The Hill

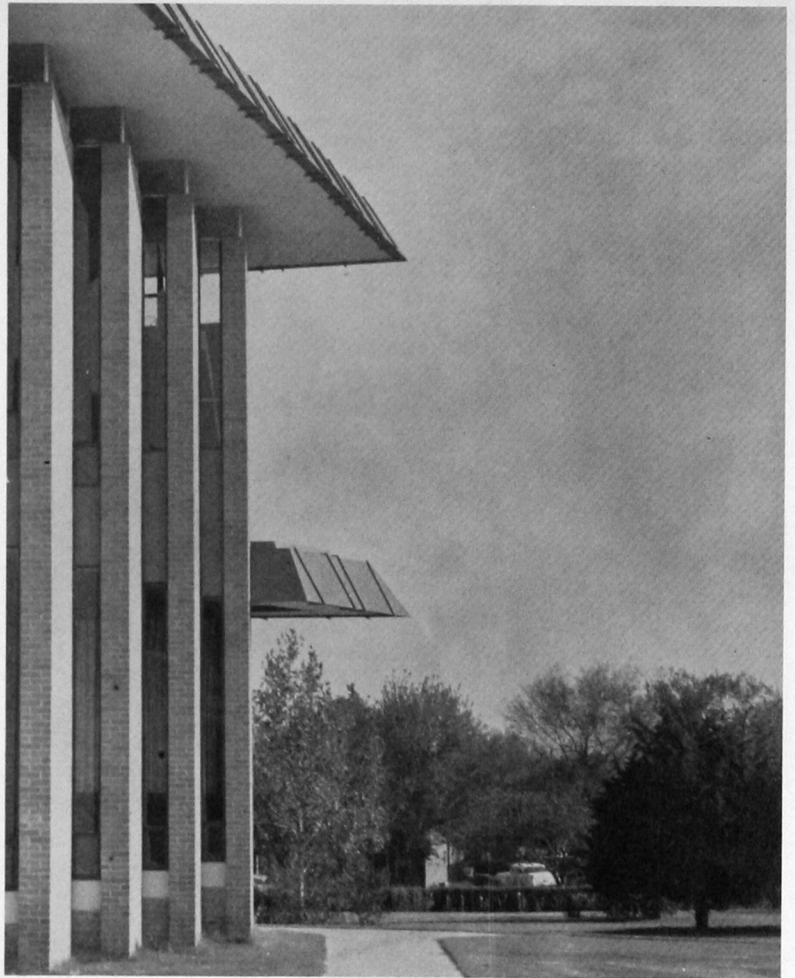
This is The Hill. This is Southwestern State College, known to three generations over six decades.

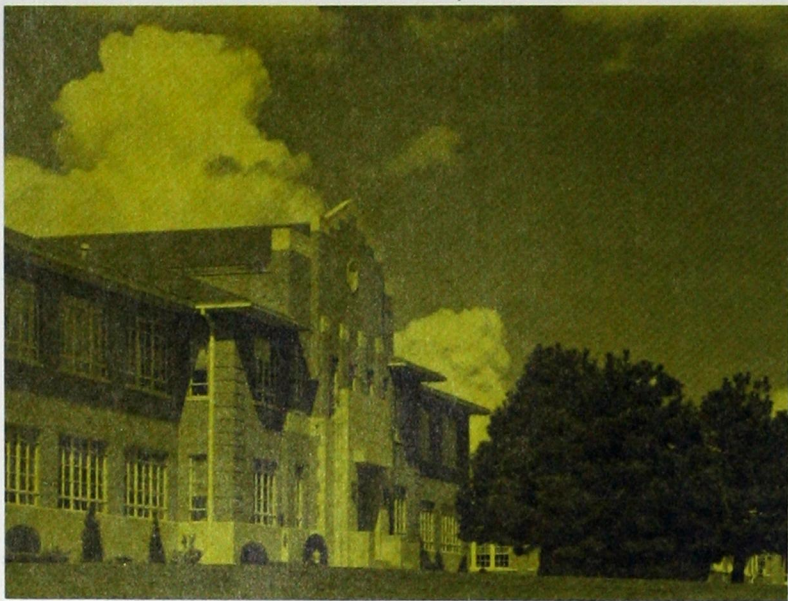

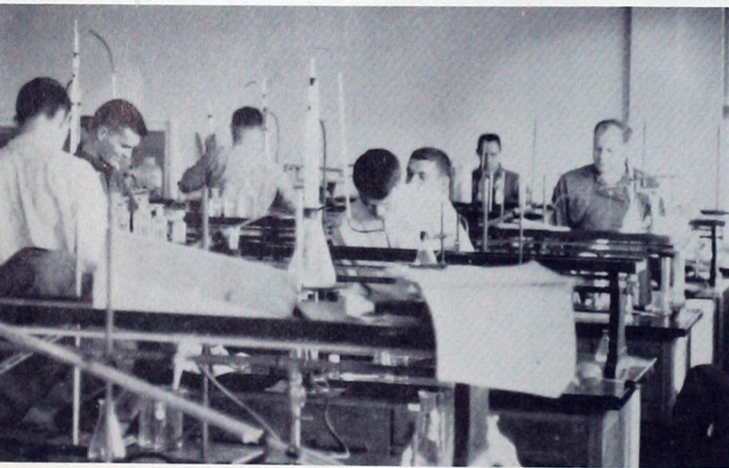

Science for Tomorrow

In the classrooms and laboratories at Southwestern State College, most of them located in the Science Hall and Administration building, science students are having their impact on the college image.

More and more each year, Southwestern graduates are becoming more in demand as chemists, physicists, mathematicians and biologists in industry and research as well as in the public schools as teachers.

In increasing numbers graduates are accepting grants, fellowships and teaching assistantships to do advanced study toward higher degrees in universities over the nation.

The School of Pharmacy has earned an enviable reputation among the schools of that type in the nation; a reputation based on successful graduates in retail pharmacy, hospital pharmacy, drug salesmanship, and pharmaceutical manufacturing.

In the medical sciences, Southwestern is represented well with graduates in medical schools, and dental schools, in hospital medical technicians and in nursing schools.

Science graduates are becoming more numerous in government employment of highly technical nature, such as the NASA and guided missile bases.

