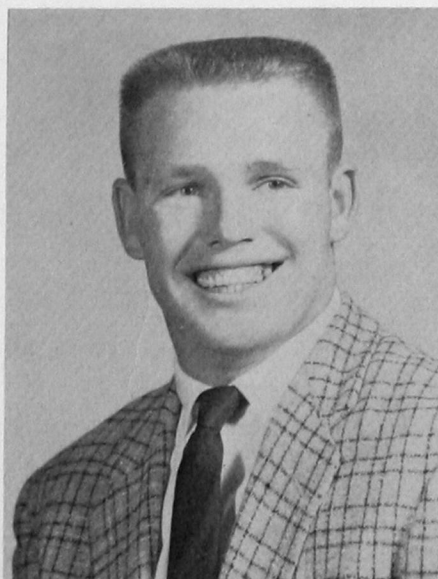
The second half kickoff rang the death knell for the Bulldogs when Tiger Cooper returning 96 yards to ice the game with a 27-0 lead.

Bearkats Defeat Bulldogs, 31-6

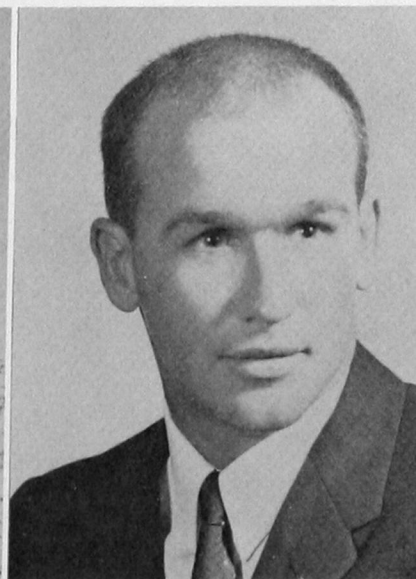

His feat was the lone bright spot for the Bulldogs, who got their hands on the ball only four times during the first half.



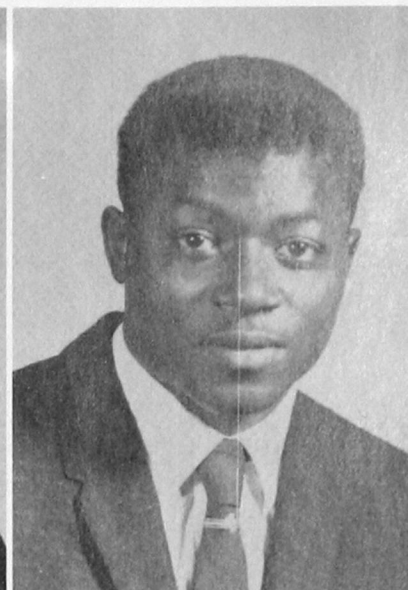

Bulldogs Thrill Old Grads, 20-19

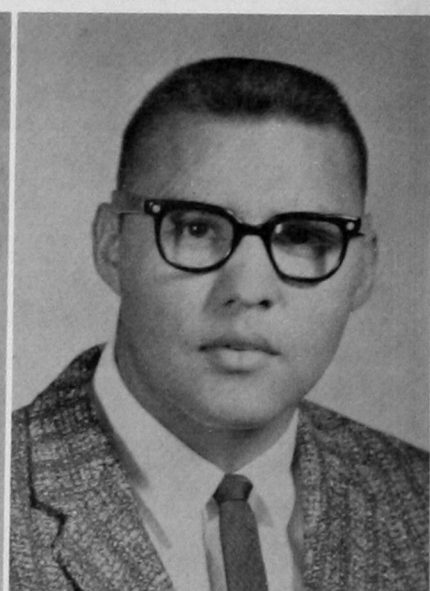

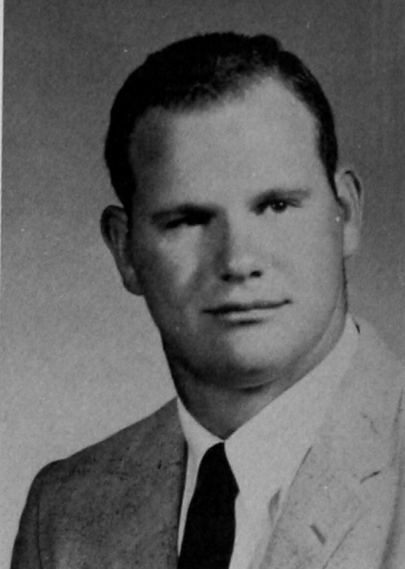
Hardnosed football was the order of business most of the time as the Bulldog-Aggie rivalry measured up to past performances.

