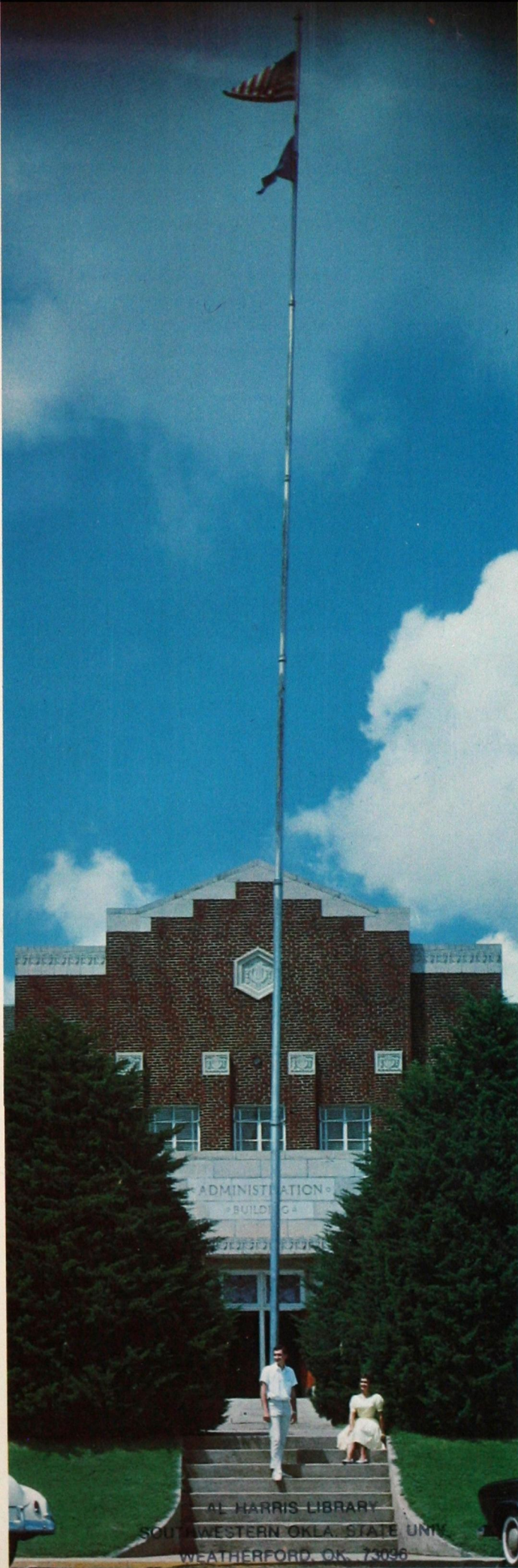

Southwestern's

This was the greatest year of all for Southwestern State College . . . the forerunner of even greater years to come.

More than \$3,000,000 went into a building program, much of it complete by the end of the second semester.

The campus enrollment was just short of 2500 students, almost four times larger than it was 10 years ago.

National recognition in science gained the school even more prestige. The National Science Foundation increased its allocations for summer institutes to include mathematics as well as chemistry.

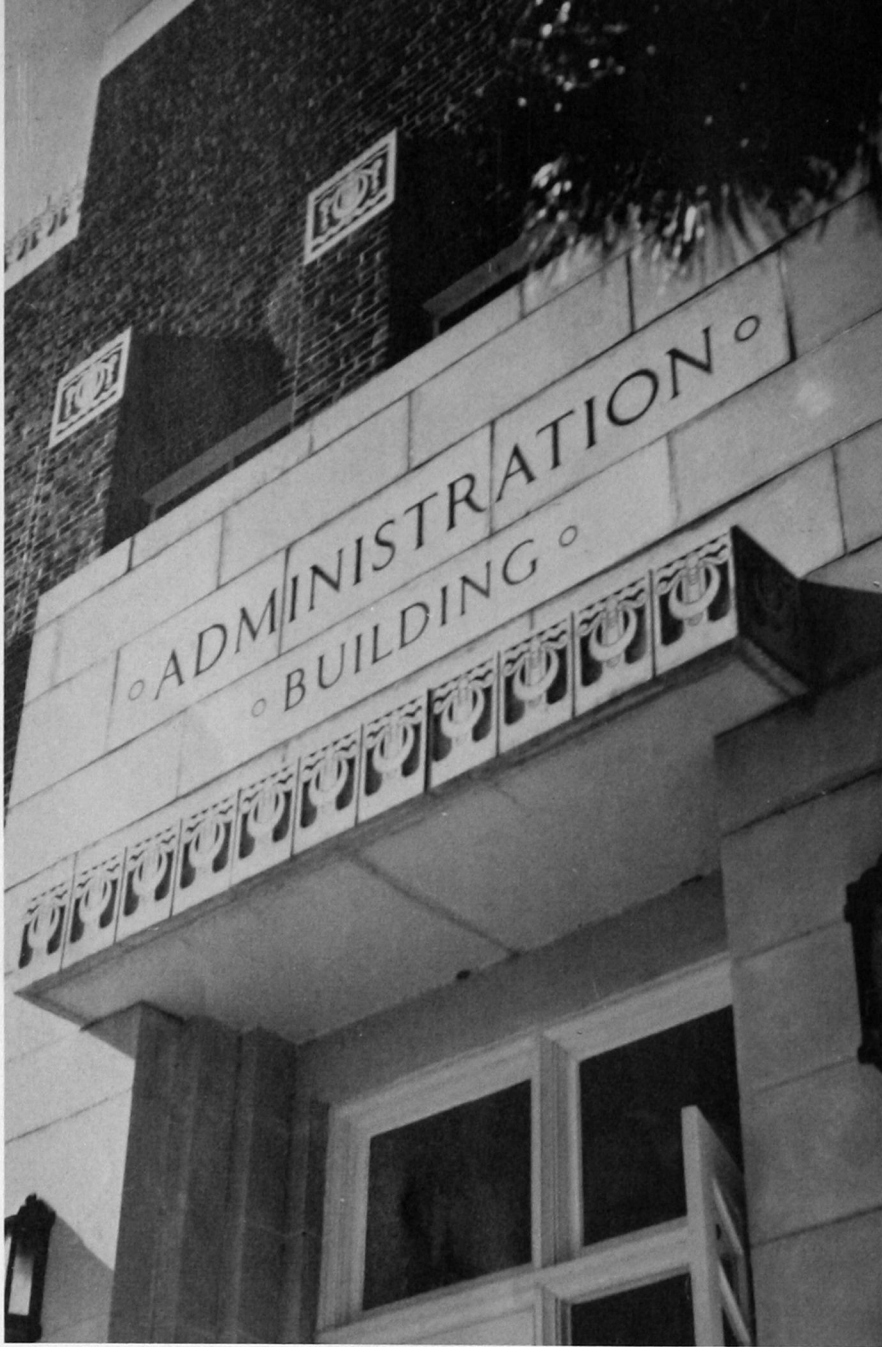
College faculty members became recognized as state leaders in promoting modern methods of teaching mathematics in public schools.

A banquet honoring honor students for the first semester's work made history on the campus and received widespread publicity and editorial acclaim across the state.

An ultra-modern new science laboratories building was completed at a cost of approximately \$1,000,000 to provide chemistry, physics, and pharmacy students the best of facilities.

The ancient Science Hall was converted into a building of beauty and modern design.

Southwestern's dilapidated band hall, originally a gymnasium, felt the effect of changing times, too, to become an up-to-date music building.



More students than the college had ever seen on its campus—2471—smashed all enrollment records.



Greatest Year

More housing went up to meet the needs of Southwestern's greatest year. Two wings were added to Stewart Hall and one to Neff Hall. Another dormitory, with rooms for 289 men, is in the making.

The student center had grown too small. The snack bar and book store were extended into more spacious quarters by additions to the building. Further expansion of the center is in the planning stage.