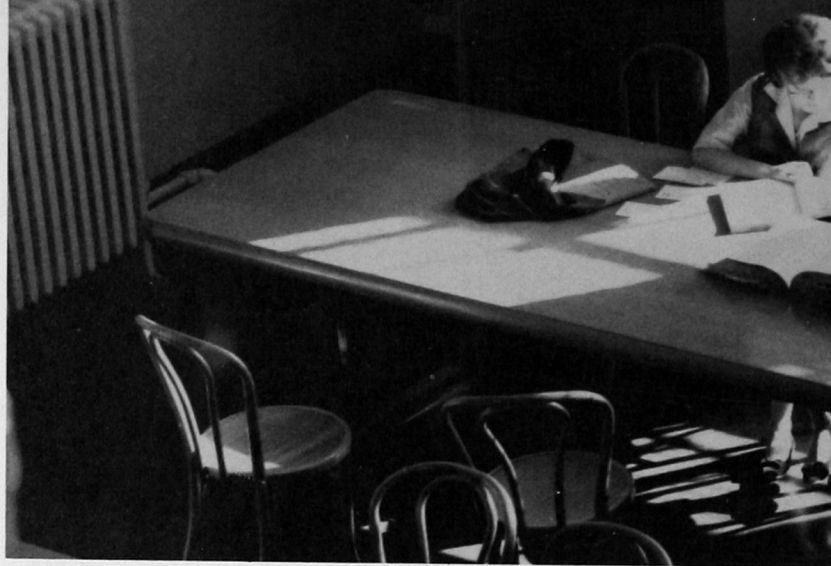

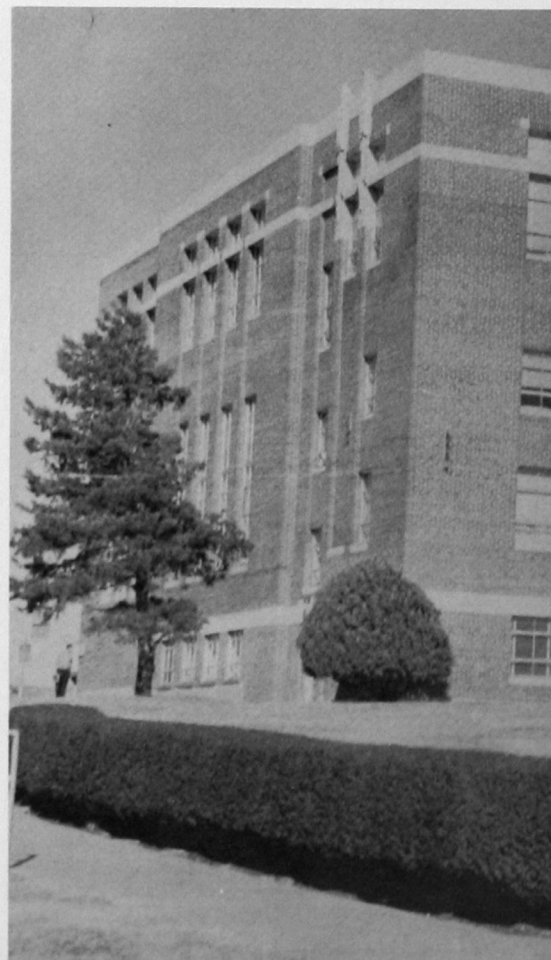

Southwestern's \$750,000 student center is more than the show place of western Oklahoma with its ultra-modern architecture. It is the symbol of college campus life at its best.

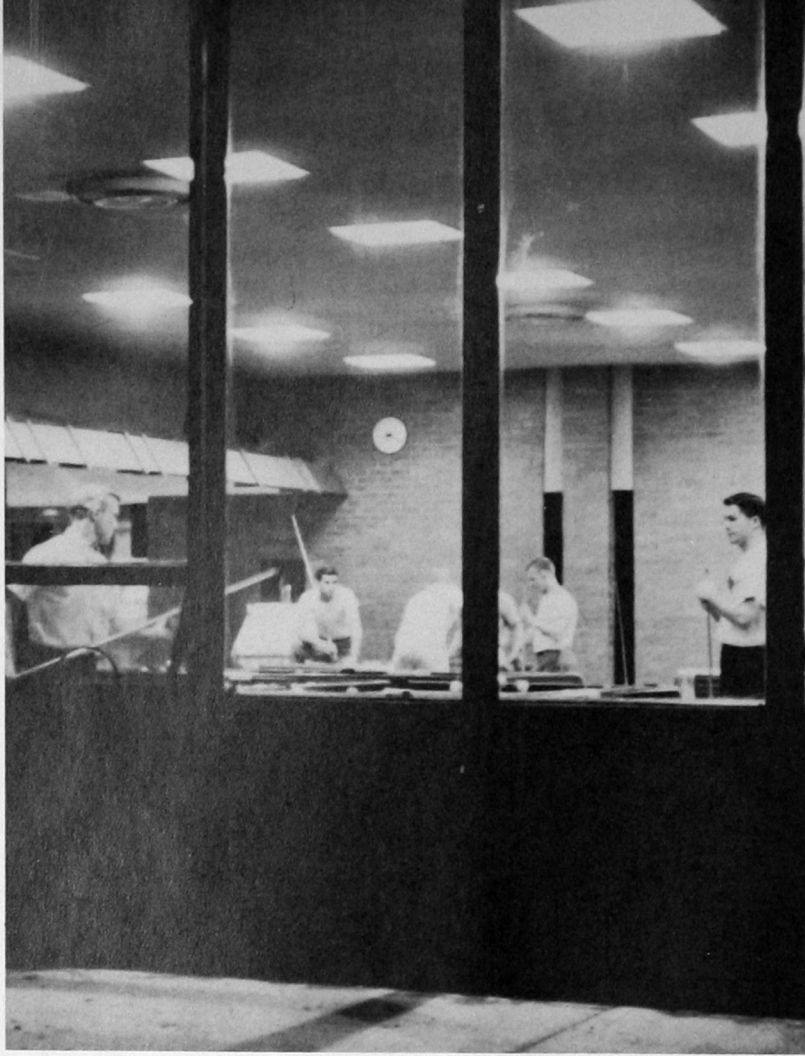
Here the student relaxes in the snack bar between classes, attends the many casual and formal dances, relaxes with recreational facilities or watches television.

The Challenge — — The Answer

With an exploding college population taxing the resources of Southwestern's campus, more than two millions have been spent within a few months to take care of the great influx of students.

A new science building will house the School of Pharmacy, the Chemistry Department and the Physics Department. The modern structure will have air-conditioned laboratories and the most recent of scientific equipment.

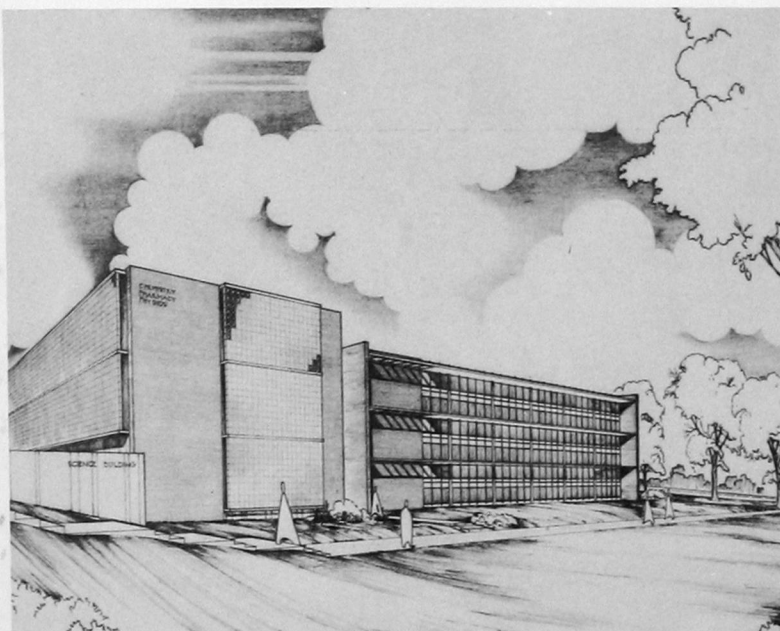
A total of \$400,000 has been spent in a complete remodeling job on the old science building, which will retain, in modernized quarters, the fast-expanding Biology Department.

The student center has been increased by 1200 square feet.

Additional rooms in three wings on two dormitories have been erected at a cost of almost one million dollars.