The victory margin came in the fourth quarter, when Chuck Barnes' extra point after touchdown placement was smothered to leave the Bulldogs behind, 6-7.

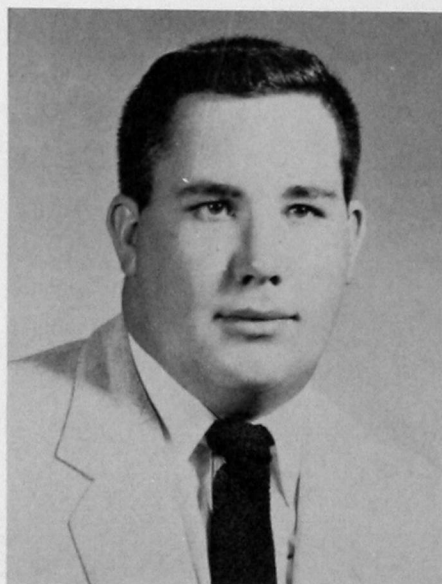

Lions Win From Bulldogs, 38-7

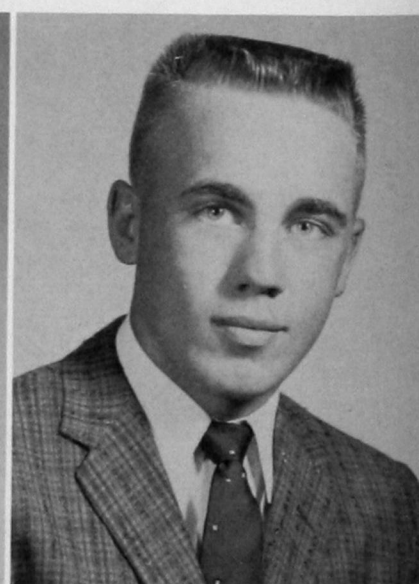

The only other bright offensive moments in a bad night for the Bulldogs was the fancy dan open field running of Mark White and the hard-charging burst of fullback Bill Cole.

