With the semester ending in May, graduation opened a new beginning for the class of 2007.

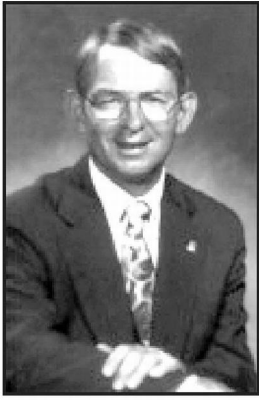

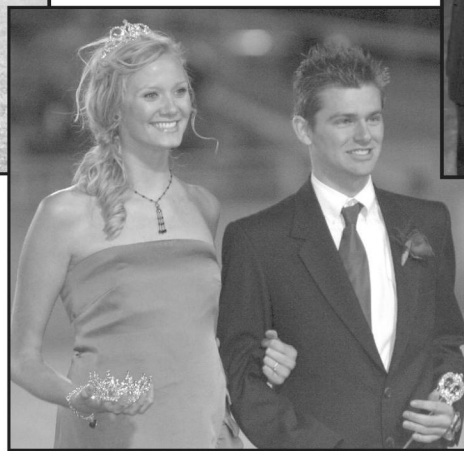

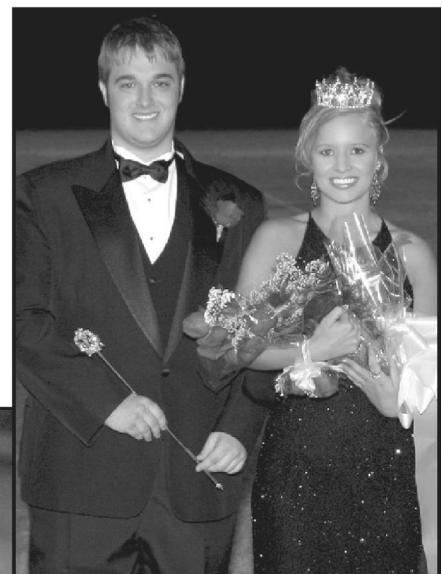

