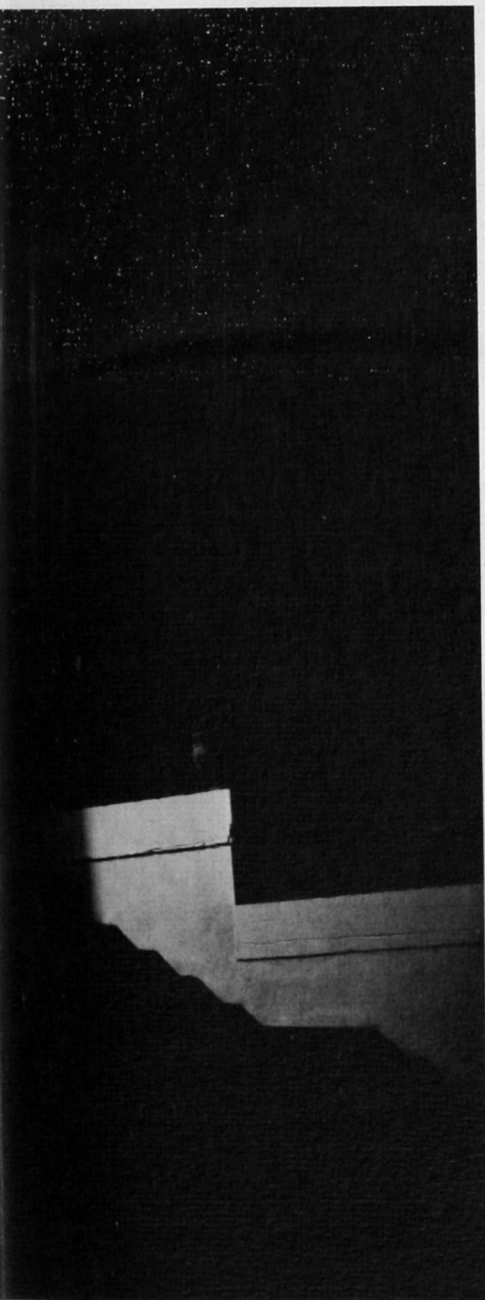




A Place of Many Moods....

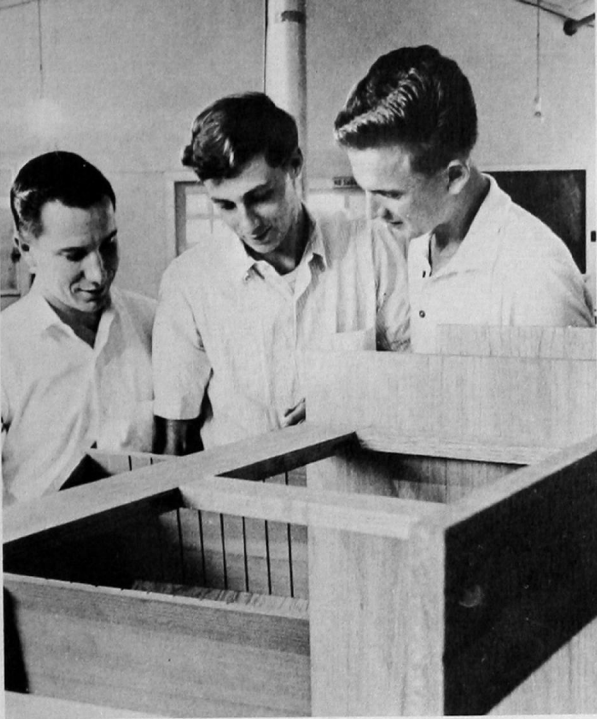
Classroom Study Supplemented

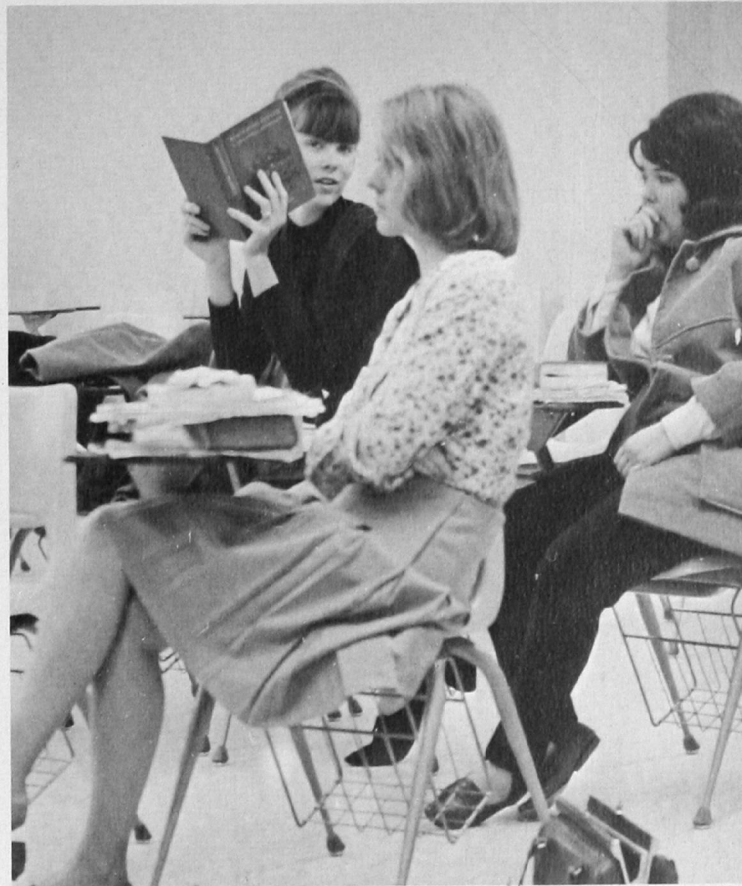
These may vary from a writing lab or art project to a special language laboratory. Field trips often provide additional help for fuller understanding, whether the area of study be science or sociology.