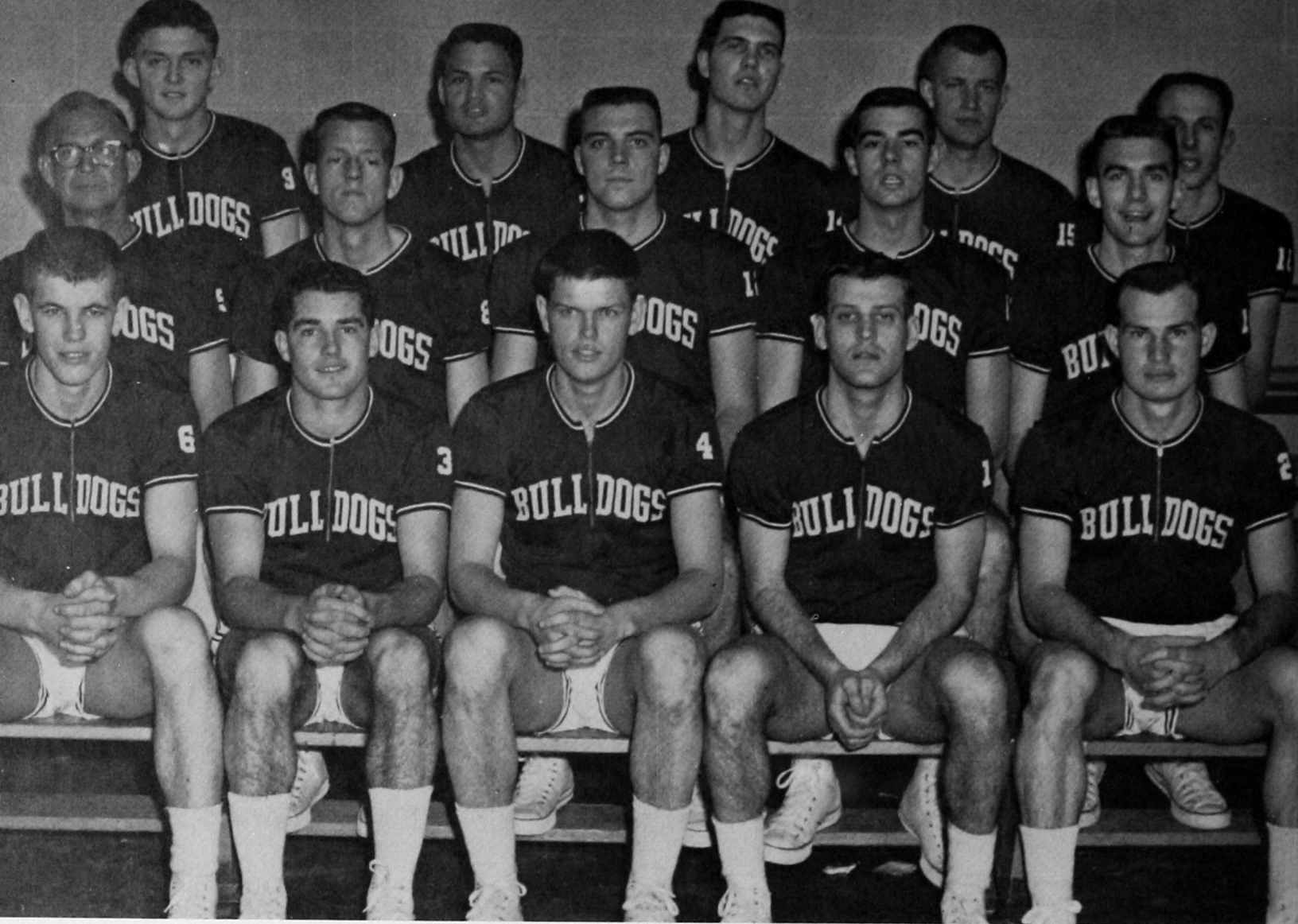

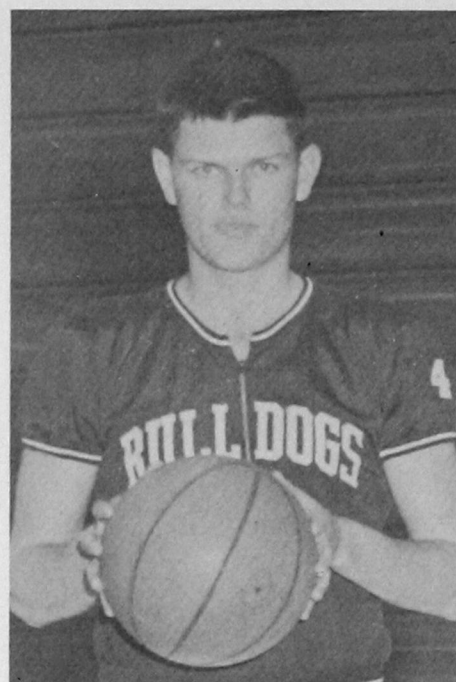
Fast-breaking Mike Riley moves in to sink a short jump-shot to help Southwestern rout the Phillips Haymakers.