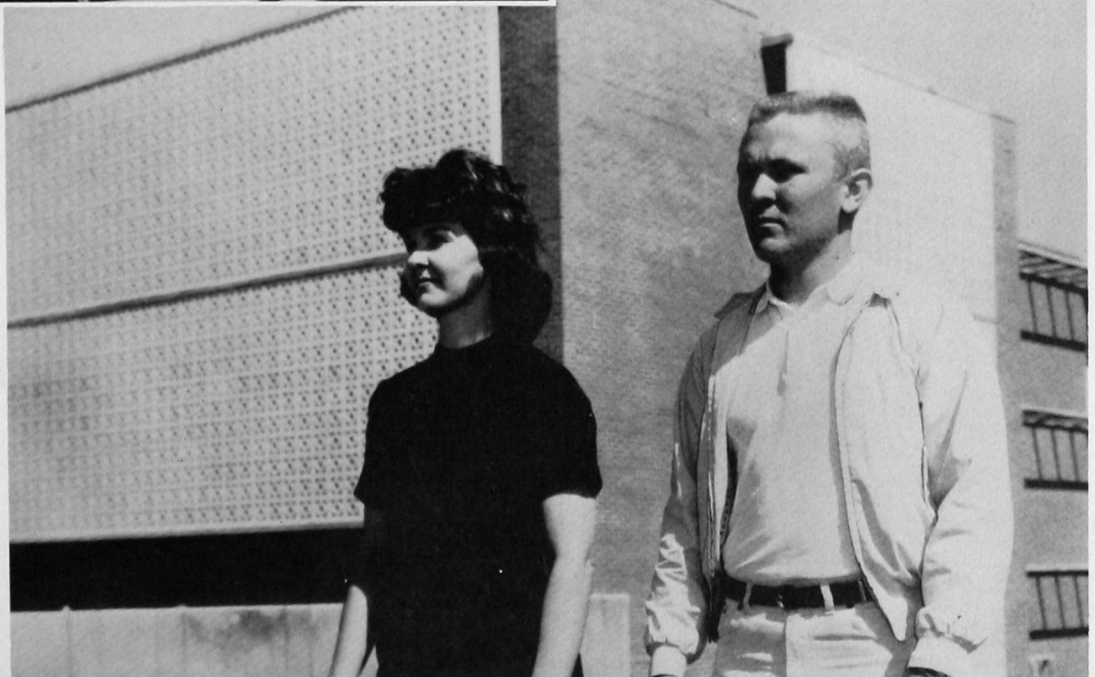

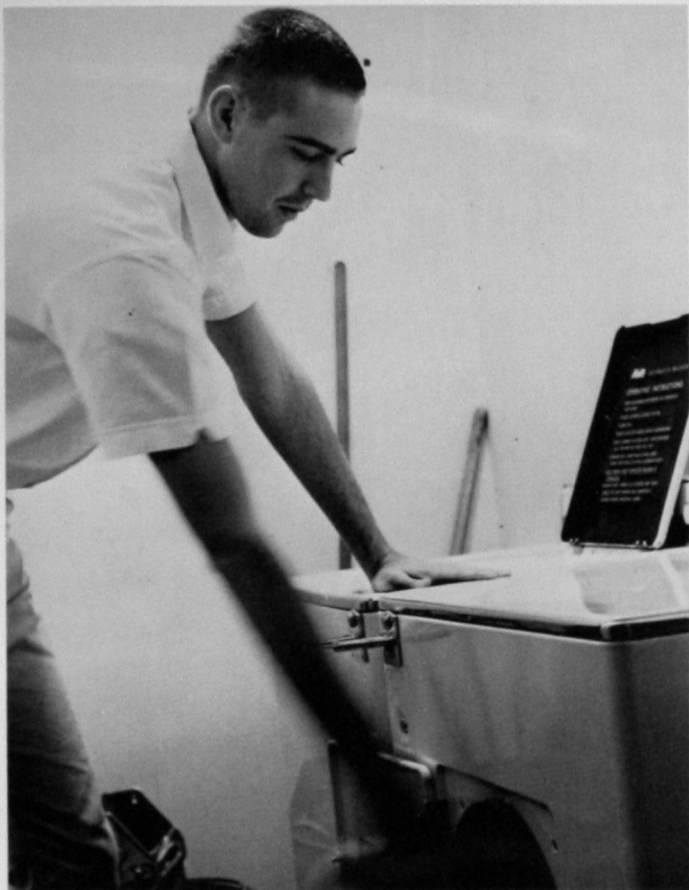

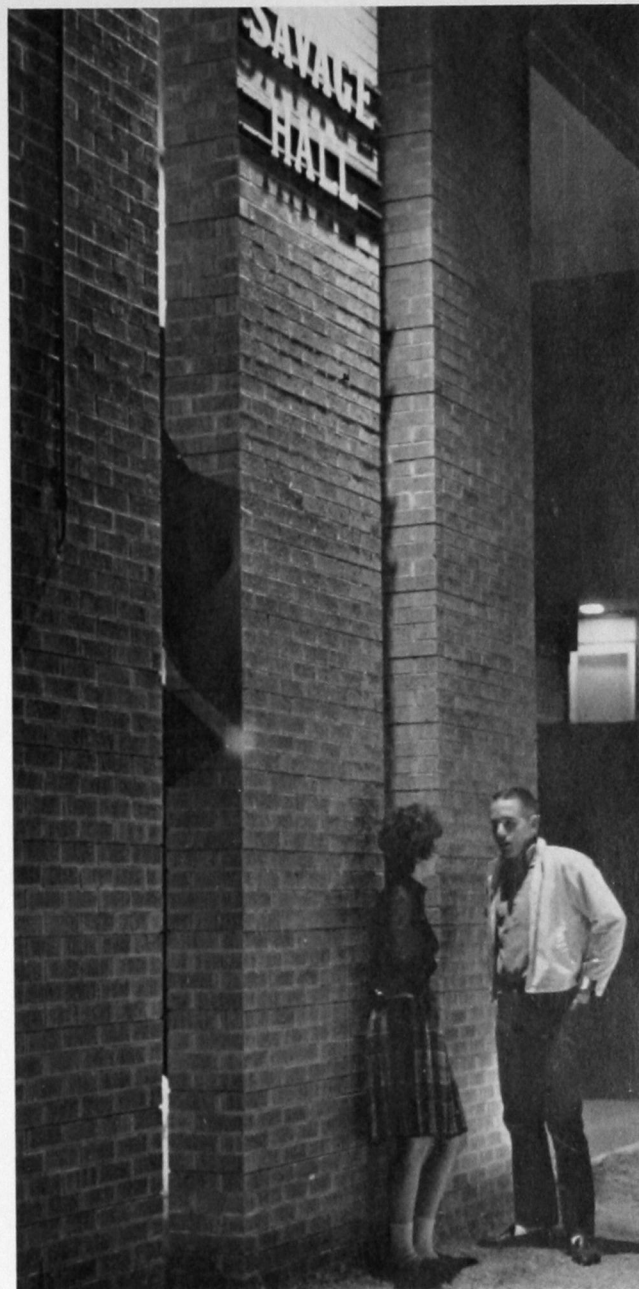

Education

Teacher education continued during the year as the single largest division on the campus. More than 200 seniors completed student teaching as the final requirement for certificates.

Graduates in 1963 continued to gain employment in large and small schools across the nation. Some elected to continue in graduate study. Elementary majors remained more in demand than those in other fields.

Music

Music had one of its great years, too. One of the highlights was the production of the Broadway musical, "The King and I," through the combined efforts of music, drama and modern dance departments.

The Collegians, official college stage band, improved the Southwestern State image as they were warmly received by high school audiences.

Choral groups carried through an ambitious concert program. The college mixed chorus doubled in size to 61 members.

Business

Continuing to rank first on the campus in numbers among subject matter fields, Southwestern's business department kept pace with the times.

Still growing in popularity was the 44-week, or business college, intensified course of study, leading to early employment or insurance for jobs for students undecided about completing degree requirements.

Graduates continued this year to find rewarding jobs in industry, business and teaching.

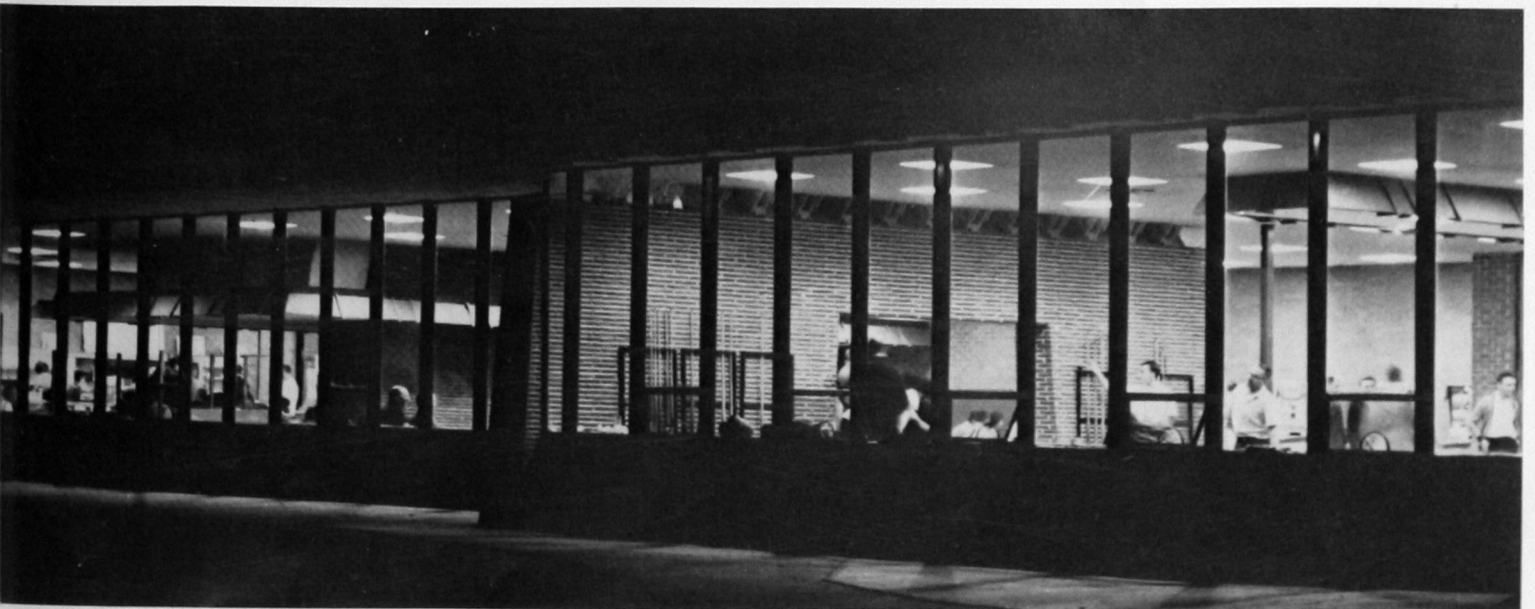
On the second floor they have beauty shows, formal and informal dances, banquets and all the affairs that add color to college life.

