## New Miss SWOSU looks forward to next challenge

Lacey Anderson, a 20-year-old sophomore nursing student from Walters, was crowned Miss SWOSU 2015 at the annual scholarship pageant earlier this month. Along with winning the Lifestyle/Fitness in Swim Suit and Peer Respect/Leadership awards, Anderson took home \$2,600 in scholarship money from SWOSU and a \$233 Children's Miracle Network scholarship. She also received a \$1,000 cash award and over \$3,000 in gift certificates and gifts from area businesses. Anderson promotes "Youth Development Through 4-H" and centers her platform on leadership. She hopes to inspire young people to get involved in clubs or organizations and to become passionate about them, just like she has been with 4-H. She encourages students to get involved in organizations that teach life skills like responsibility and dedication. "Everyone has that something that they are passionate for and 4-H is that 'something' for me. It has built me into the woman that I am today," Anderson said. "Because of everything that I've learned in 4-H, it has built me to be a

leader and a role model. SWOSU just happened to give me the perfect opportunity to use that."

This year was Anderson's second year to compete in the Miss SWOSU pageant. Last year, she was first runner-up.

Her favorite part of being involved in pageants is making friends and making memories with those friends. She has also grown fond of wearing her crown around Weatherford.

"It is such an honor to represent such a supportive and loving community," she said.

Anderson also has the support of her family and friends from Walters and SWOSU. She said that some of her biggest fans are her sorority sisters of Eta Iota Sigma, a Christian sorority on campus.

"The sorority I'm involved in is totally supportive of everything I do. I know they're a great group of girls that keeps me sane while holding this title," she said.

Anderson moves on to the Miss Oklahoma Scholarship Pageant, which will be held May 30 through June 6, 2015. She said she will soon be selecting her song to perform for the talent competition and is already looking forward to pageant week.

"Everyone that I've talked to about it claims that it's the best week of your life. Who wouldn't want to experience that?"

## Oklahoma astronaut to present museum speech

On Saturday, Nov. 22, Oklahoma native and retired astronaut Commander John Herrington will be coming to the Stafford Air and Space Museum.

He will be sharing a presentation about his trips to the International Space Station.

The presentation will start at 7 p.m. while doors open at 6:30. The price SWOSU students and all students 18 and under is \$2. For all other guests it will be \$7.

Commander Herrington was born in Wetumka, Okla., on Sept.

14, 1958.

He grew up in Colorado Springs, Colo., Riverton, Wyo., and Plano, Texas, where he graduated from Plano Senior High School. He earned a bachelor's degree in applied mathematics from the University of Colorado-Colorado Springs.

In 1984, Herrington received his commission in the U.S. Navy from the Aviation Officer Candidate School in March 1984.

In June 1995, Herrington received his Master of Science degree in aeronautical Engineering from the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School. In April 1996 Herrington was selected by

NASA, and had to report to Johnson Space Center in Houston, Texas on August 1996.

After completing two years of training and evaluation, he qualified for flight assignment as a mission specialist.

Herrington was assigned to the Flight Support Branch of the Astronaut Office where he served as a member of the Astronaut Support Personnel team responsible for Shuttle launch preparations and post-landing operations.

Herrington was selected as a Mission Specialist for STS-113, the sixteenth Space Shuttle mission to



**John Herrington** the International Space Station The space shuttle Endeavor was launched from Kennedy Space Center on Nov. 23, 2002 and returned Dec. 7.

During Herrington's mission he performed 3 space walks, which totaled almost a total of 20 hours.

In July 2004, Herrington served as commander of the NEEMO 6 mission aboard the Aquarius Underwater Laboratory, where he lived and worked under water for 10 days.

He retired from the Navy and NASA in July 2005.