Student Center Dominates



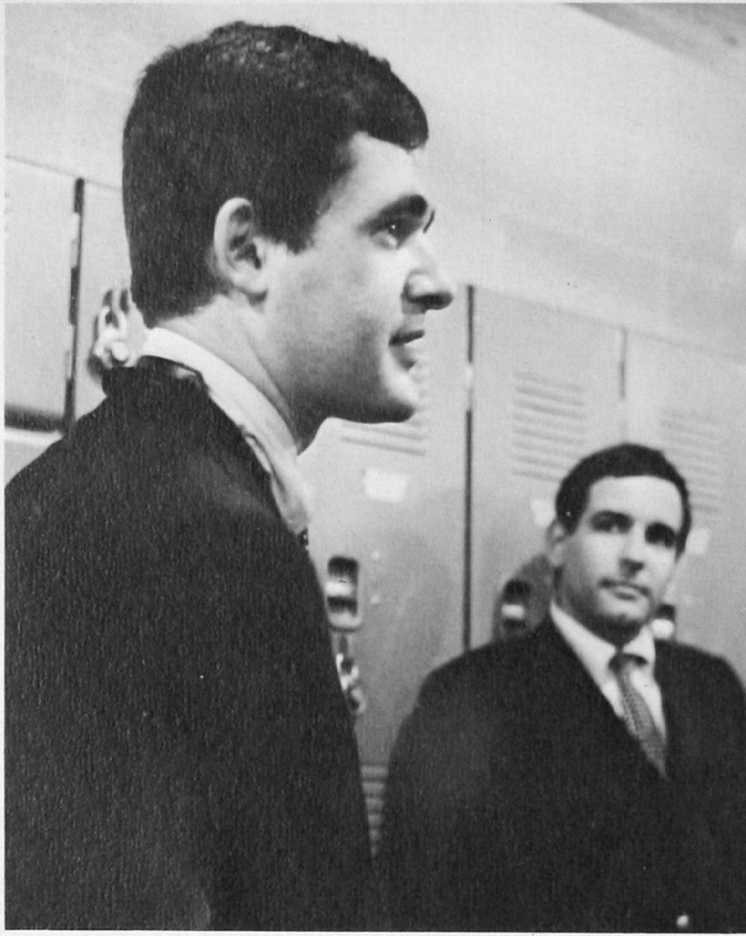

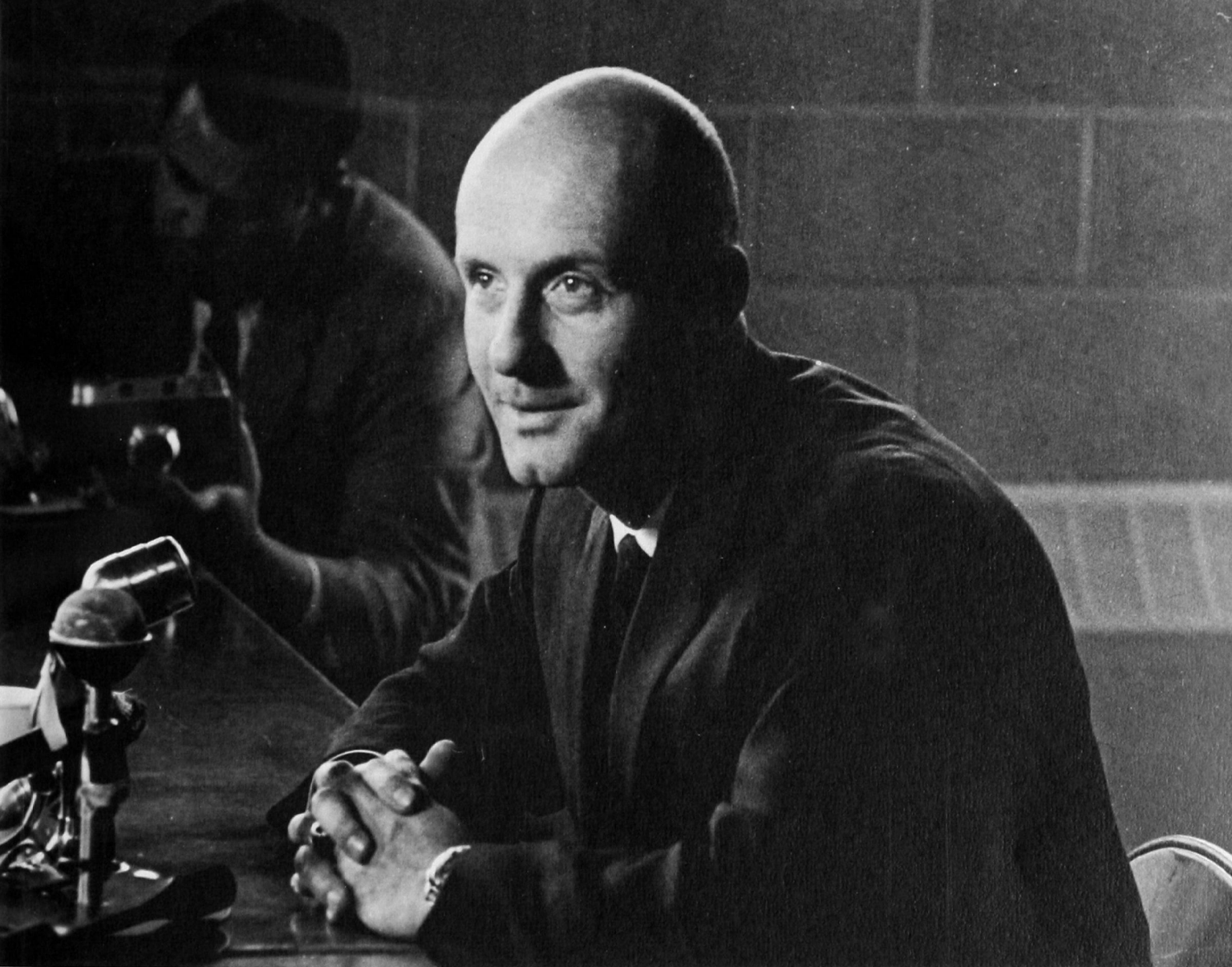

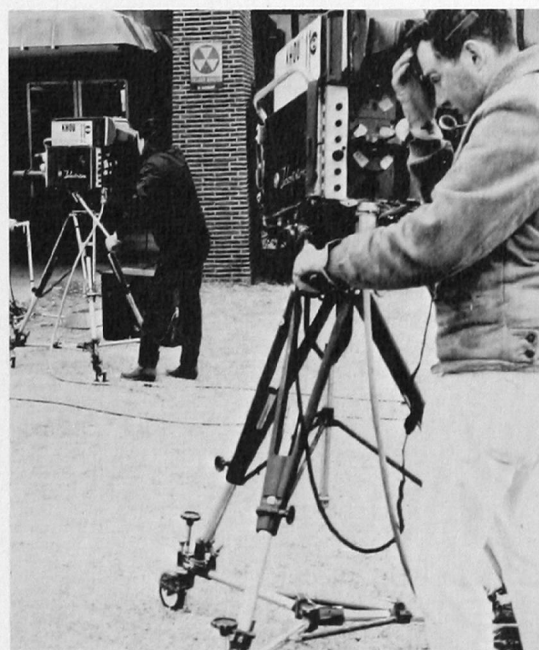

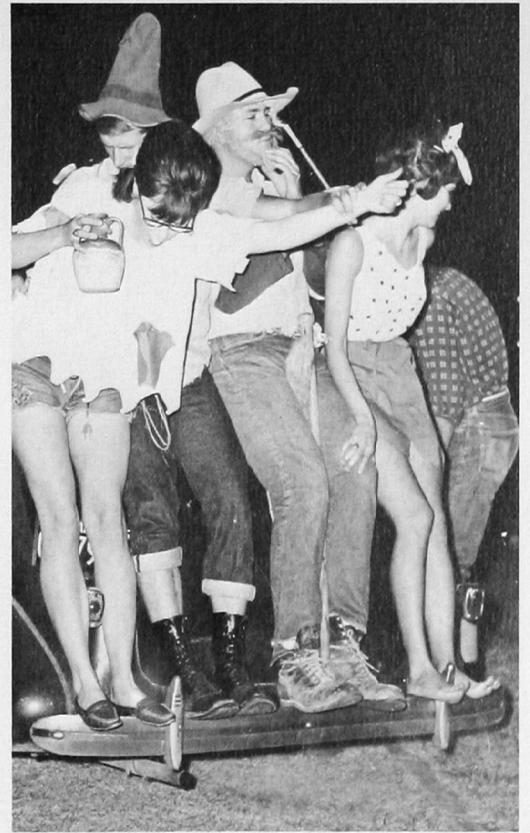

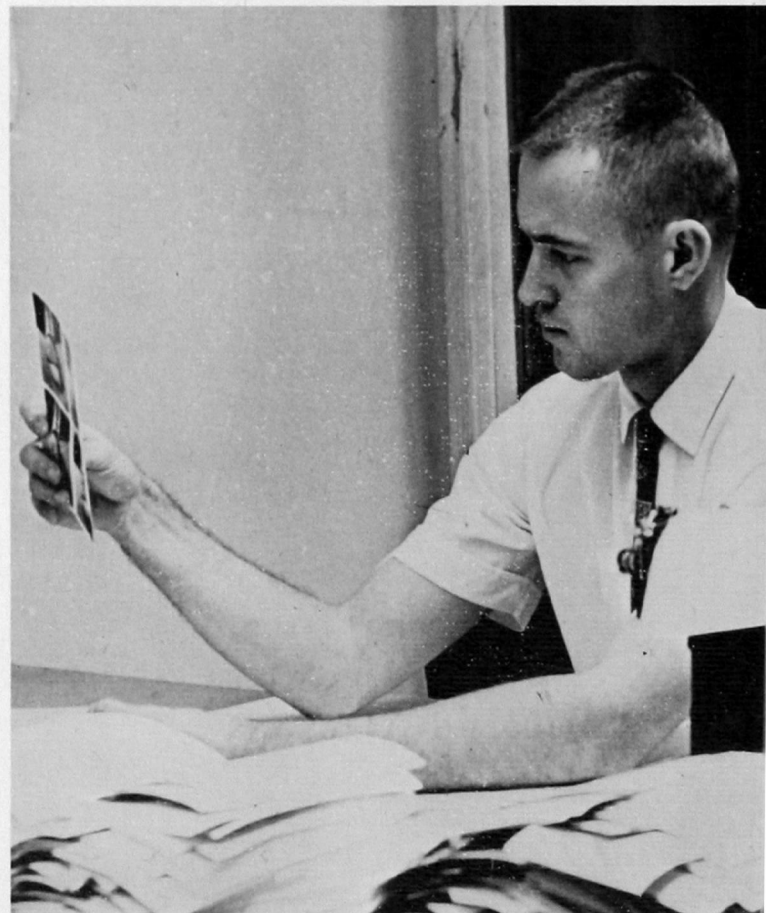

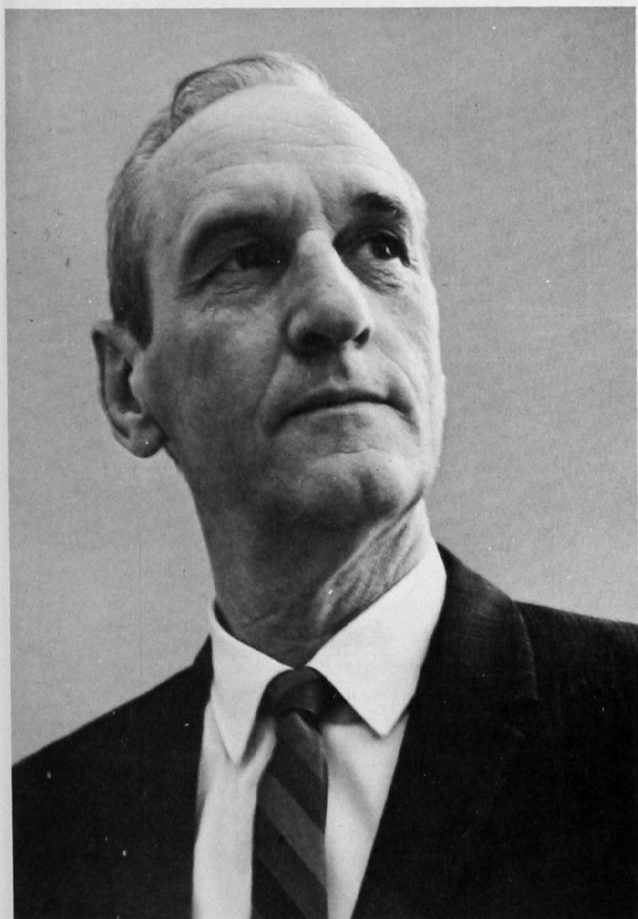
President of Southwestern State College

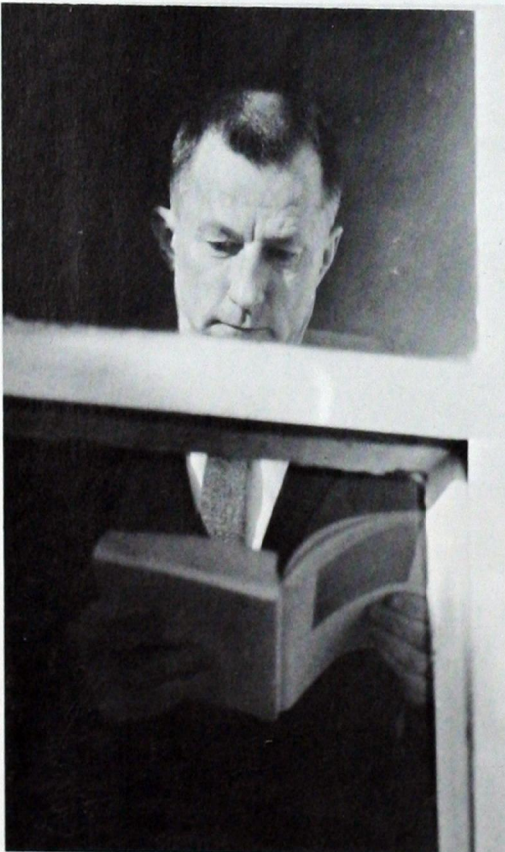

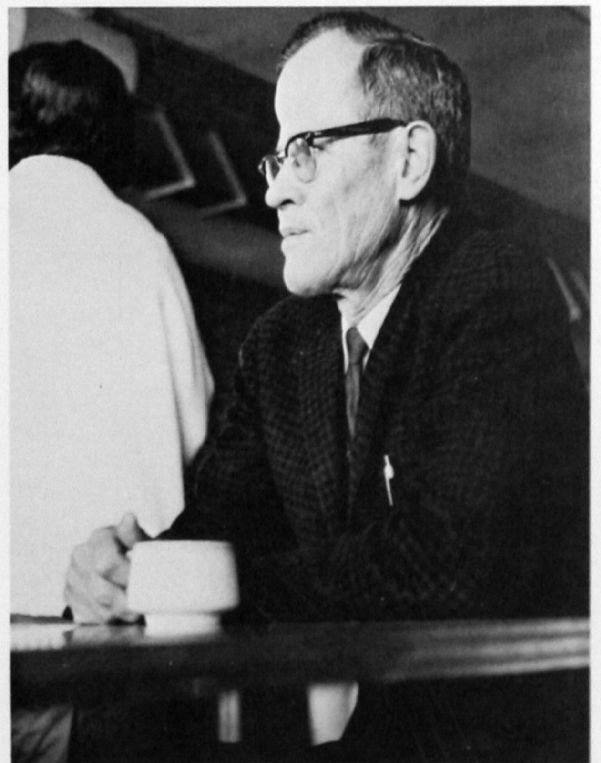

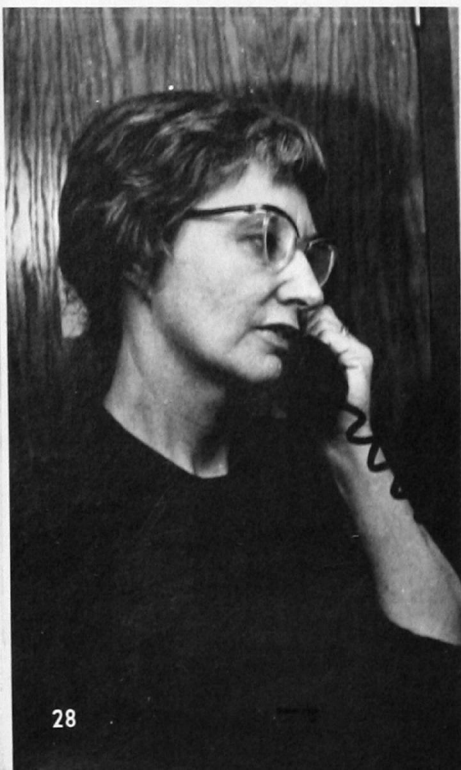

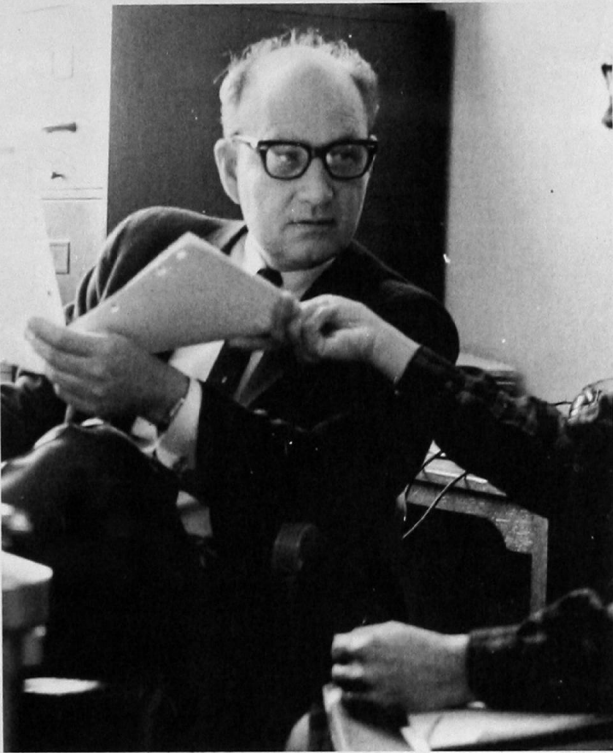

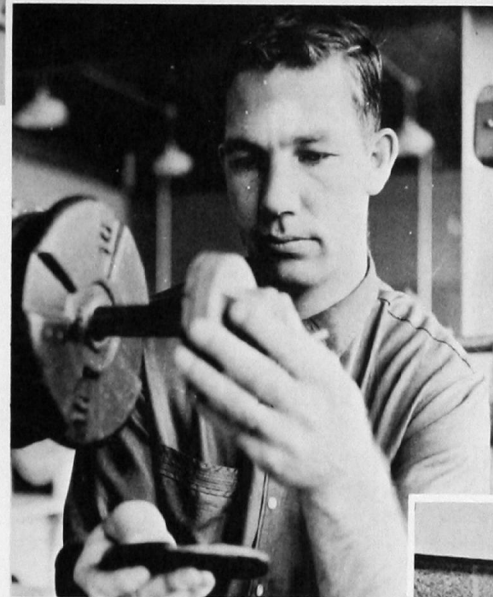