Architect's drawing of the new Science Building now under construction



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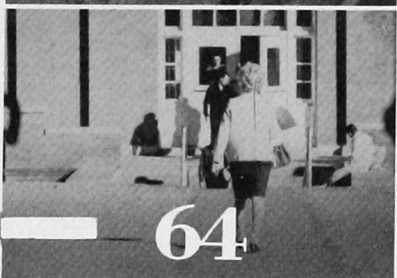

Homecoming

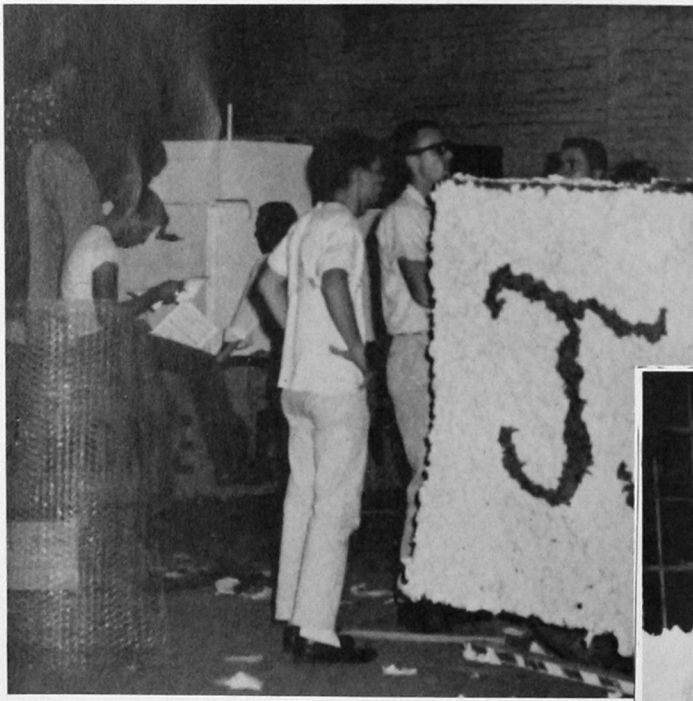

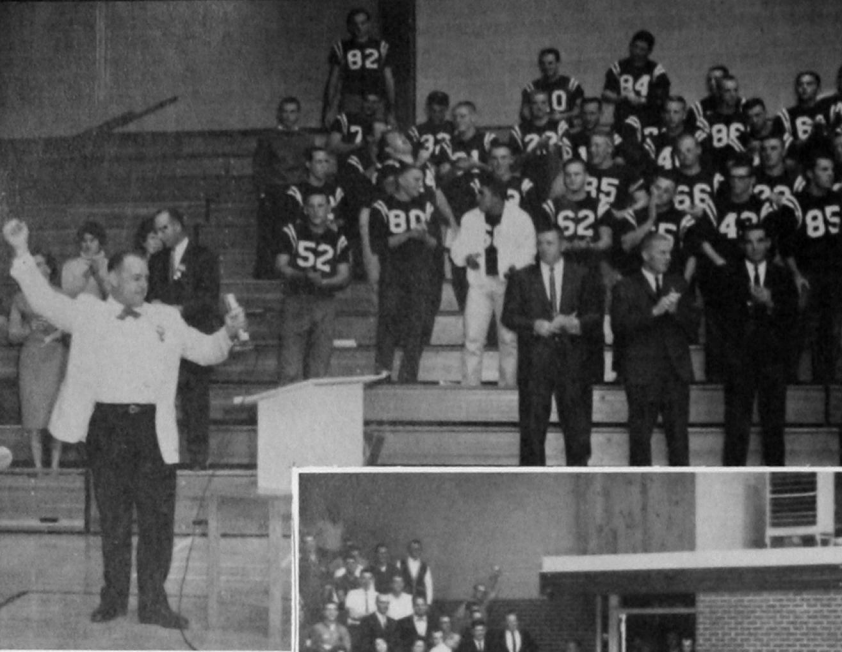

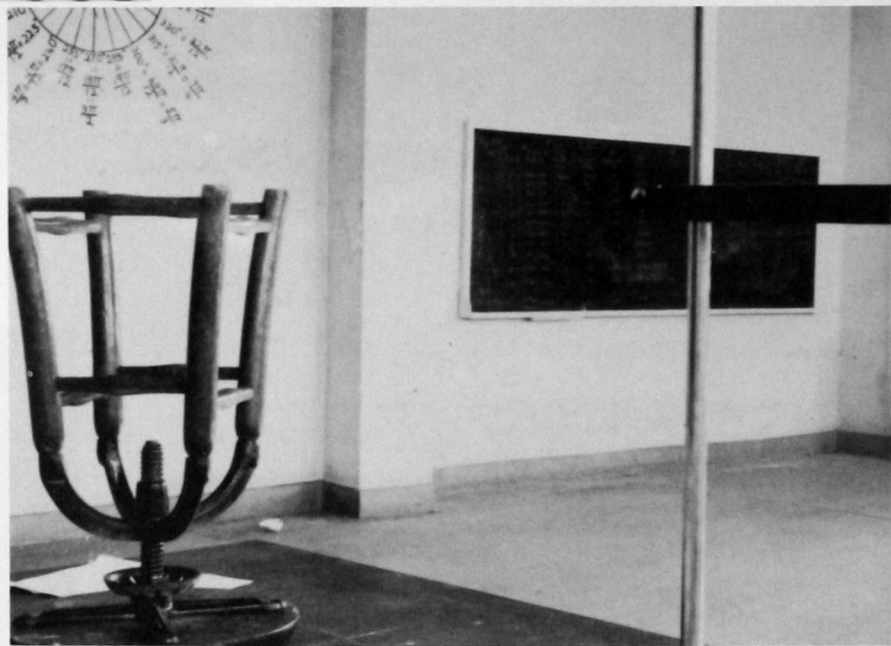

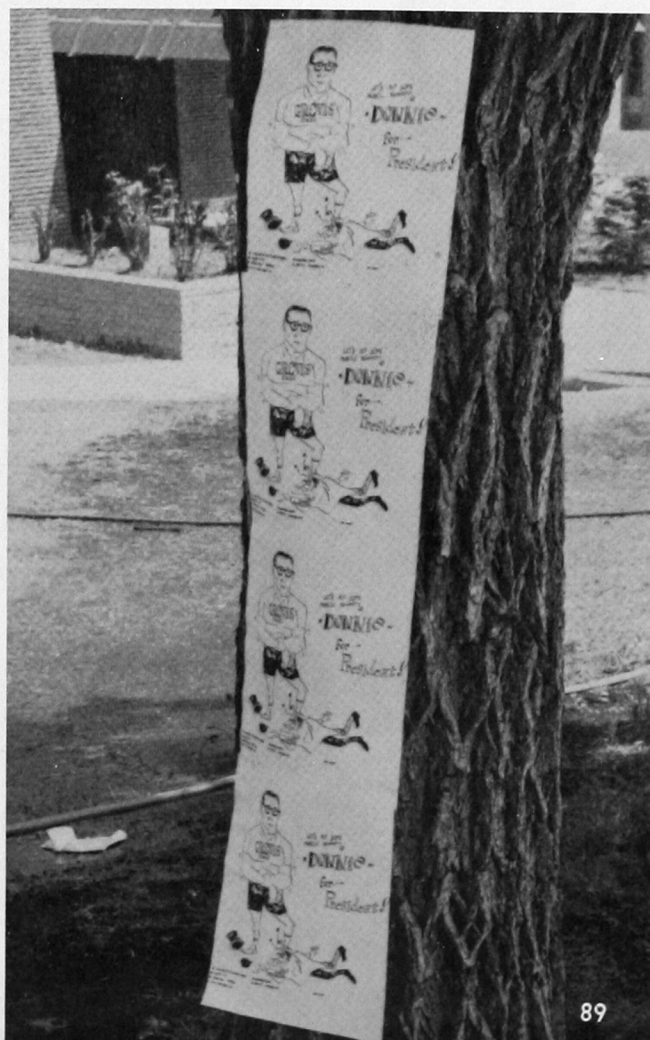
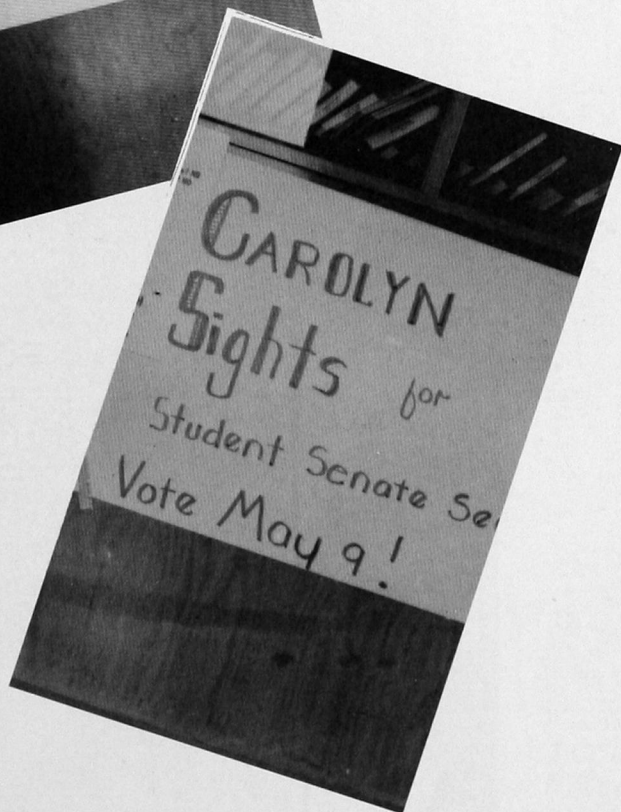
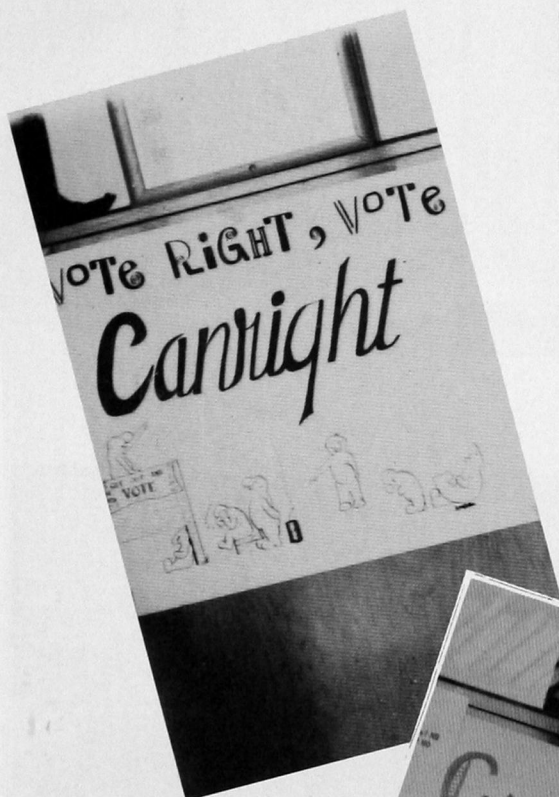


Student Senate Election

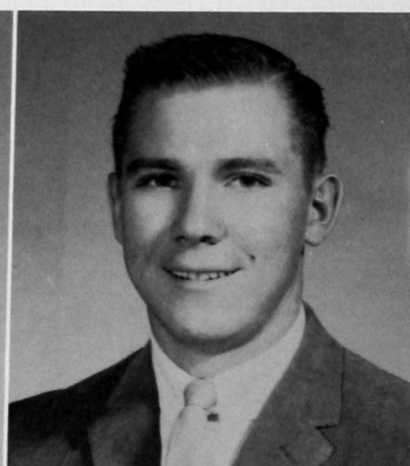
This Was Spectacular

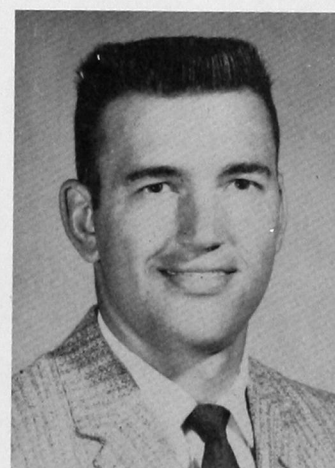
Rangers Are Upset

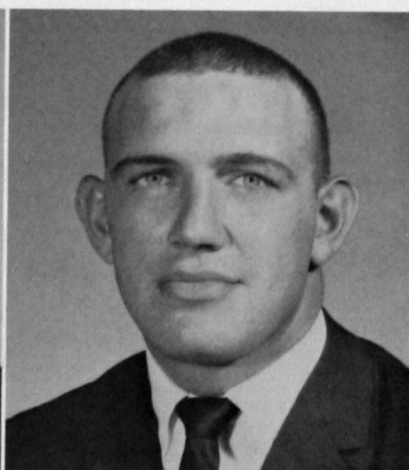
A Thriller for the Old Grads

The recovered fumble on Southwestern's 12 set the stage for a pass from Langston's Donald Lee Smith that wiped out a 20-19 Bulldog lead.

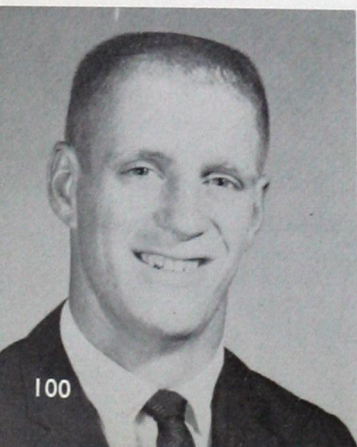