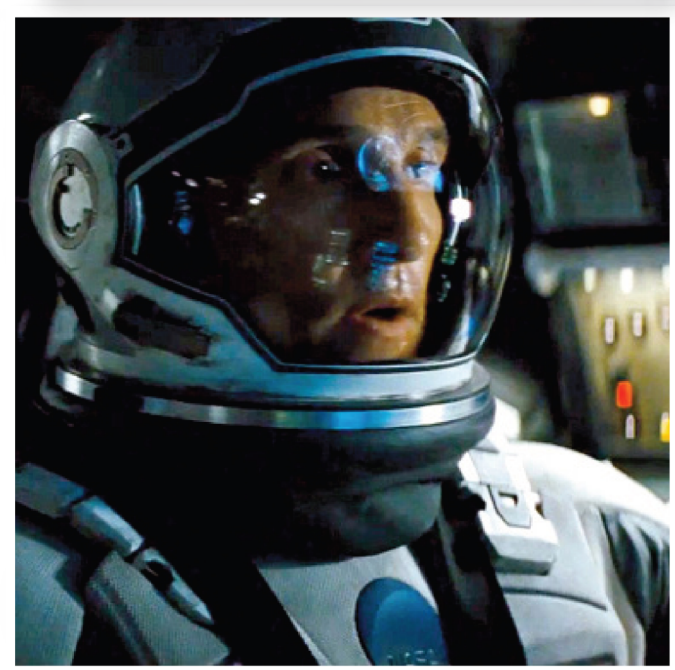
always great but the service definitely needs to be worked on.

## Movie Review



It's not often that movies make you think. It's even less common when that type of movie is a high-budget, Hollywood science fiction flick. Most times we go to the movies and the information is spoon-fed to us. *Interstellar* is a science fiction movie that will have you glued to the screen with curiosity.

*Interstellar*, starring Matthew McConaughey and Anne Hathaway, is a story of astronaut explorers sent to a different galaxy to find a new home for the human race. Earth's resources are dwindling and life as they know it is coming to an end.

I would compare this movie to the 2010 sci-fi flick *Inception*. There are twists and turns that you will never see coming. The crew of space explorers is faced with some difficult choices and not all of them will make it to see the end of their journey. The team is also assisted by robots on the mission, but this depiction of robots is much different than any I have ever seen.

I am not a typically a fan of sci-fi movies, but this one was an exception. McConaughey shows his worthiness of the Oscar he won in 2014 for the film *Dallas Buyer's Club*. Hathaway also puts on a very believable performance as Amelia Brand, the daughter of the brains behind their exploration. Matt Damon also makes a brief appearance in the movie. There is a scene where McConaughey and Damon get into a fight and one of the men's helmets gets cracked leaving him struggling to breathe. I found myself in my seat trying to help him catch his breath.

I would not recommend this movie for children or anyone with a short attention span. The movie runs almost three hours, but every minute keeps you guessing.

## Book Review

*The Help* was written by Kathryn Stockett and published in 2009. In 2011, a movie was released based on the novel. It combines the issue of race, love and education in forcing readers to rethink how society operates.

The story is about African-American women working as maids in Jackson, Miss., during the early 1960s. It features three main narrators—Aibileen, Minny and Skeeter. Aibileen and Minny are black women who work for a white family in a time and place where racism was a serious problem.

The main issue regarding unfairness starts with the bathroom problem. Hilly, a white woman who wants to legalize discriminatory practices, sponsors a "bill that requires every white home to have a separate bathroom for the colored help."

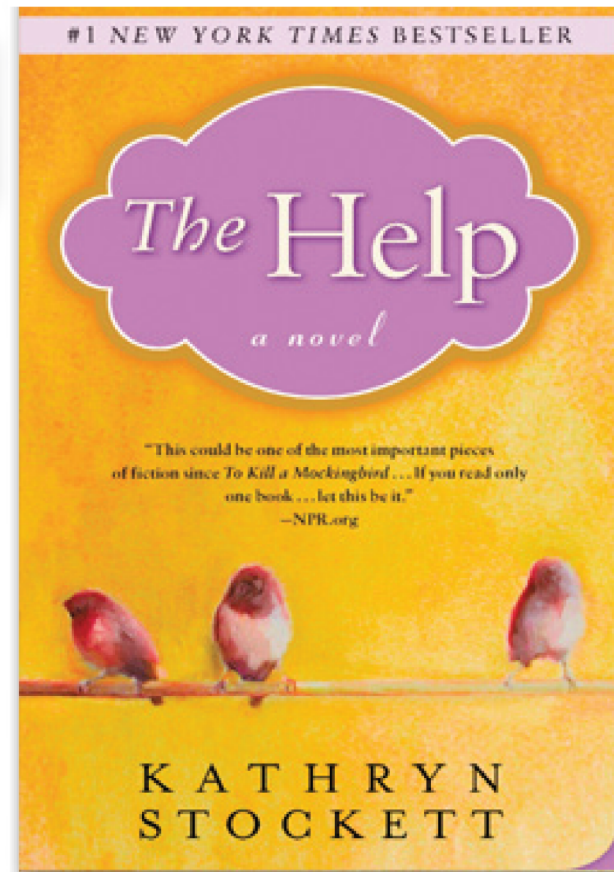
To break the boundaries, Skeeter takes the risk to write a story from the maids' perspective. "No. I couldn't. That would be... crossing the line," said Skeeter at first. No matter how hard, Skeeter decides to be her own judge about what is right and what is wrong.