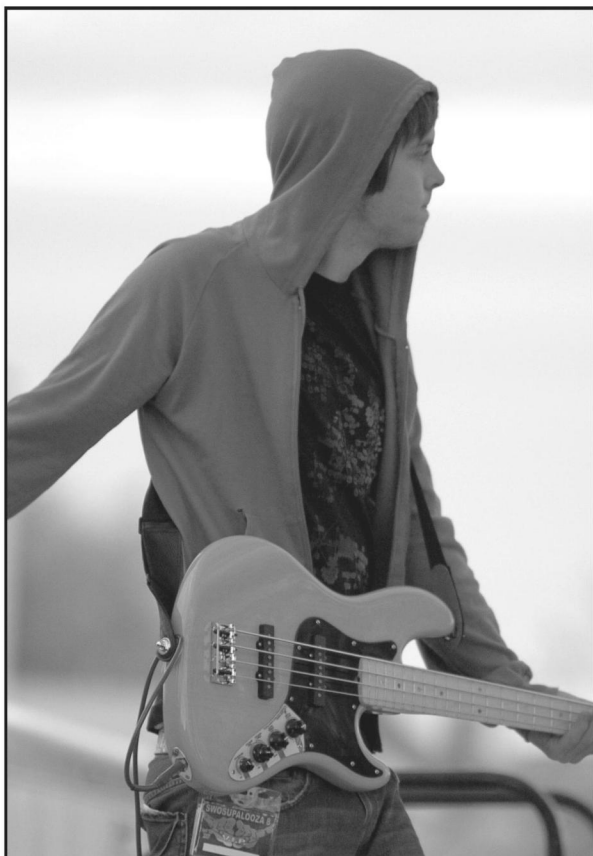

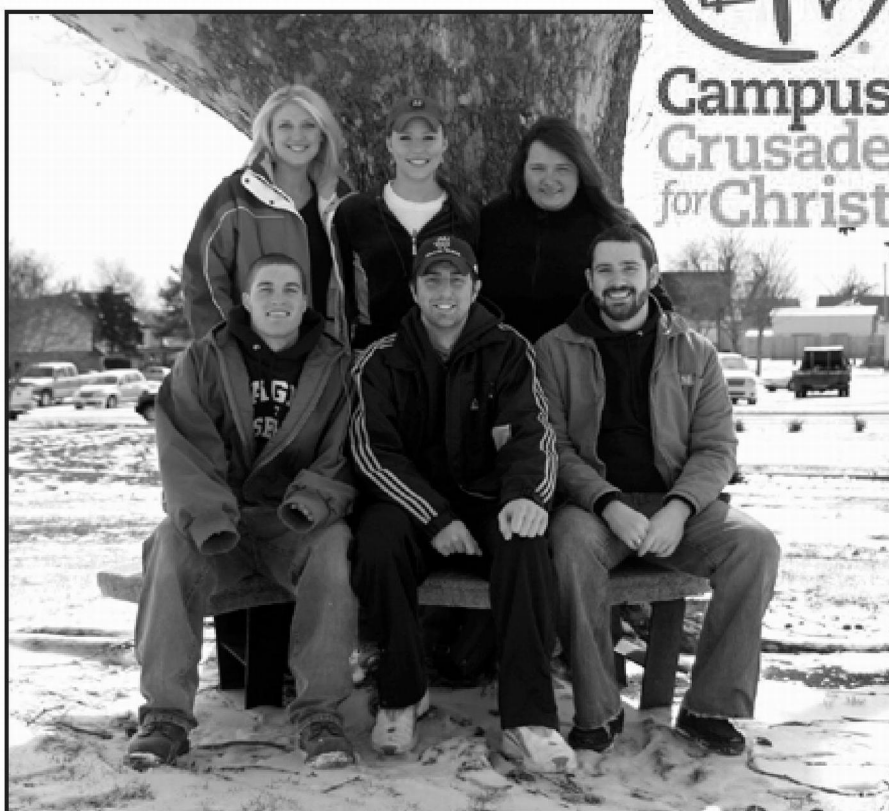

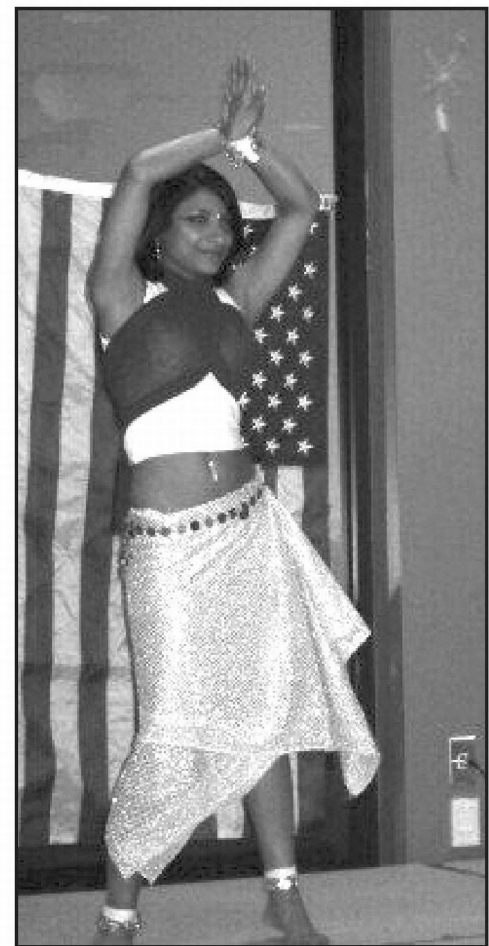

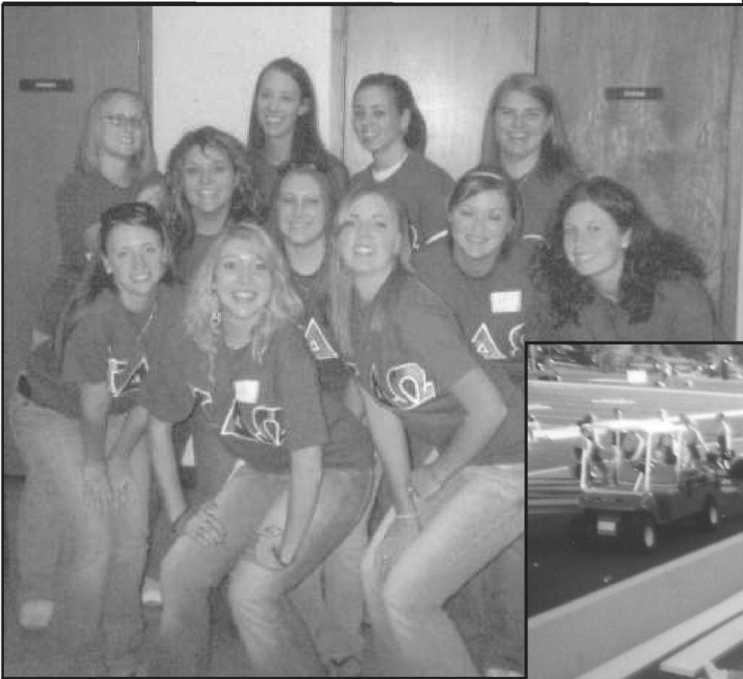

