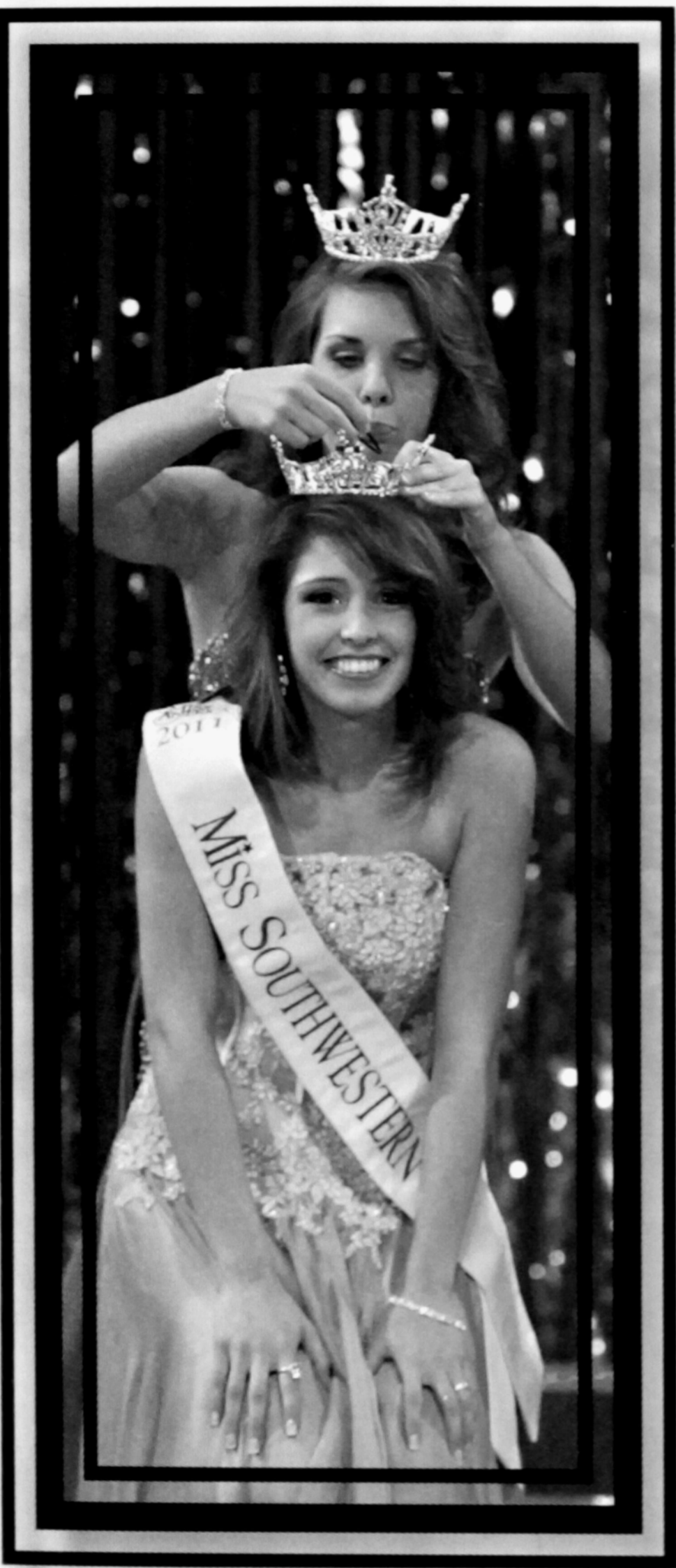

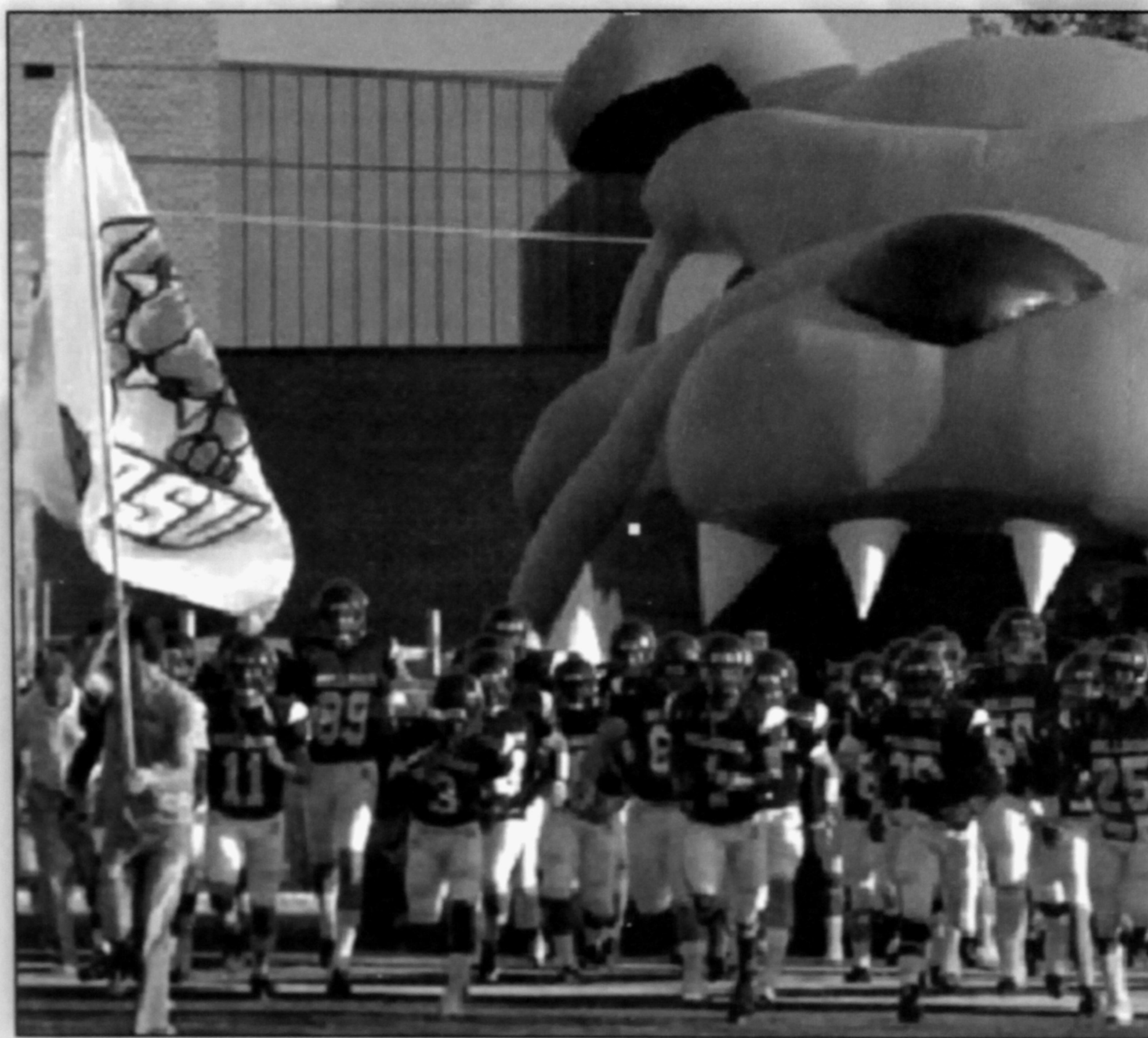

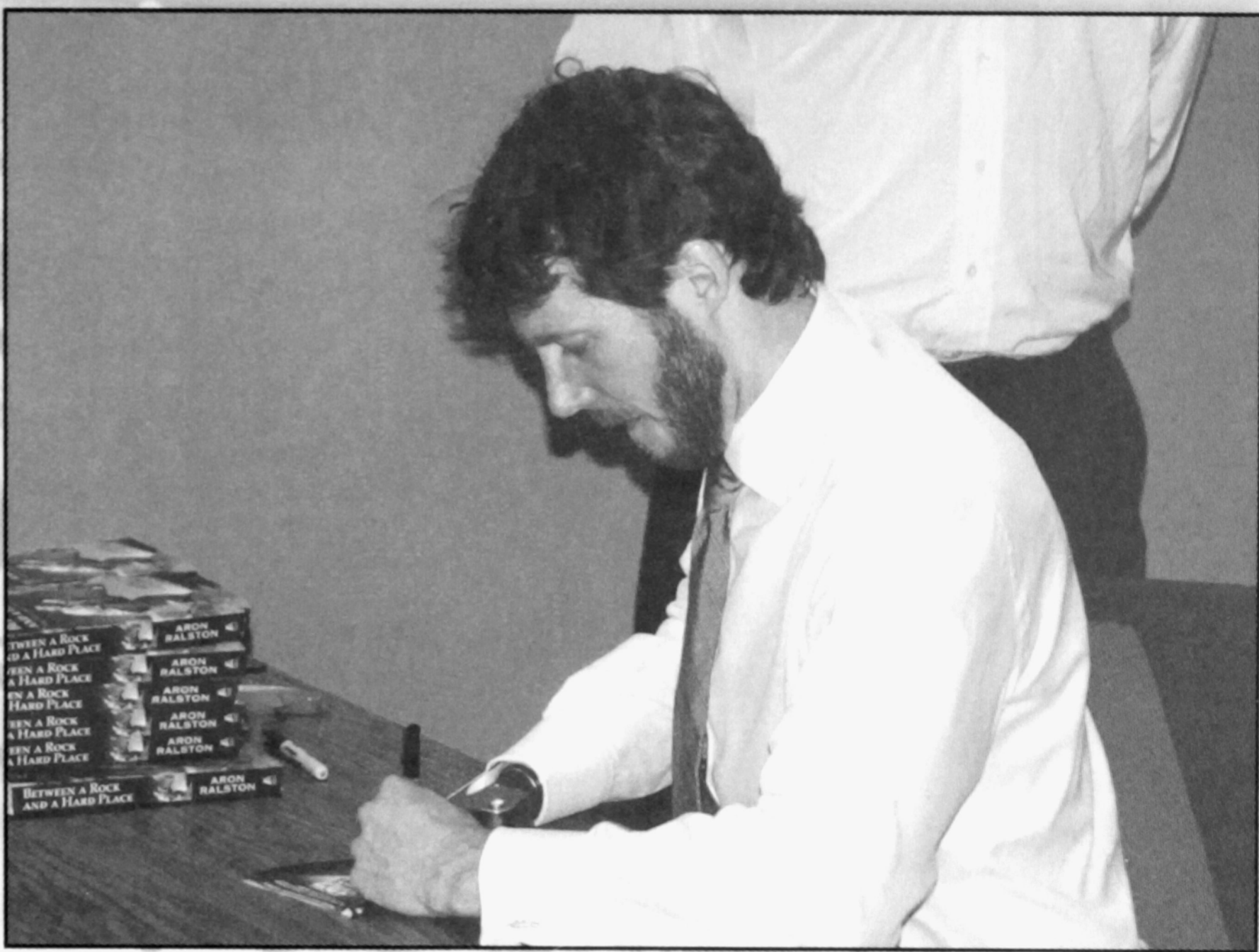

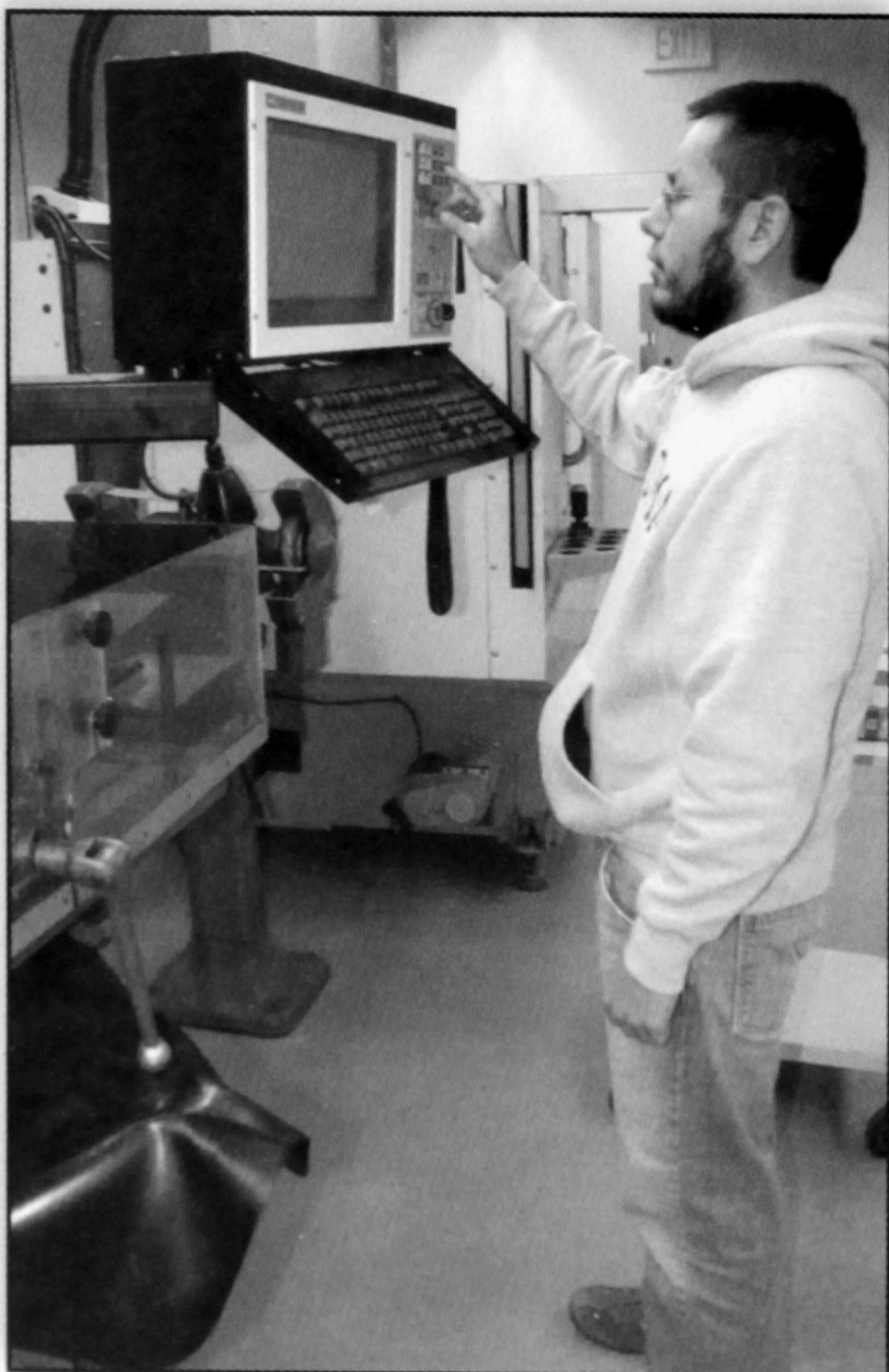
The \$2.2 million project began in May 2009 and was completed in July of 2010. Meyer Architecture in Oklahoma City and Jim Loomis Construction of Weatherford were responsible for the renovation.

The ribbon-cutting ceremony was held right before the open house. The building is located just south of the Campbell Building on the northeast side of the SWOSU campus.

The project renovation upgraded all existing classroom, laboratory and office spaces while adding an additional 8,000 square feet of education space. The Department of Engineering Technology Chair Brad Bryant quotes, "We are excited about utilizing such a historic building to grow our program."