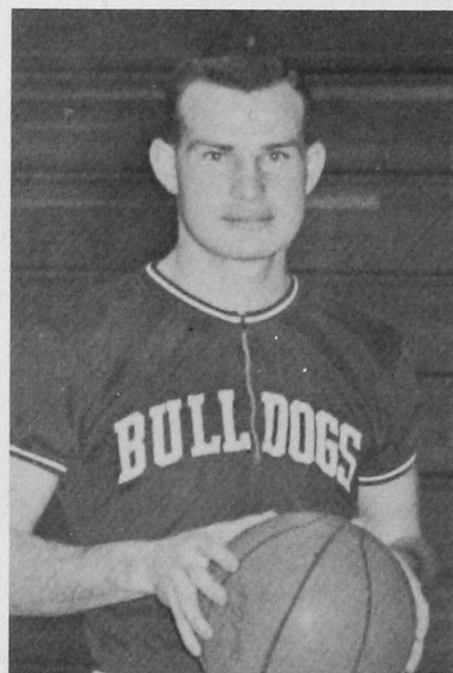

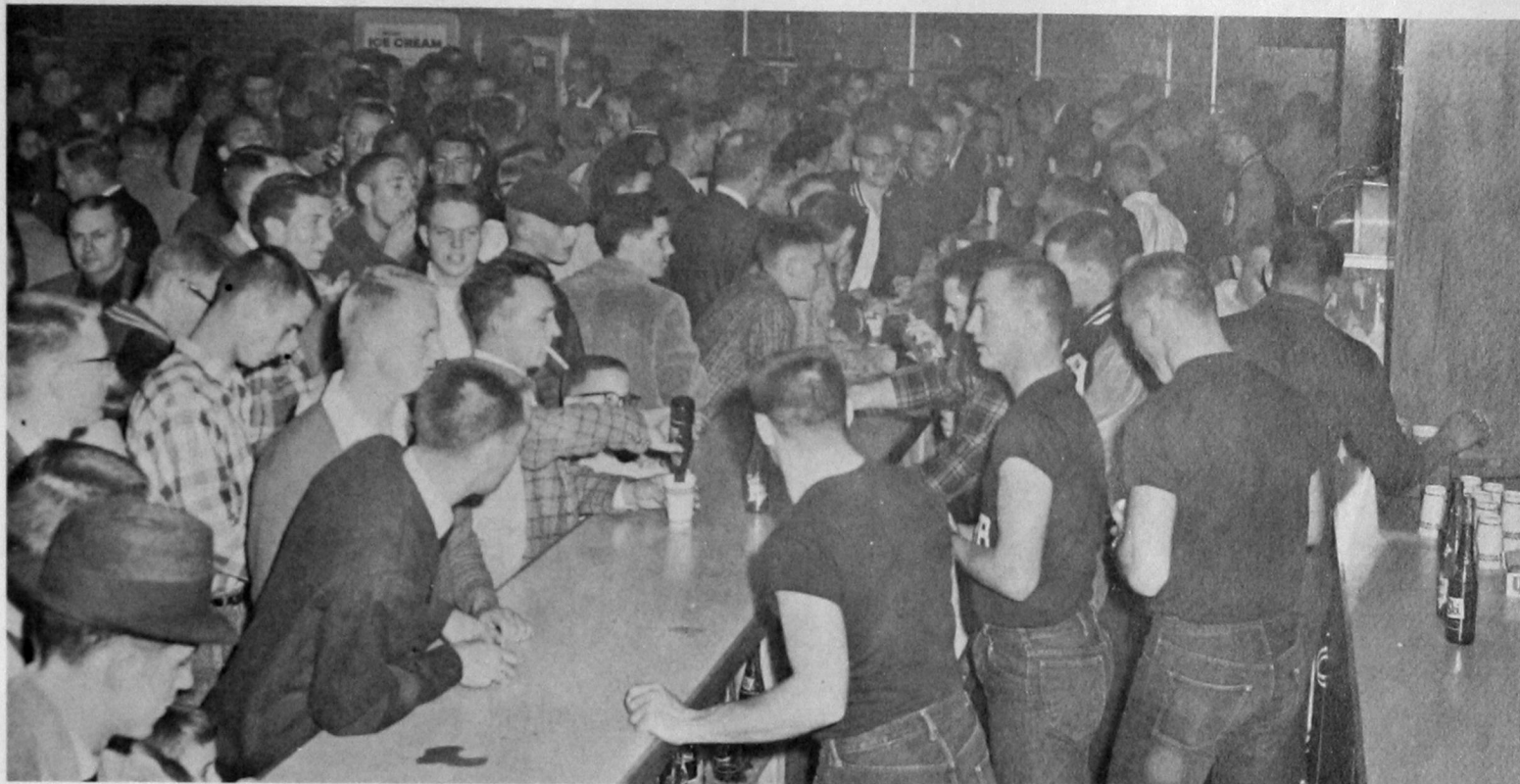


The Big Game

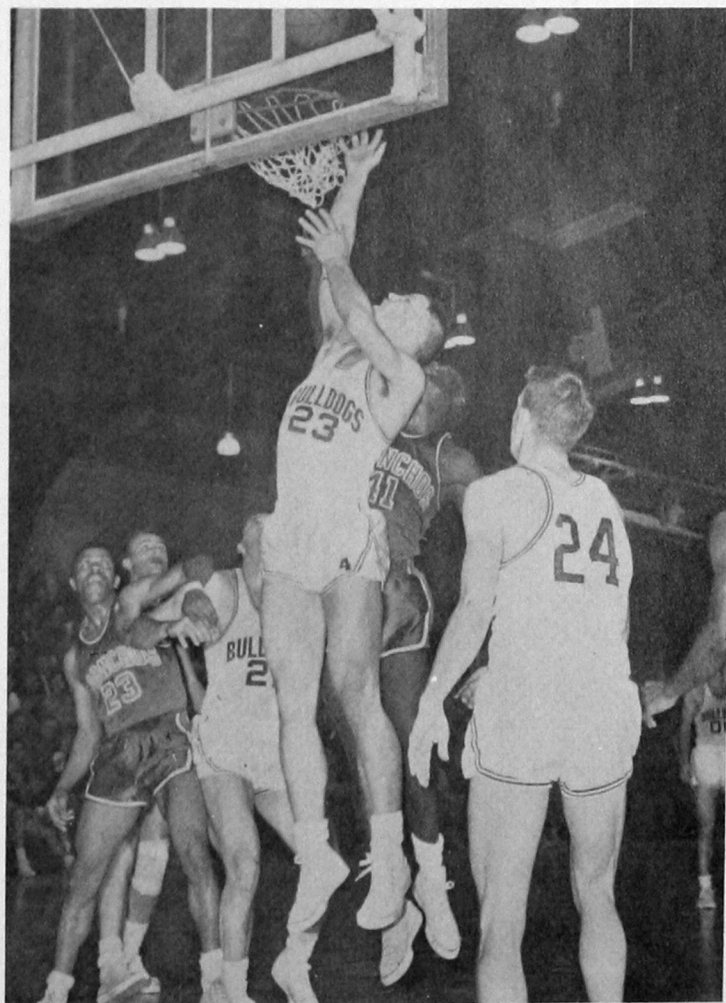

Lyle Dobbins is literally swept off his feet by his teammates following Southwestern's stunning upset over Central.