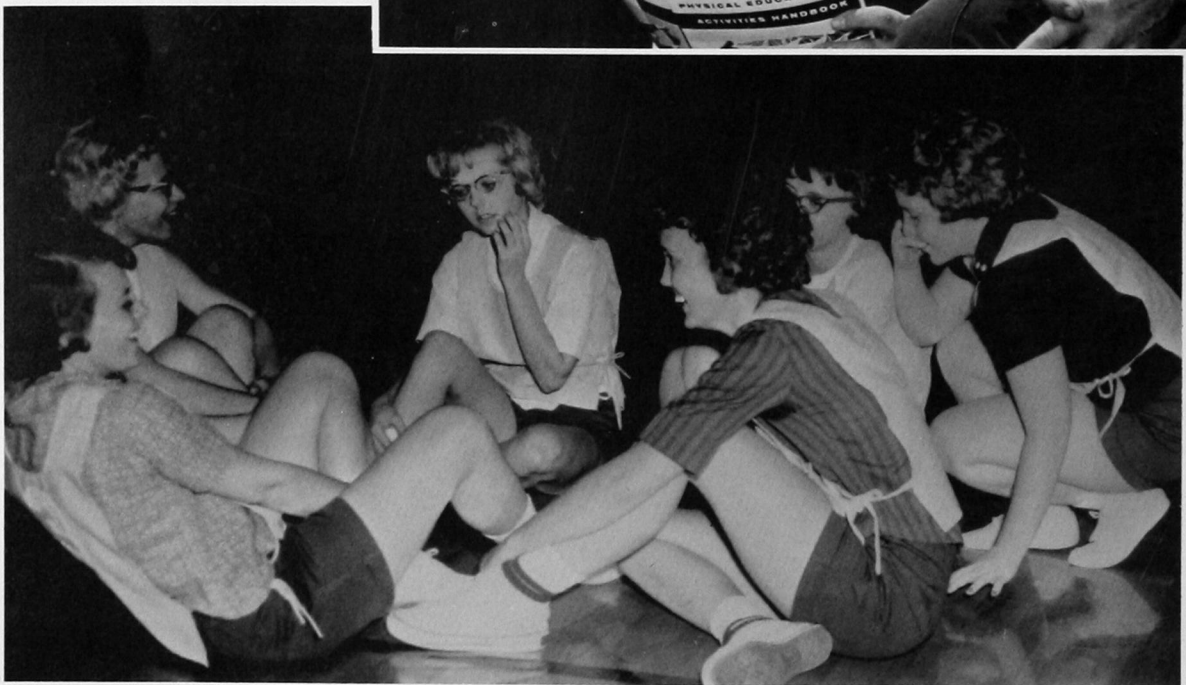
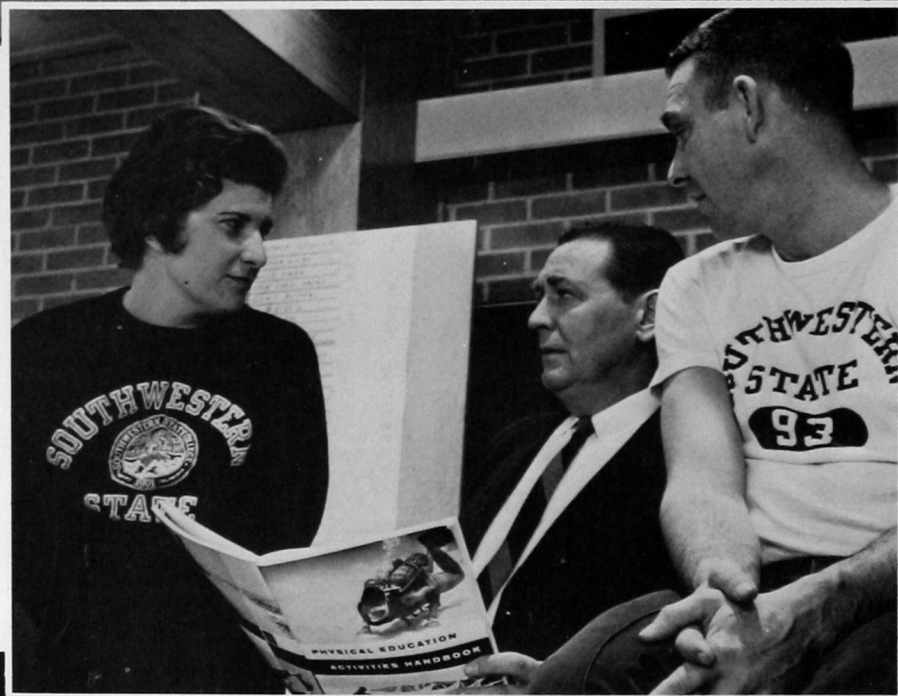
Best of Recreation

More than 500 men and women participated in basketball alone, with other sports rounding out a well-balanced year.

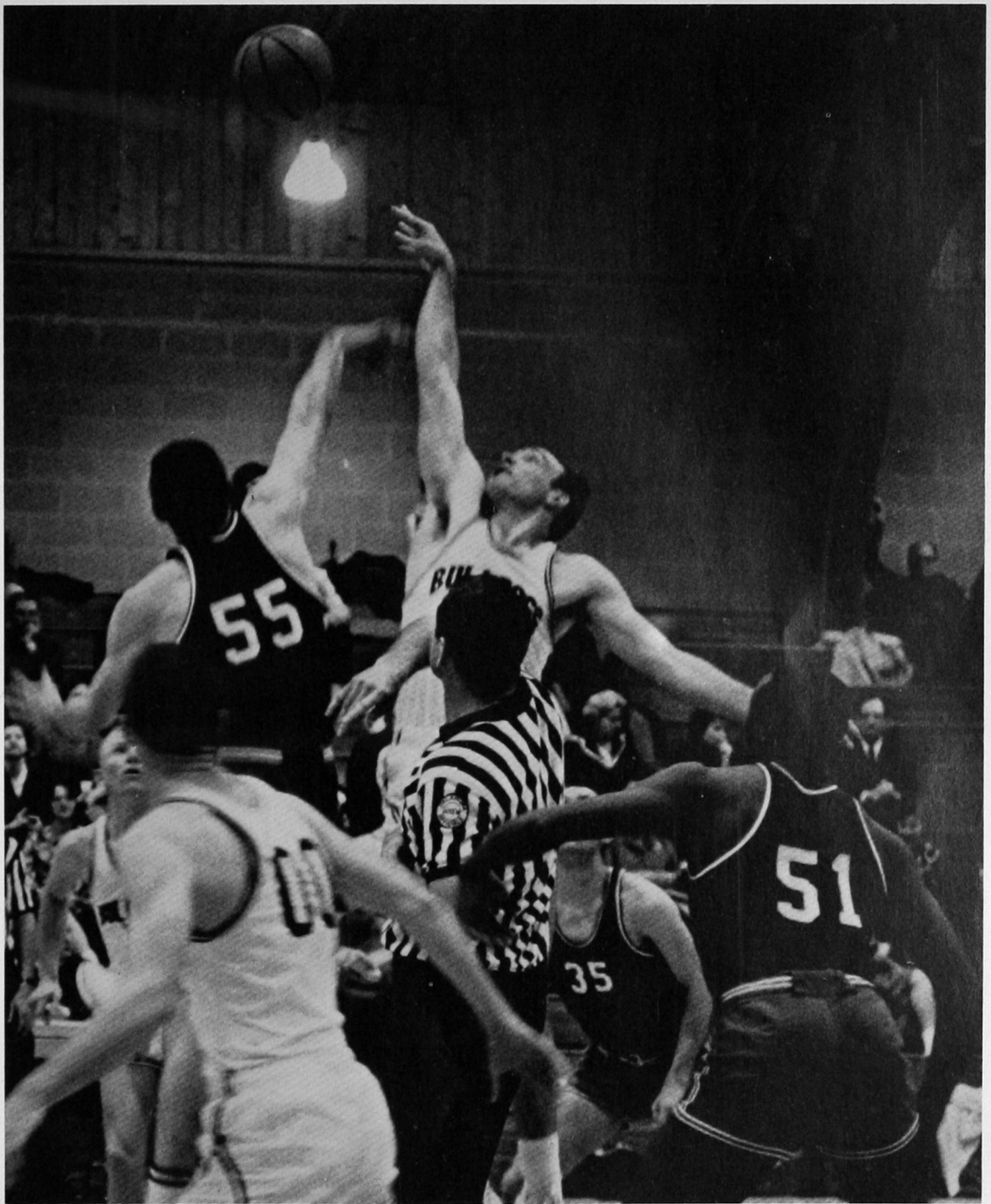
The gymnasium was also the "Home of the Bulldogs," where varsity basketball games were played.