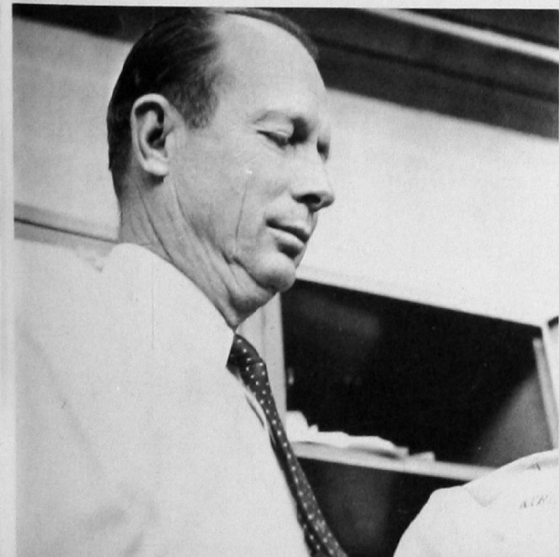

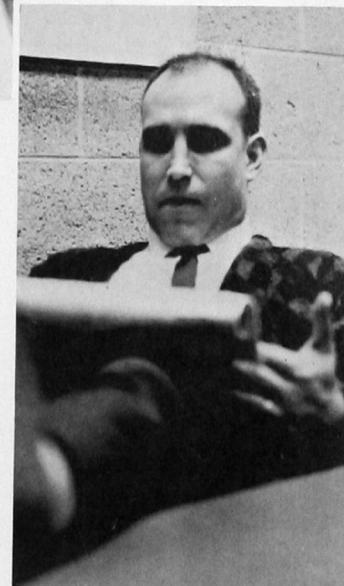

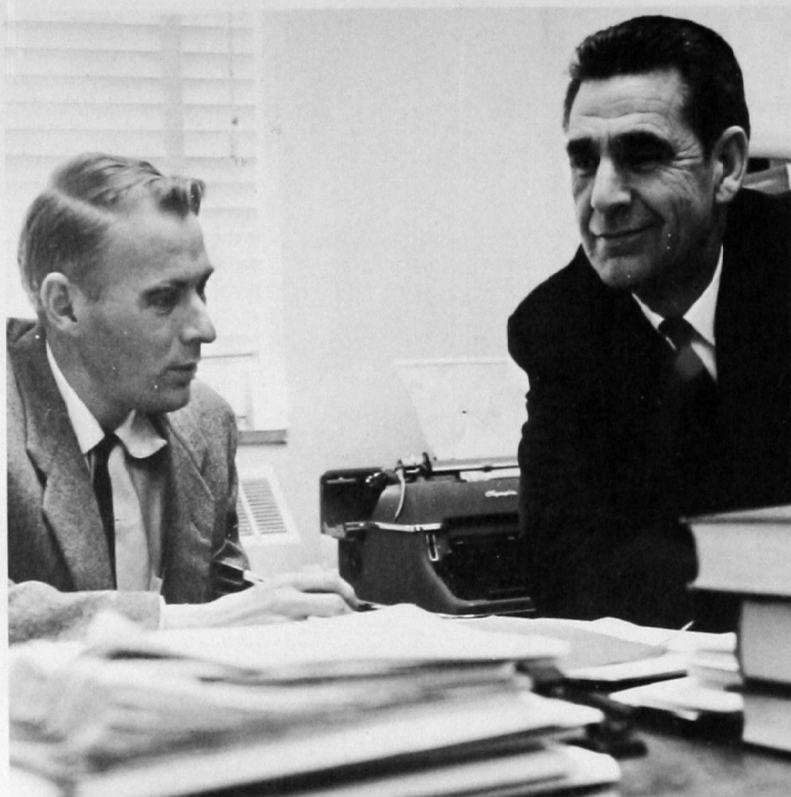

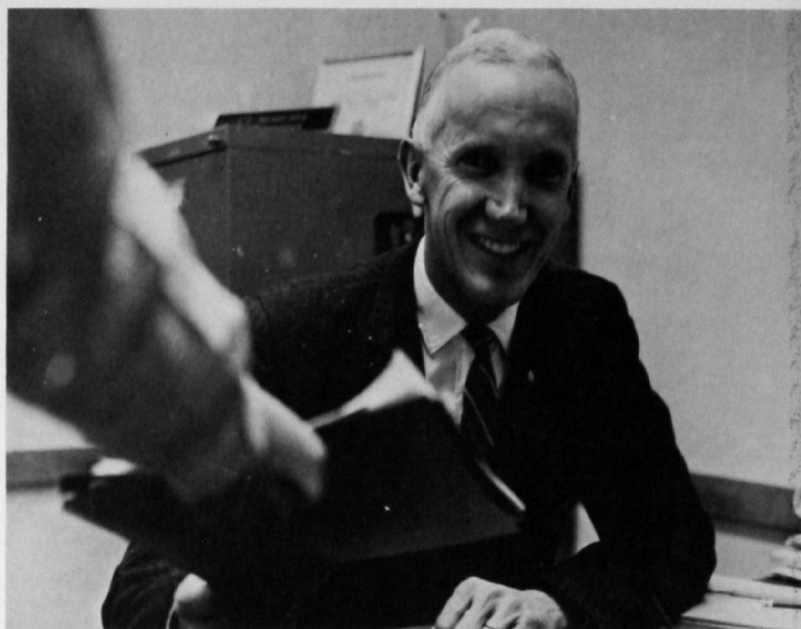

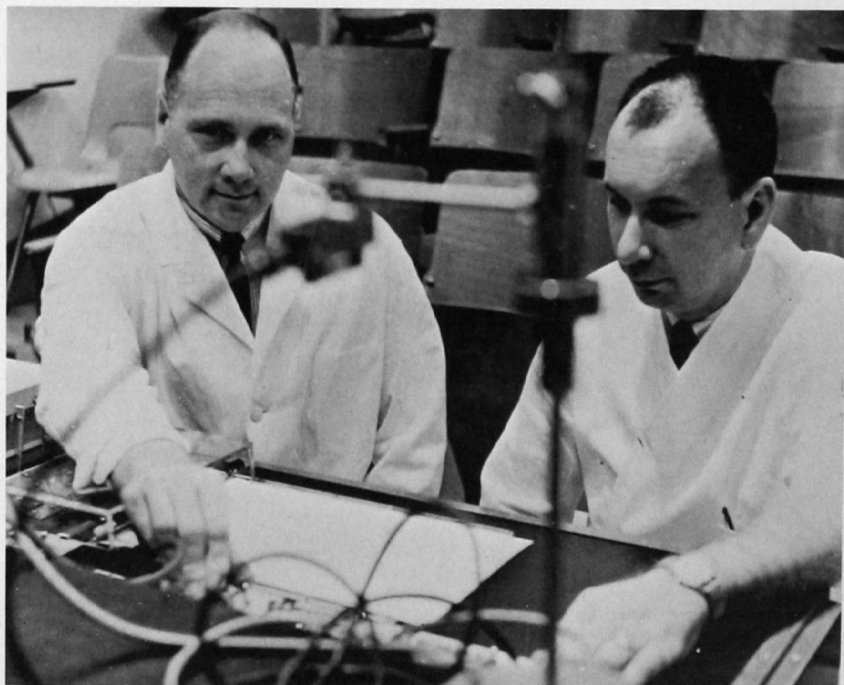

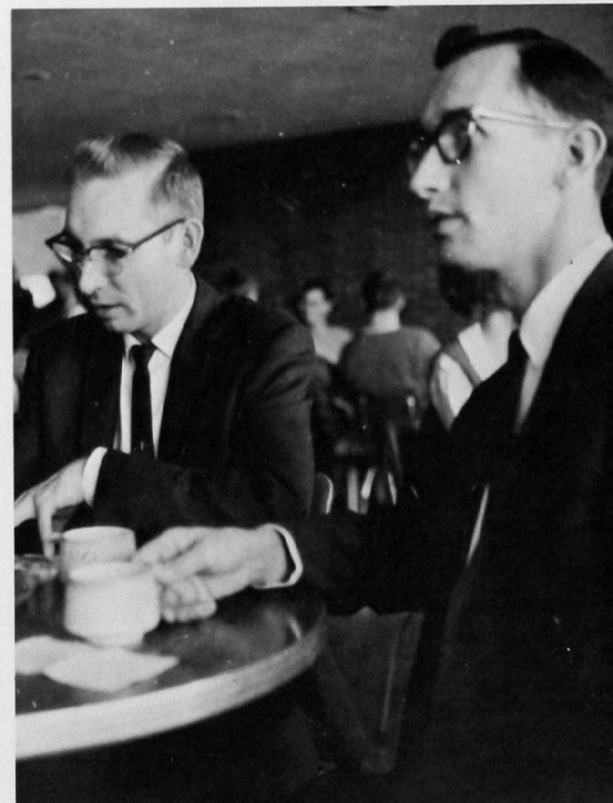

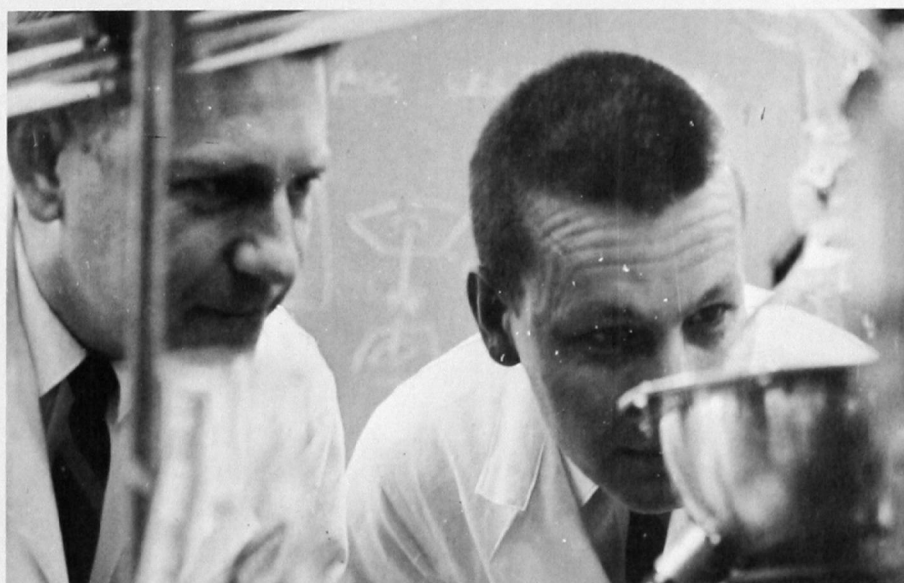

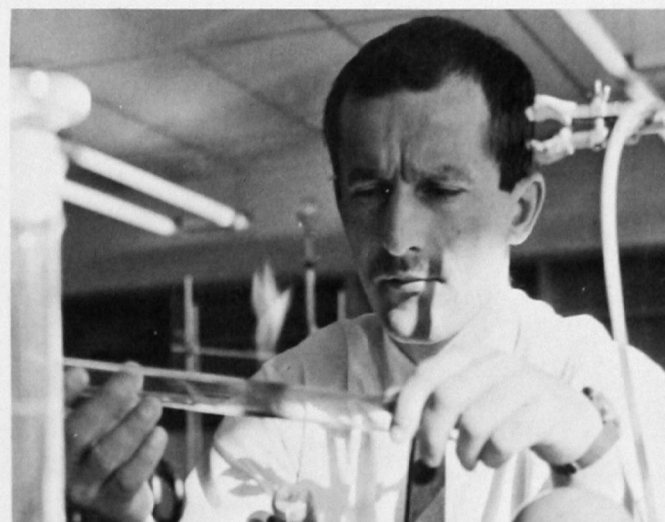

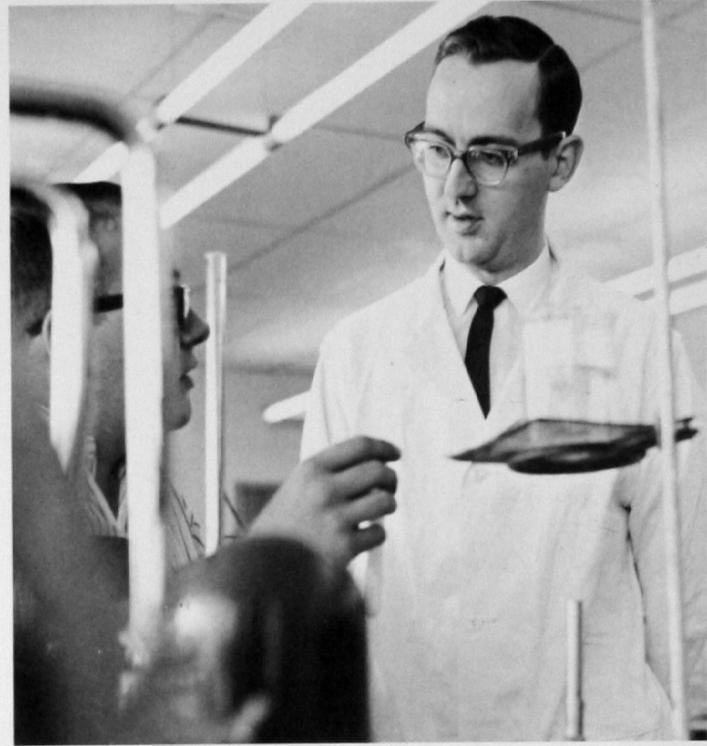

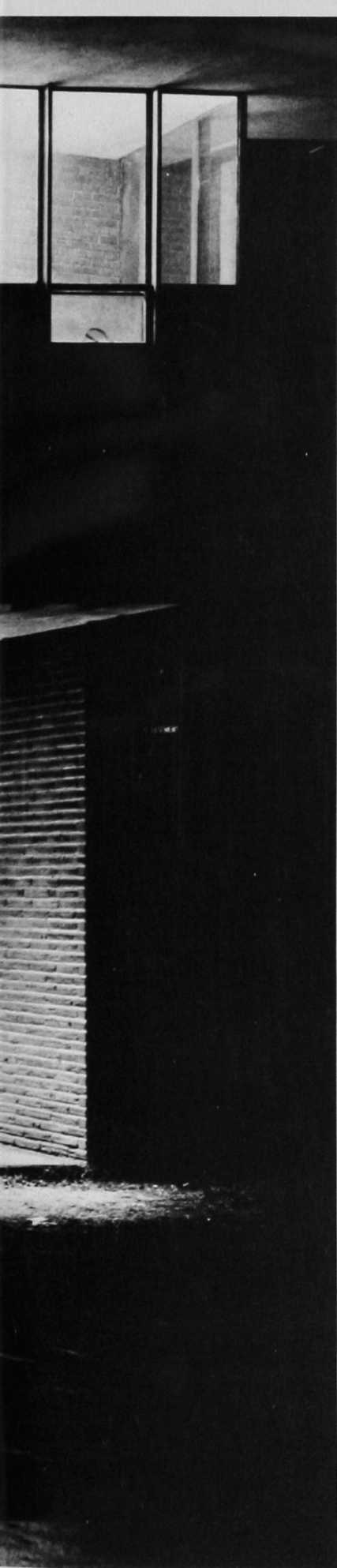

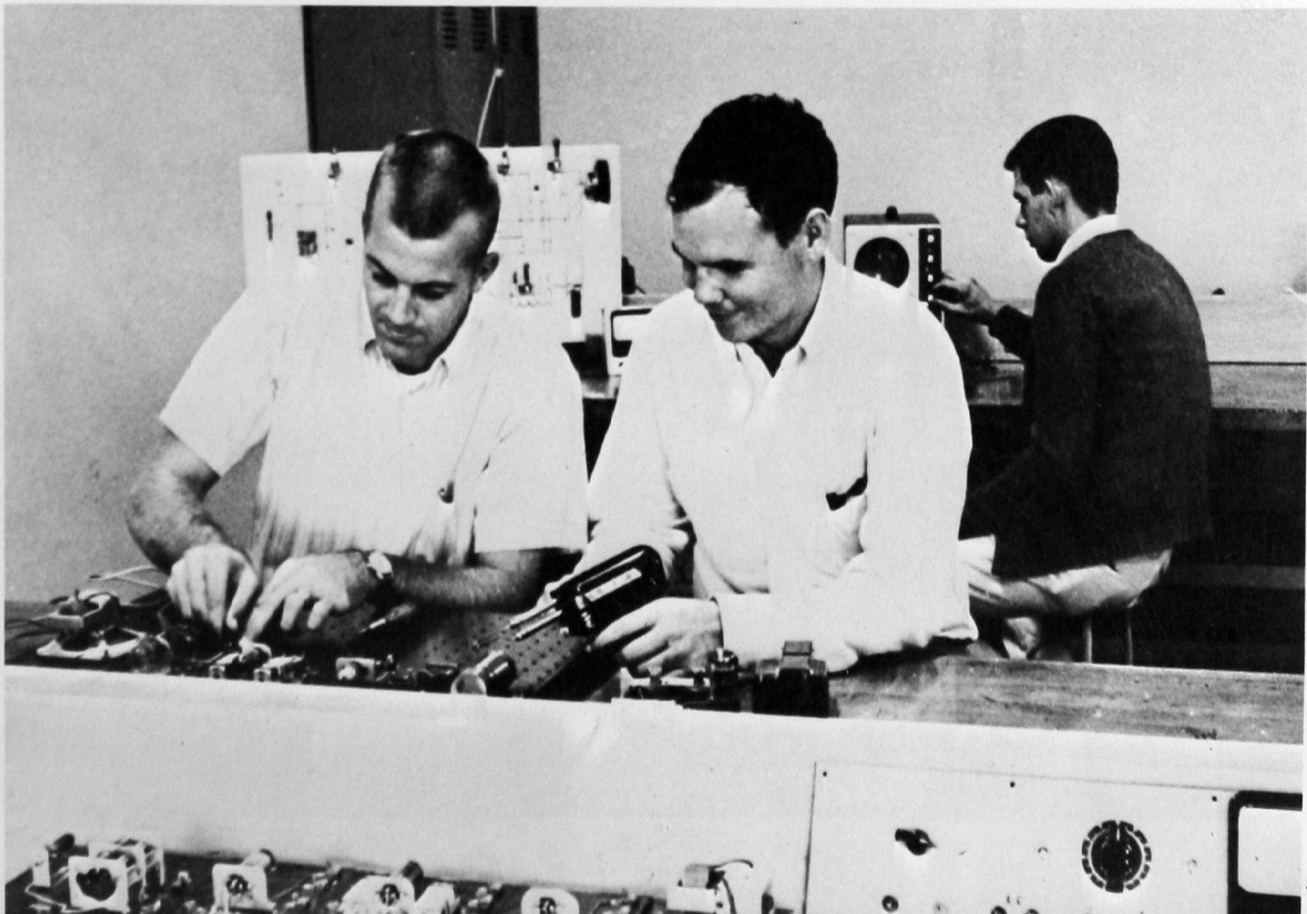

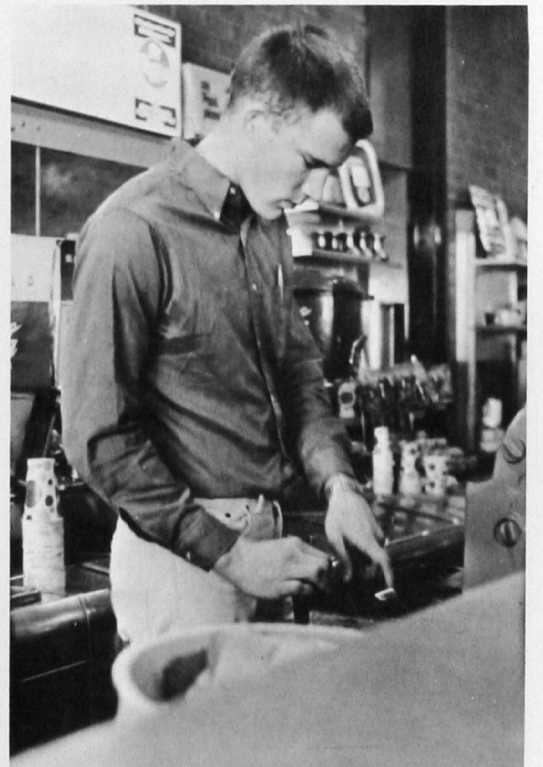