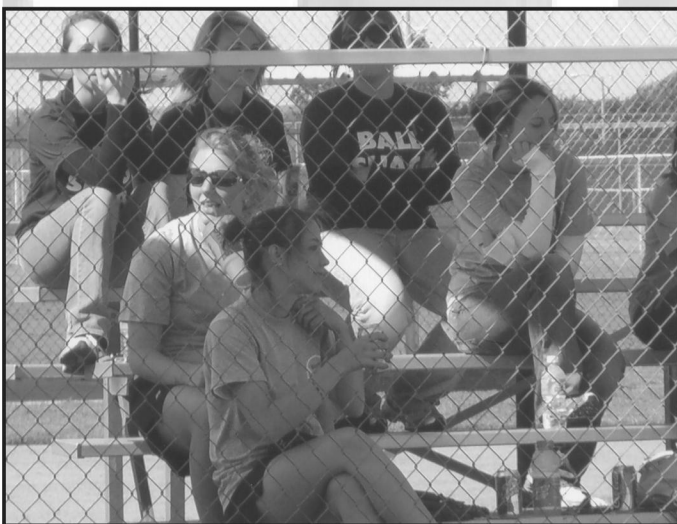

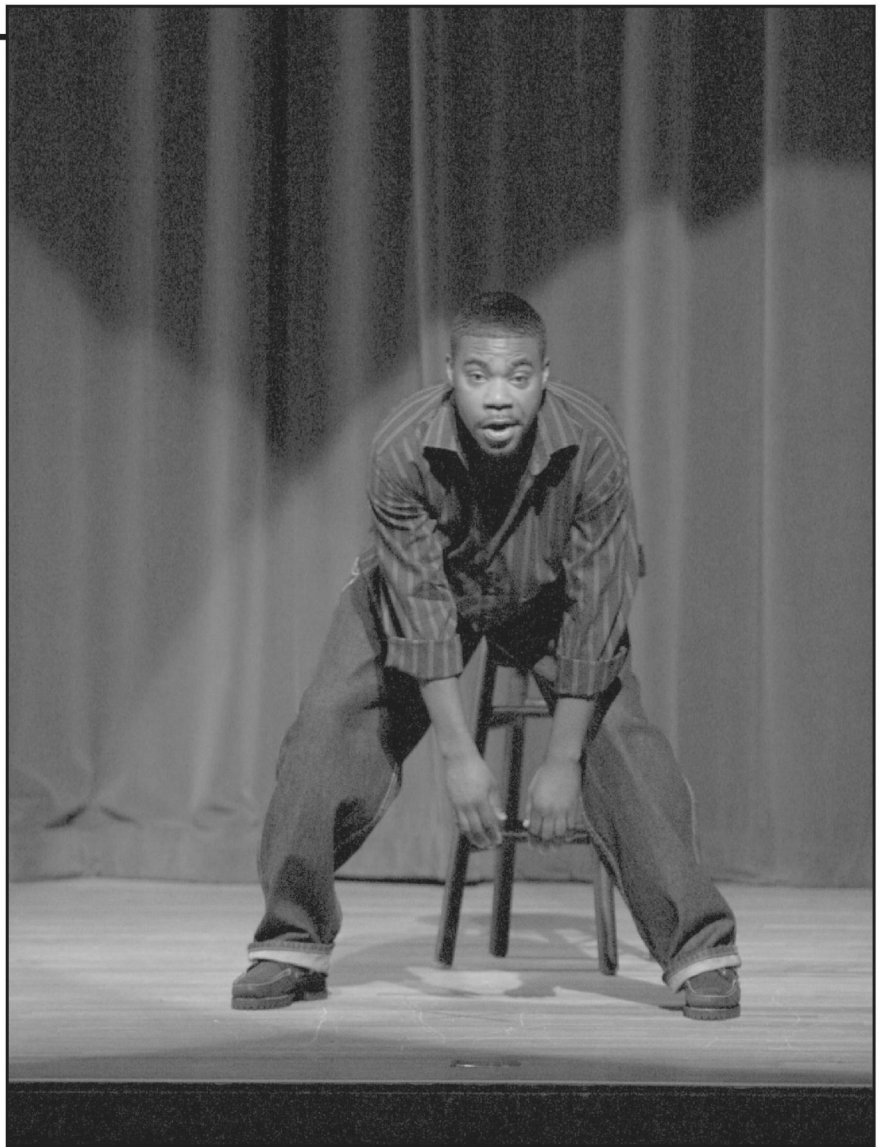

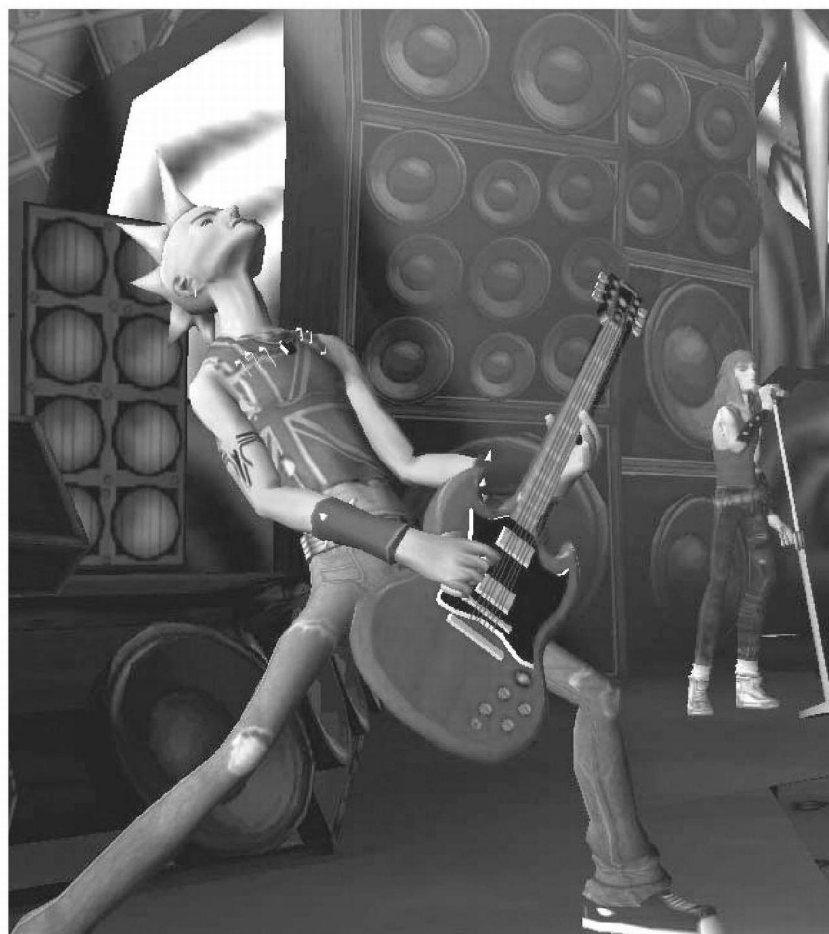

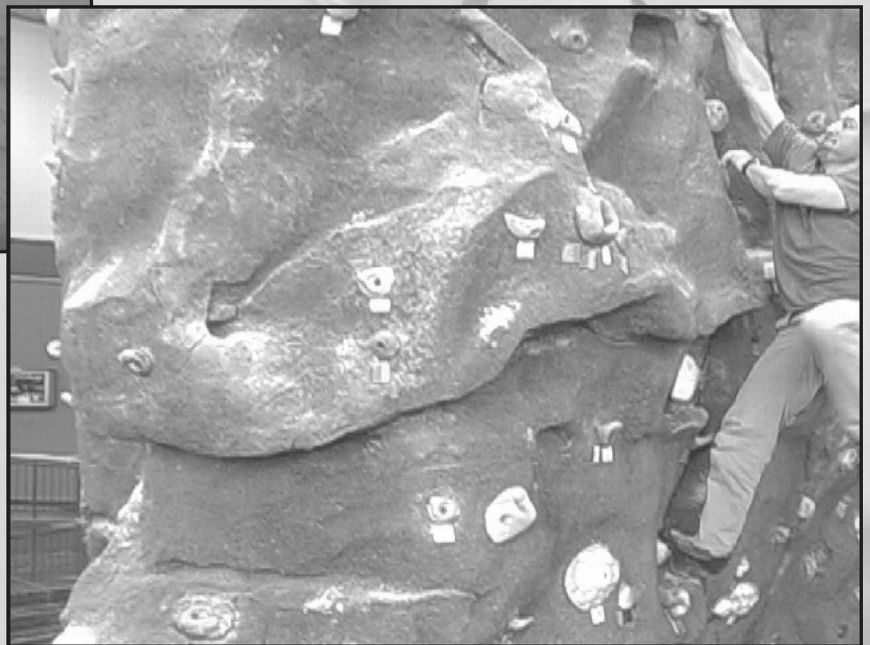

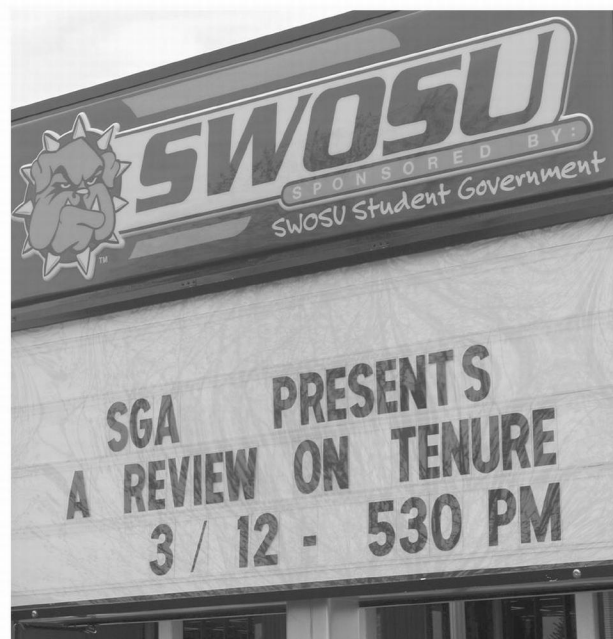

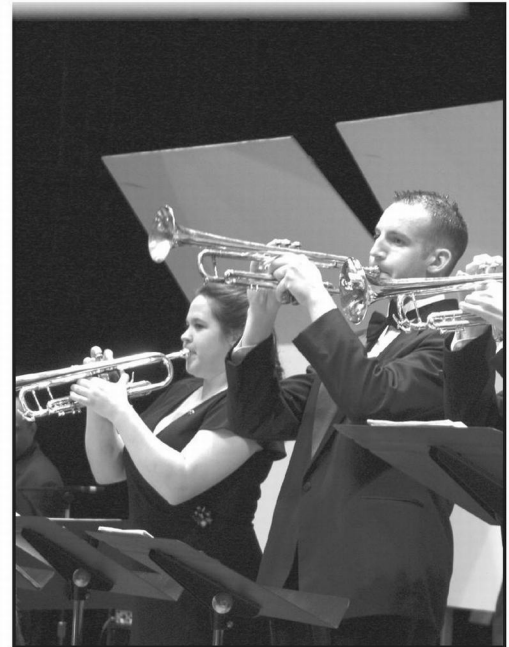

Orangemesh safety fences have become a part of the landscape, and students have had to adjust to the sounds of machinery and hammers echoing across campus.