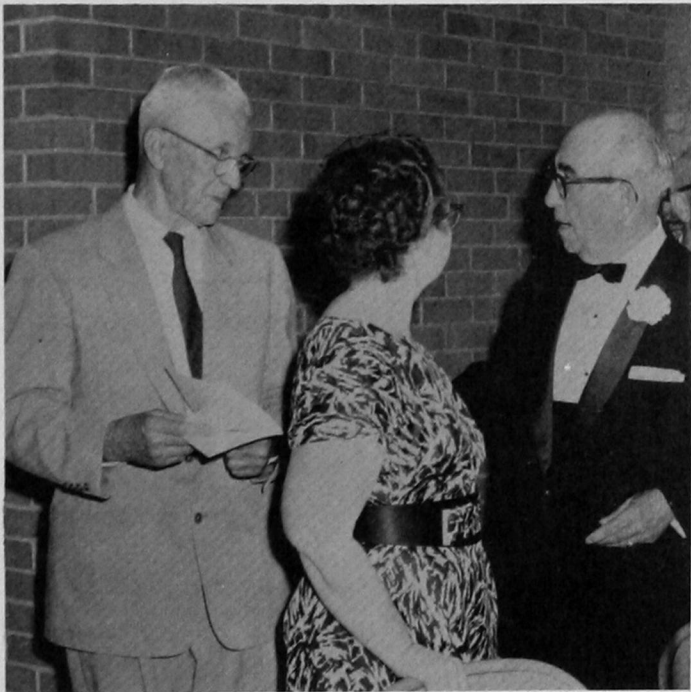

A PRESIDENT RETIRES

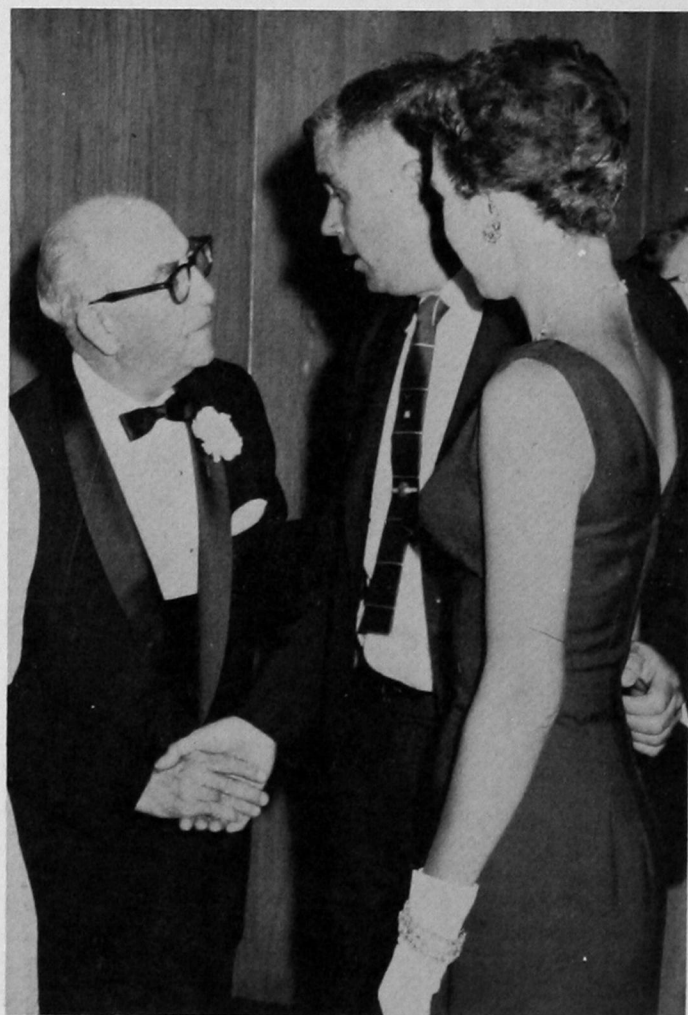
On the night of May 27, Southwestern State College faculty, Weatherford townspeople, and educators and friends from all sections of the state paid tribute to President and Mrs. R. H. Burton, on the eve of the president's retirement July 1. The occasion was an appreciation banquet in the Memorial Student Center.

Cedric L. Crink, of the language arts division, was master of ceremonies. Other faculty members presented a panorama of the 15 years President Burton had headed the college since he assumed his duties in 1945.

Mrs. Millie Thomas, Everett Gartrell, Dr. Gladys Bellamy, Dr. Louis Morris, Dr. Kirk E. Naylor and Dean W. D. Strother reviewed a great period in the development of Southwestern State College from an enrollment of 330 students in 1945 to 1823 in 1959; an increased annual budget of \$165,000 in 1945 to almost \$1 million in 1960; the construction of almost \$2 millions in buildings, including the Memorial Student Center, the Health and Physical Education building and the Education Building.

The President was acclaimed as a guiding force in college accreditation in every field, including the master's degree, most recent achievement.

Judy 1 President and Mrs. Burton moved to a new home in Oklahoma City after 15 great years at Southwestern. They left an institution on the threshold of even greater opportunity for growth and development.