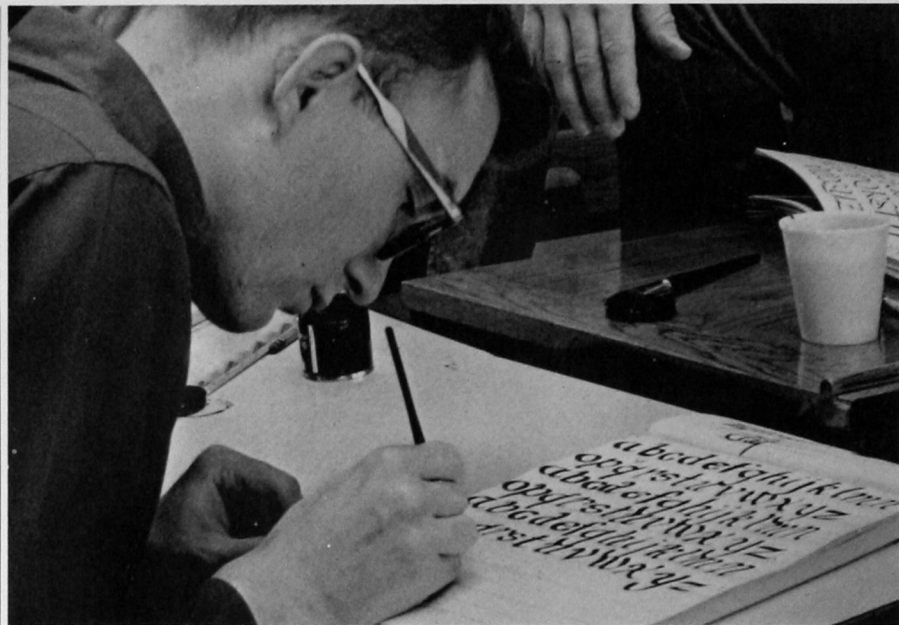
Physical Education

New Life for Old

More than \$300,000 was invested in a complete overhaul of the 53-year-old Science Building, making it a model of beauty and efficiency. Added were 10 classrooms and 10 offices. When the new laboratory building is completed, Old Science will be known as the Biological Science Hall. With the renovation of space came addition of new equipment and furniture.

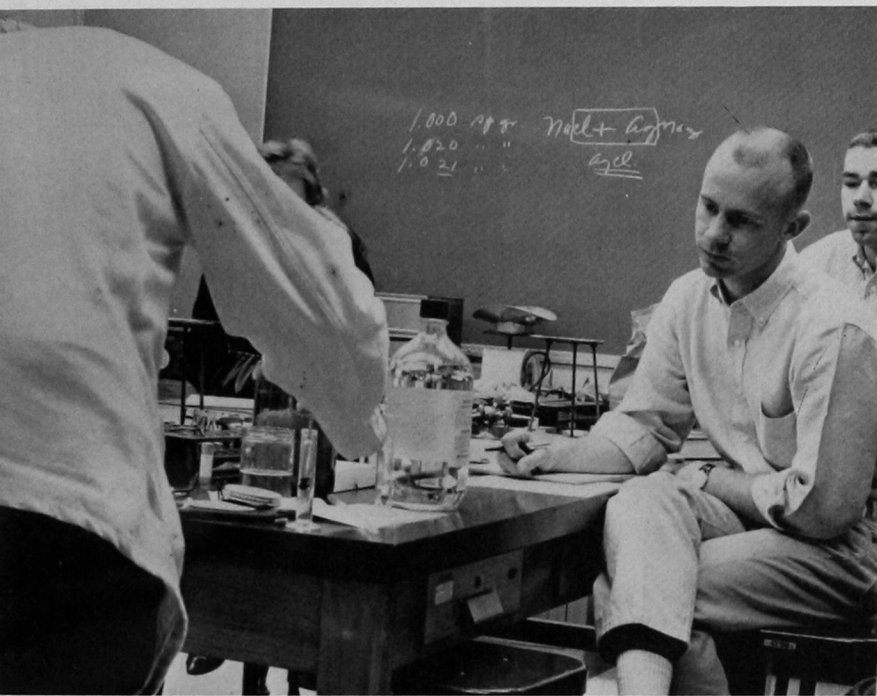
Medical Sciences

Long recognized for its training in the medical sciences, Southwestern State made more gains during the year in the fields of medical technology, pre-medicine, pre-dentistry, and related fields of study.

One of the major additions was a modern greenhouse located on the second floor balcony.

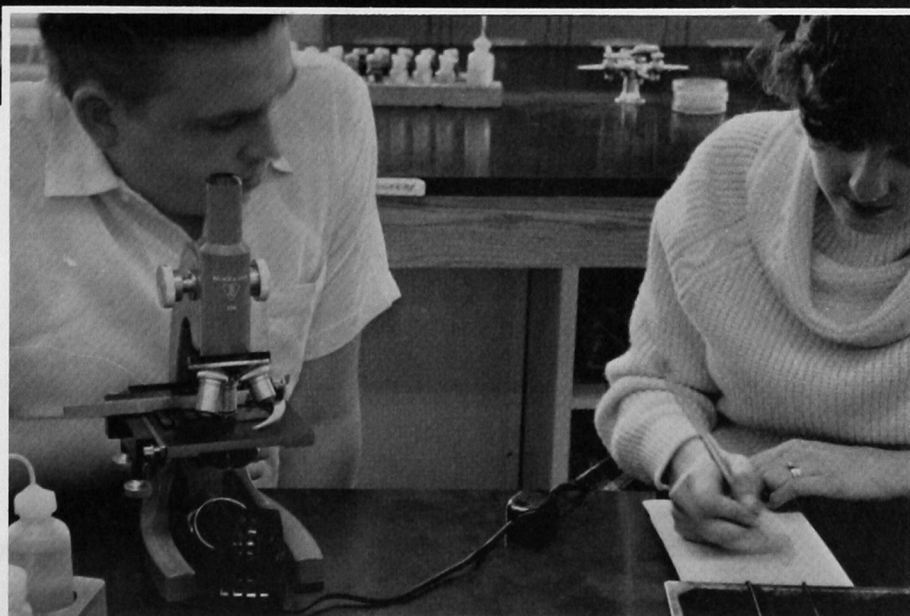

Chemistry

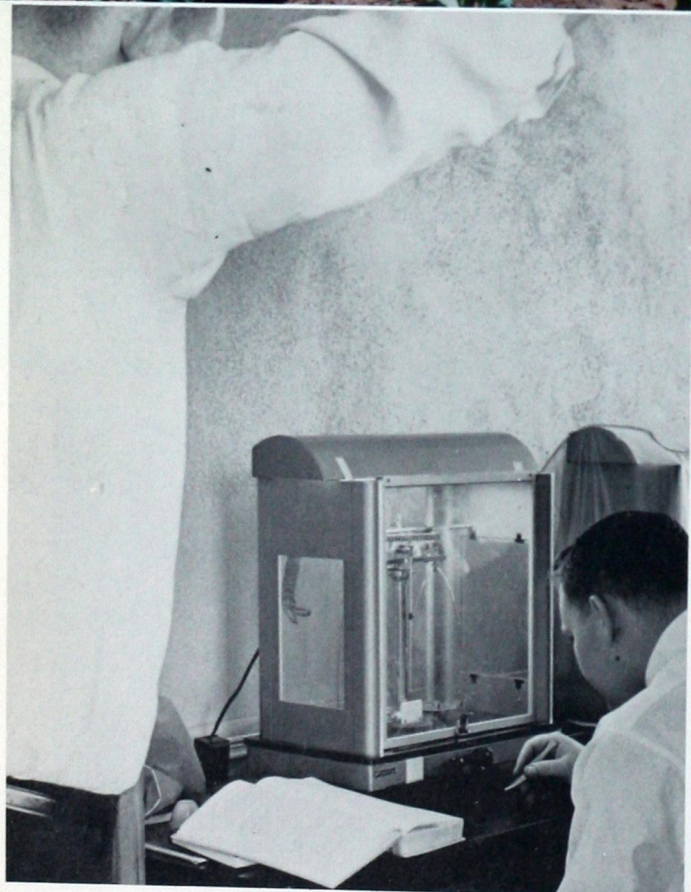

Two National Science Foundation institutes (the third consecutive year in chemistry), area leadership in promoting high school interest in the study of science, and a growing number of graduates going into advanced study highlighted 1962-63.

School of Pharmacy

Recognized across the nation because of the high quality of its instruction and the success of its graduates, Southwestern's School of Pharmacy had its greatest year of all.

The 1963 graduating class had 61 members, the largest in history. A grant from the Pfeiffer Foundation added \$100,000 in equipment and furniture to the new pharmacy laboratories.

Receiving special honors at the spring banquet from faculty and students was Dean W. D. Strother in recognition of his contributions to the school and to the pharmaceutical profession.