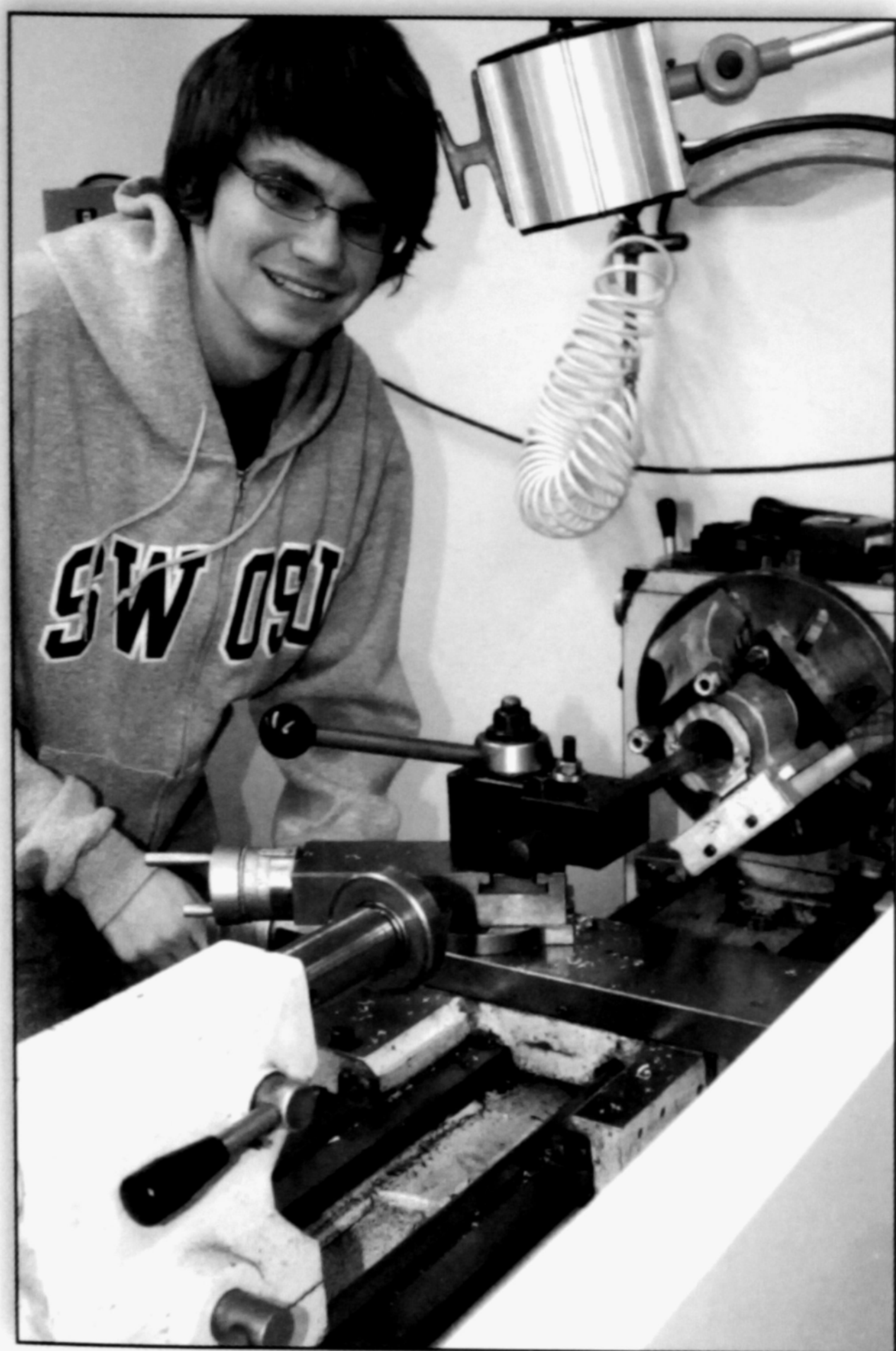

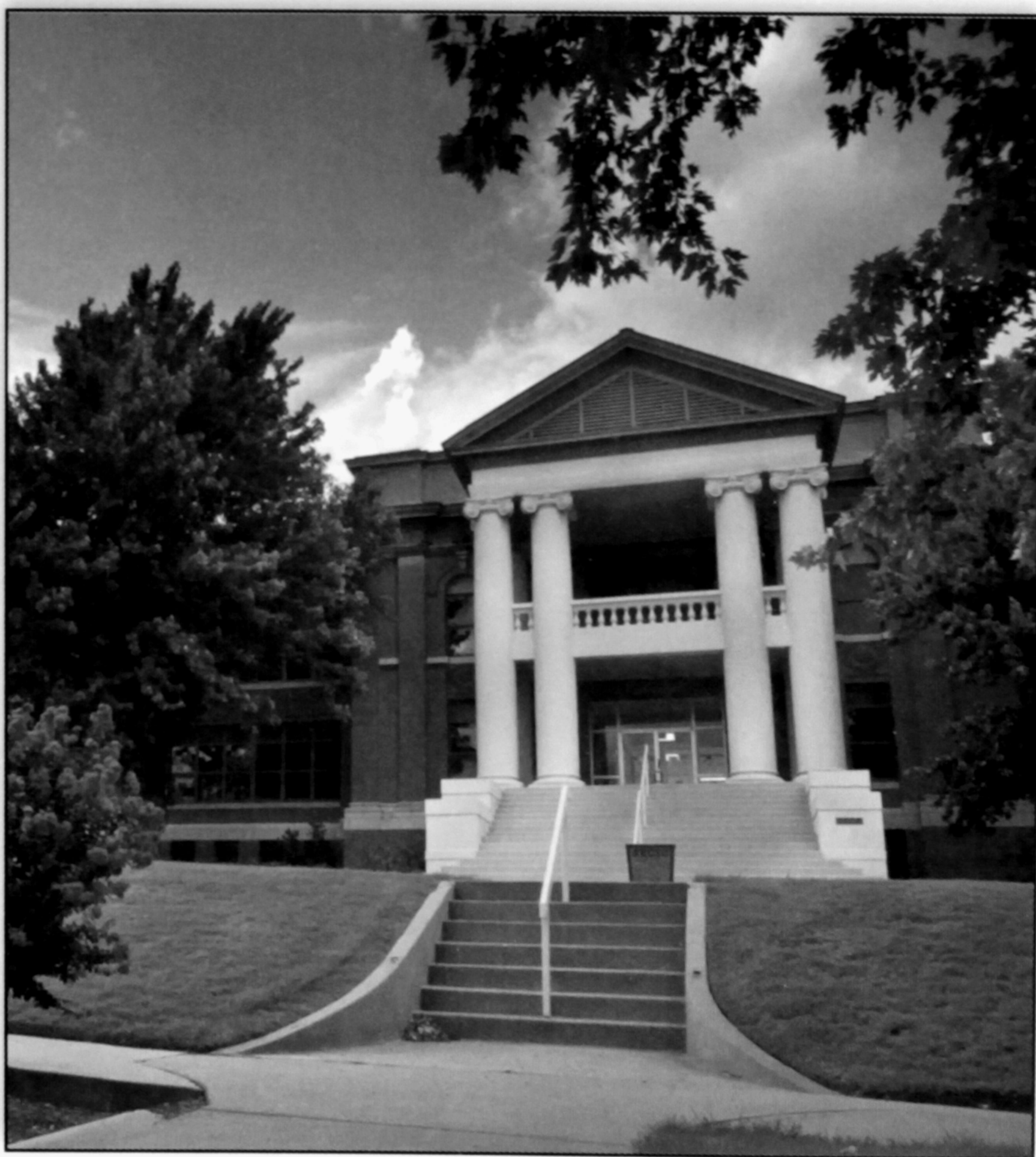
A ribbon ceremony was held at the Old Science Centennial with President Beutler cutting the ribbon.