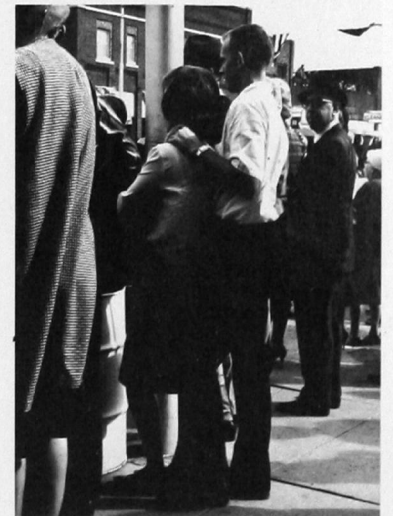

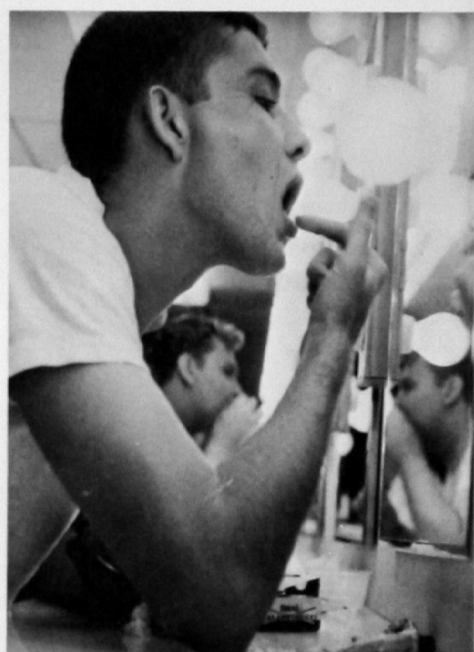

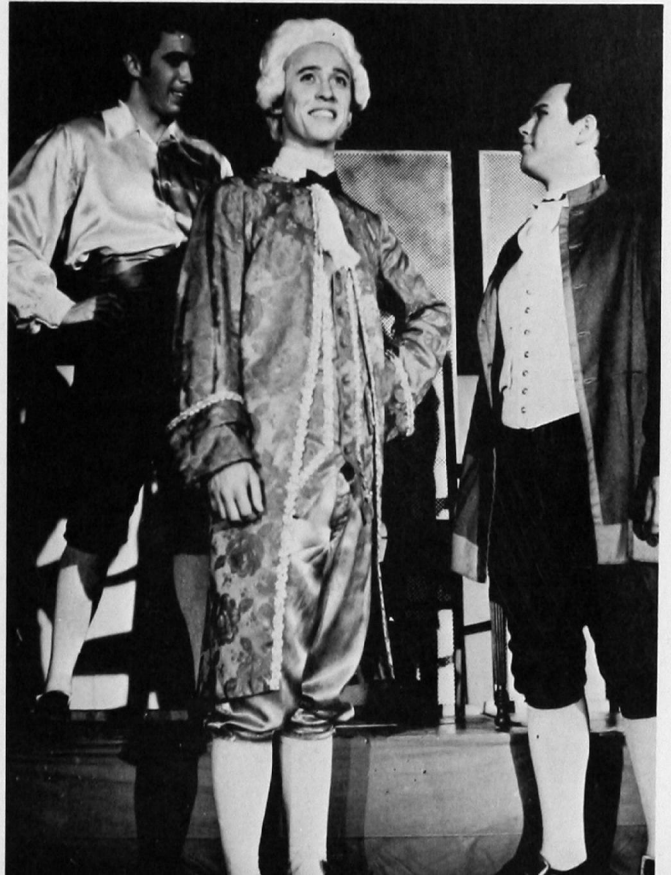
The purpose of the workshop was to give students a variety of experiences, and they received just that by not only performing but also doubling as the backstage crew.

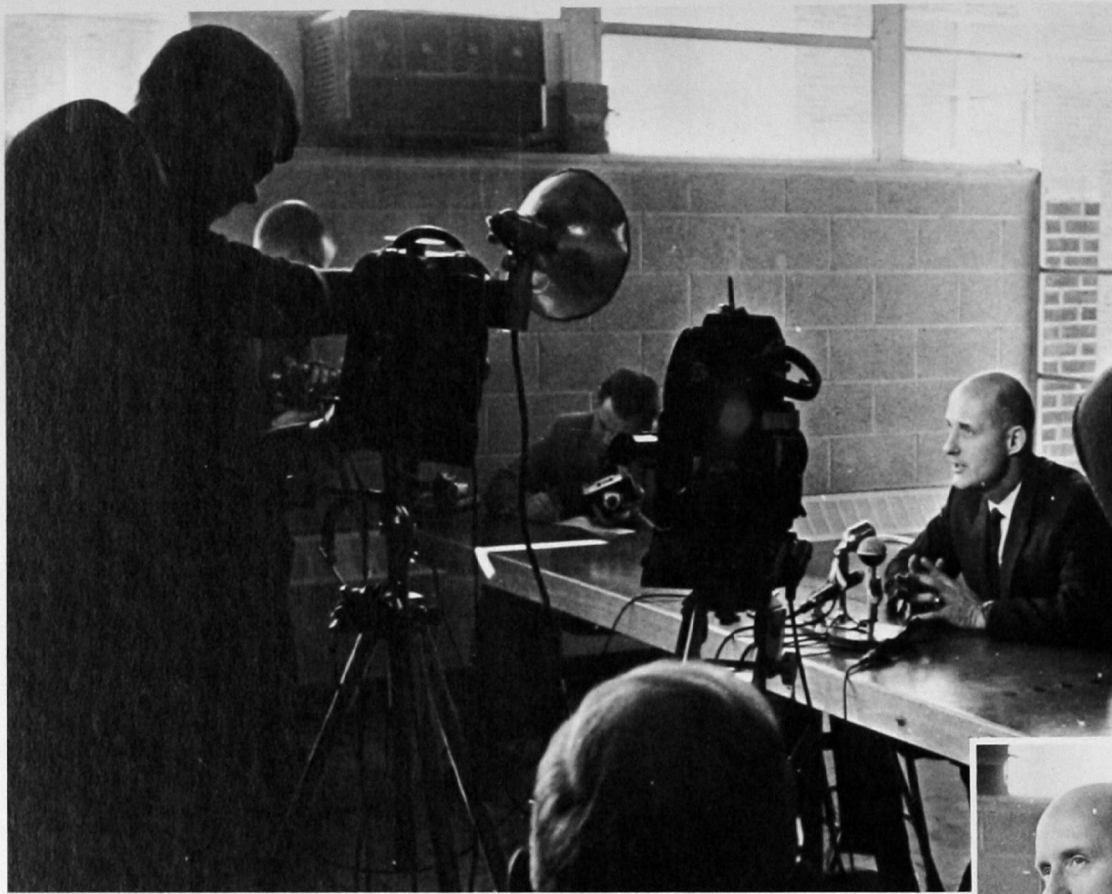

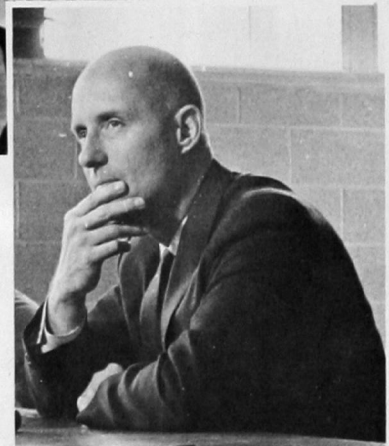

For those who aren't quite ready to strike out into the world there's always student teaching and preparation for that final semester at good old Southwestern.



