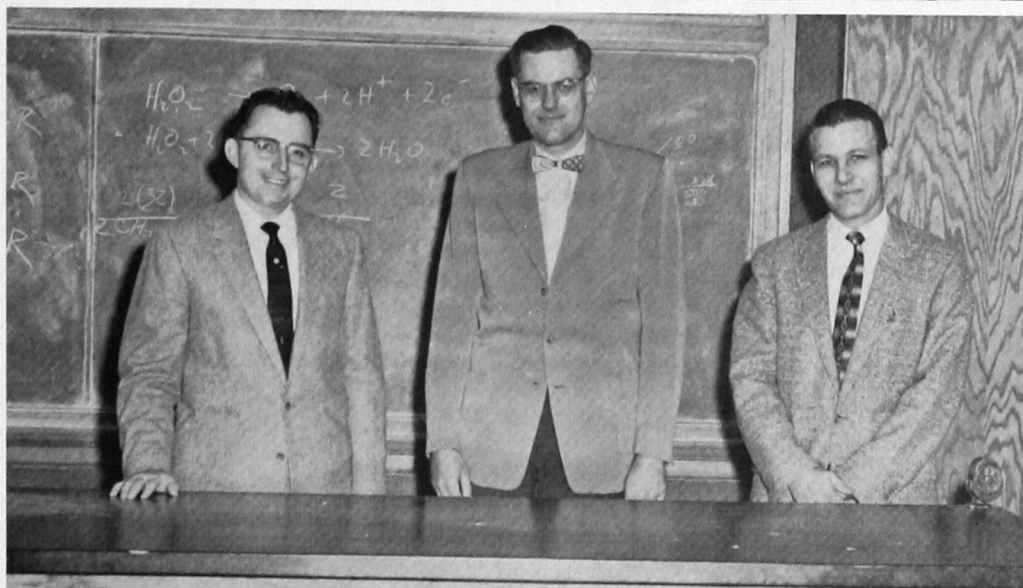

WORLD TRAVELER, GRACIOUS HOSTESS, VETERAN ENGLISH PROFESSOR, DR. GRACE JENCKE IS RETIRING FROM SWSC AFTER 36 YEARS OF TEACHING.

Coming to SWSC in the fall of 1921, Dr. Jencke served as head of department of English until 1949, when ill health forced her to resign as head of the department to become half-time teacher. Dr. Jencke came to SWSC with A.B. and A.M. degrees, graduate work in literature at Yale University, summer terms at University of Wisconsin, University of Missouri, and Oxford University, England.

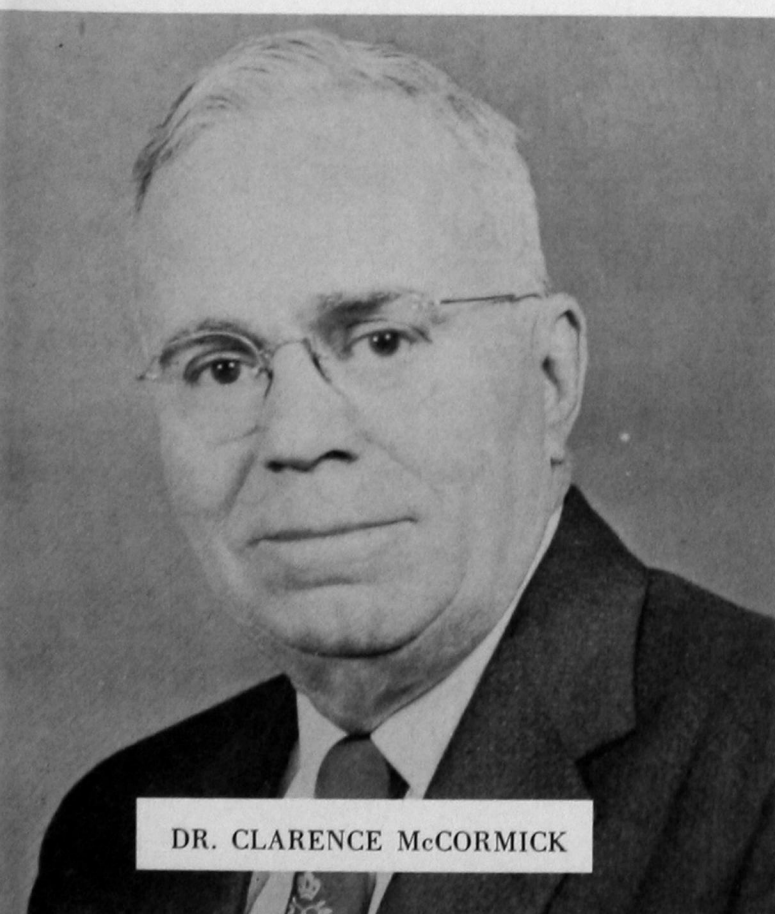
A charter member of the Oklahoma Council of English Teachers, she twice served as president. Besides representing the Oklahoma Council at the national meeting a number of times, she received the Oklahoma Council's first award for "long and faithful service" in 1955.

In addition to her work in her professional field of English, Dr. Jencke is a member of the P.E.O., Delta Kappa Gamma, American Association of University Women, and Kappa Kappa Iota.

MATH PROFESSOR HAS SERVED AS ACTING PRESIDENT, DEAN, HEAD OF MATH DEPARTMENT, YEARBOOK ADVISOR, YEARBOOK PHOTOGRAPHER, AND MATH TEACHER. RETIRING A VETERAN OF 39 YEARS.

Dr. Clarence McCormick started his career at SWSC in the fall of 1918 as professor of mathematics and head of the department. During that long tenure he has served as Dean of the College from 1951 to 1954. Two months during the summer term of July and August, 1935, Dr. McCormick was acting President of the College. Sponsoring the yearbook was his task in 1943 and 1944; and he served as Bulldog photographer from 1943 to 1948.

Membership in the Methodist Church at Weatherford dates from 1918, during which time he has been advisor of Wesley Foundation for twenty years, from 1932 to 1952, College Class teacher from 1918 to 1950; and director of the Wesley Players from 1938 to 1952. Dr. McCormick was a member of Weatherford Rotary Club from 1925 to 1954, and served as president in 1932.