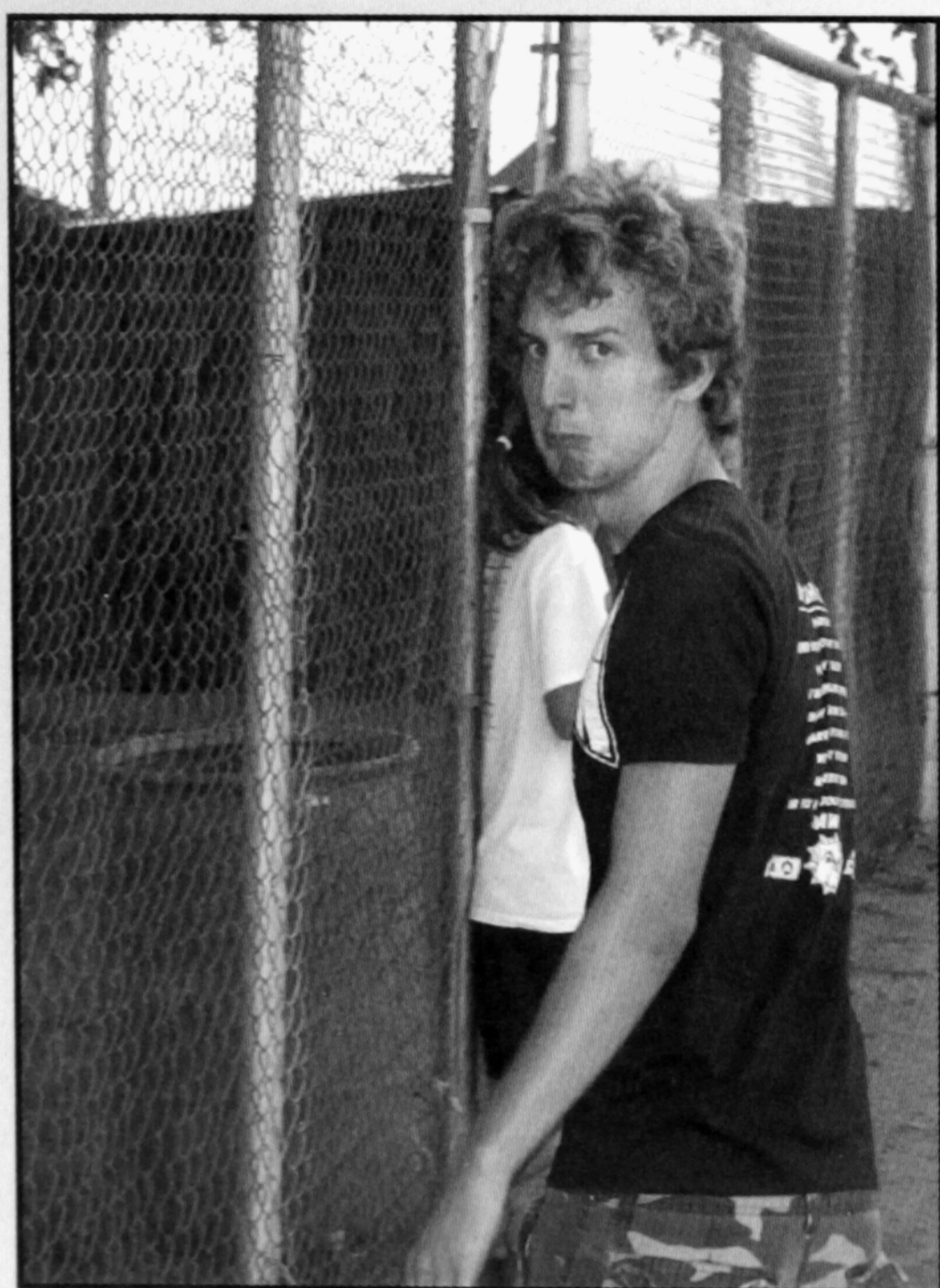

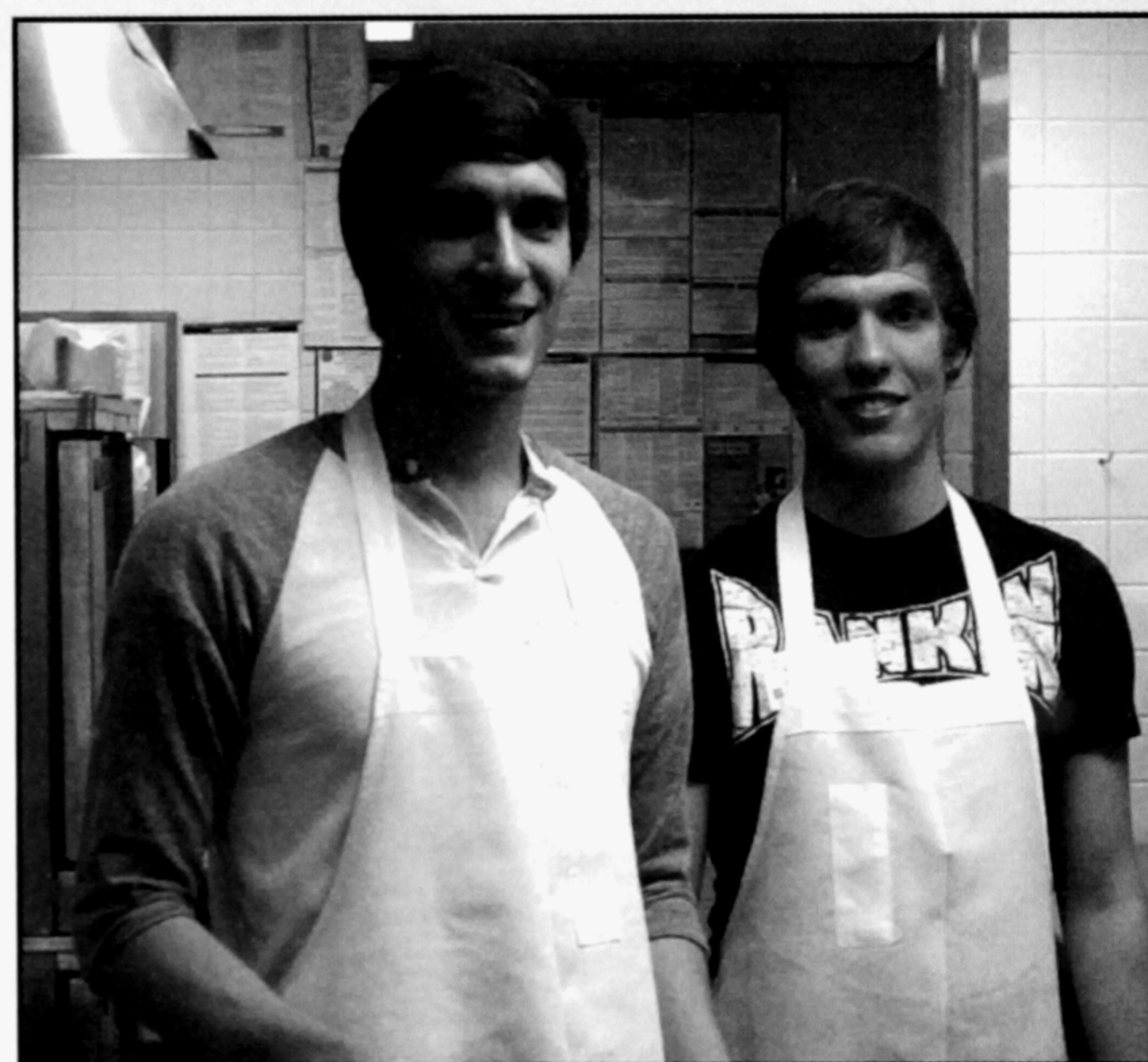

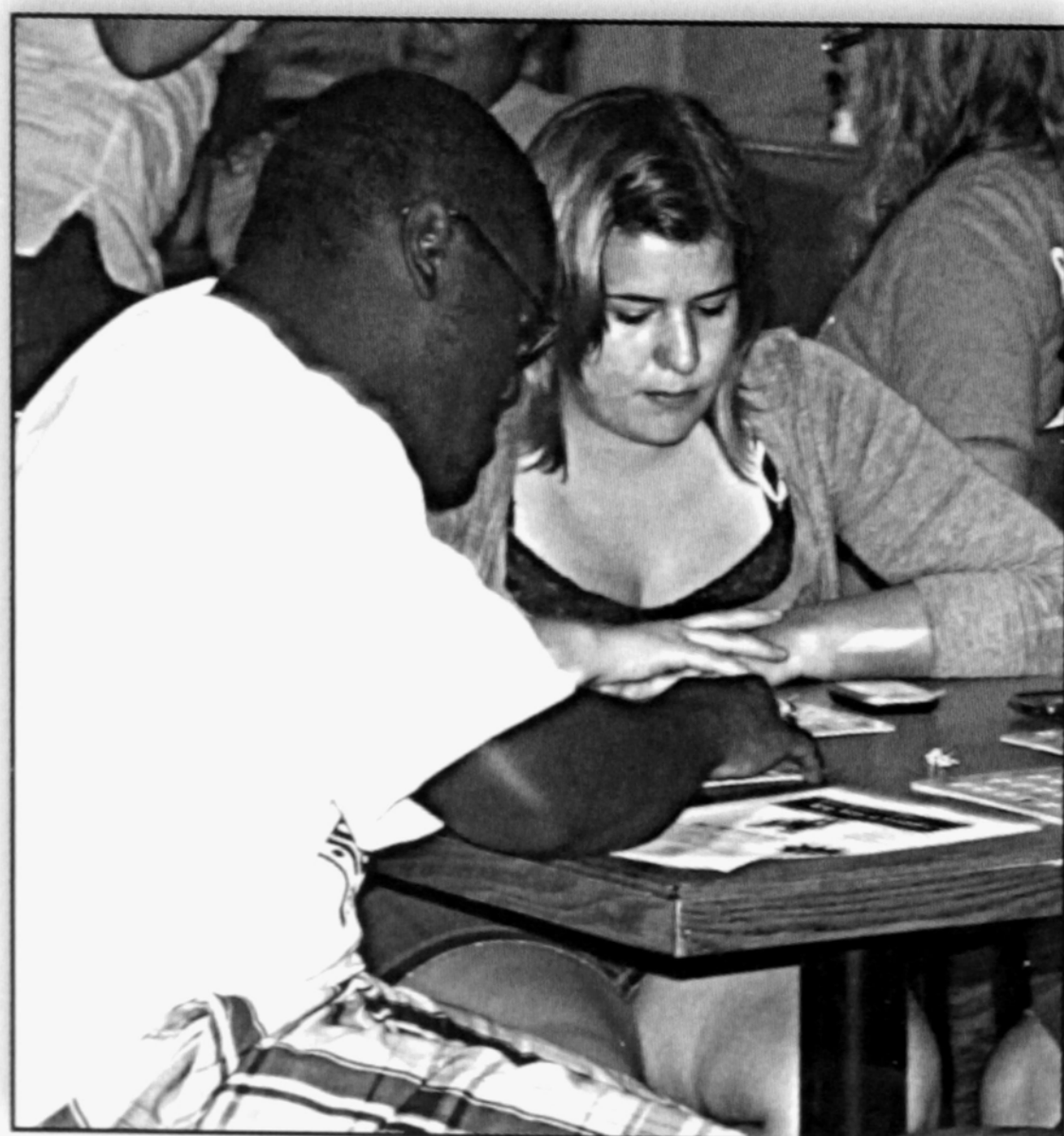

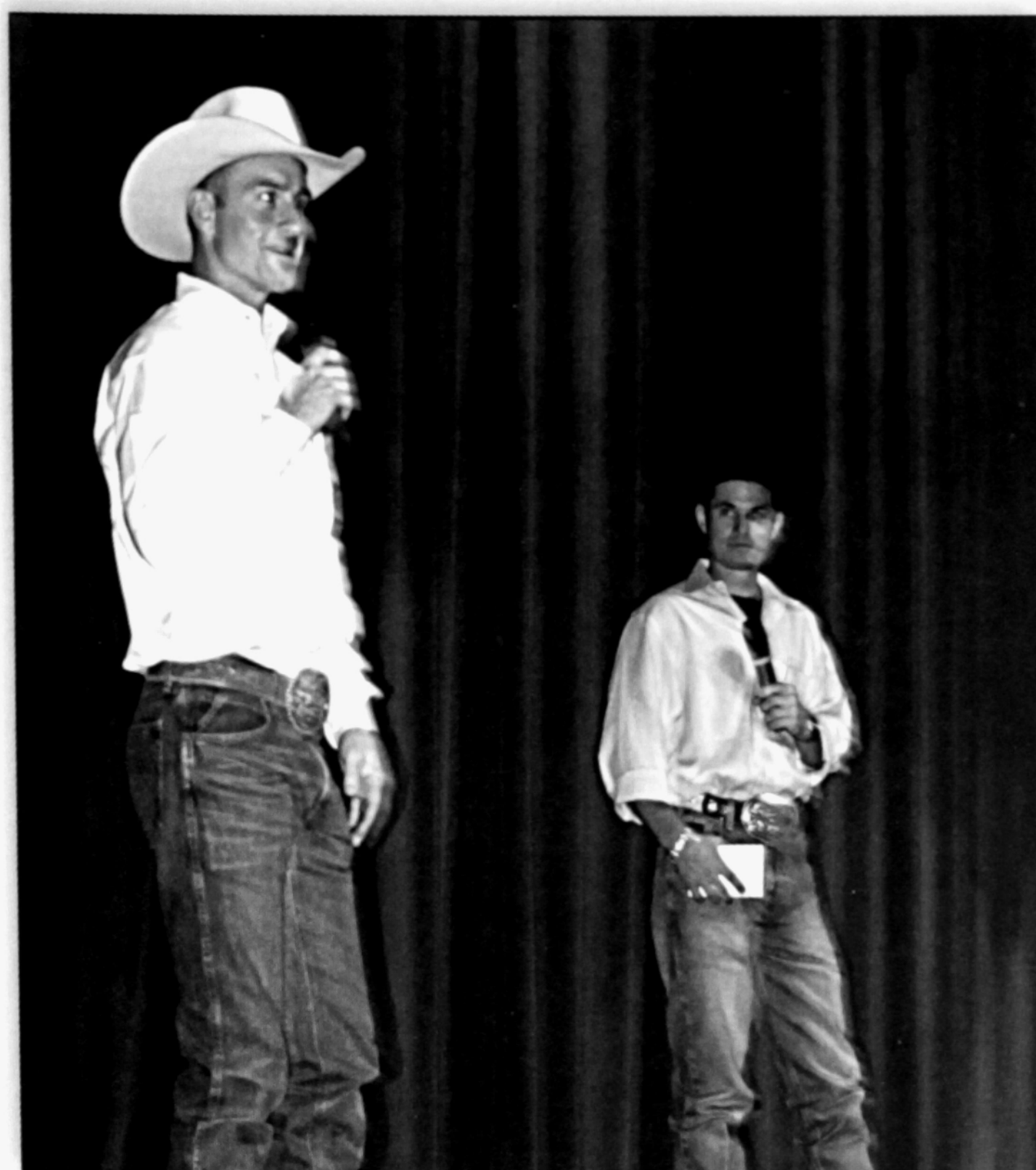

The The Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribal College (CATC) is the result of extensive planning by the Education Authority of the Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes and Southwestern Oklahoma State University (SWOSU). SWOSU serves as a partner with CATC as it progresses through its initial developmental stages as a tribally-controlled institution of higher education.

CATC is currently and temporarily located on the main campus of Southwestern in the "Old" Science Building, First Floor, Suite 104 as a result of a Memorandum of