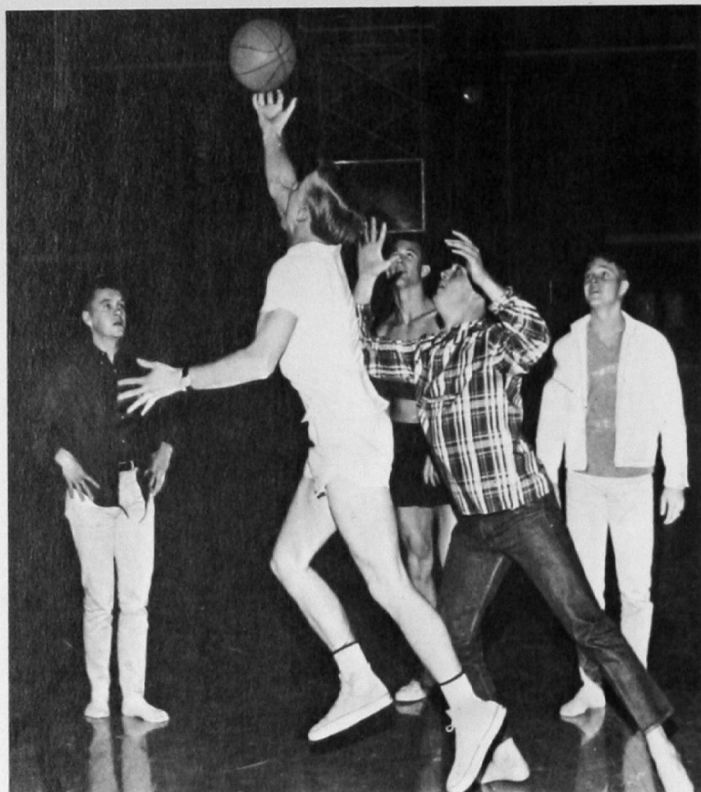

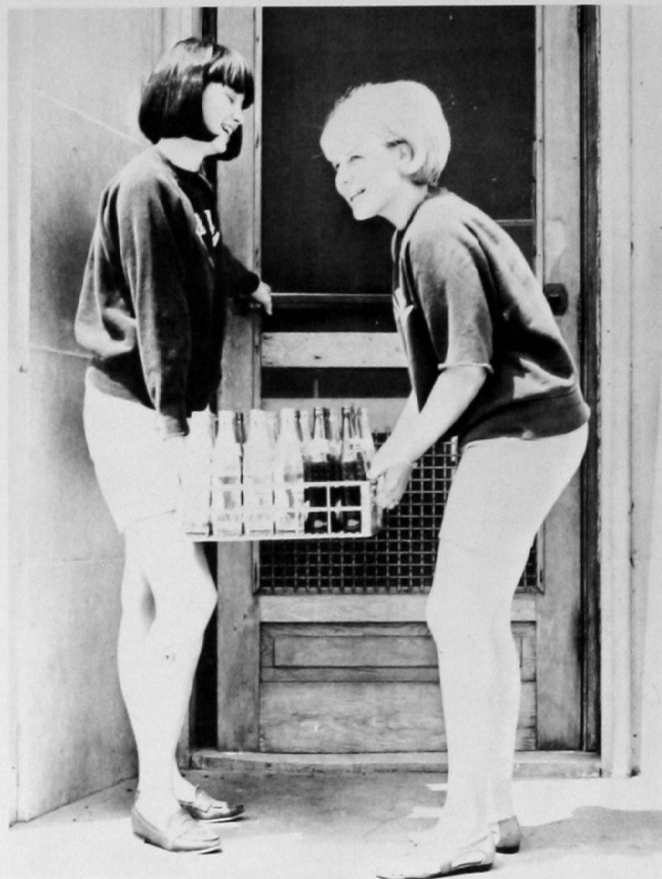

Hard work and the natural comic natures of some of their members helped the Alpha Xi's win first place in the All-School Follies.



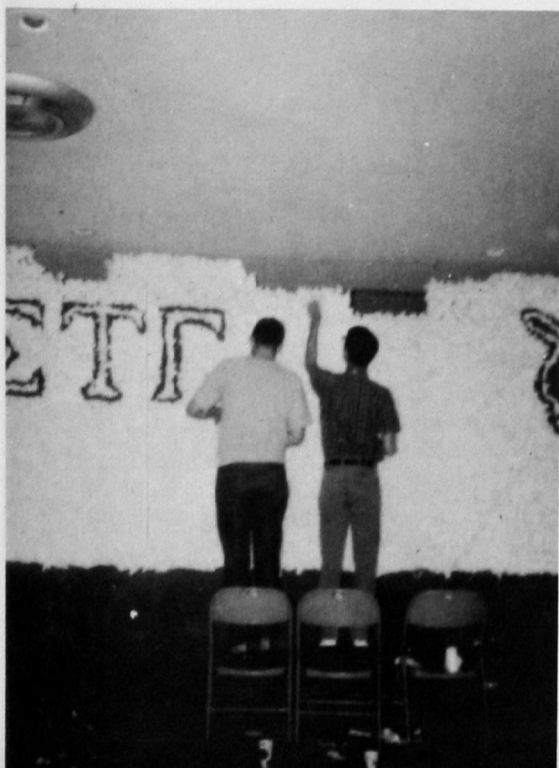

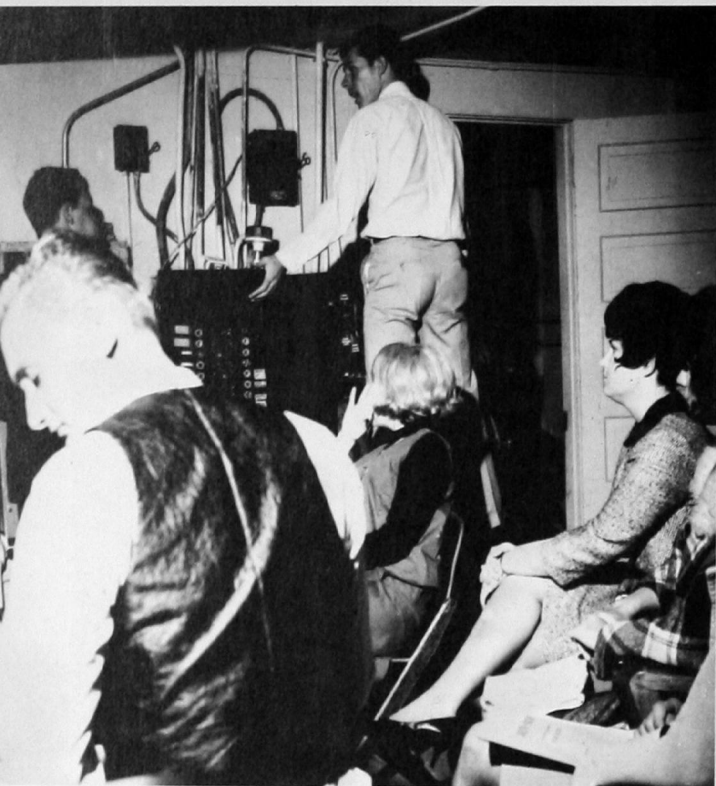

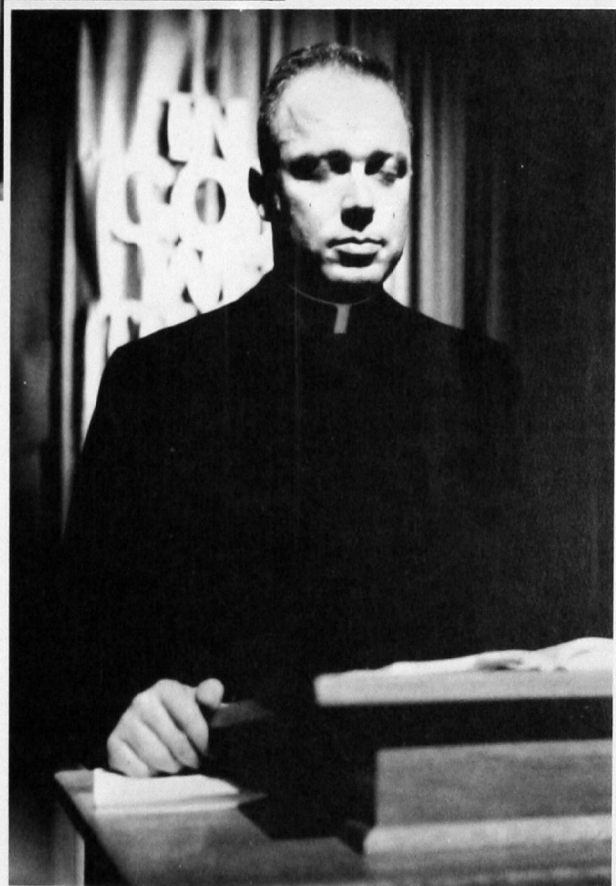

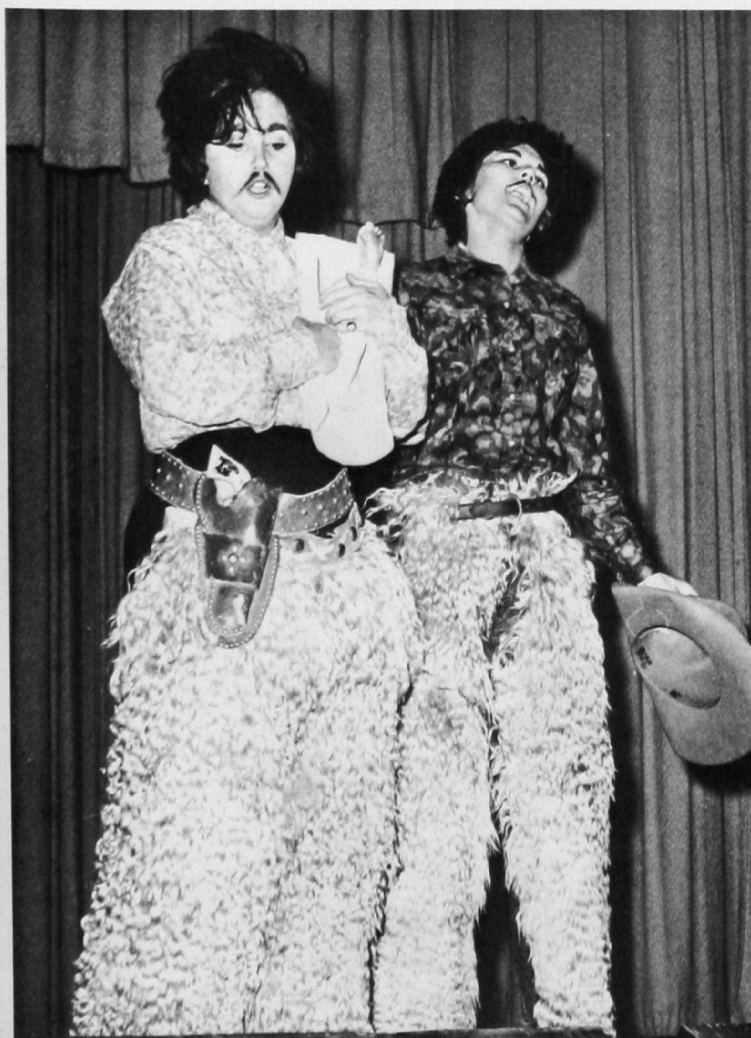

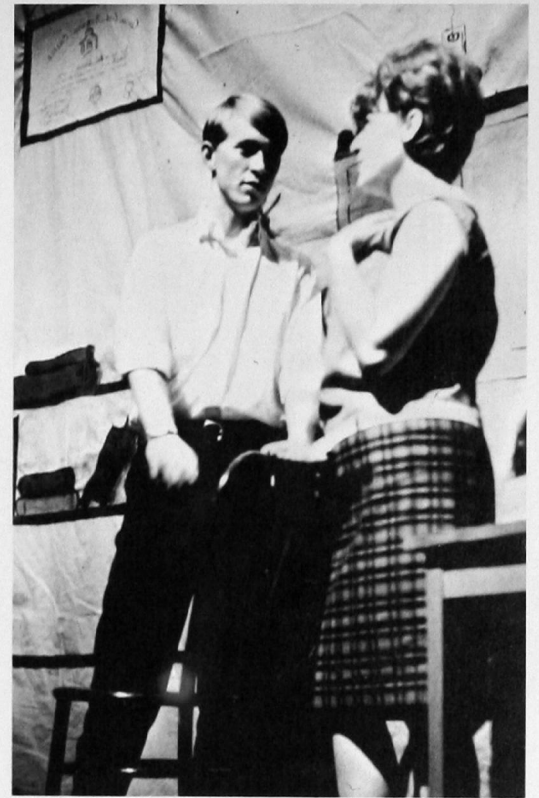

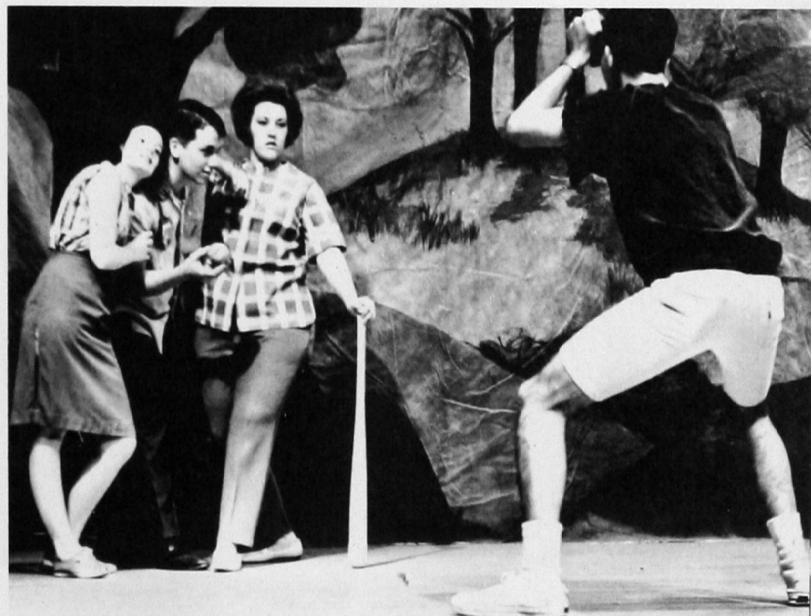
Sparks Fly In "Pajama Game"

With the added funds swelling its treasury the senate was able to sponsor not only the usual activities but also several unusual ones.