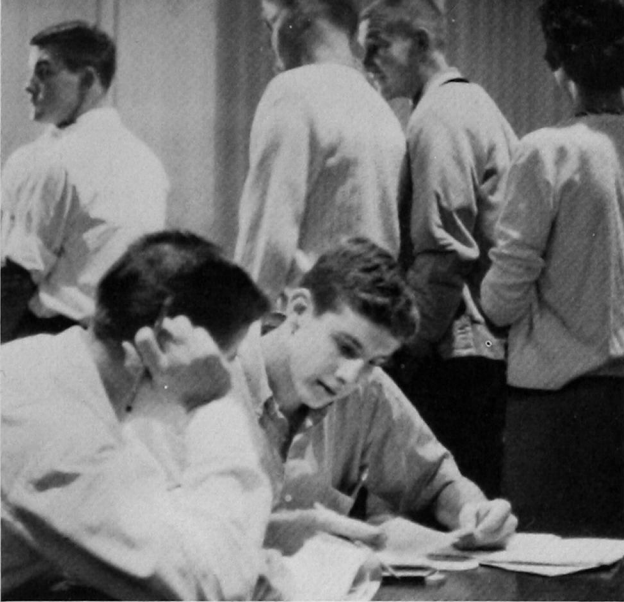

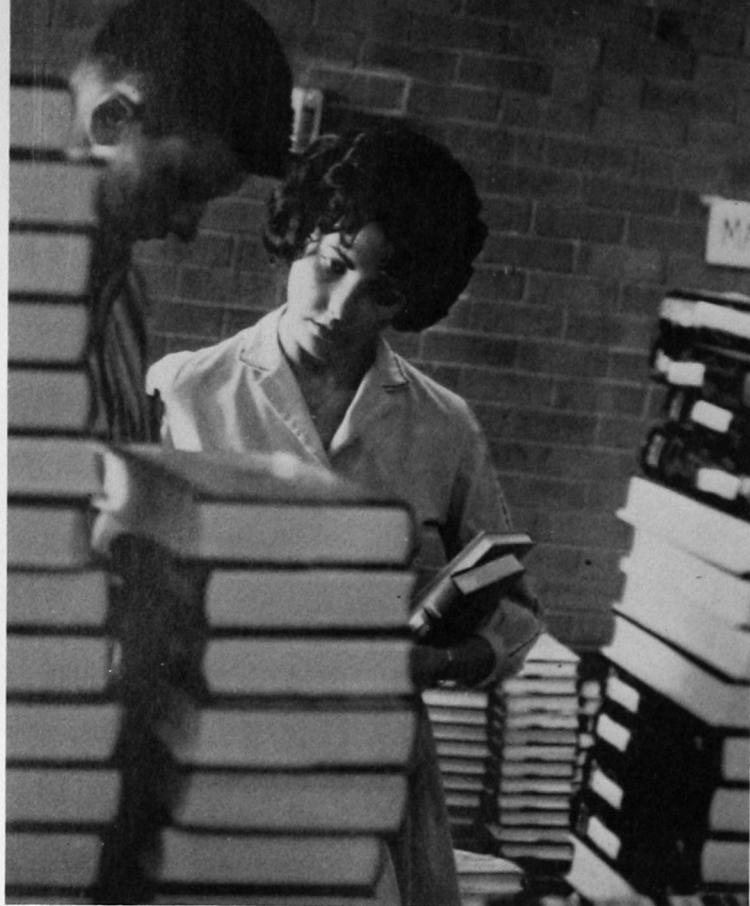

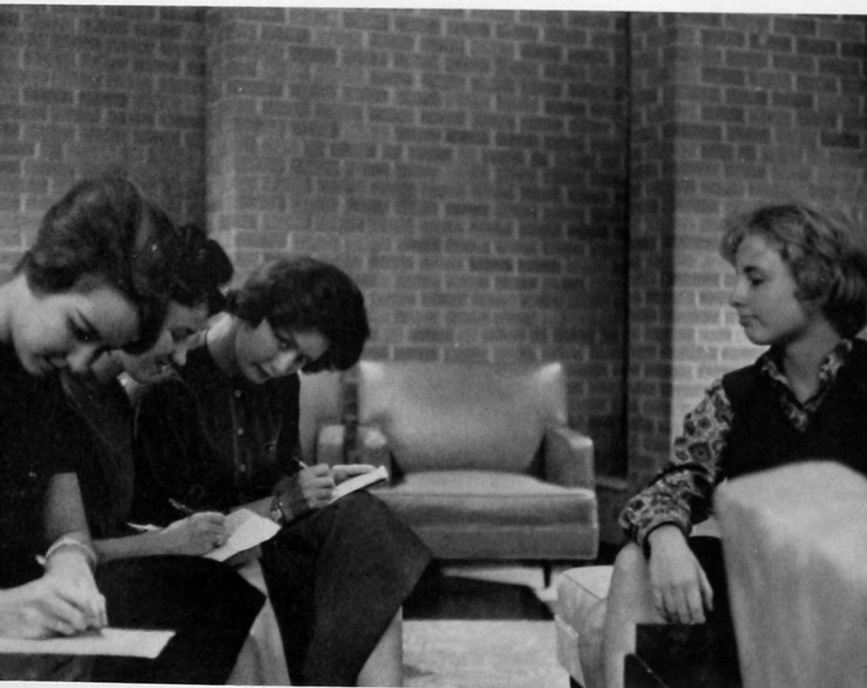

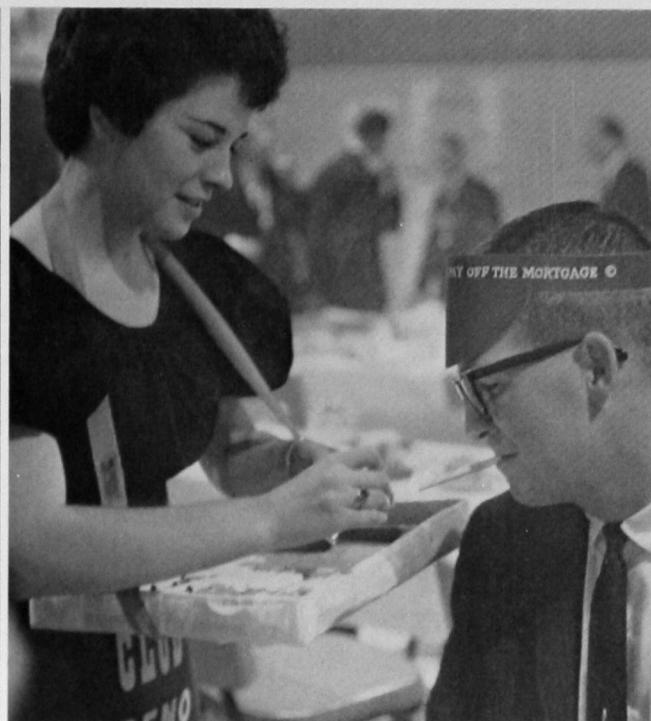

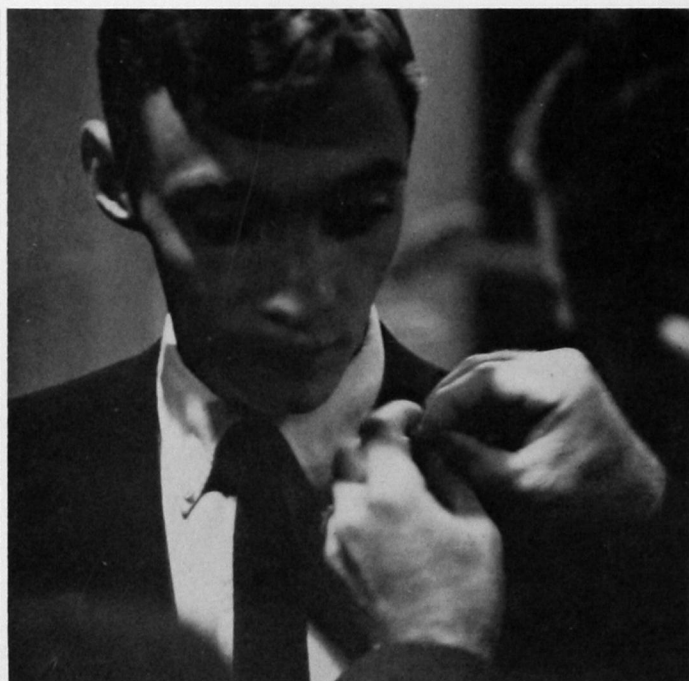

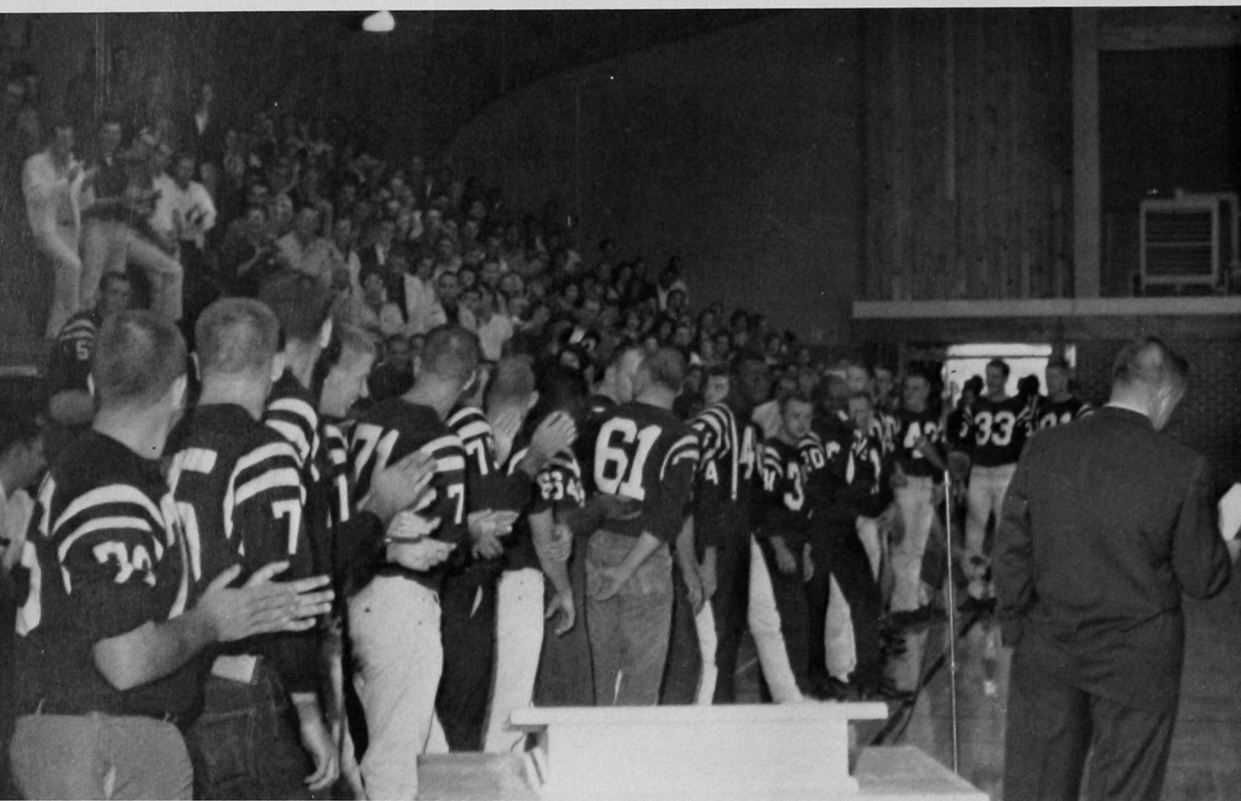

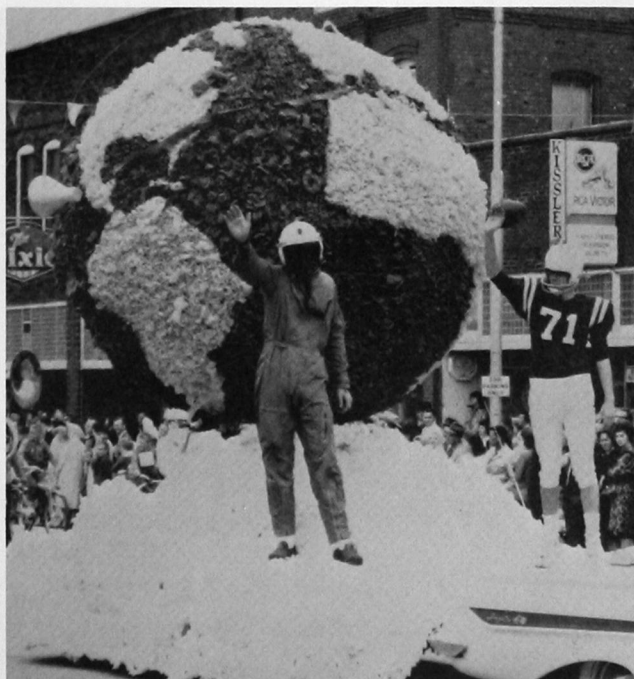