A COACH IS HONORED

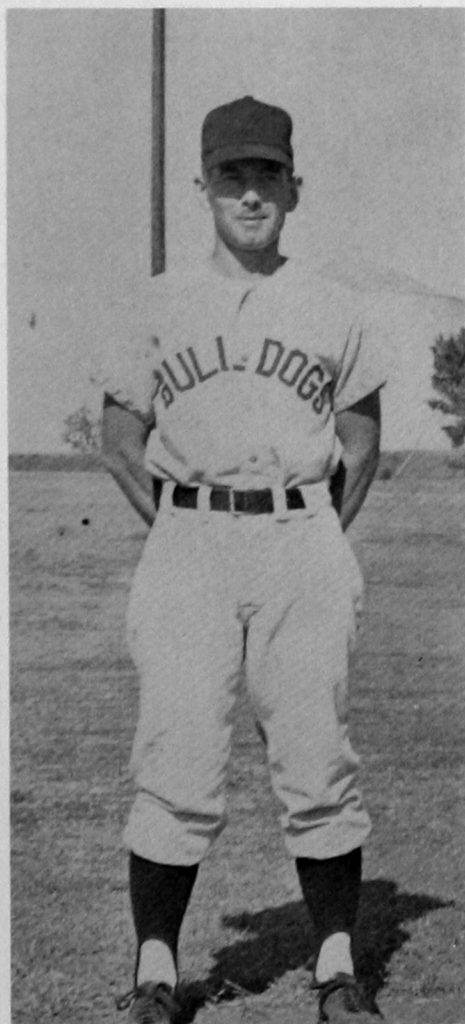

He was recognized at a special banquet attended by the nation's coaches and other leaders in intercollegiate athletics.

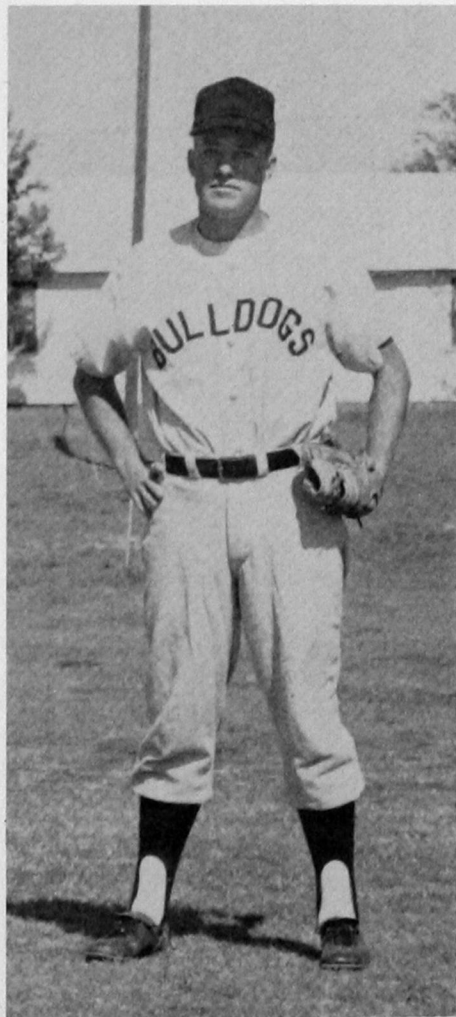

Southwestern State College points with pride to a great coach and a gentleman—Rankin Williams.