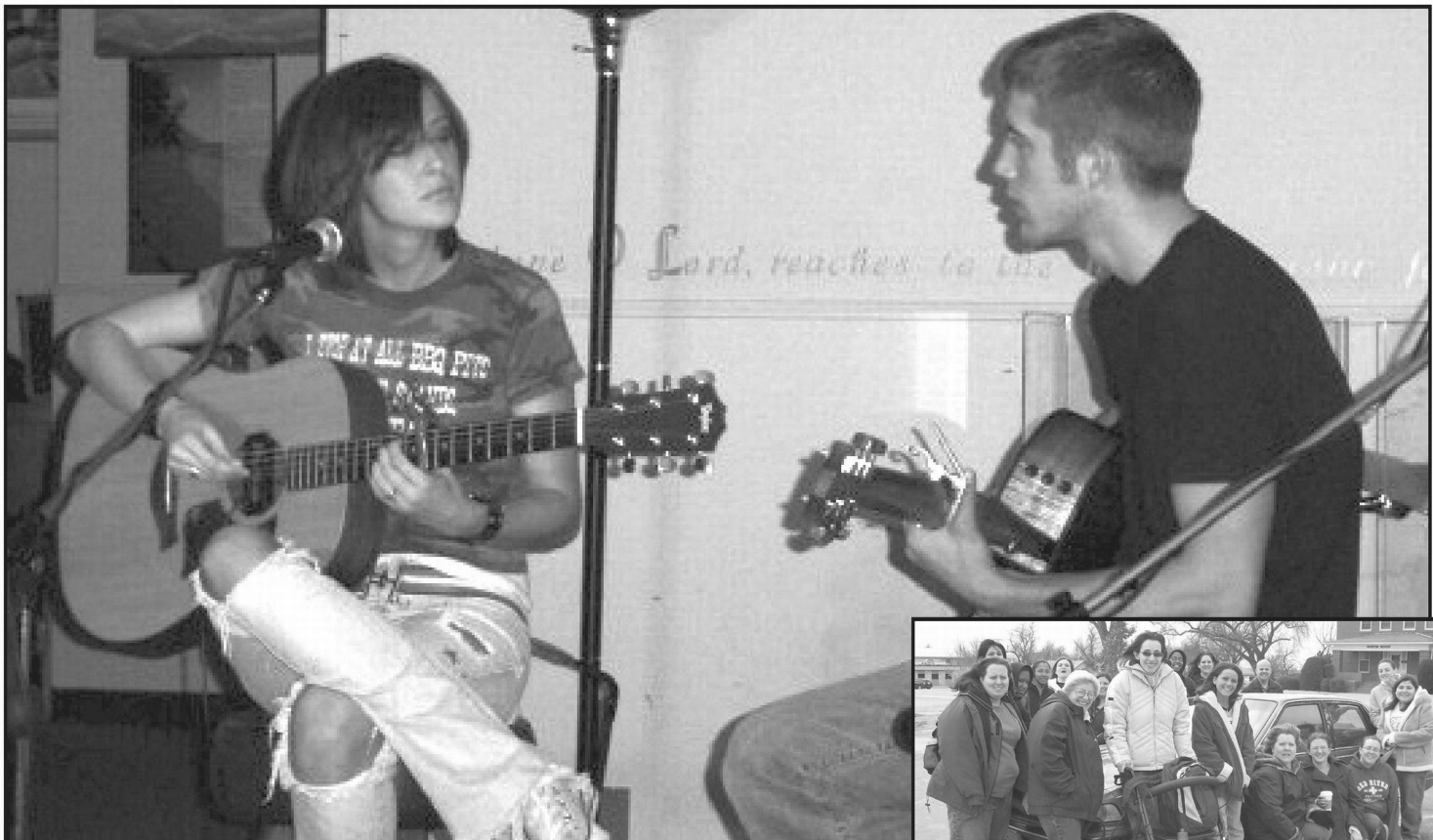

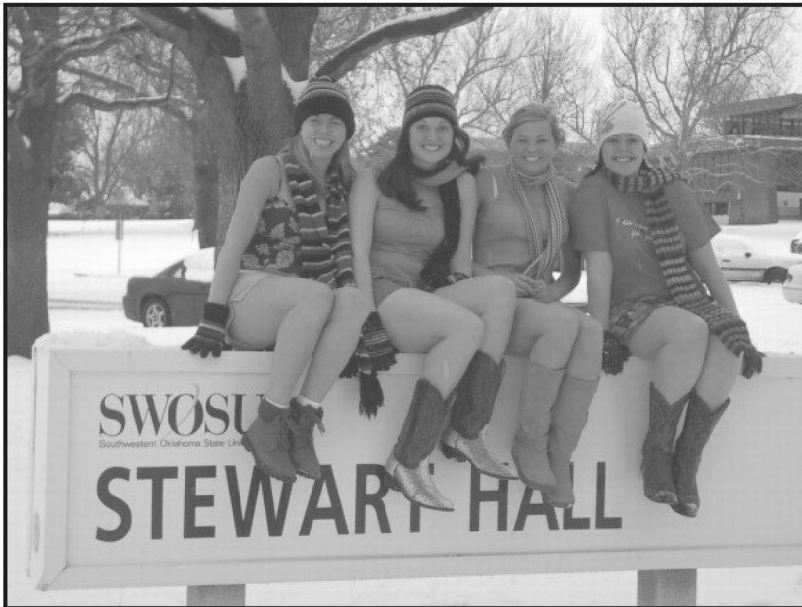

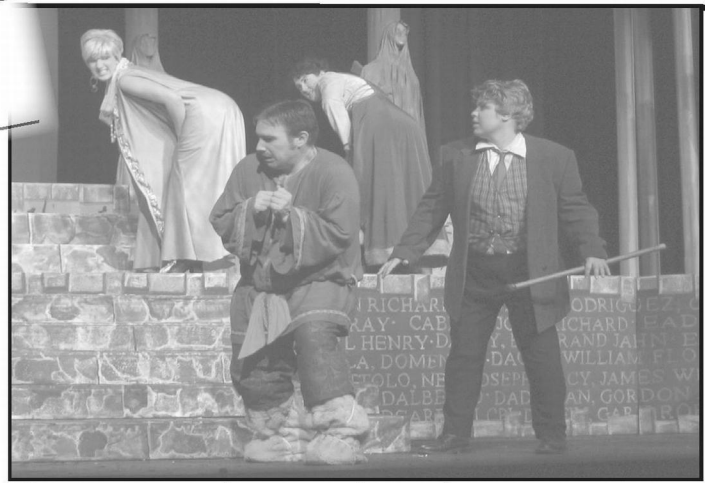

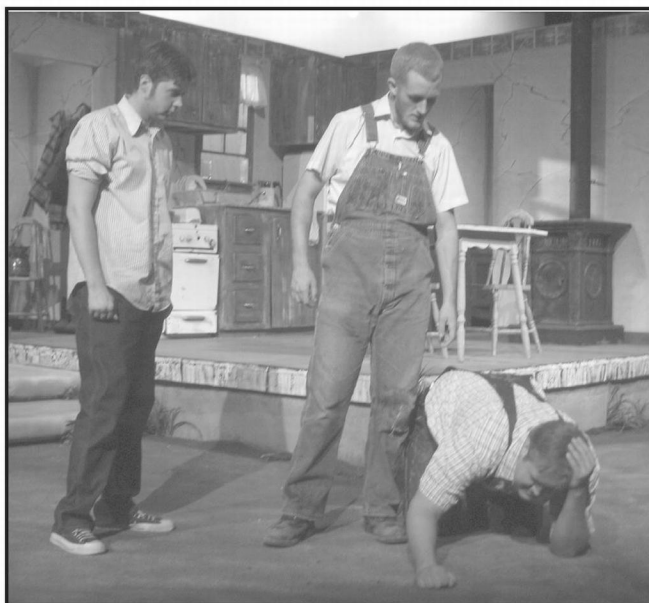

The SWOSU College of Pharmacy provides a doctorate program that is considered one of the most elite in the country. The program admits only 80 students a year, making acceptance very competitive. The College of Pharmacy offers a Doctor of Pharmacy (Pharm. D.) degree. The degree requires two-years of pre-professional study and once accepted, an additional four years of professional study. The last year of professional study requires the student to attend Oklahoma City, Lawton, or Tulsa to complete a year of rotations that familiarizes them with the realities of a professional pharmacist. In labs, pharmacy students acquire the abilities needed to perform in a real pharmacy setting. Students are required to counsel mock patients in order to specify the need for the specific prescription. When graduation finally comes, the SWOSU College of Pharmacy students are skilled professionals in the field.