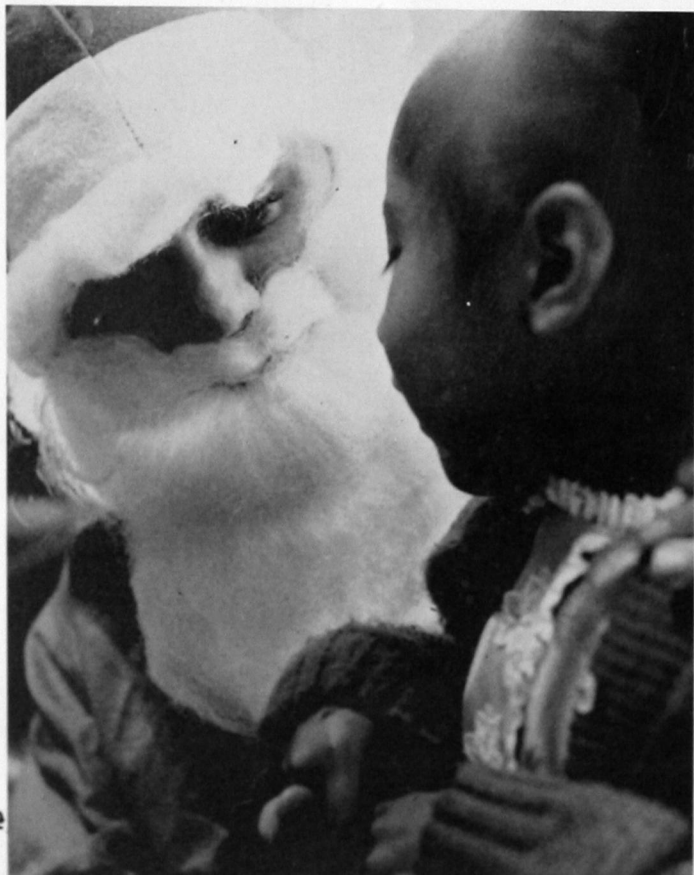

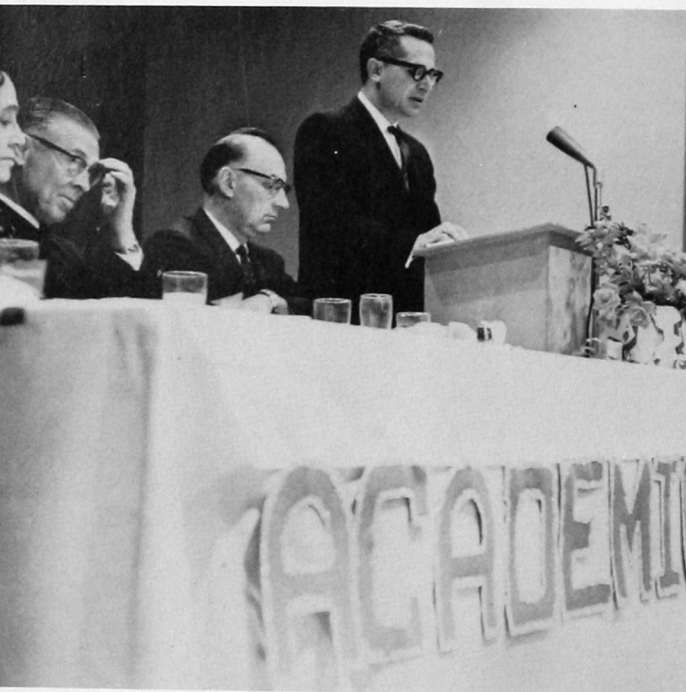

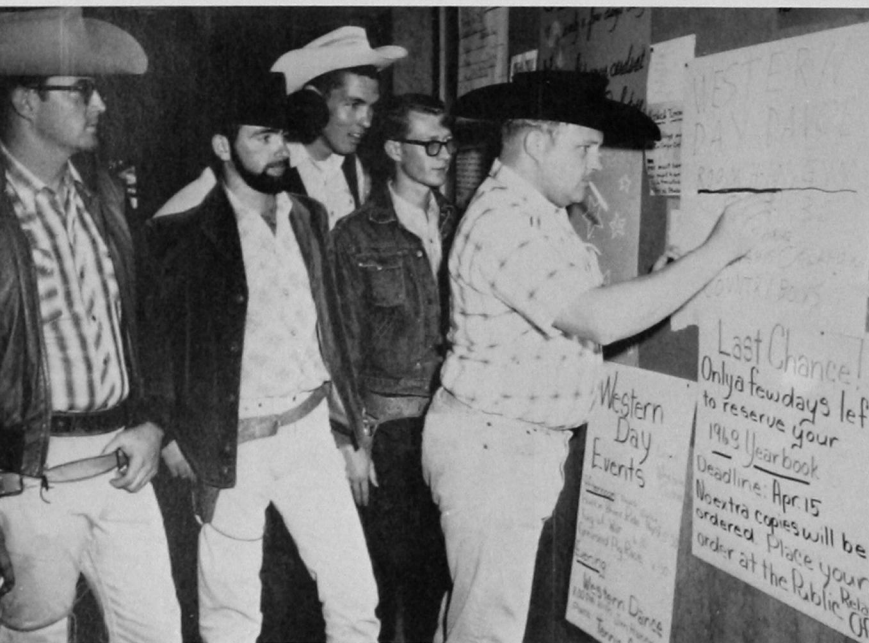

Perfect Ending for the 1963 Homecoming

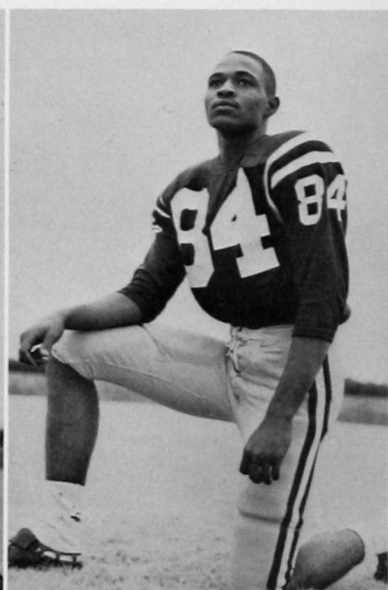
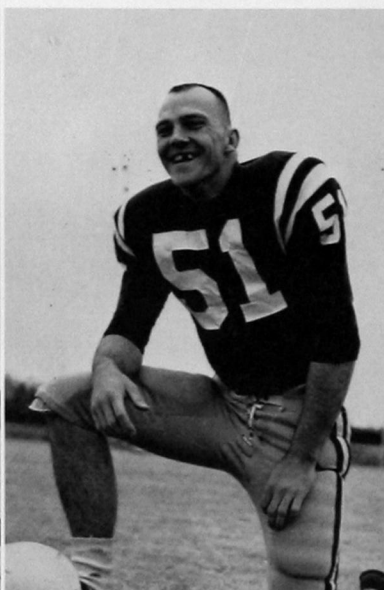
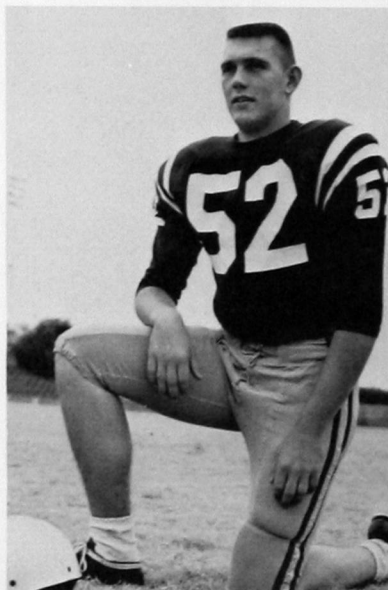