At first, only Aibileen helps with the story. She tries to encourage other maids to help. "I'm proud a what I'm selling. I can't help it. We all telling stories that need to be told," Aibileen said. For her, revealing truth from her perspective may dissipate the racial tension in the town. But things don't go smoothly as it was expected.

Minny doubts helping tell her stories to Skeeter for several times, fearing of being used.

"I must be crazy, giving a white woman the sworn secrets of the colored race," she said.

However, she changes her mind in order to let the world know about what they think. Although Skeeter is abandoned by some of her own race, such as Miss Hilly, she earns the acceptance from the black community.



I like the book a lot because it is so vivid as three people take turns telling the story. Other readers like the message of the book.

"Sometimes we know there is something unfair, but we just dare not to react. Eugenia shows her courage," said Li-Chen Chang.

Another student says the book has a strong message about respect. "Put yourselves into everyone's shoes, and then you'll understand how important the respect is," said Yu-Hsuan Liu.

As the book says, "Lines between black and white ain't there neither." No one was born to show racism.

## Alumni Honored by College of Pharmacy

Kent and Jalee Abbott of Hydro were recently presented the 2014 Southwestern Oklahoma State University College of Pharmacy Outstanding Pharmacy Alumnus Award.

The Abbotts were honored during the recent SWOSU College of Pharmacy Alumni Recognition Ceremony held on the Weatherford campus.

The Outstanding Pharmacy Alumnus award is presented each year for demonstrating exceptional support of the SWOSU College of Pharmacy and outstanding personal achievements in the profession.

Both Kent (’78) and Jalee (’77) are graduates of the SWOSU College of Pharmacy. They are owners of PharmCare USA, founded in 1999 and based in Hydro. Their operations now stretch from New Jersey on the east coast to Grand Junction (CO) in the west. PharmCare provides a continuum of pharmaceutical services to long-term care patients, assisted living facilities and developmentally disabled patients. They have both been involved in community and consulting pharmacy since 1981 when they established their first company, JK Consulting.