The renowned Langston quarterback had had a bad night up to that point as Southwestern's hard-charging forwards practically chased him out of the stadium.

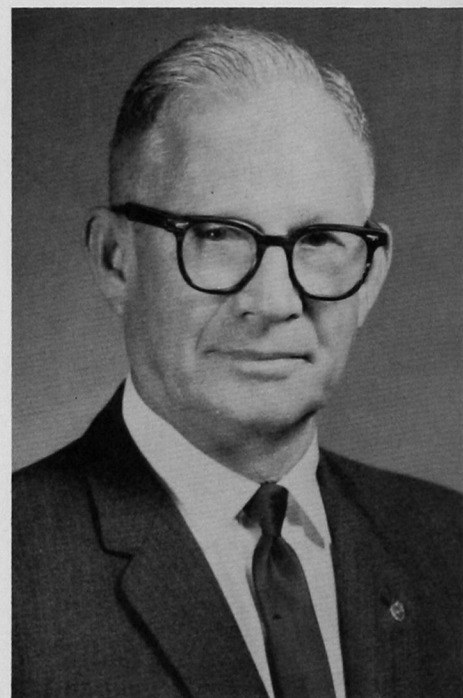
Echoes of the 1962 Season

Southwestern's Bulldogs played 25 games, winning eight and losing 17. Their conference record was six won and 12 lost, placing them near the top of the second division.

This was a marked improvement over the 1961 season, with a number of first-year men developing into promising varsity players of the next two or three years. The Bulldogs also had a colorful scoring combination in Dean Ingram, uncanny deep court jump shot artist, and driving Gary Abercrombie. Both placed with the top 10 individual scorers of the Collegiate Conference.

Ingram was voted by conference coaches to the all-star first team, getting the highest number of votes given any player selected.

