Campaigns move into final weeks

Presidential elections are quickly approaching. The presidential election is Tuesday, Nov. 6, 2012.

Several national polls have found that Democrat incumbent Barack Obama and Republican challenger Mitt Romney are tied statistically. In fact, the latest polls on Oct. 15 disagree as to who is winning the overall national race.

A Gallup Tracking Poll and Rasmussen Tracking Poll both gave a slight edge in a poll of likely voters.

However, polls on the same day by Politico, ABC, News and Morning Call gave the edge to Obama.

The Oct. 15 analysis by Real Clear Politics looked at the most important statistics -- electoral votes. A candidate must receive 270 electoral votes from individual states to win the election.

The analysis showed that with only three weeks left before the election, 201 electoral votes were likely to go to Obama, 191 were likely to go to Romney, and 146 votes were declared a "toss-up." The analysis showed that 11 states could go to either candidate.

University selects initial CLEET council participants

Southwestern recently selected participants for its first Council on Law Enforcement, Education and Training (CLEET) Collegiate Officer Program on the Weatherford campus.

The CLEET Collegiate Officer Program is a component of the SWOSU Parks and Wildlife Law Enforcement degree.

According to Dr. Chad Kinder, associate dean of the SWOSU School of Behavioral Sciences and Education, participants in this competitive entry program were chosen based upon their grade point average, interview performance, fitness levels, and background check/drug screen results.

Successful participants will exit the program with their Bachelor of Science degree with a major area in Parks and Wildlife Law Enforcement and having met requirements for full time Oklahoma law enforcement certification.

"This allows program graduates to go to work for any municipal, county or state law enforcement agency that normally sends their officers to the 16-

Officials offer health, safety tips for upcoming colder weather

With the recent dramatic temperature changes it is obvious that winter is approaching. College students should prepare for the winter season by planning ahead. The following tips will help students stay healthy during the upcoming winter months.

Take care of your health by drinking plenty of water, taking vitamin C and getting proper amounts of sleep. If you feel like you are getting sick, there are health services provided to Southwestern students in the Wellness Center, and there is no charge to see the university nurse, Laura Smith.

Although the cold weather will not always give you a cold, dressing properly for the weather is important. Get your winter clothing and outer gear ready for the first frosty day. Wearing flip flops and tank tops when its 30 degrees outside may not be a good idea if you want to stay healthy.

In order to prepare your vehicle for the winter months you should keep it well stocked with an ice scraper, a coat,

gloves, jumper cables and a first aid kit. Also, remember to check your wiper blades and washer fluid because good visibility is important when driving. AAA recommends some winter driving tips like to never warm up a vehicle in an enclosed area, such as a garage. It is important to make certain your tires are properly inflated. Also, keep you gas tank at least half full to avoid gas line freeze-up. When driving on any slippery surface, it is best not to use the cruise control.

Winterize your living space by checking all external doors and windows for a tight seal. According to the website, www.thedailygreen.com, it is a good idea to use caulk or weather stripping on windows and door to keep out the cold air. It is recommended to change your furnace filters and winterize your A/C and water lines. They also suggest insulating your pipes to help decrease the chance of pipes freezing. In your home keep an emergency kit which would include candles and matches, and be sure to store bottled water and non-perishable foods in case the electricity goes out.

Following some of these helpful tips will prepare you for winter season and the chilly weather ahead. Think about preparing your home, your car, and yourself for the winter months.