Understanding entered into between the Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribal College Board of Regents and SWOSU on May 25, 2006. The Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribal College held its opening ceremonies on August 25, 2006 and inaugurated its first president on April 3, 2008.

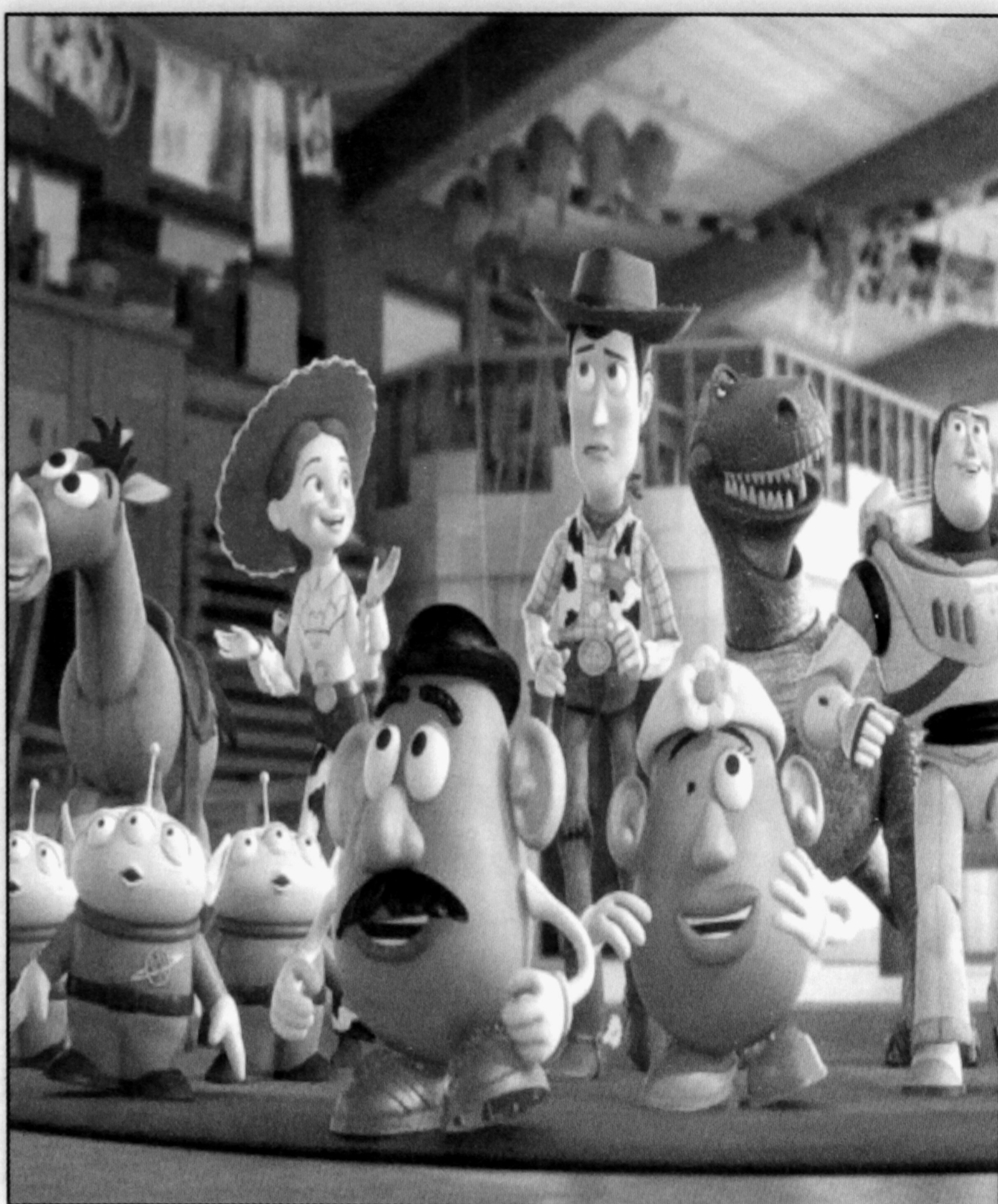

The greeks participate in many events, fundraisers, and community services on and off the campus. They do all this while promoting brotherhood or sisterhood and keeping their values in mind.

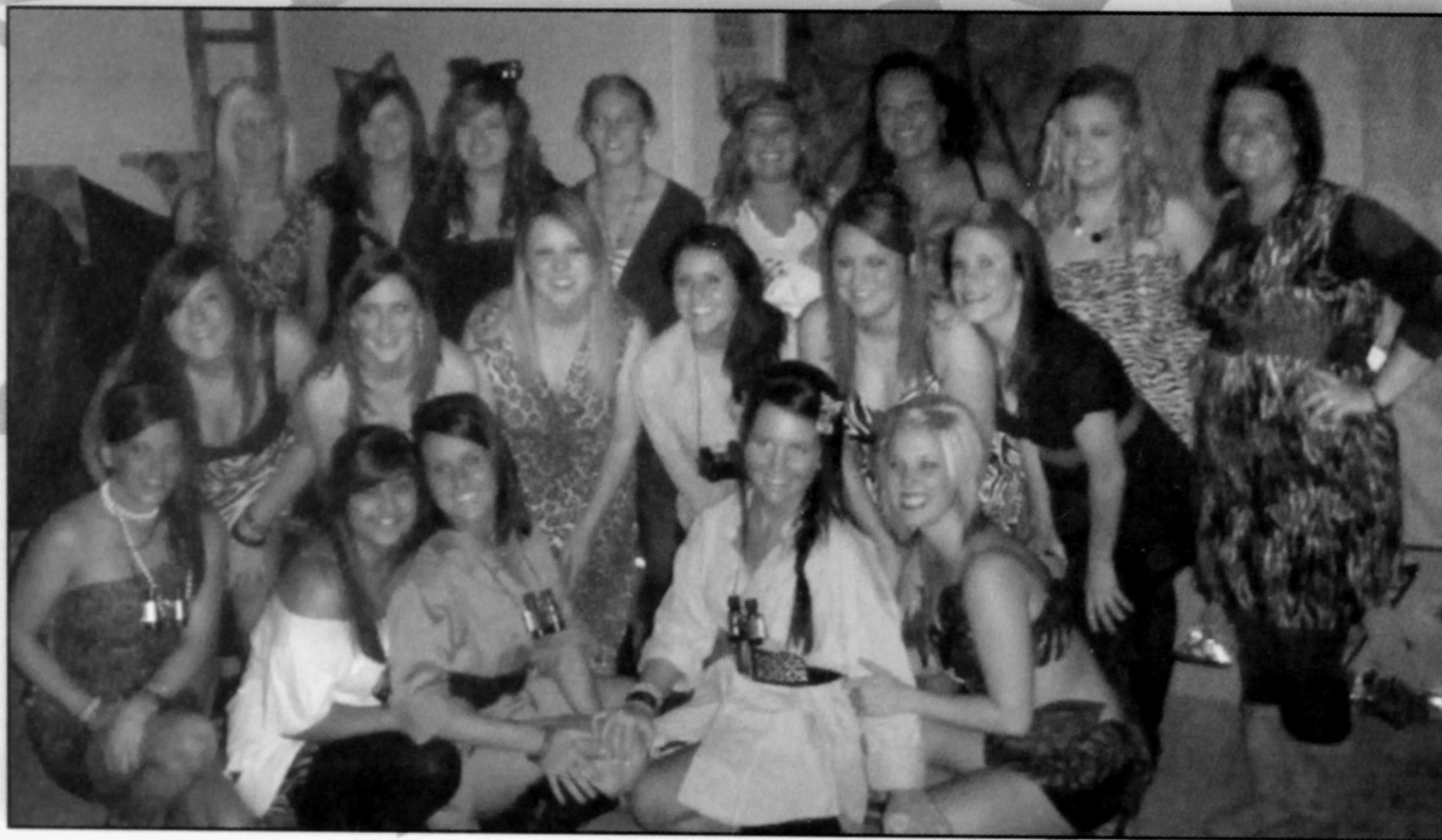
The greeks helped put on the biggest blood drive SWOSU has had in the fall. They also help raise money for Relay for Life and participate all night at