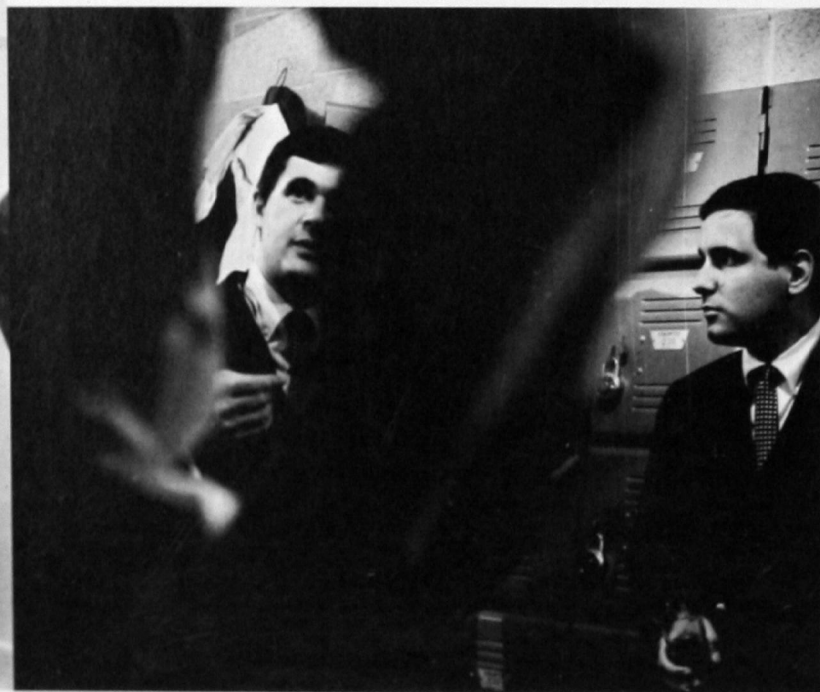
During the second semester the senate sponsored concerts by two big-name groups—The New Christy Minstrels and We Five.

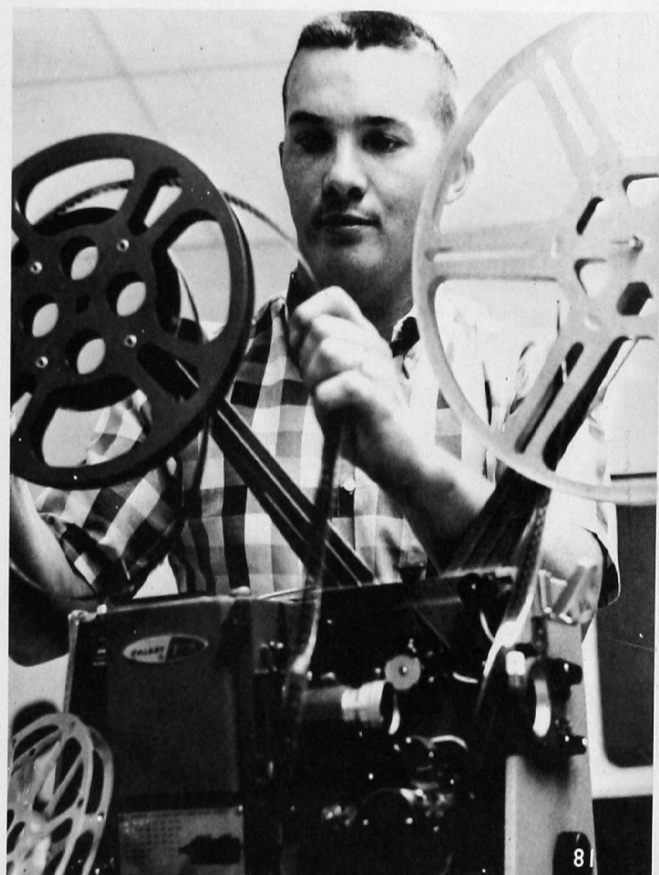

On May 11 students exercised their right to vote in the student senate election. For a week prior to voting day candidates campaigned vigorously.

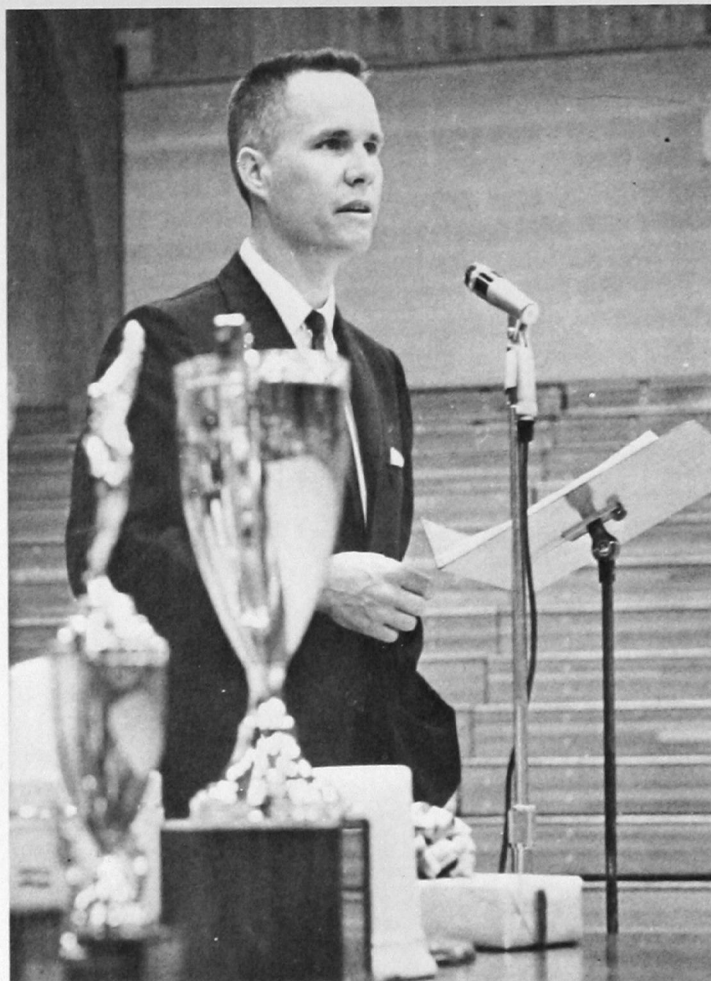
Women from the home economics club introduced a note of high fashion into campus life on May 20 when they presented the annual style show. They modeled clothes they had designed and made themselves.

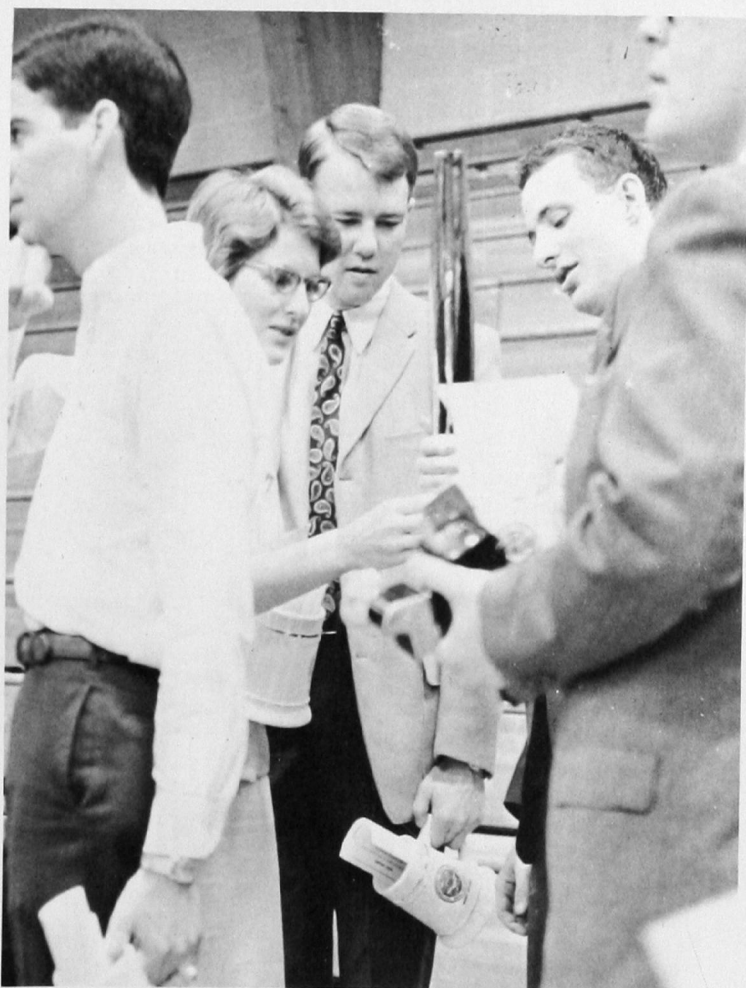

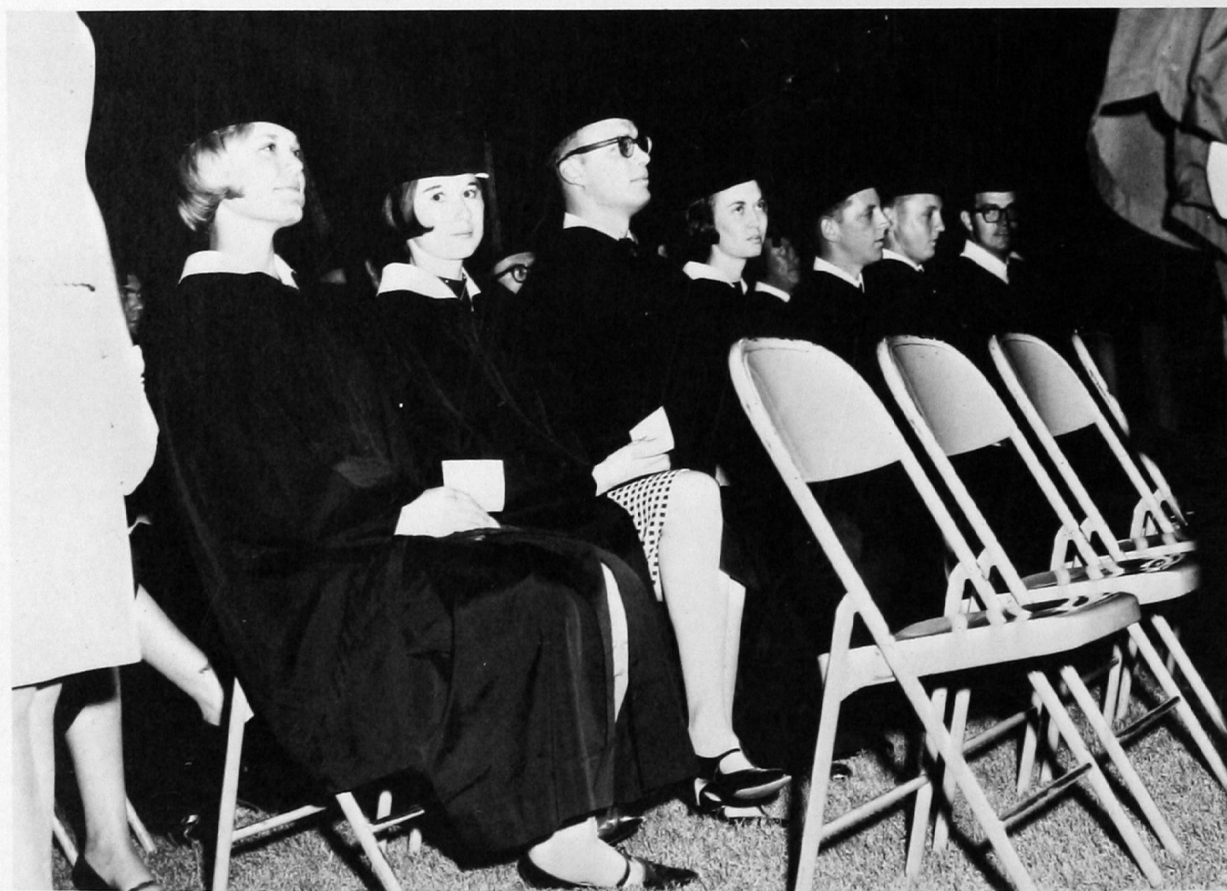
508 Graduate

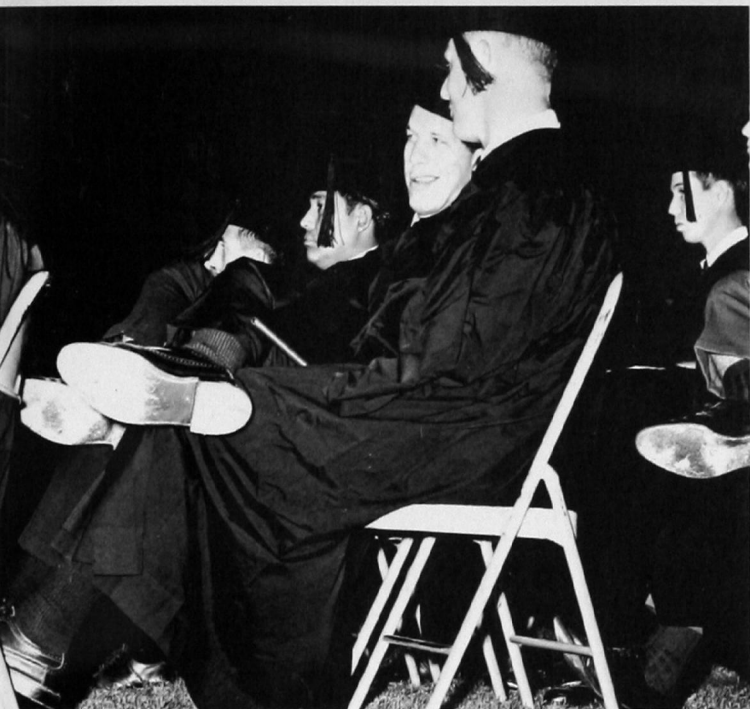
A record total of 508 candidates received degrees at Southwestern's 1966 spring commencement. The graduation exercises were held in Milam Stadium on May 27.