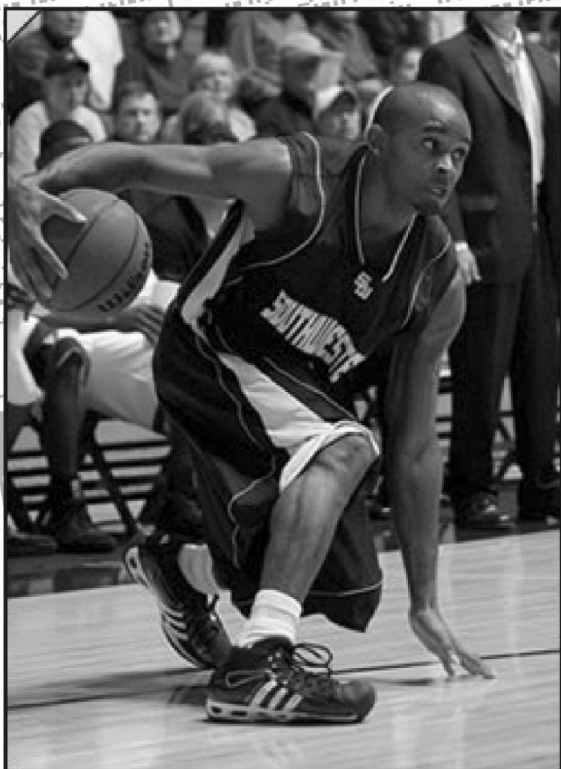

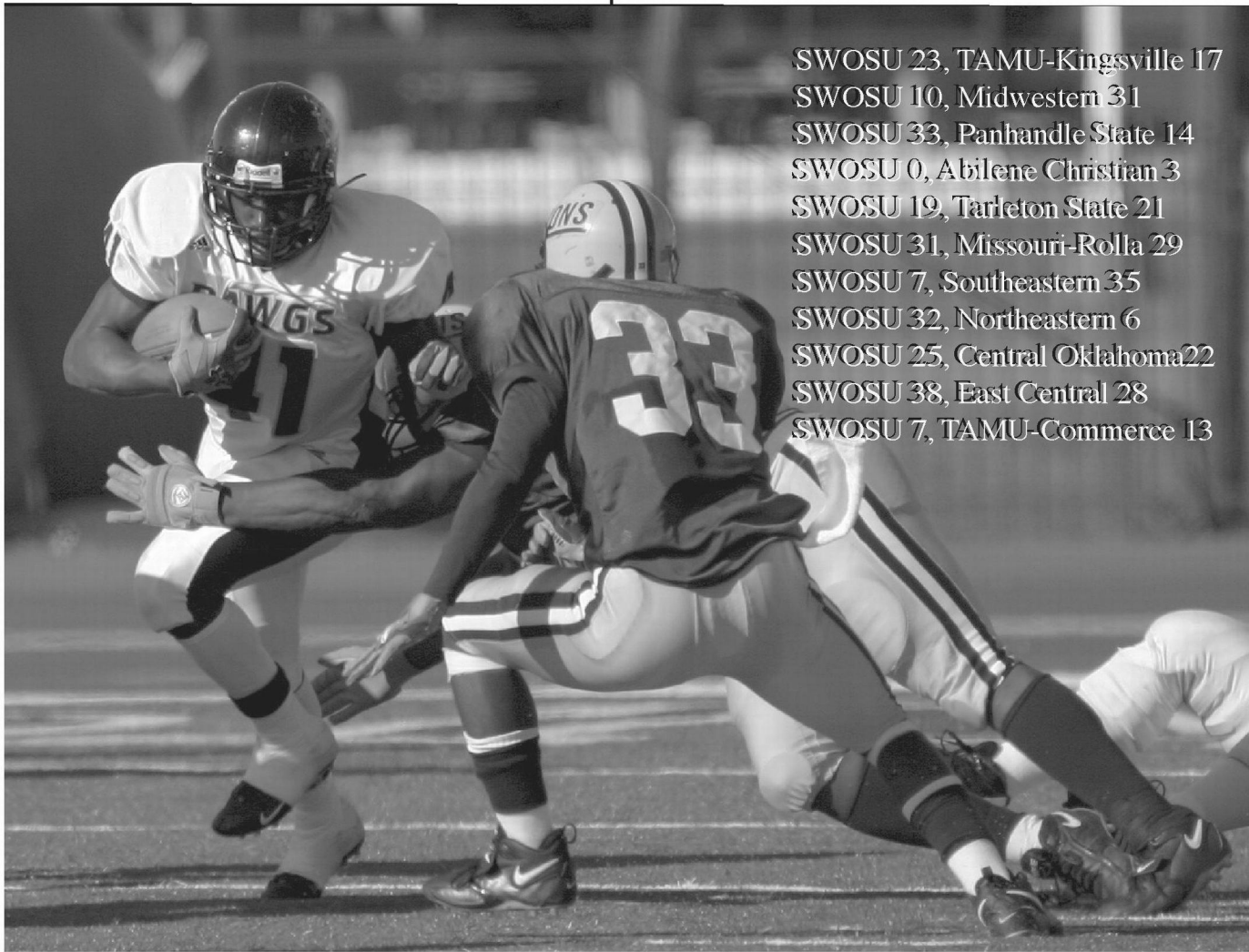
Southwestern was recognized as one of the most improved NCAA Division II football teams in

The team started the season by racing out to a 10-0 start. The momentum from the fast start helped them increase their win total by eight games from the previous year.