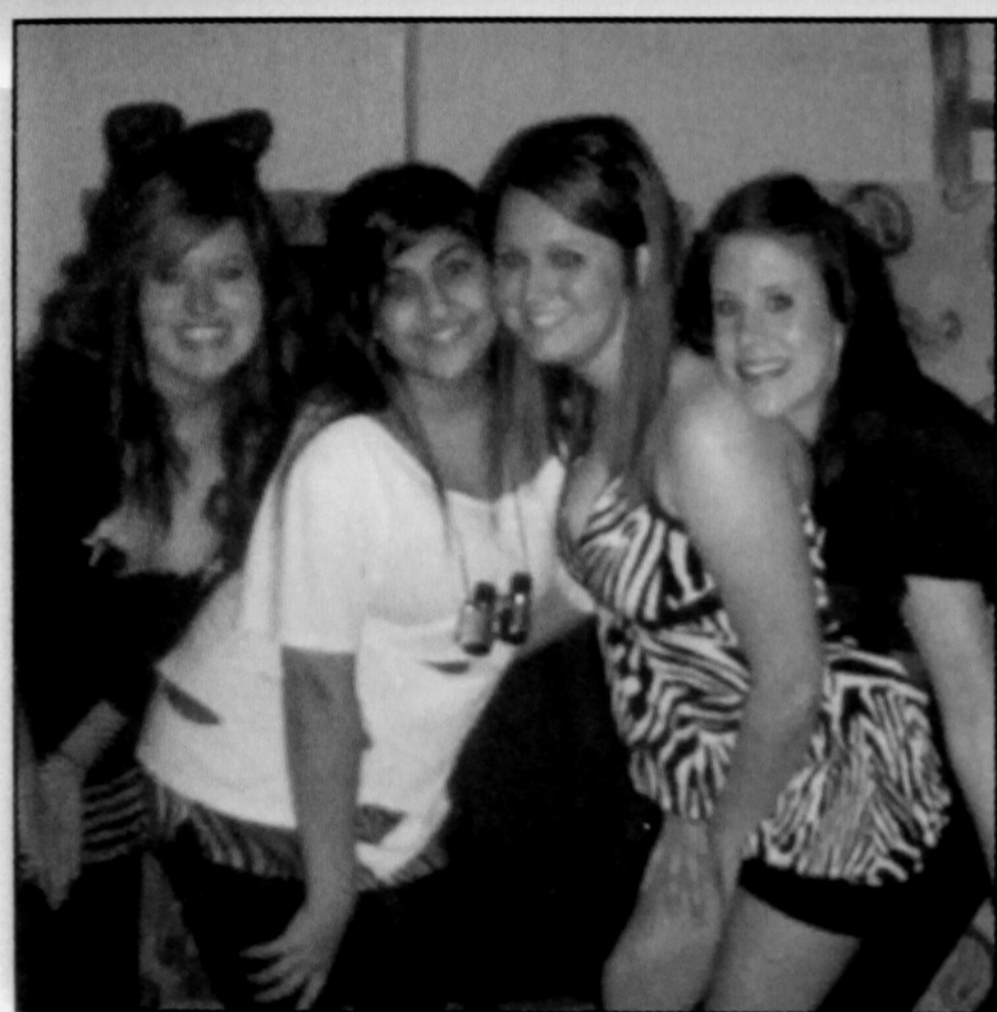

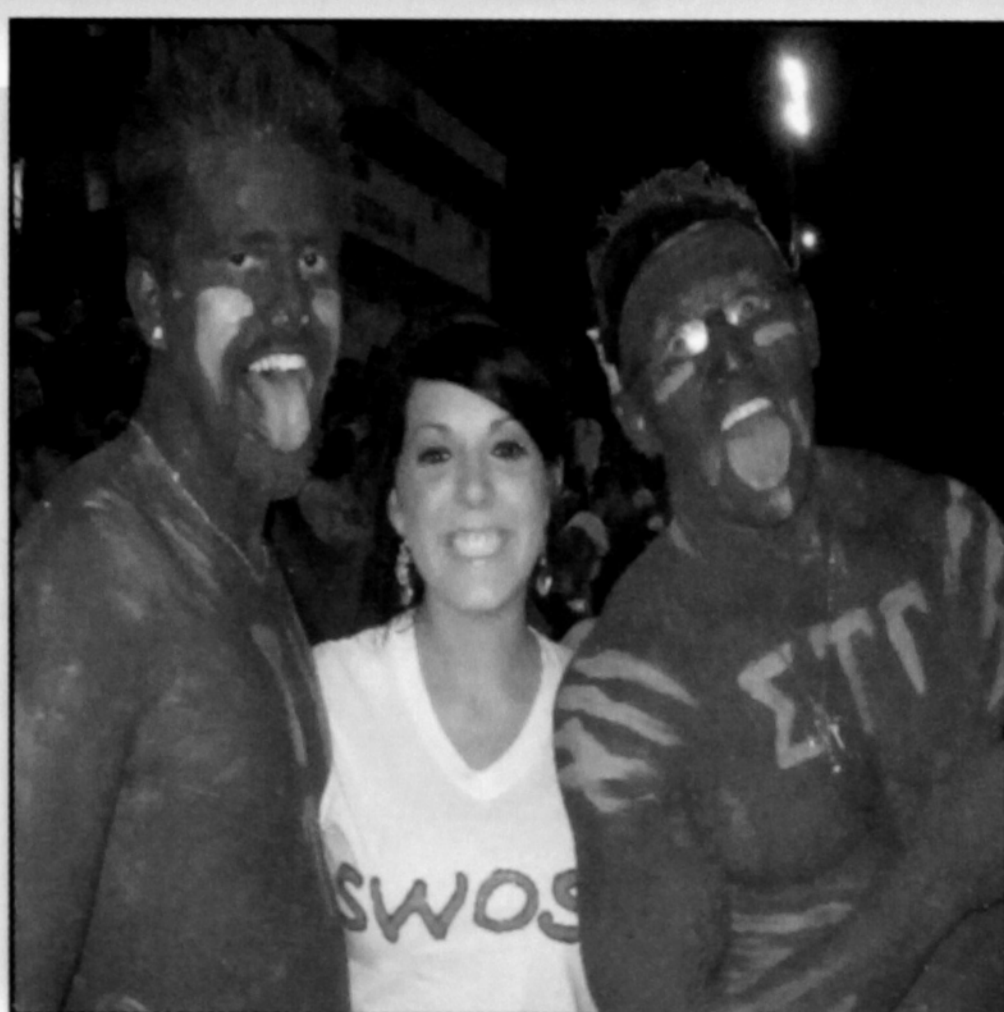

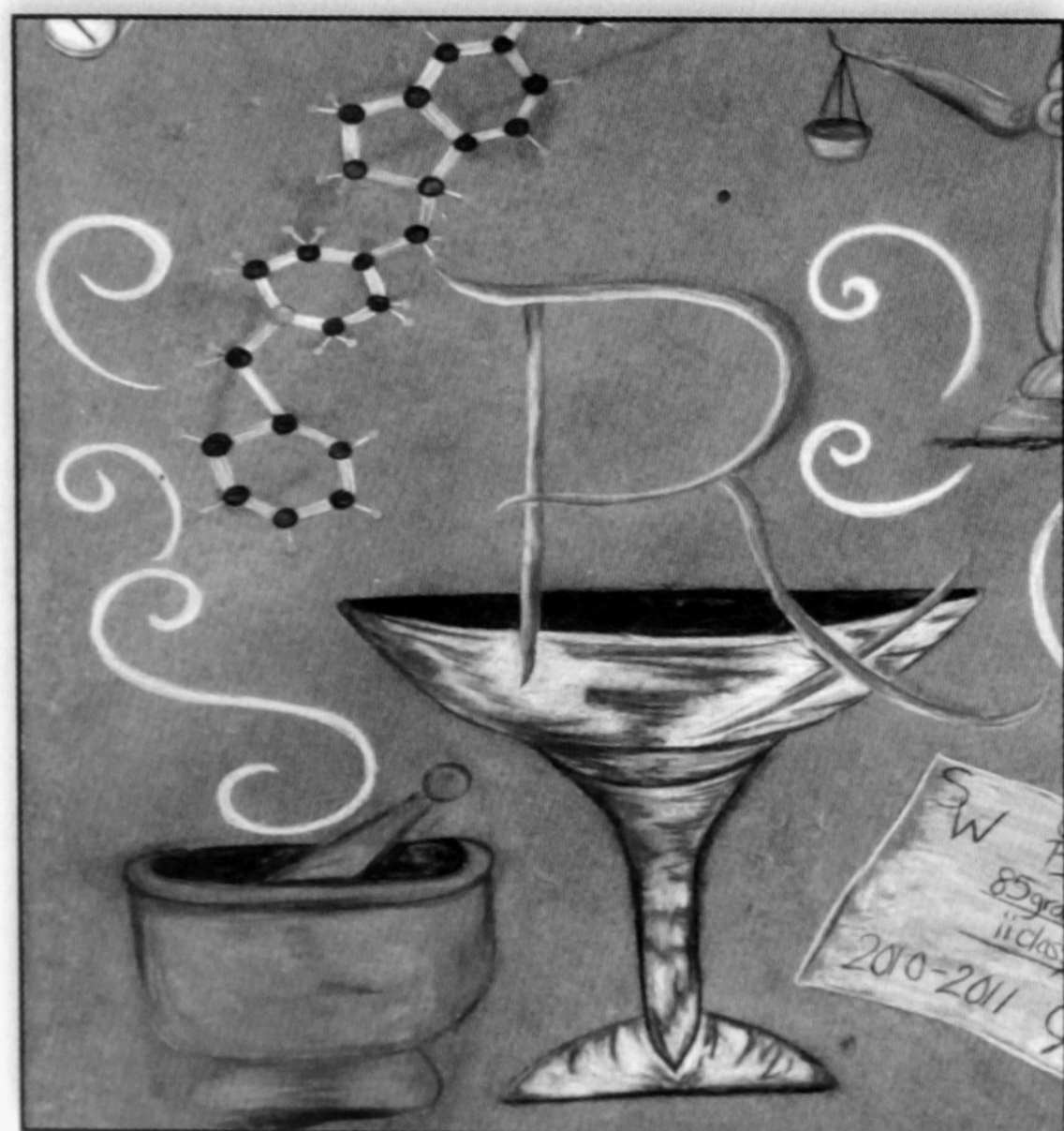

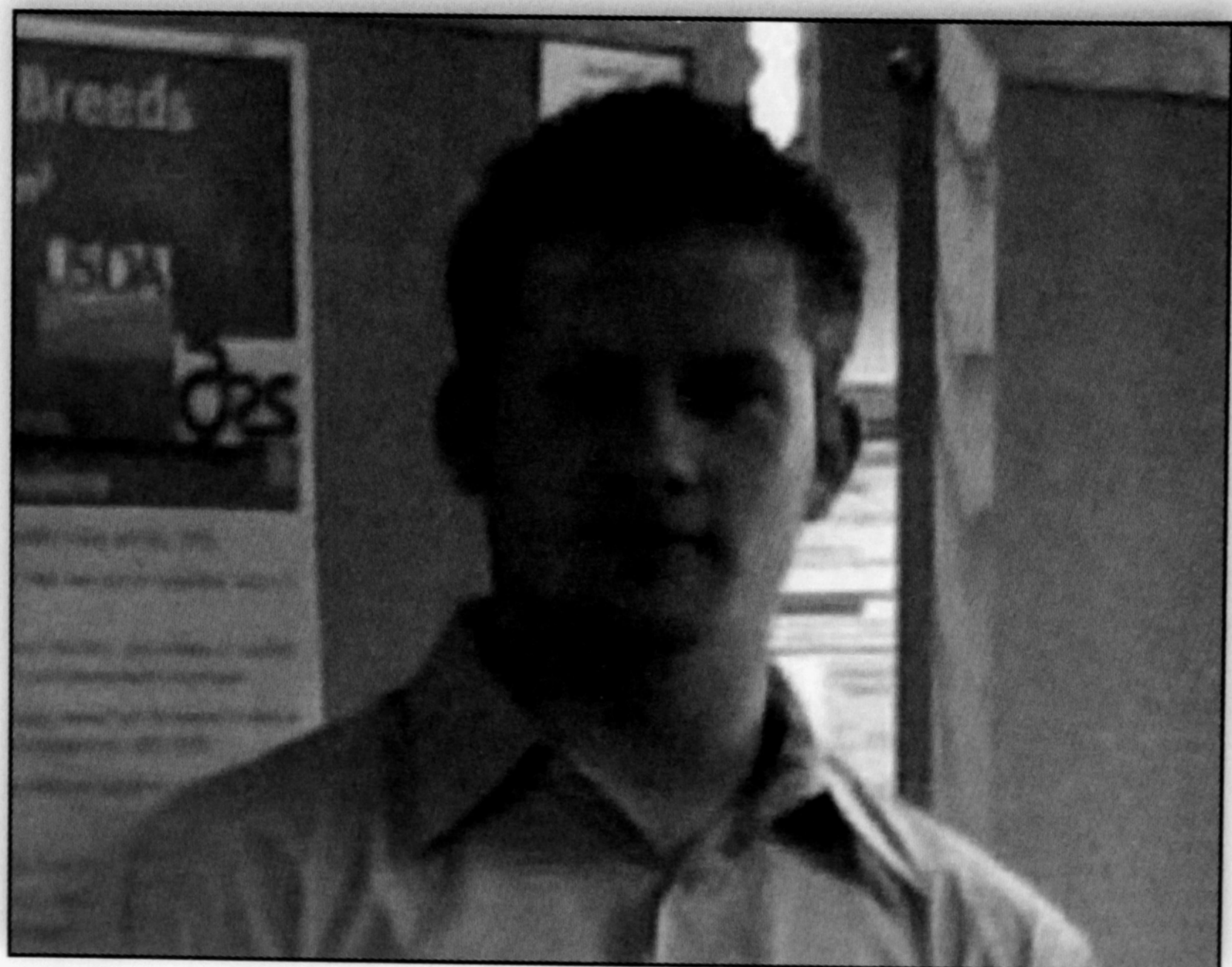

After a rough start to the season, going 0-4, the Bulldogs came back with an exciting win over Eastern New Mexico to make them 1-4. After that, the Bulldogs, under second-year coach Dan Cocannouer, finished the season with a 3-8 record. SWOSU ended its 2010 football season testing itself against the nation's second-ranked NCAA Division II football team giving Abilene Christian University a stern challenge before