Focus on SWOSU Faculty



CETL is spotlighting faculty members in a series of articles called “Focus on SWOSU Faculty.” These faculty have been selected as doing inspiring active learning methods in their courses and have agreed to share some of their activities with the SWOSU community. One SWOSU faculty member will be spotlighted per month who is using transformative and other exciting active learning methods in their teaching which advance student learning at SWOSU. This month, CETL is spotlighting Dr. Patrick Julian, Department of Art, Communication, and Theatre.



Dr. Patrick Julian is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Art, Communication and Theatre and Director at the Hilltop Theatre. He was born and raised in Concord, Michigan, the youngest child of a factory worker and a librarian. Local

color was provided by Ted Nugent, who lived two miles away, and whose amplifiers could occasionally be heard ringing across the cornfields on late summer nights. Always interested in performance and composition, Patrick earned a B.S. in Theatre Performance from Northern Michigan University, and a M.A. and Ph.D. in Theater History and Literature from Bowling Green State University. His professional career includes three years spent teaching at Eastern New Mexico University, sixteen years as a writer, actor, and director in Los Angeles (highlights include hugging Drew Barrymore and RuPaul (not at the same time)). Patrick recently completed five years teaching Performance and History in the theatre department at Central Michigan University before arriving at SWOSU in 2021, with his wife Laura, who is an adjunct professor and collaborative pianist in the Department of Music. Explains Dr. Julian:

“As a teacher, I aim to perpetuate knowledge and inspire learning. More specifically, as a theatre historian, I introduce students to a canon of dramatic works and ask them to articulate their reactions, not only presenting a repertoire but also teaching independent critical listening and thinking. To this end, I seek a balance in my courses between lecturing to students and asking them to make discoveries. I encourage students to engage with the topic, with me, and with each other in the belief that good teaching depends upon intellectual exchange.”

Dr. Patrick Julian goes on to elaborate that his approach to student assessment reflects his two goals. First, the student is expected to master a body of knowledge by demonstrating on exams a familiarity with those dramatists, plays, terms, and concepts studied in the course. Second, students are given the opportunity to reflect upon the material at greater leisure in written assignments that emphasize the skills of critical thinking and listening acquired during the semester. Dr. Julian goes on to point out that while his standards are high, he helps the students to meet expectations by providing office hours, review sessions, and the chance to submit draft papers and revisions.

Dr. Julian believes in a flexible manner of instruction, responsive to the unique atmosphere of a given class. In conducting either a large lecture or small seminar, he is aware of students’ different experiences and temperaments in hopes of capitalizing their strengths while developing their weaknesses. Contends Dr. Julian:

“Every student, regardless of background, can improve his or her ability to listen to and understand a piece of literature.”

In lectures, discussions, and assignments, Dr. Julian endeavors to show that literature responds to various modes of inquiry: Analytical, hermeneutic, cultural, and historical; thus, students are equipped to explore the possibilities of each perspective and emboldened to push beyond their own experience to expand their skills. In the end, if he enriches a student’s ability to think about, discuss, and interpret literature with a new awareness of its aesthetic and humanistic significance, Dr. Julian believes that he has done his job.

Preparing Teachers and Students for Online Teaching

According to Davison (2008), both teachers and students are recommended to acquire adequate technical skills before they enter the online environment. In fact, Coyner and McCann (2009) observed that to prepare students who are unfamiliar with the technology, teachers may find themselves at times spending more time in technological training than teaching the content material of the course.

As Davison (2008) contended, one aspect that online teachers may also struggle with is lack of technical support and/or resources to design appropriate materials and teach an online course. This, in essence, means that when technical issues arise, it normally takes assistance from instructional designers and technologists to allay course-impeding tech issues.

Naturally, numerous tech issues emanate from the whole process of teaching online from both sides of the rail, faculty, and student sides. When these issues arise, they require the assistance of designated instructional designers to resolve such issues and maintain quality teaching and learning. But then while help is always available when issues arise, it is always advisable for faculty members and students to have basic technical skills to comfortably delve the online teaching and learning environment.

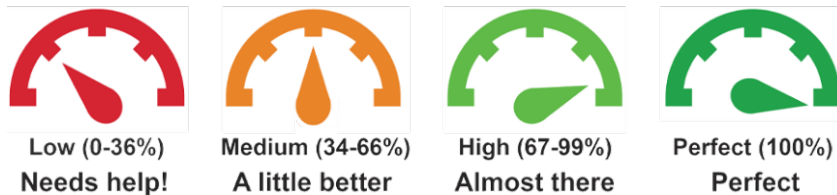

Blackboard Ally

Beginning this Fall Semester, you may have noticed some small dashboard icons next to some of your files in Canvas. These are actually Ally Accessibility icons.


What is Ally? Ally is a tool that can help faculty check and improve the accessibility of their course documents. The tool integrates into your course shell in Canvas to assess the accessibility of your course documents and provides feedback and instructions to help make your documents more accessible for all. Simply stated, 'accessible content is better content'.

Accessibility Indicators



When you log in to Canvas, you will find the Ally accessibility indicators next to your files.

Simply click the indicator to read detailed feedback about what the accessibility issues are with the file, why they matter, and how to fix them. If you choose, you can follow along step-by-step to improve your original file. These accessibility scores are only visible to you and are not visible to students, so no need to worry! CETL will be offering workshops and trainings throughout the Fall and will be available anytime to answer questions or provide assistance.

Lessons Learned

The first two days of the Fall 2022 semester was interesting to say the least. SSO being down and staying down for a while (due to an issue with the company behind our SSO) is a situation we wish to never experience again. One way to help respond to these situations, is to have a backup plan in place.

One part of your back-up plan is to have the Canvas mobile app installed and active on your mobile device. While the mobile version of Canvas cannot be used to complete all Canvas tasks (such as taking quizzes), it can be used to complete many tasks such as submitting assignments and participating in discussions. Canvas has created trainings on how to download and use the apps. You can access these trainings below:

Please keep in mind that the Canvas mobile app must be actively used within 48 hours for the user to stay logged in. If the app becomes inactive, the user will have to log in again. During the SSO outage, users who had not accessed the Canvas app regularly could not use it due to the need to log in to SSO.

The second part of the back-up plan is to have electronic copies of documents such as course syllabus, course schedule (both uploaded to Canvas), and a course roster (from Self-Service) readily available. Instructors are urged to be mindful of version control, and make sure to save the most current version of the document being used. Along with saving electronic files, another idea is to take a picture of the Modules or Assignments sections in Canvas, (both if you use each) and save it to a Word document where it can be easily accessed. This step can assist you with what to expect with course flow, and upcoming assignments.