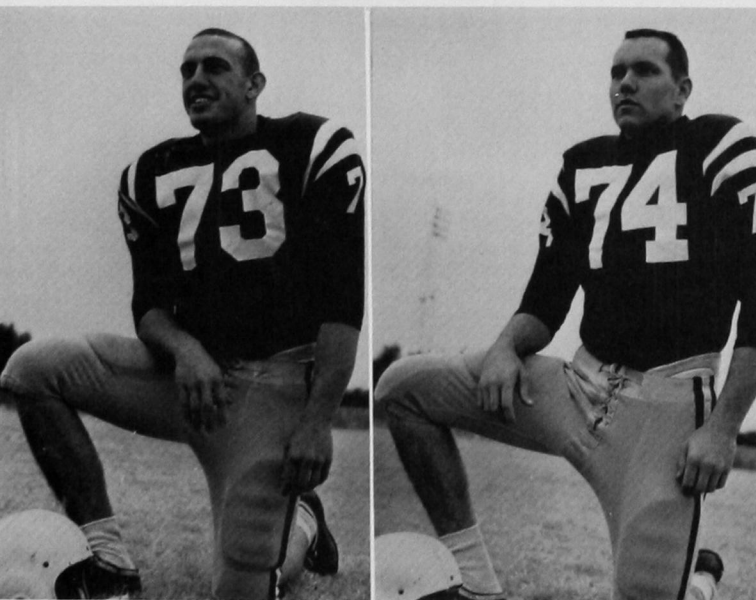


Aggies Battered, 28-7

The Season Ends

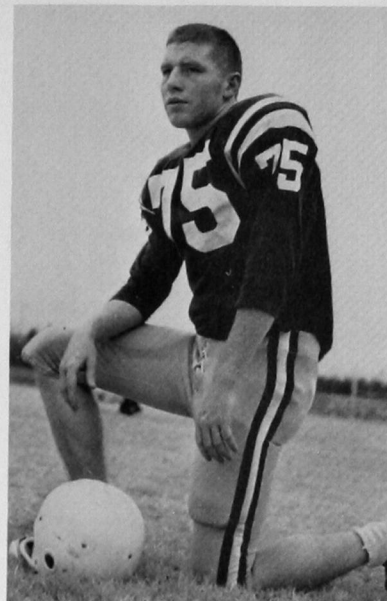

A number of freshmen and sophomores came along during the long campaign. With Jones and Abercrombie both due great senior seasons, the outlook for 1964 is encouraging.



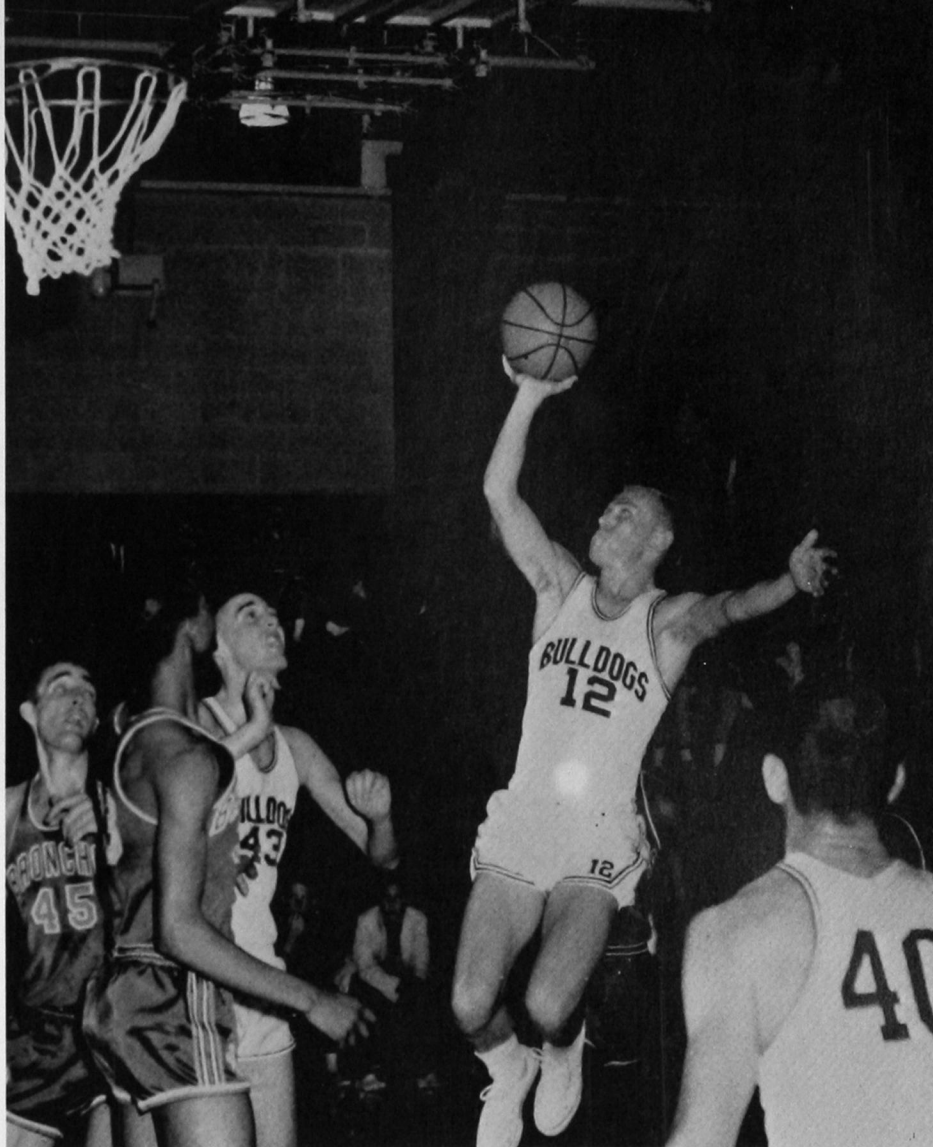

Sophomore Club Has Big Season

With the most inexperienced club in years (the Bulldogs had only two seniors on their roster), Southwestern came up with a colorful club dominated by sophomores that narrowly missed tying the Western Division champions, Phillips, and a chance to regain the Oklahoma Collegiate Conference title last held in 1958.

Rankin Williams, dean of Oklahoma college coaches, whose teams have won more baseball crowns than all the other conference coaches combined, began the season with only one veteran pitcher, sophomore Bill Funkhauser. A talented corps of sophomores and freshmen made Southwestern's hurling staff the surprise of the season.

After dropping five of their first six games against Sul Ross State and Texas Tech, two Lone Star powers, the Bulldogs rebounded to end the season with a 20-12 over-all record, 8-4 in the conference. 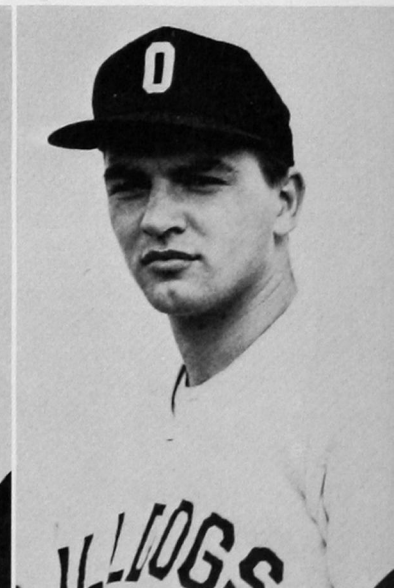
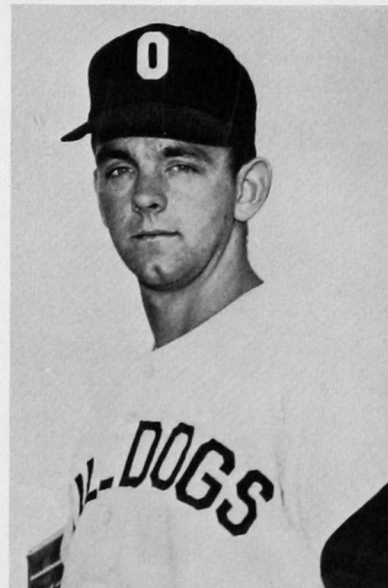
Two extra-inning victories were among the highlights of the Bulldog home schedule.