falling 47-17. Although a loss, many Southwestern players had a very good game. SWOSU's biggest star of the game was wide receiver Ryan Corbin who caught two touchdown passes, including a 42-yarder in the final seconds. Corbin, the sophomore from Newcastle, finished the day with four catches for 72 yards. His touchdowns were from two different SWOSU quarterbacks, starter Dustin Stenta and backup Michael Van Deripe.

Jonathan Darby was among a handful of elite players selected to the Lone Star Conference North Division All-Conference team. 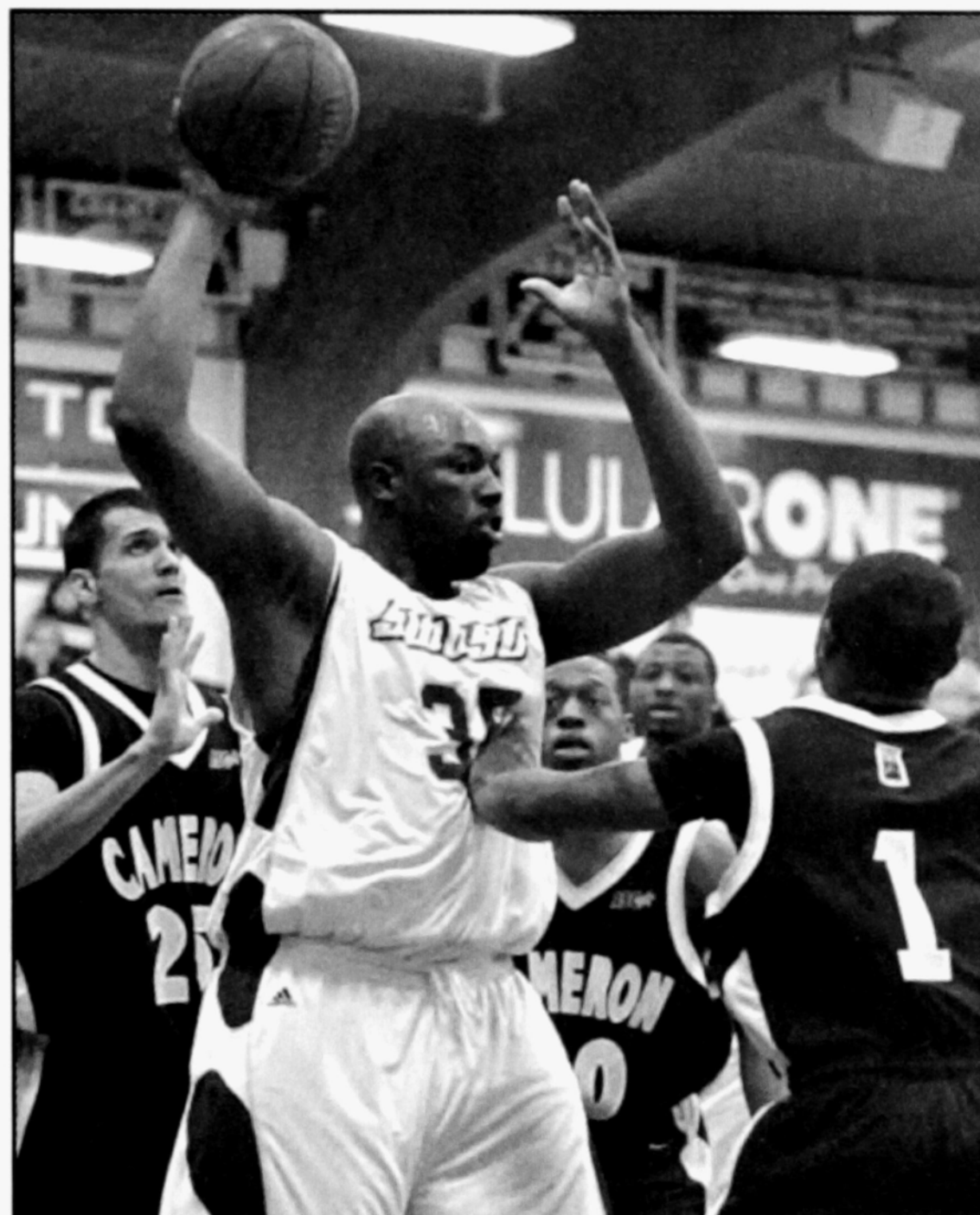