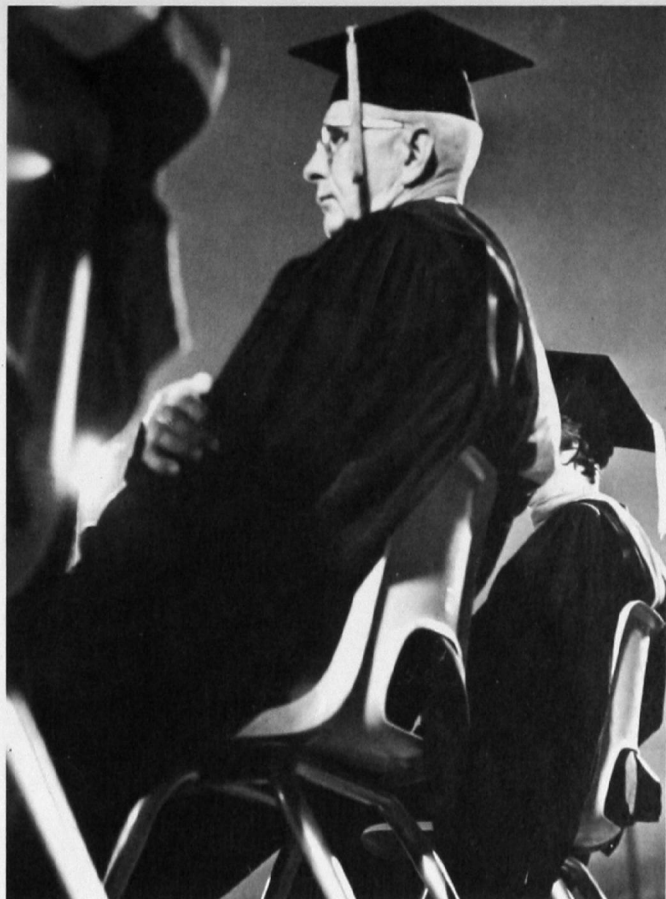

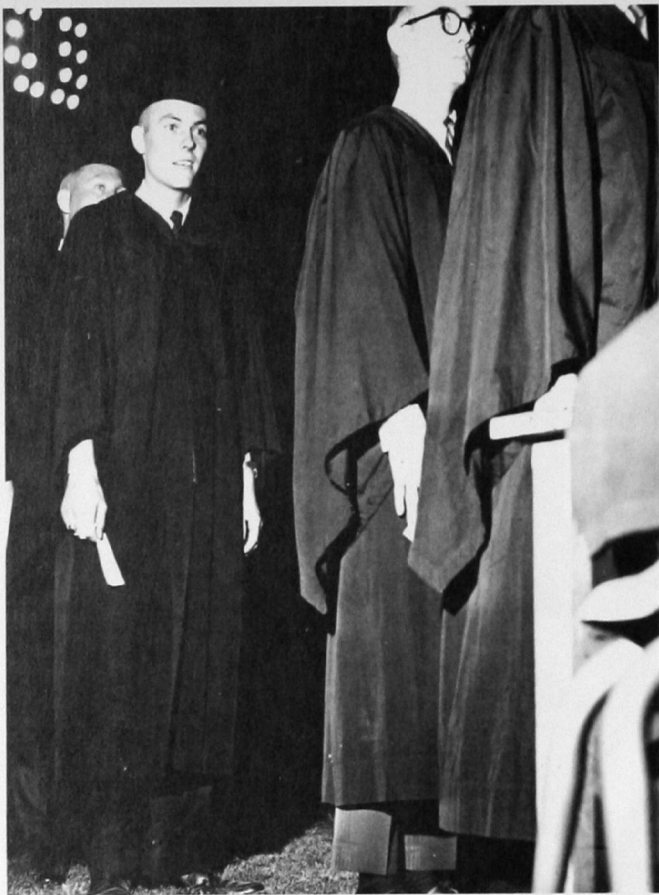

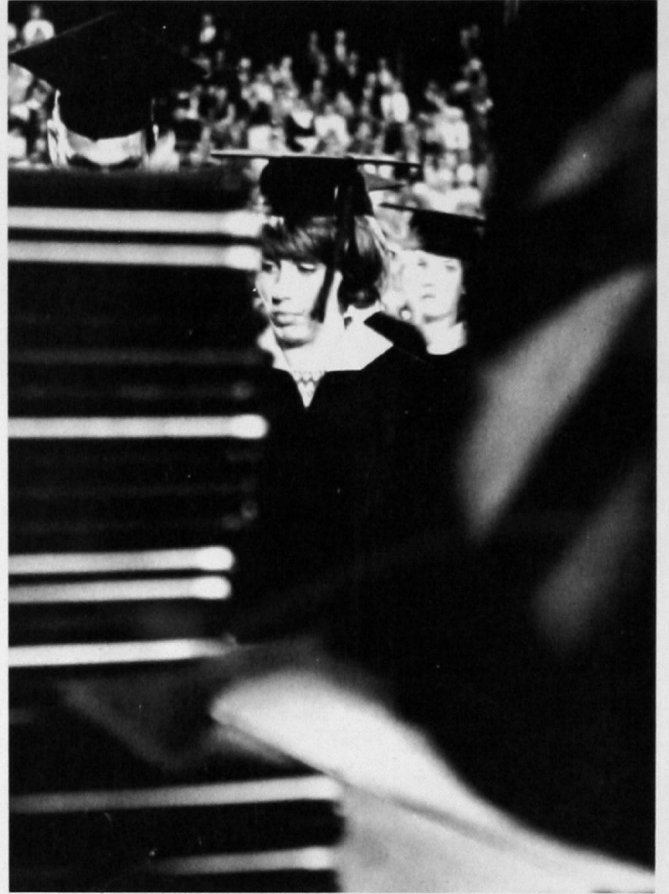

This Year's Season

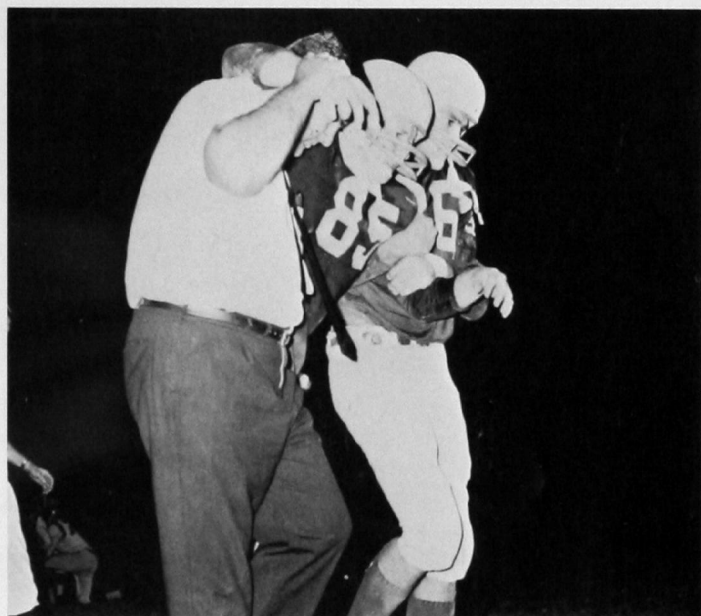

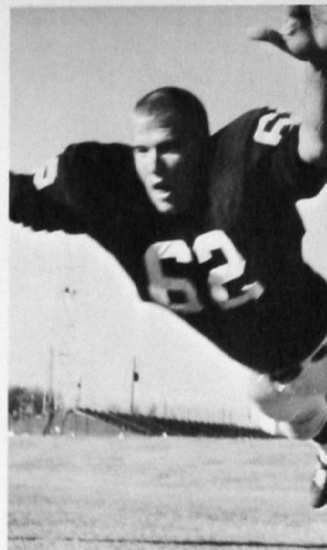


Fullback Charles Randle (30) grinds out yardage in the Langston game.