A few of the season's highlights: One of the thrillers was a 74-69 Bulldog victory over Phillips in an overtime. Southwestern hit nine of 11 free throws in the extra period to win . . . Ingram coolly dropped in both of two free throw opportunities with only two seconds left to edge Northwestern, 82-81 . . . and Elwood Pryor scored the points to put the Bulldogs ahead to stay as they shaded Northeastern, 73-71 . . . The wildest game of all was a 59-75 loss here to Southeastern. The Bulldogs outscored the Savages, 19-15 from the field, but were penalized by weird officiating 40 times, the conference champions earning 45 points at the free throw line . . . Ralph Johnson's field goal in the last 15 seconds was the key score as Southwestern ripped Eastern New Mexico University, 59-56.



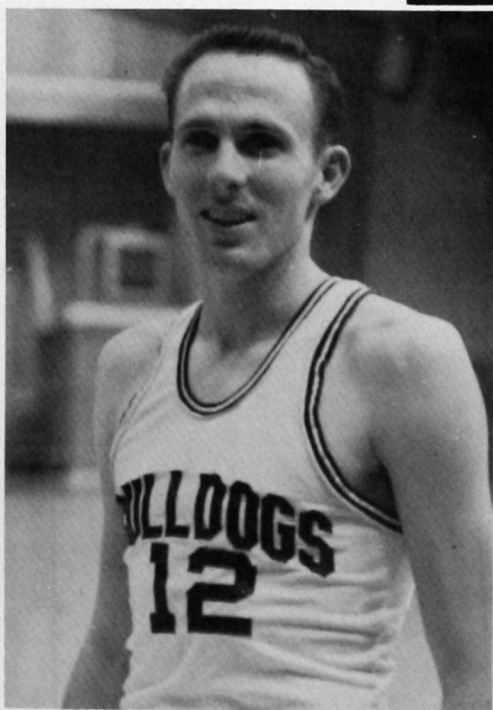
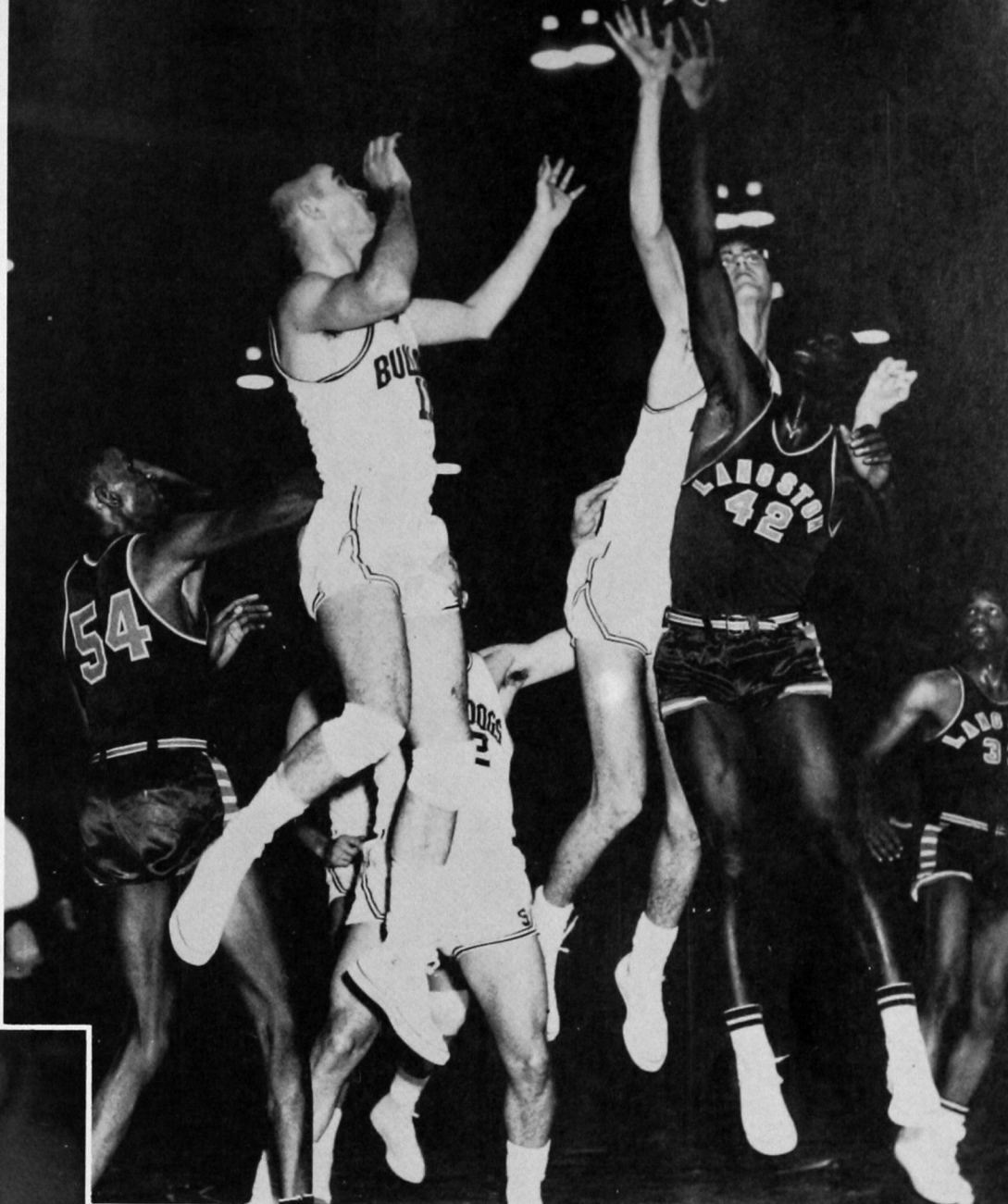