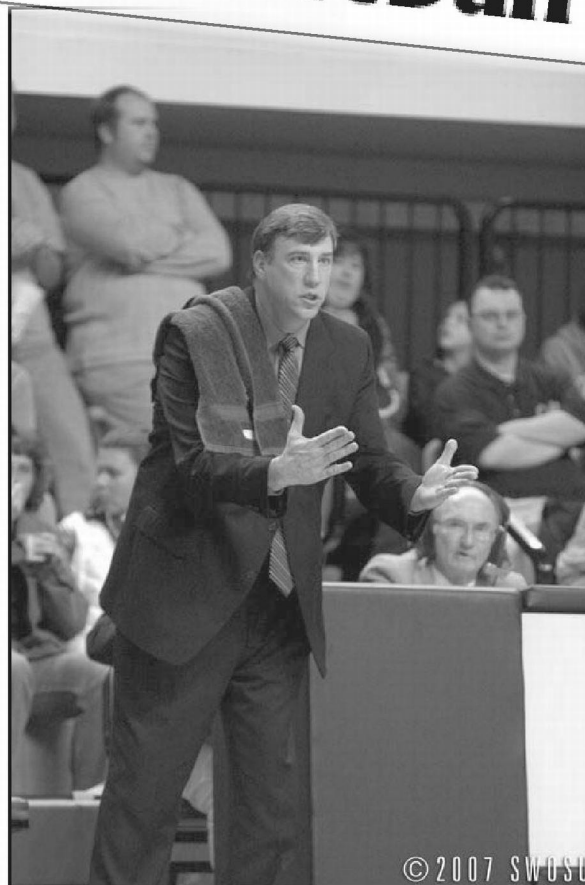
On the team were three seniors, each of which were an integral part of the team. The seniors included Reggie Gunn, Othello Alford and Michael Sampson.

Gunn averaged 11.8 points per game for the season. Alford lead the team in assists with 113 and Sampson was second on the team in blocked shots.

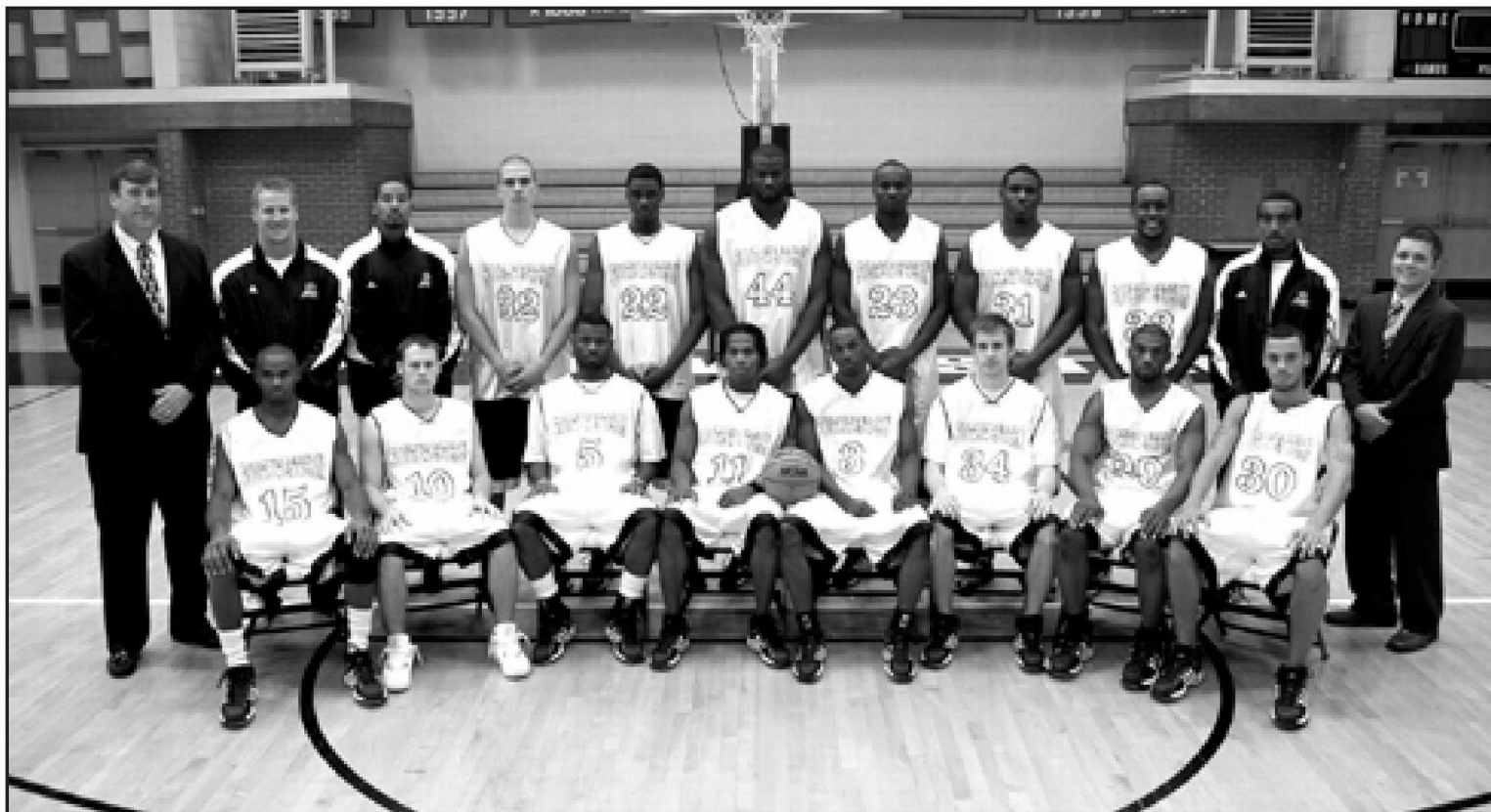

Coach Pagliasotti said he saw improvements with the team in maturity and in confidence. He also said "with having seven seniors we will have the oldest team in the conference."