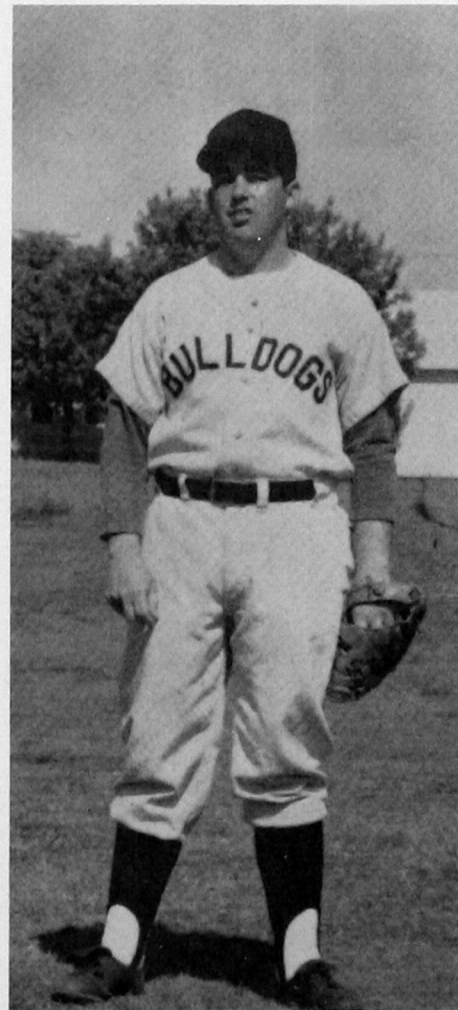

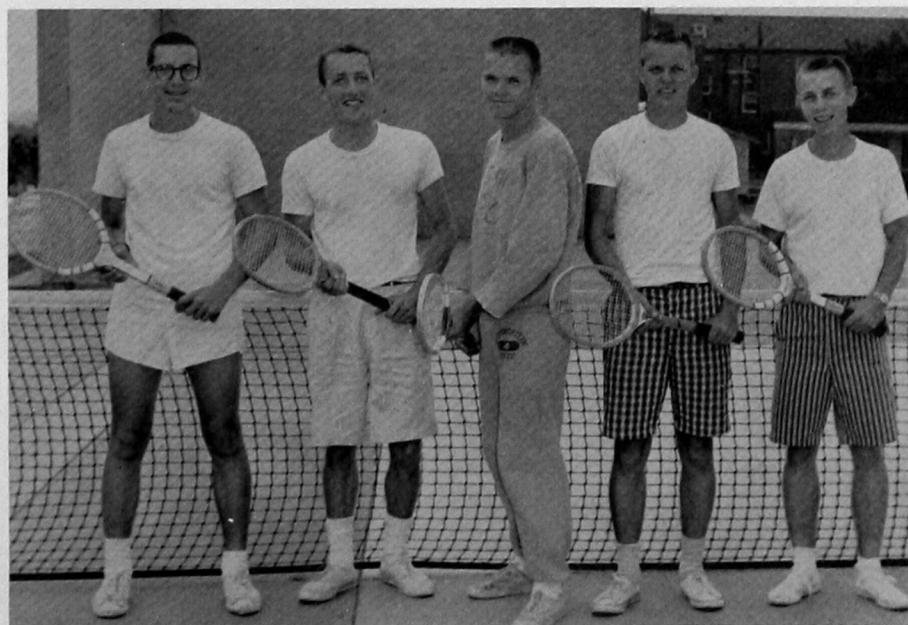

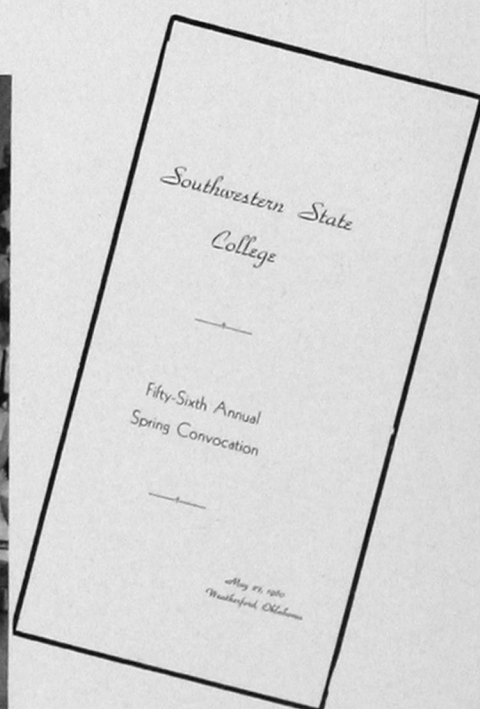