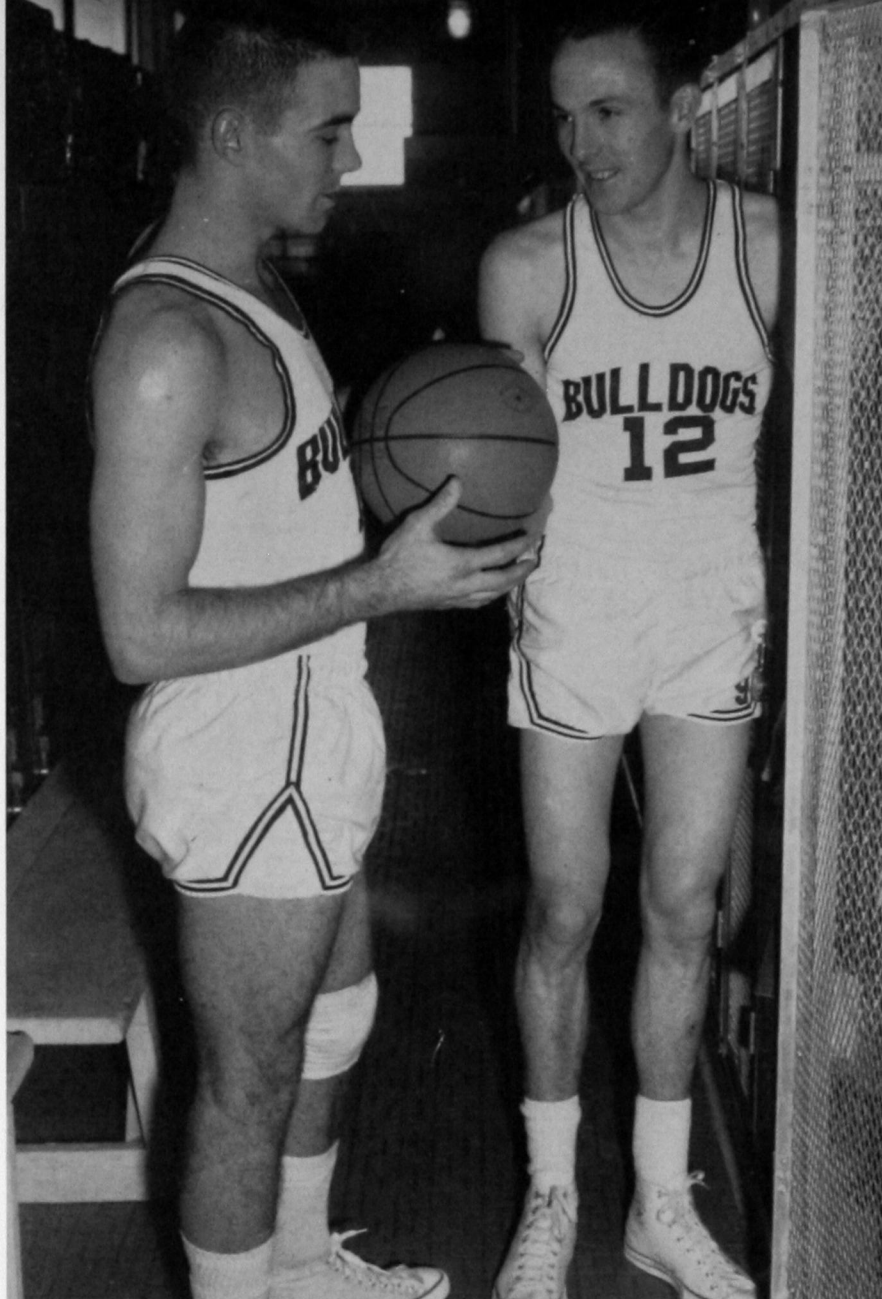

Southwestern was off to a flying start in the collegiate conference, winning five straight before midseason injuries to key men eliminated the Bulldogs from the title chase.

