SENIOR TRIP

At 6:00 P.M. on Saturday, October 4, 1958, twenty-seven seniors and fifteen wives, accompanied by Dr. Walter L. Dickison and Jim Hudson, Eli Lilly Co. representative, boarded a special Santa Fe car in Oklahoma City to begin the Senior Pharmacy Trip to Indianapolis, Indiana, and Chicago, Illinois. We arrived in Chicago at 11:00 A.M. the following day only to find that we had missed our connection to Indianapolis on the New York Central. After five and one-half hours in Chicago, we again boarded the train and were en route

to Indianapolis where we were met at 11:00 P.M. by the Eli Lilly representatives. After a short orientation in the meeting room of the Severin Hotel, we were given theatre tickets to attend one of several excellent movies showing at the time in downtown Indianapolis. Rather than attend the theatre, many tired embryonic pharmacists chose to retire in preparation for the following day. On Monday, October 6, we began our day at 7:45 A.M. with breakfast in the hotel. After breakfast we journeyed to the McCarty Street Plant. Here we were welcomed by Mr. John F. Lee, Director of the Sales Personnel Relations Division. During the morning we toured the Research Laboratories and had a discussion of the Lilly Policy by Mr. J. W. Stroud. Our luncheon was held in the Lilly cafeteria and following this we toured the Pharma-Production ceutical Departments. Later in the afternoon we saw a film on Polio Vaccine and were returned to the hotel by the Lilly Laboratory buses. A banquet was held in the evening on the top floor of the hotel. One of the highlights of the entertainment came after the banquet when we were given tickets to attend "South Pacific" in Todd-AO. After the movie, many of the students and their wives saw some of the town, and several had small informal parties in their rooms to discuss the day's events.

Tuesday morning after breakfast in the hotel we toured the Kentucky Avenue Plant and saw some of the Marketing and Productions Services Division. We again had luncheon in the Lilly cafeteria and during the afternoon we went to the Biological Laboratories in Greenfield, Indiana which is only a short distance from Indianapolis. On the way to Greenfield we had a chance to stop at the Indianapolis Speedway where the famous 500 mile race is held every

W. D. Strother, Dean

The School of Pharmacy at Southwestern is completing another successful year, marred only by the illness of Dean Strother. We are all thankful for the fine recovery which he has made and welcome him back to work again.

The progress made by the School of Pharmacy since graduating its first class in 1941 has been phenomenal. It is interesting to reminisce about the early history and recall the names of persons associated with the founding of the School.

Dr. James Boren, President of Southwestern at the time, became interested in establishing a School of Pharmacy, based on the results of a survey showing that the number of pharmacists being graduated in Oklahoma was far short of the needs of the state. The School was founded with the full and active endorsement of the Oklahoma Pharmaceutical Association, the State Board of Pharmacy and many leading pharmacists of Oklahoma. W. D. Patterson, El Reno, Secretary of the Board, and Pete Weaver, Stillwater, Secretary of the State Association, made many trips and spent much time in the early planning stages. Special credit is due Albert Eaton of Weatherford for the important part he played in the founding of the School.

The organization of the School was interrupted during World War II, but continued after the war was over. Faculty members during the early formative years were Dan Rivkin, Frank Cosgrove, Dr. L. J. Klotz and Dr. Ralph Wilson. Graduates of the School of Pharmacy received full recognition by the Oklahoma and Texas Boards of Pharmacy prior to national accreditation.

Dean Strother reported for duty in August, 1949. National accrediation and the great progress made by the School since 1949 have been accomplished under the fine leadership of Dean Strother. The loyal, continuing interest and support of President Burton and Bert Brundage of Thomas have been important factors in making this progress possible. Thanks also go to the alumni, who are doing a fine job of actively supporting their alma mater.