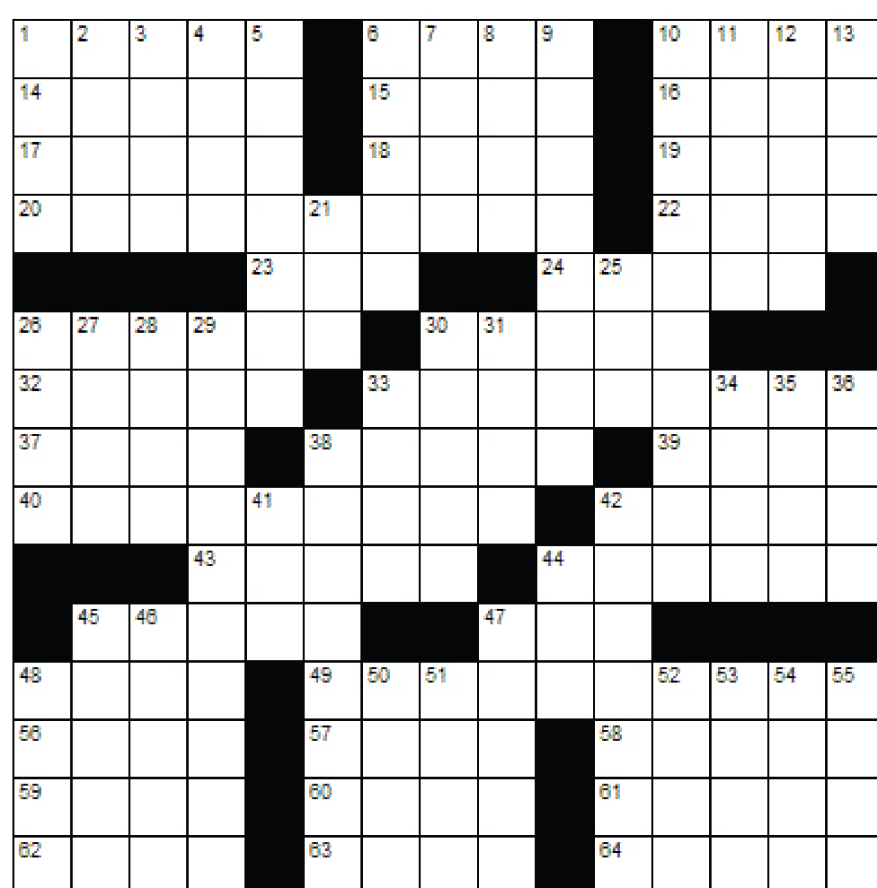

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

14 in a row: Soccer team stays perfect

WEATHERFORD, OKLA.—Southwestern Oklahoma State University's soccer team continued its perfect season with a 3-0 win over Missouri Southern State University on Sunday. The win put the No. 9 Bulldogs 14-0 overall and 6-0 in Conference play.

SWOSU will continue its quest for perfection when they take on conference newcomer Southern Nazarene on Friday, October 19 in Bethany, Oklahoma at 6 p.m.

Coach Mark Persson was thrilled with his team's performance.

"Once we got into the flow of the game, we were able

to get some possessions that lead some open opportunities," Persson said. "That first goal was really big for us."

The Bulldogs scored their first goal in the 15th minute of the contest when senior captain Josie Price sent a cross pass to Kelsey Visor, who blasted a shot into the back of the net. The goal by Visor makes that her fifth on the season while Price picked up her 12 assist.

"I thought Kelsey Visor had a great game today. She really worked hard; she brought other people into the play," said Persson.

The second goal on the game came 15 minutes later at

the 30th minute mark when Samantha Nunez got a clean run in pass from Charlotte Eastman for a straight shot into the net, putting SWOSU up 2-0 in the first half.

The final goal of the game came at the 57th minute from Nunez when she received a cross pass from the left by Ashley McMahon and squeezed in a shot, putting the Lions away for good.

As a team the Bulldogs outshot the MSSU 17-4 with a 13 shots on goal.

Defensively, SWOSU's Corey LaMoureux came away with her tenth shutout of the year.

Southwestern loses to Wonder Boys in shootout

WEATHERFORD, OKLA. – Southwestern Oklahoma State University's football team couldn't hold of the Wonder Boys of Arkansas Tech University, losing 45-37 in Great American Conference play on Saturday afternoon.

Despite the loss, SWOSU's Aaron Wilson rushed for 290-yards on 27 carries for two touchdowns, which is the second best rushing effort in SWOSU history.

The loss drops the Bulldogs overall record to 1-5 and 1-4 in Great American Conference action while ATU improves to 4-3 and 2-2 in the GAC.

SWOSU's defense set the tone early when senior DeMarcus Miller picked off a pass from ATU's quarterback Tanner Marsh for a 31-yard return to the ATU 16 yard line.

After an incomplete pass to a wide open Teverick Boyd, SWOSU had to settle for a 32-yard field goal by Colton Rainey that put the Bulldogs up 3-0 with 12:42 left in the first quarter.

After forcing the Wonder Boys to a quick three-and-out, SWOSU didn't waste any time adding to their 3-0 lead when Aaron Wilson broke out for a 61-yard run to put the Bulldogs in ATU scoring territory. Three plays later, SWOSU's D.C. Walker scored a touchdown on a 1-yard rush to put the Bulldogs up 9-0. The extra point was good by Rainey extending the lead to 10-0.

SWOSU's next score came on a Dustin Stenta 12-yard pass to Kirk Jones to put the Bulldogs up 17-0 with four seconds left in the first quarter.

After a brief weather delay due to lighting, the tables seem to turn in the Won-

der Boys' favor. The Bulldogs gave up 14 second quarter points to bring the score to 17-14 at the half.

To start the second half the Bulldogs got back to work when Wilson broke out of the back field to score on a 53-yard touchdown run to extend the Bulldogs lead to 24-14.

That ten point cushion was quickly erased when ATU drove down the field on 7 plays for 80-yards that end with 31-yard run by Cassius Washington that help set up a ATU touchdown on a 7-yard TD pass from Marsh to Dwight Brooks to close the gap to 24-21.

Five minutes later the Bulldogs offense responded with a 13 play drive for 65 yards that ended with a 11-yard touchdown run from Wilson to put SWOSU right back up 31-21.

No less than thirty seconds later, the Wonder Boys quickly answered with a pass from Marsh to Cassius Washington for a 80-yard touchdown to put ATU right back in the game cutting SWOSU's lead to 31-28.

SWOSU didn't let the Wonder Boys quick score affect them. They responded with a 12 play drive for 85 yards that included a 29-yard run by Wilson capped off by a 23-yard field goal attempt by Rainey that put the Bulldogs up 34-28 going into the fourth quarter.

With back and forth action by both team, the Bulldogs were not able to hold off falling to the Wonder Boys 37-45.

The Bulldogs will travel to Durant, Oklahoma to take on the Savage Storm of Southeastern Oklahoma State University Saturday, October 20 at 3 p.m.