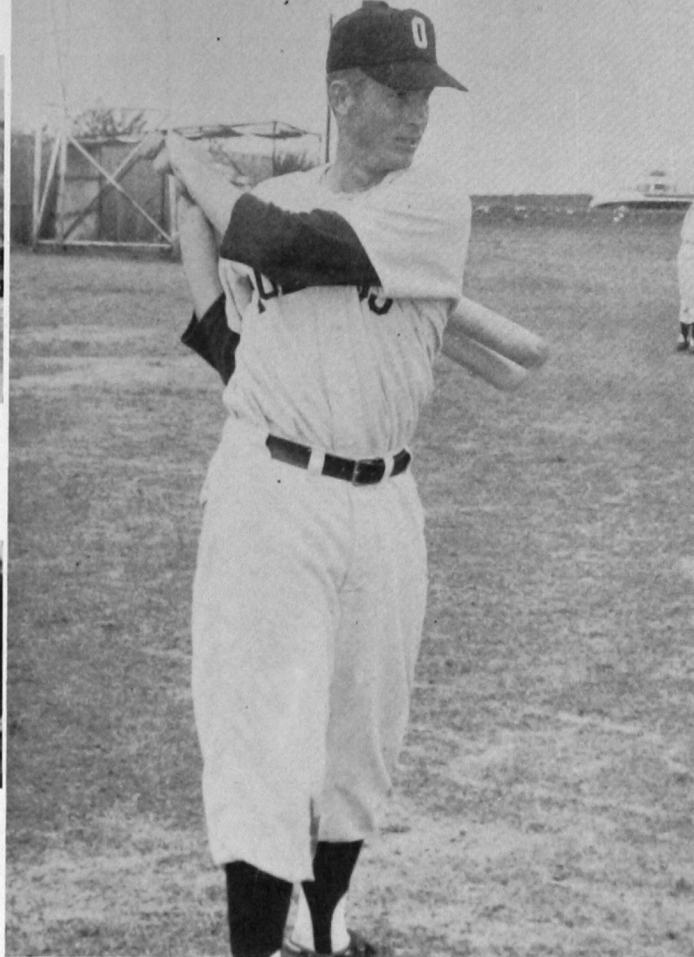

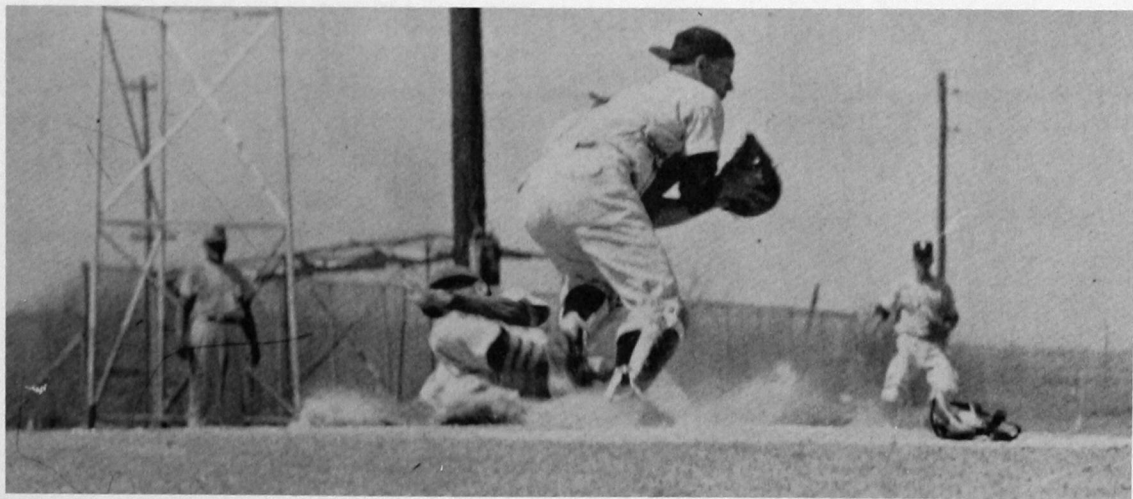

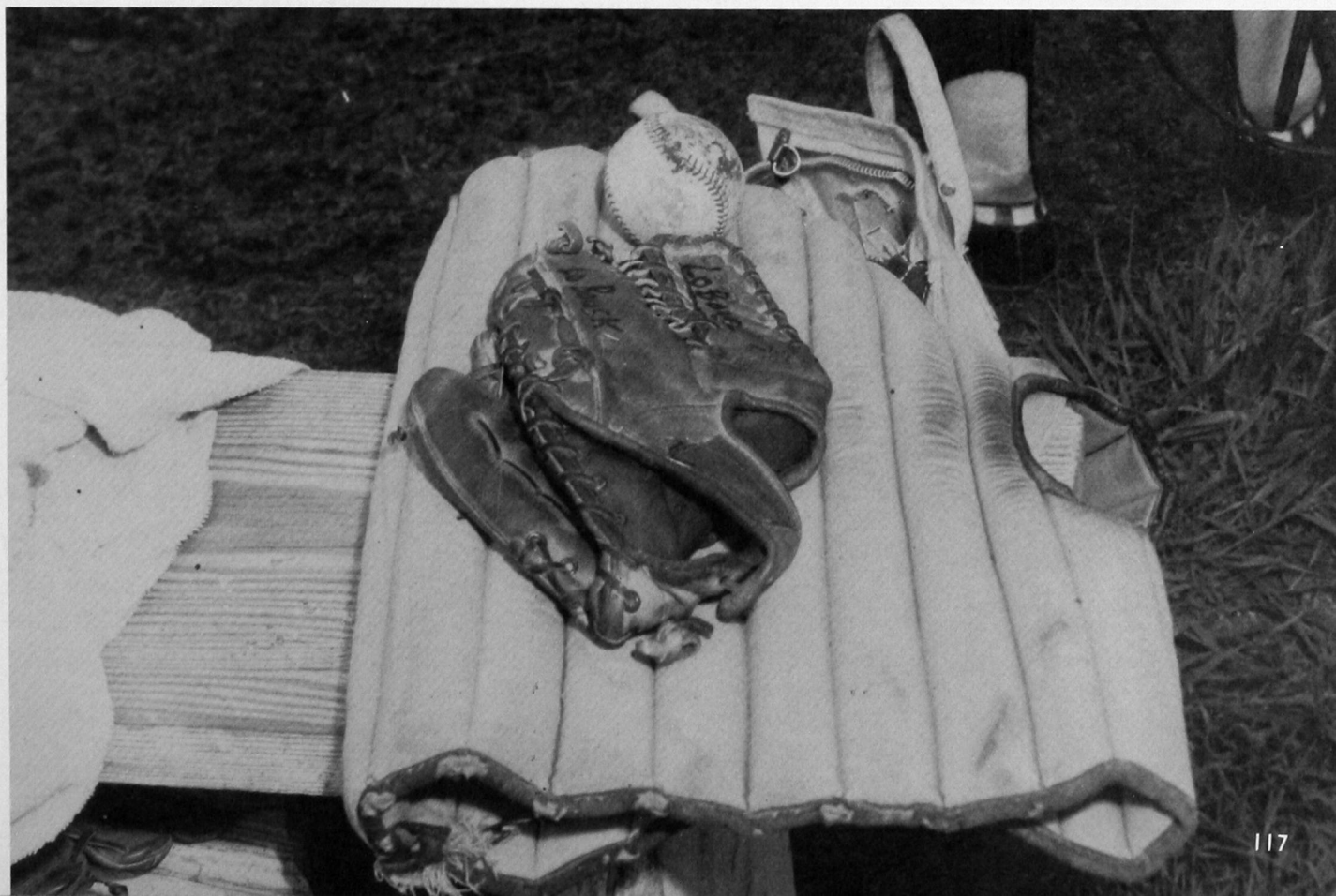

A Comeback Season

After many years with only token teams, Southwestern put a well-balanced squad on the track and field during the 1962 season.

The Bulldogs had two triangular and one dual meet on their home field, Milam Stadium, winning all three. In smaller meets away from home, they finished a strong second to Central at Alva and at Shawnee behind Oklahoma Christian College.

In the first home appearance, Don Parker, with $13\frac{3}{4}$, paced Southwestern to 55 points over East Central with 44 and Oklahoma Baptists with 32.

Racking up nine first places, with Clyde Coleman and Parker leading the way, the Bulldogs were first with 61 points to Northwestern's 45 and Oklahoma Baptists' 35, again on the Milam Stadium track.

In the final home meet Chuck Lambrite was the high scorer with 15 as Southwestern buried Panhandle in a dual meet, 100 to 27.

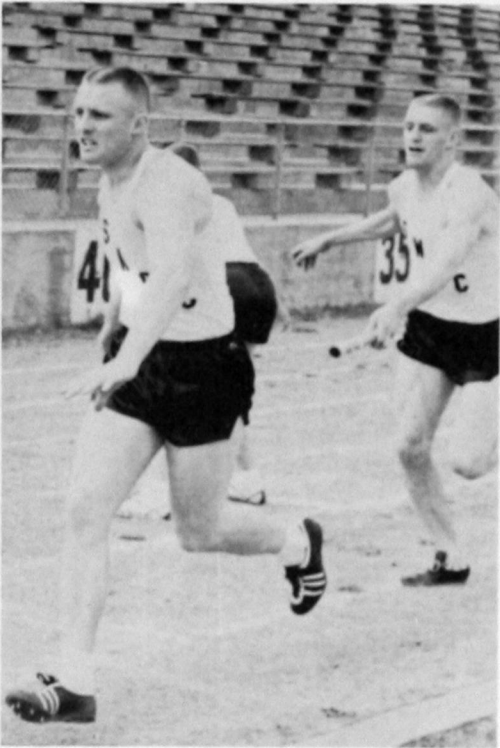


Gary Abercrombie clears the bar during a triangular meet with Oklahoma Baptist University and Northwestern. The Bulldogs won the meet.