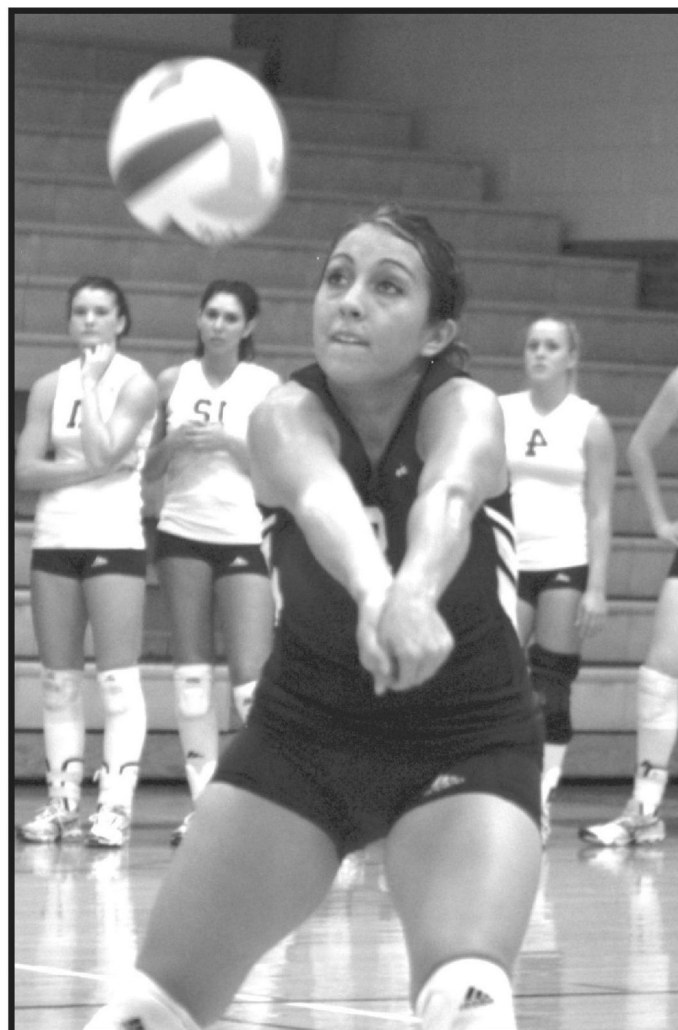

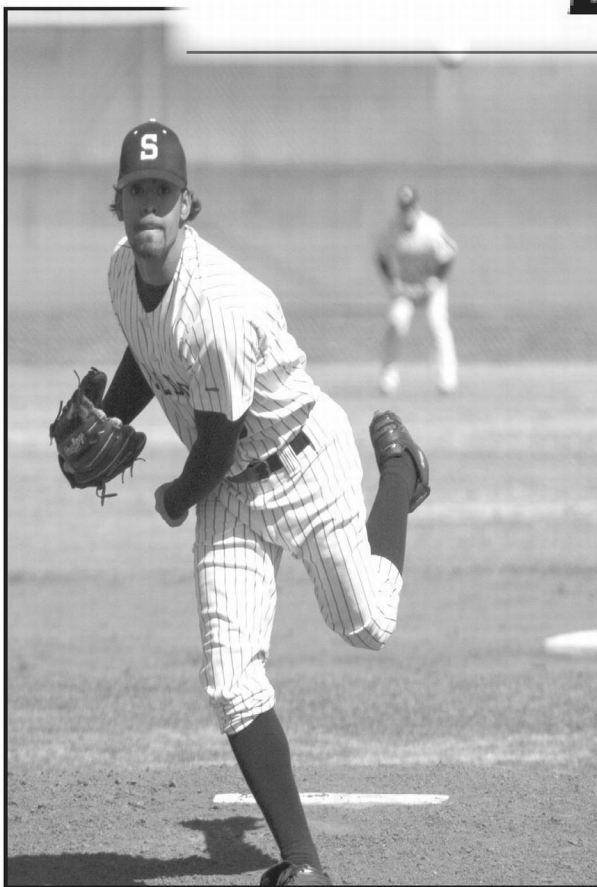

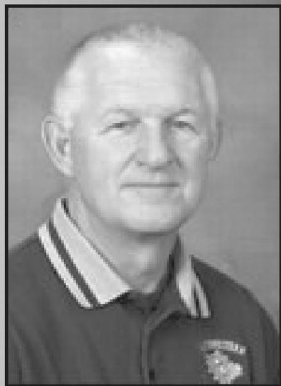

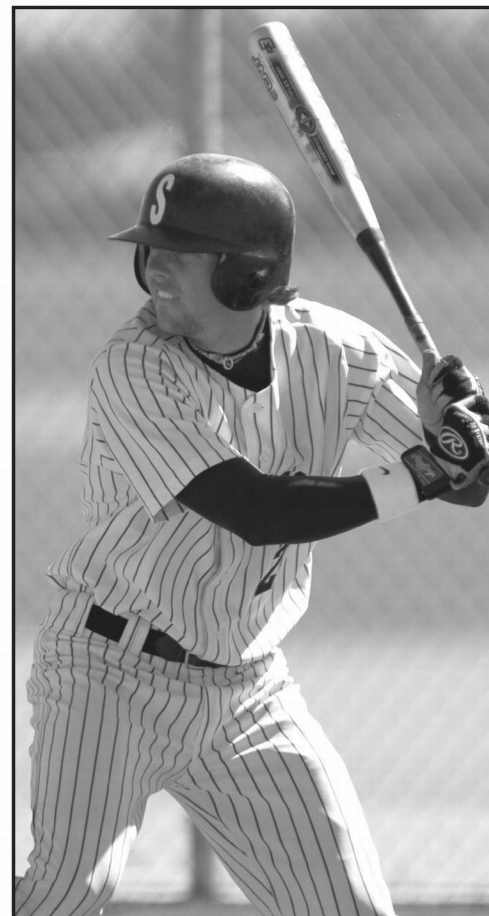

In 2006, SWOSU finished the highest it has ever finished in the Lone Star Conference standings. It finished seventh by posting a 6-9-2 record.

Additionally, Southwestern collected a team academic award from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) for exceptional achievement in the classroom from its women's soccer team.

The Bulldogs, under the direction of coach Joe Bradley, were honored by the national soccer organization thanks to its collective team GPA of 3.26.

The academic award is given out to each school that posts a team grade point average of 3.0 or better during the 2005-06 academic year.