Kent has been very involved on several commit-

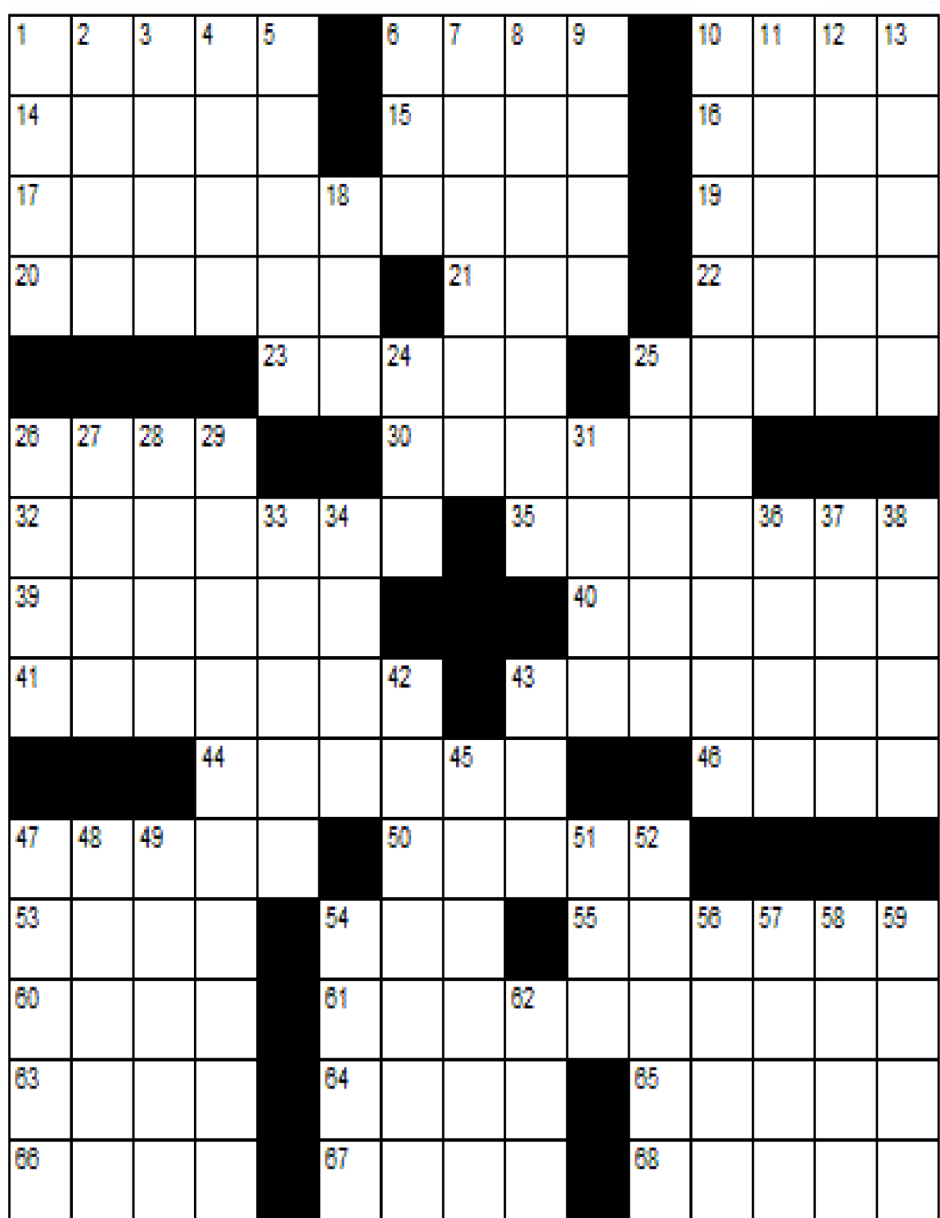

## Football team ends year with 28-6 loss at home

WEATHERFORD, Okla. – The Bulldog football team lost two fumbles and turned the ball over on downs three times after halftime and they were out-scored 21-0 in the second half by the visitors from Northwestern Oklahoma State, who defeated the Bulldogs 28-6 on Senior Day at Fast Lane Field.

Karl Hodge provided the majority of the offense for SWOSU, finishing with a career-high 180 yards rushing on 28 carries, and he scored the only points for the Bulldogs on a three-yard plunge with 1:13 to play in the first half. After SWOSU's extra point was blocked, Northwestern countered with a 37-yard hail mary touchdown at the end of the half and converted their extra point for a 7-6 halftime lead.

Various miscues, including two lost fumbles and a snap over punter Dalton Jackson's head, led the a big second half for NWOSU, who snapped a six-game losing streak against the Bulldogs. SWOSU matches their lowest scoring output of the season, which came in the season opener at Harding, despite totaling 358 yards of offense outgaining the Rangers by more than 40 yards.

Hodge concludes his senior season with 980 yards, the second-most at SWOSU in the NCAA Division II era, and 11 touchdowns. He finishes his career with exactly 1,700 yards to rank third at SWOSU and his career-high of 180 yards is the fourth-most by a Bulldog in the NCAA era.

Making his first start since the third game of the season, Ryley Claborn finished 14-for-36 passing for 152 yards and he was intercepted one time. His top target was tight end Collin Bricker, who hauled in six receptions for 63 yards. Brad Smithey made three receptions in the game and finishes his career with 140, meaning he graduates ranking fourth in career receptions at SWOSU.

The SWOSU defense caused plenty of havoc for the Ranger offense, finishing with 11 tackles for loss. Steven Townsley recorded a team-best 11 tackles and broke up one pass in his final game as a Bulldogs while Austin Loomis tallied nine tackles. Devin Benton and Tanner Thompson each had 2.5 tackles for loss as Benton tied the single-season school record for tackles for loss with 23.0. He will graduate from SWOSU as the school's all-time leader in both sacks (18.0) and tackles for loss (50.0).