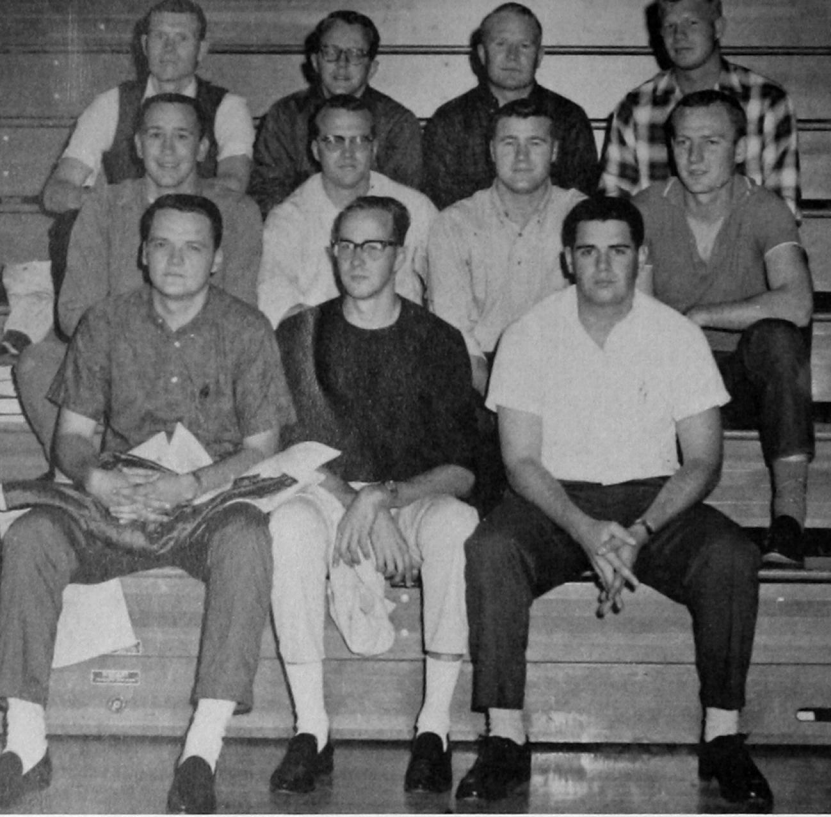

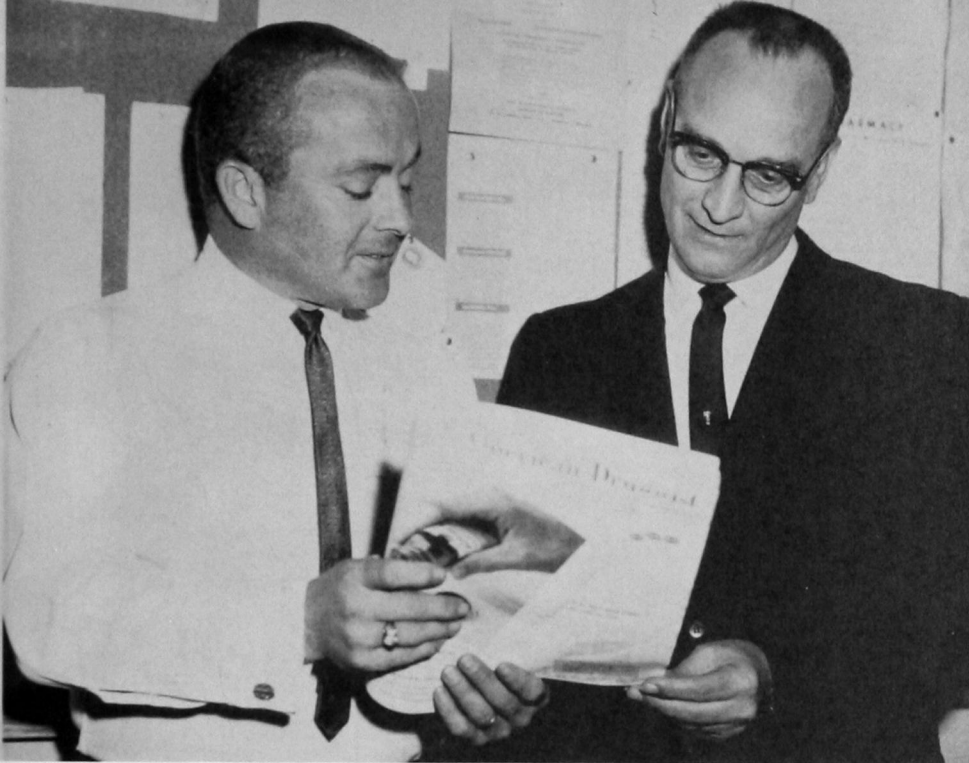

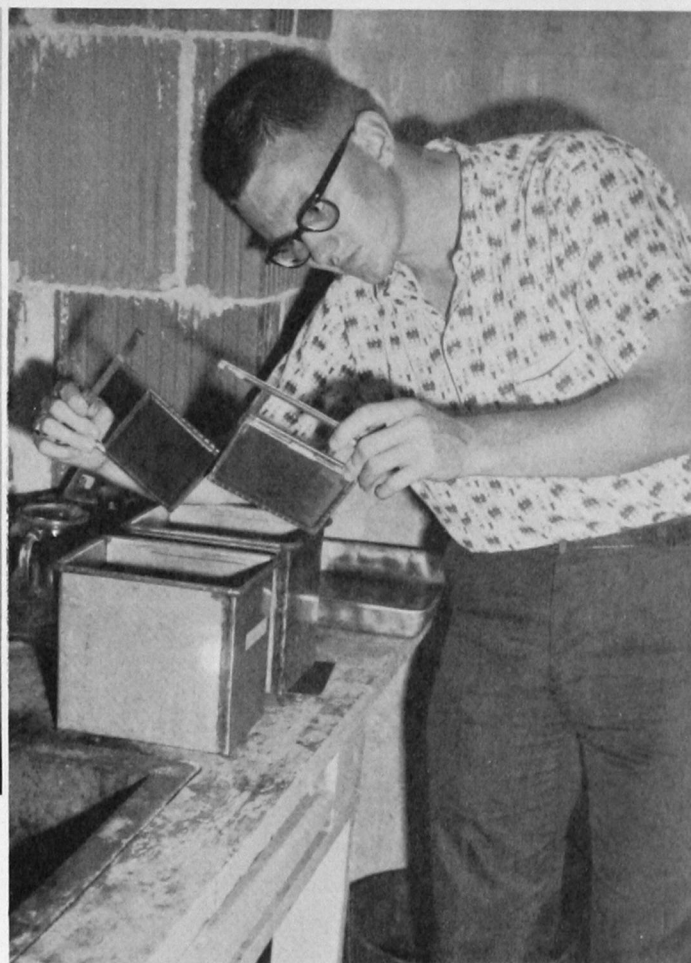

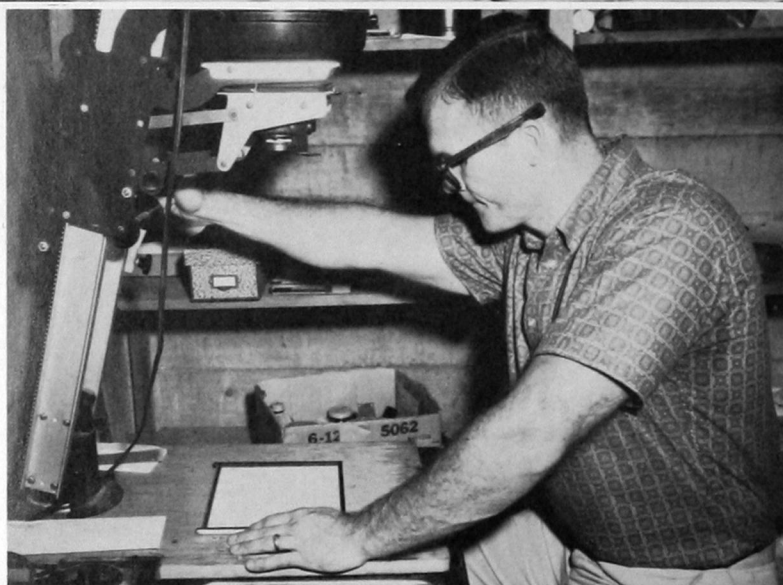

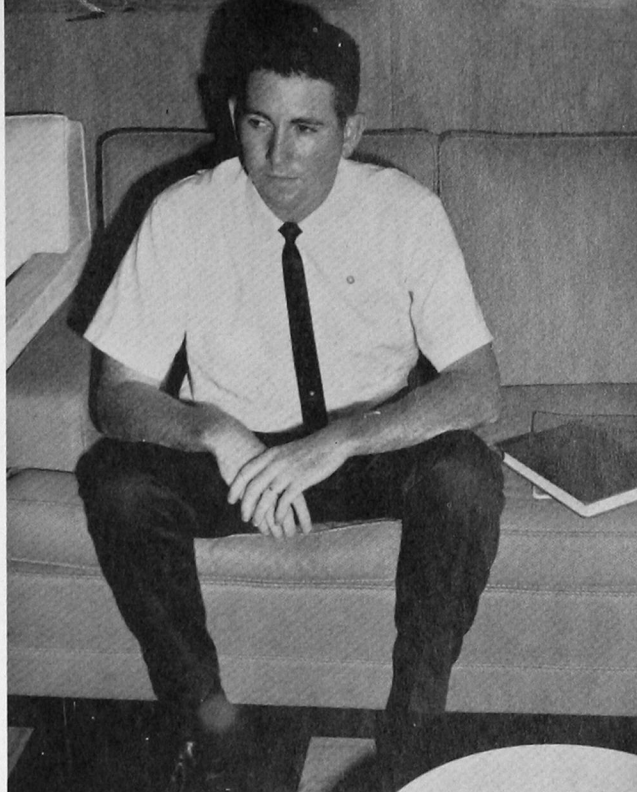

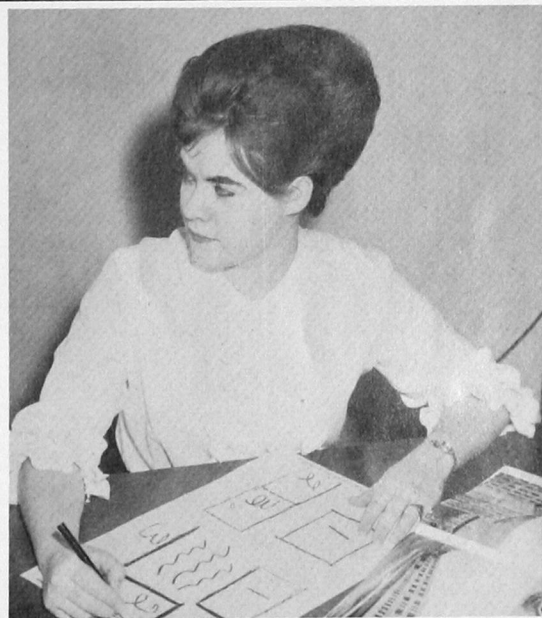