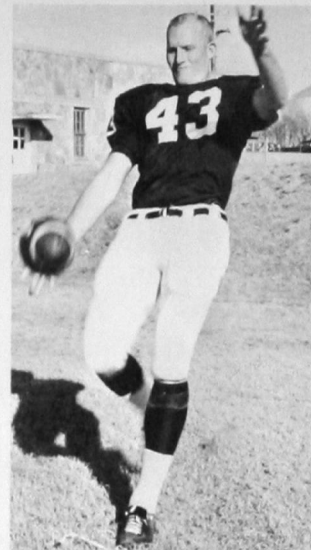

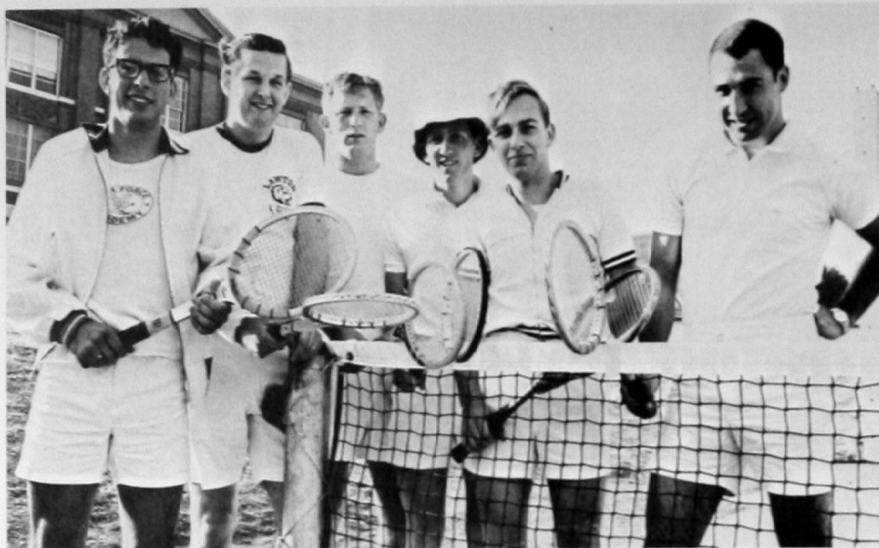

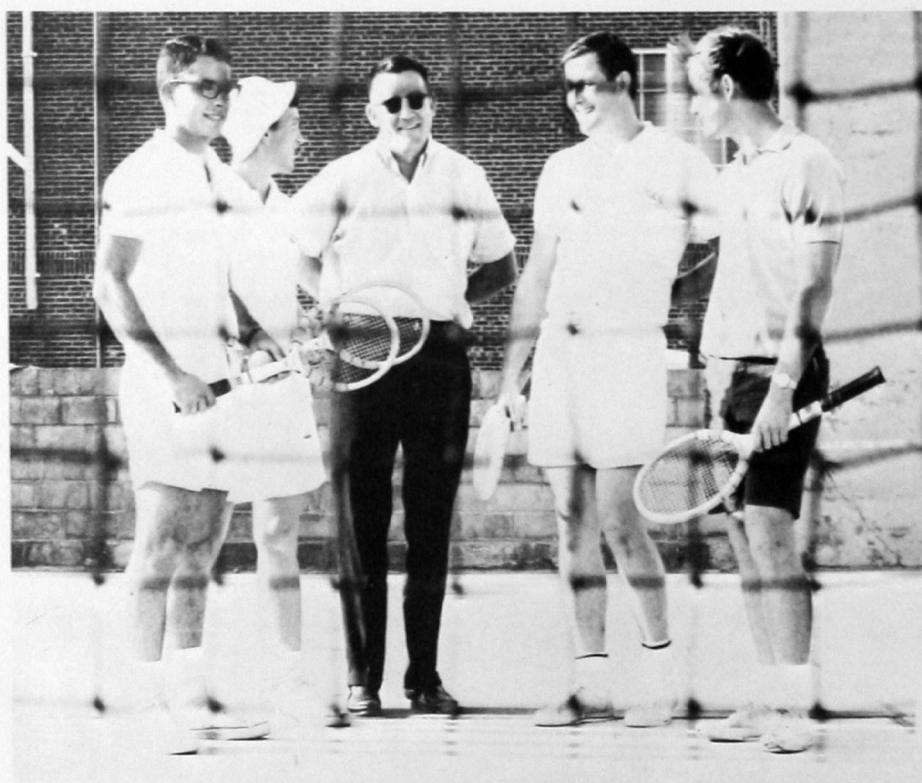

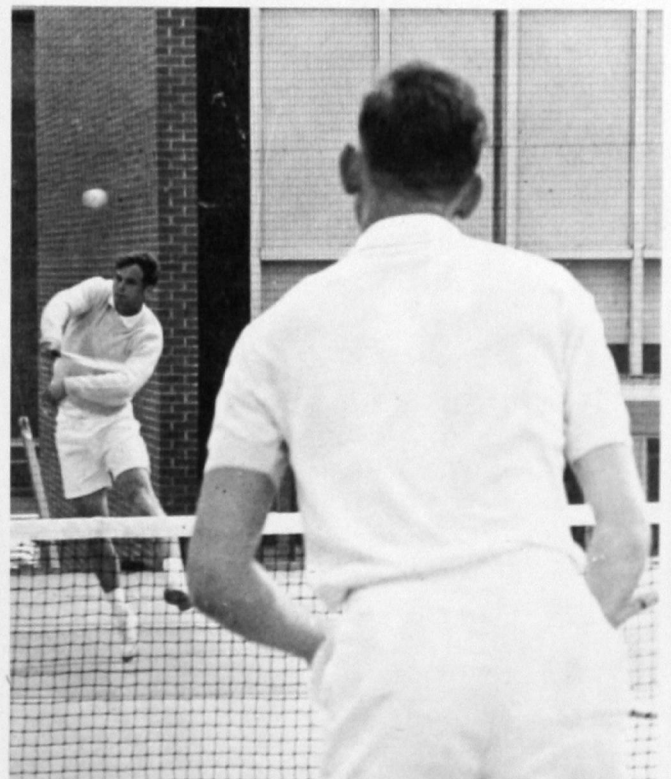

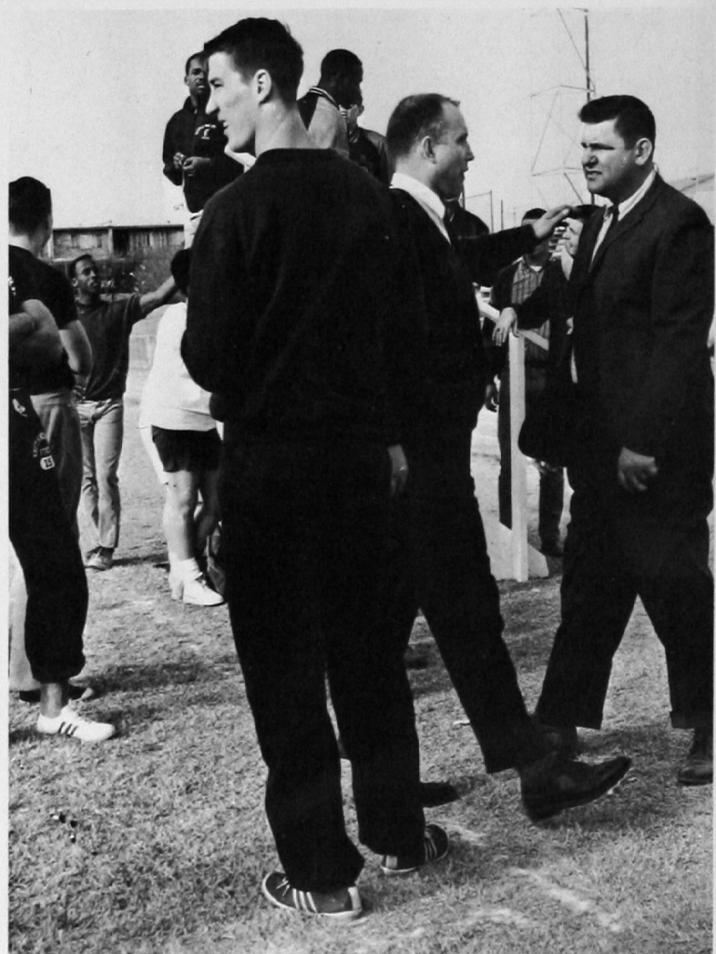

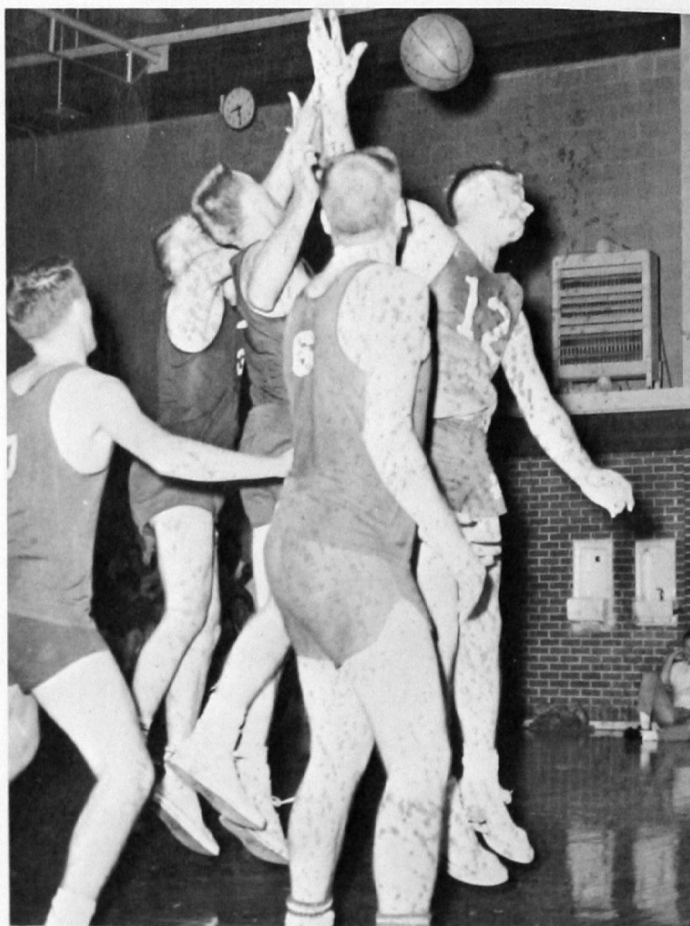

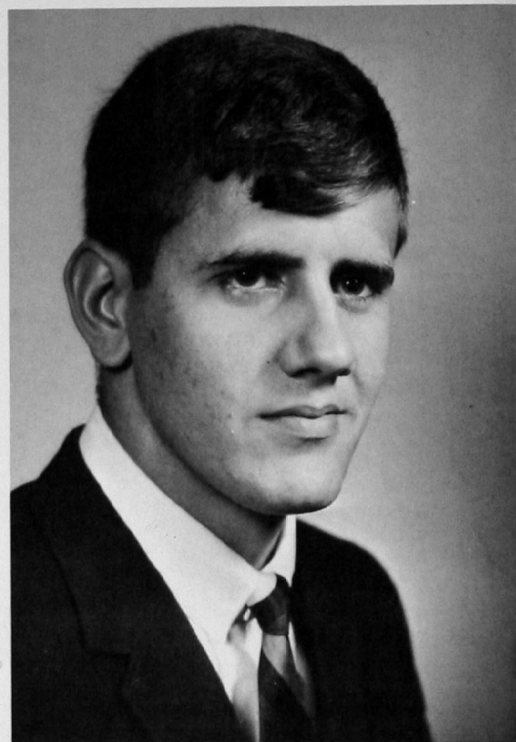
As another service project the women made Christmas tray favors for the patients at the sanatorium.

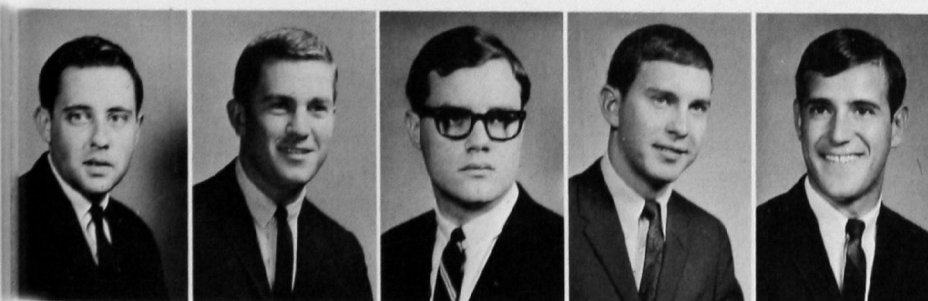
Coordinating and supervising the rush weeks and affairs of both national social fraternities on campus was the main task of the inter-fraternity council.

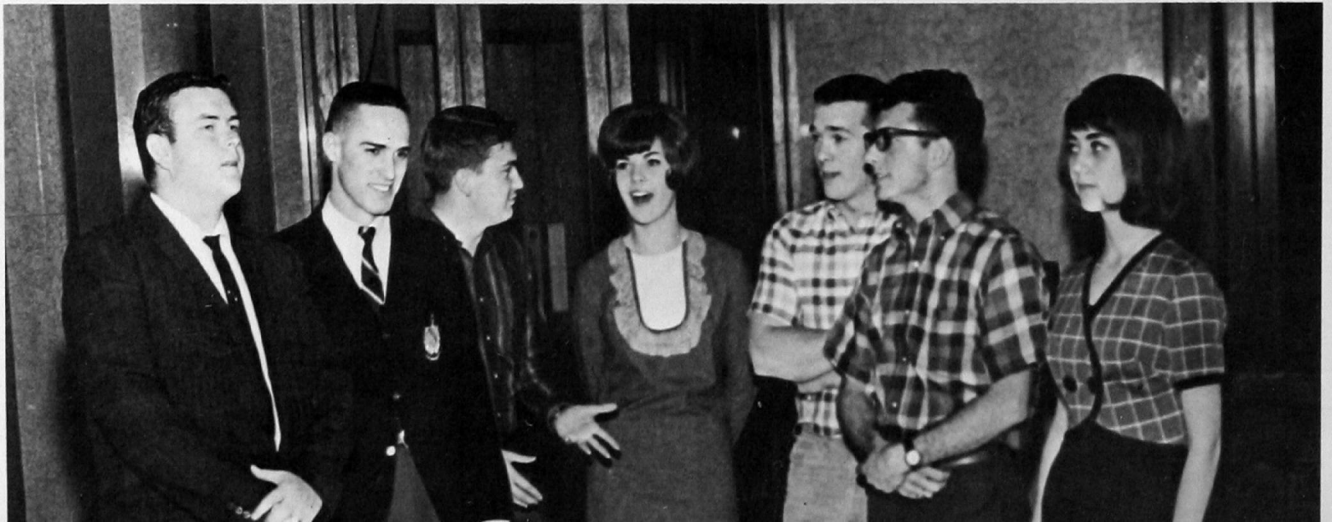

The job of running the council is handled by three officers—Mike Dowling, president; Ken Adams, vice president, and Arlita French, secretary.

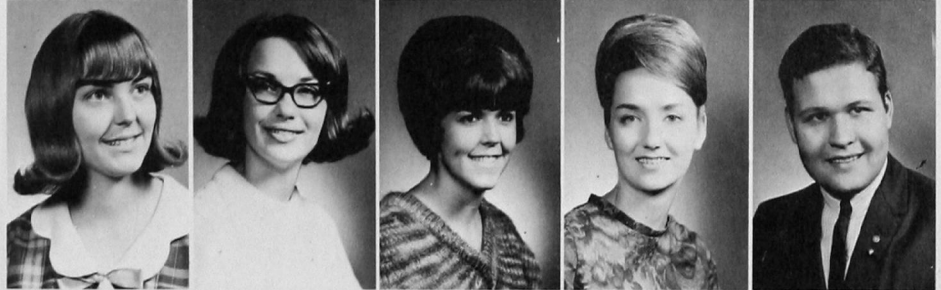

various charities at Christmas and Easter time. The organization also awards a \$100 scholarship to a deserving member.

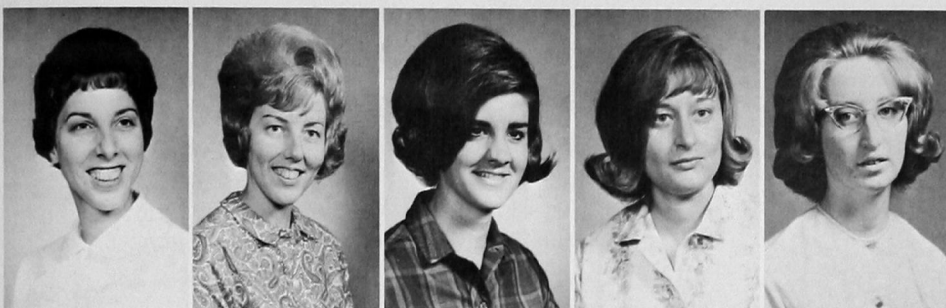

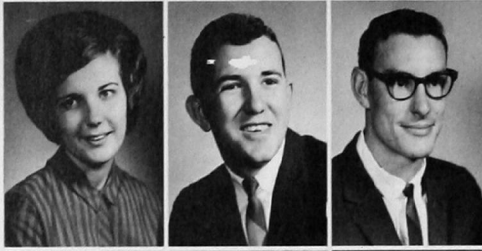
The newest club on campus is the Mathematics club, sponsored by Verlin Koper and Stanley Van Steenvoort, which was organized this year.

The purpose of the organization is to provide a social outlet for its members and to promote a better understanding of industrial arts and industry.

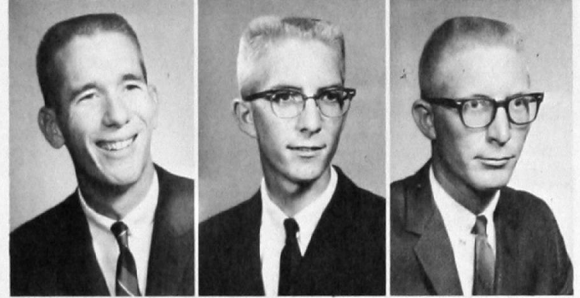

Southwestern's first MENC chapter was organized in 1957 with twelve members. It has since grown to one of the larger chapters in the state with 66 members.

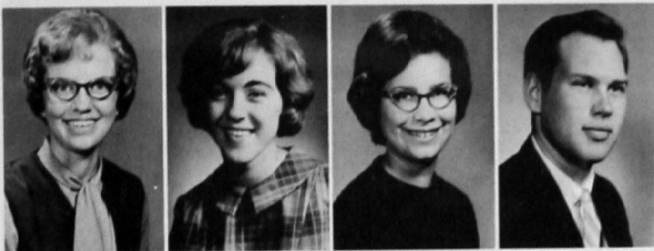

Wesley Foundation