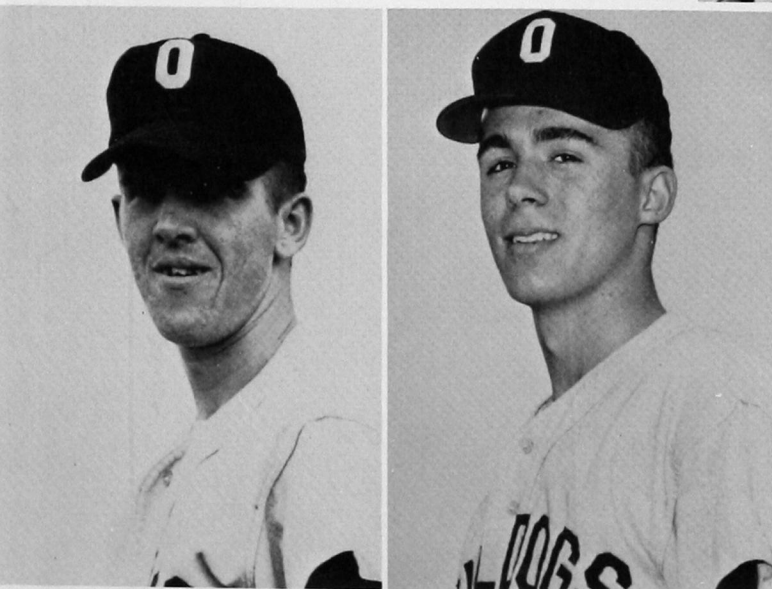

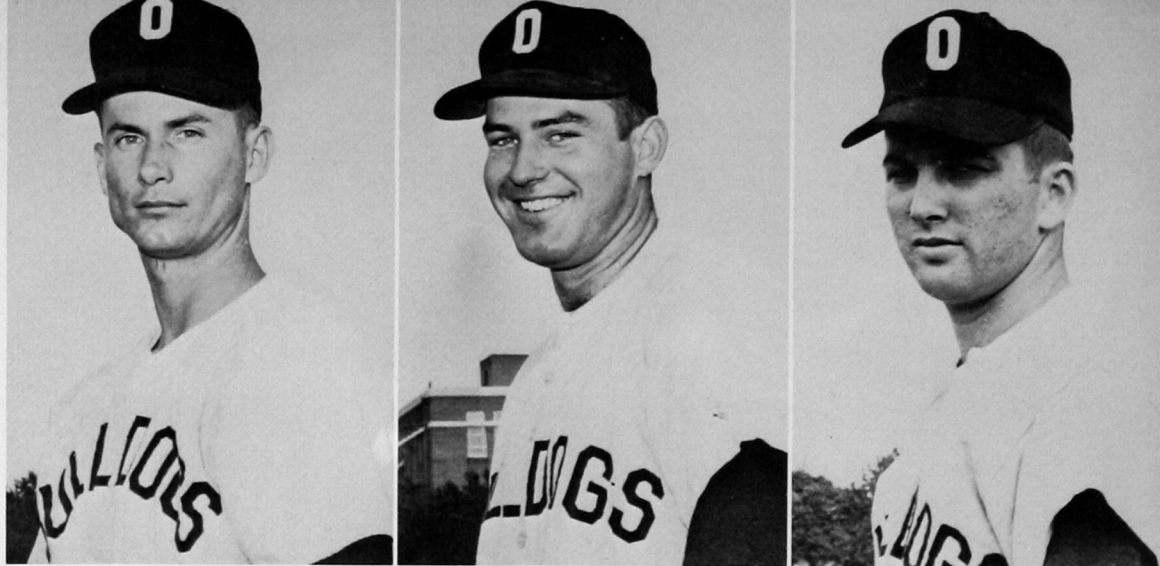

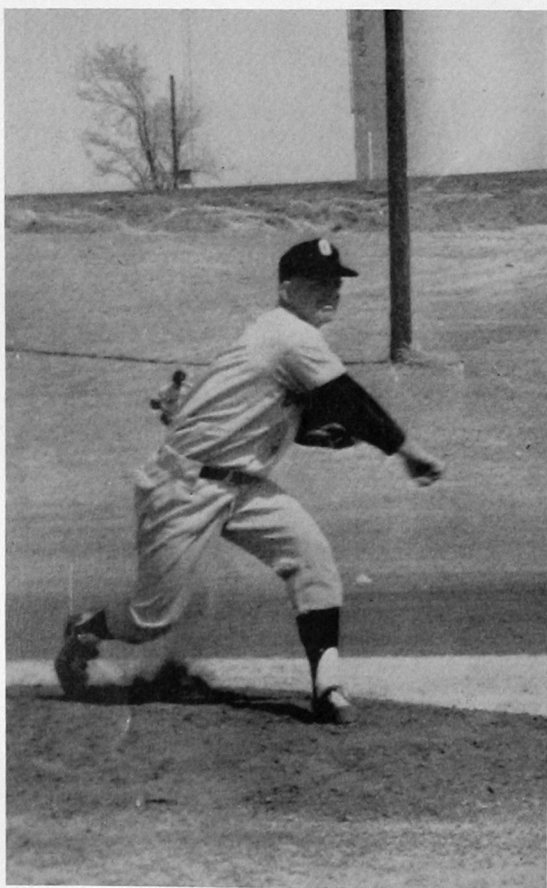


Suiter Leads Hitters

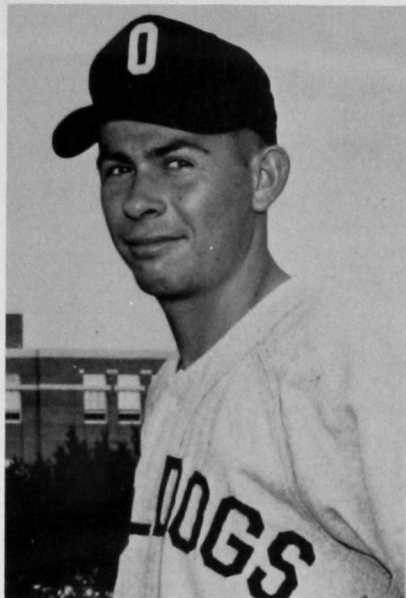

For the third consecutive year the chapter teamed up with the Delta Zetas to win the college follies trophy, retiring it permanently.

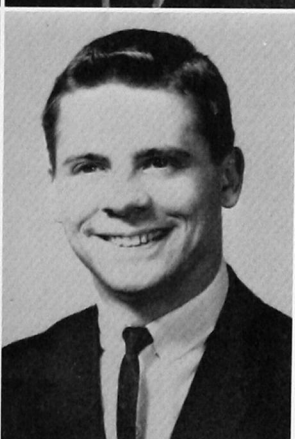
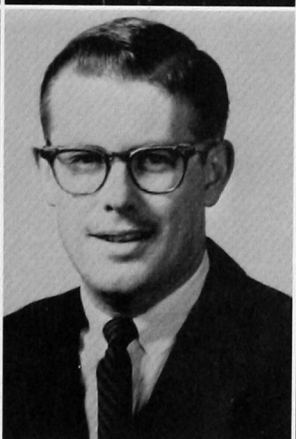
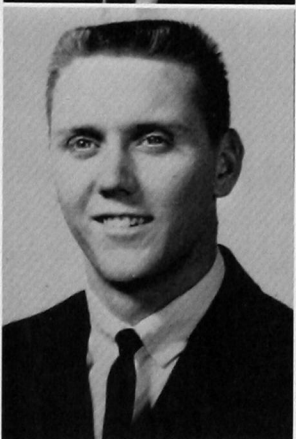
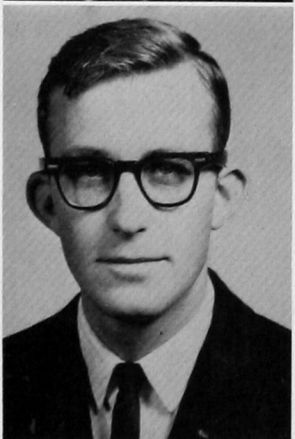
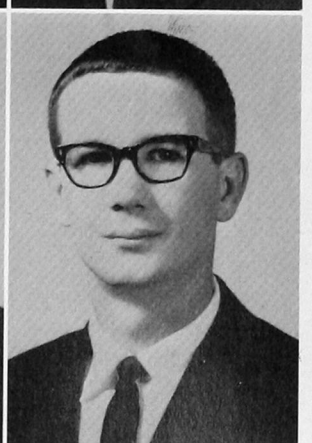
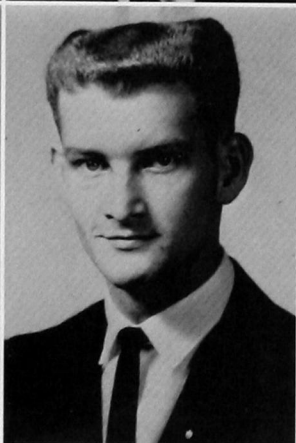
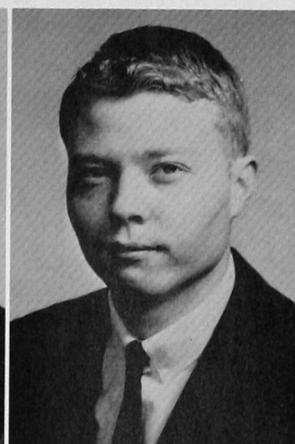
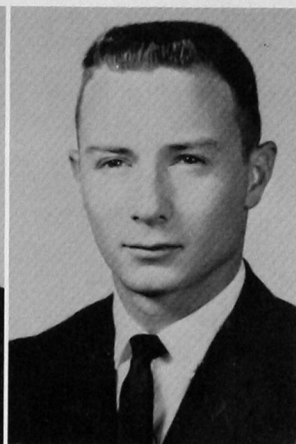
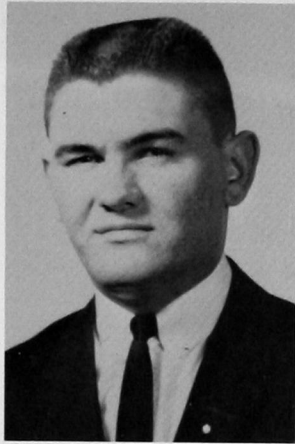