The loss ends the Bulldogs season at 3-7, tied for ninth in the Great American Conference with Arkansas Tech and Northwestern.

## Bulldogs finish their final exhibi-

The Bulldogs wrapped up their final exhibition game of the season when they travelled to Norman, Okla., on Tuesday night to face the No. 19-ranked Sooners in McCasland Field House.

SWOSU struggled to find a rhythm early on, waiting until three minutes to earn their first bucket off a Martell Collins layup. For their next score, Emeche Wells stole the ball from Sooners' guard Buddy Hield and passed it to Trent Washington on the breakaway for the easy layup. The Dawgs struggled from the field though, only shooting 25.9 percent, but made 3-12 treys to go into halftime trailing 43-18.

The Bulldogs opened up the half with a great alley-oop from Washington to Richard McCalop. However, they would shoot 22.6 percent with only one three-point shot made through the second half. McCalop finished as SWOSU's leading scorer with 10 points on 4-10 shooting, while Kenyon Borders was second on the team with seven.

The Dawgs finished with 30 rebounds to the Sooners

55, led by Oliver Willis with a team-high 6. Trent Washington finished second with 5. The game ended 78-37 in favor of the Sooners.

"This is a good learning experience for our guys," said Head Coach Bob Battisti, "We learned some things about ourselves and it will help us to better prepare for the beginning of the season."

## Team goes 1-1 to begin the season

BOLIVAR, Mo. – The Bulldogs finished 1-1 at the Southwest Baptist Classic after falling 64-61 to Lincoln in their final game at the Meyer Sports Center in Bolivar, Mo.

The Bulldogs started off slowly, missing their first three shots before Martell Collins drained a three off the assist by Trent Washington. This started a strong two minutes from Collins in which he record a steal, two boards and scored SWOSU's next four points to pull the teams even at 7-7.

From there, the Blue Tigers jumped out to a six point lead before

baskets by Collins and Mark Braden put the Dawgs on the front foot 17-16. SWOSU would eventually jump out to a 30-24 lead, before going into the half leading 30-28.

Lincoln scored a layup and a trey to take back the lead once the game resumed for the second half. They would not relinquish the lead until free throws by Emeche Wells drew the teams level at 54-54 with 2:43 remaining.

SWOSU found themselves down 62-58 before a Kenyon Borders assisted three by Washington pulled them within one with 15 seconds

remaining in the game. Keyshawn Perkins then fouled Lincoln's Joshua Buie to put him at the line with six seconds remaining. Buie sank both free throws to put the Blue Tigers up 64-61, before a missed three by Collins ended the game with SWOSU's first regular season loss of the year.

Collins ended with a double-double thanks to game high 23 points on 44 percent shooting, including 4-8 from behind the arc, and 12 boards. Washington finished with 12 points and two assists, while Borders ended with six points and three rebounds.

## Women win exhibition match

WEATHERFORD, Okla. – Kimmi Sawatzky scored a game-high 22 points and McKinsey Schumpert recorded a double-double as the Lady Bulldogs withstood a late run from Mid-America Christian and earned an 81-74 exhibition victory on Friday night at the Pioneer Cellular Event Center.

Sawatzky played a full 40 minutes and hit 7-of-15 field goal attempts – including 4-of-7 three pointers – to lead SWOSU, who collectively hit on 39% of their field goals and threes.

It was Schumpert, however, who put the Lady Dawgs up 13, 69-56, with 6:54 to play before MACU made a late push. The Evangels outscored SWOSU 16-5 over the next four minutes and got within two at 74-72 with 2:13 to play.

Chelsea Bates stopped the run with a layup and a pair of free throws and Jennifer Williams polished it off at the free throw line and SWOSU concluded exhibition season 1-1.

Sawatzky finished with a great

line of 22 points, seven rebounds and eight assists while Schumpert's final line included 10 points and 11 rebounds.

Williams scored 12 points in her home debut despite struggles from the free throw line (6-of-14) and Jade Jones also reached double figures with 11 points.

The Lady Bulldogs open the regular season next Thursday, November 20, against Arkansas-Fort Smith with a 5:30 pm tip time scheduled at the Pioneer Cellular Event Center.