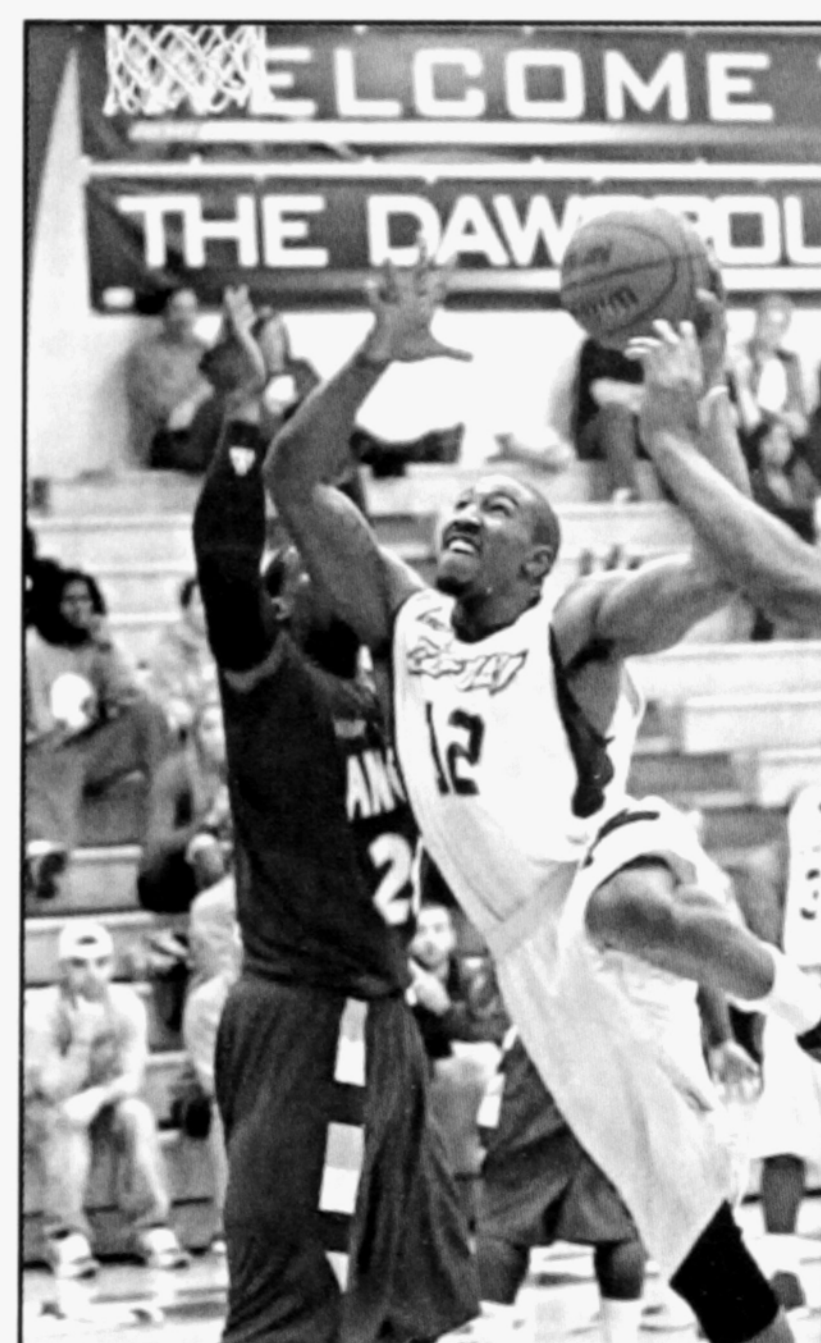

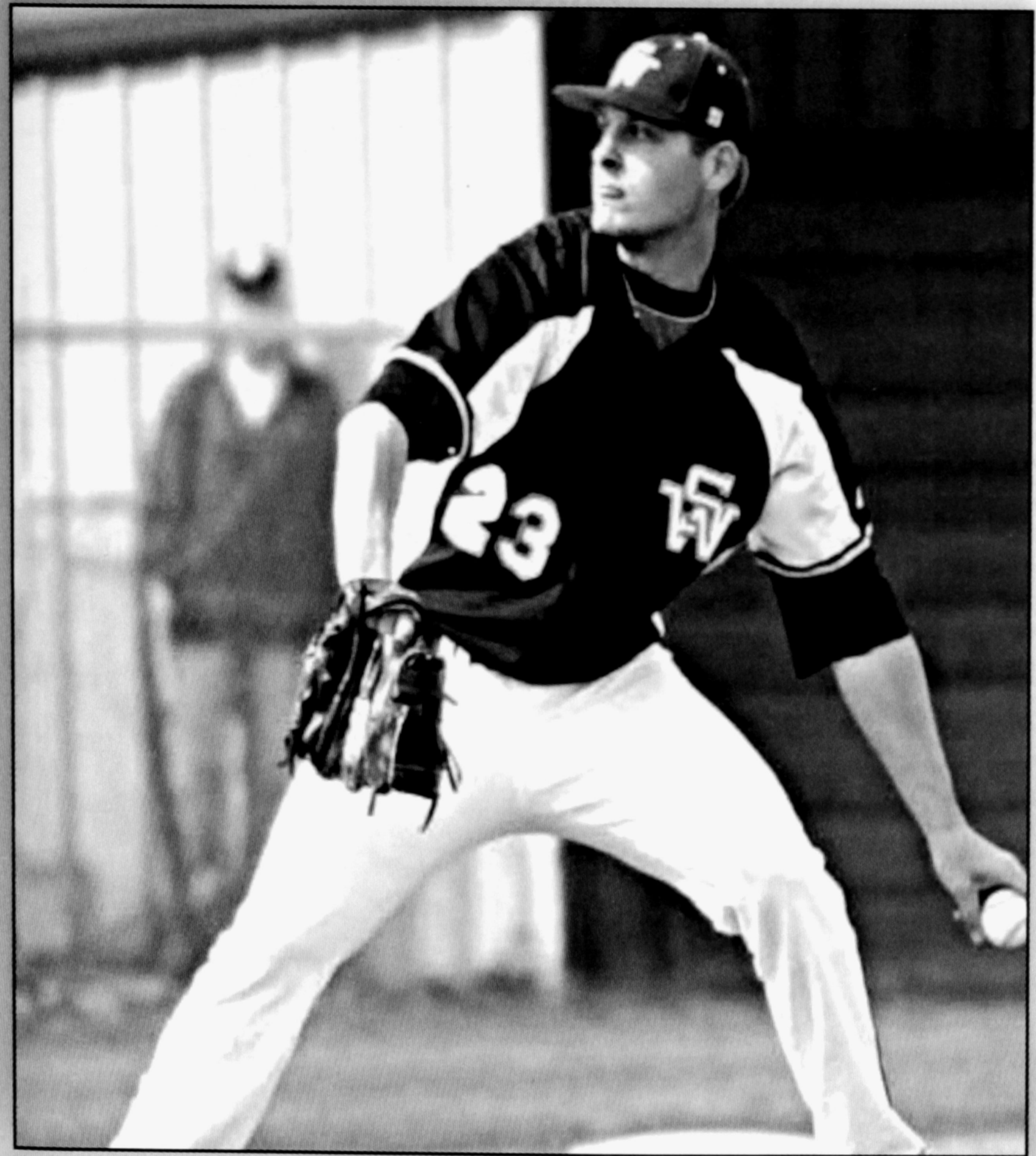

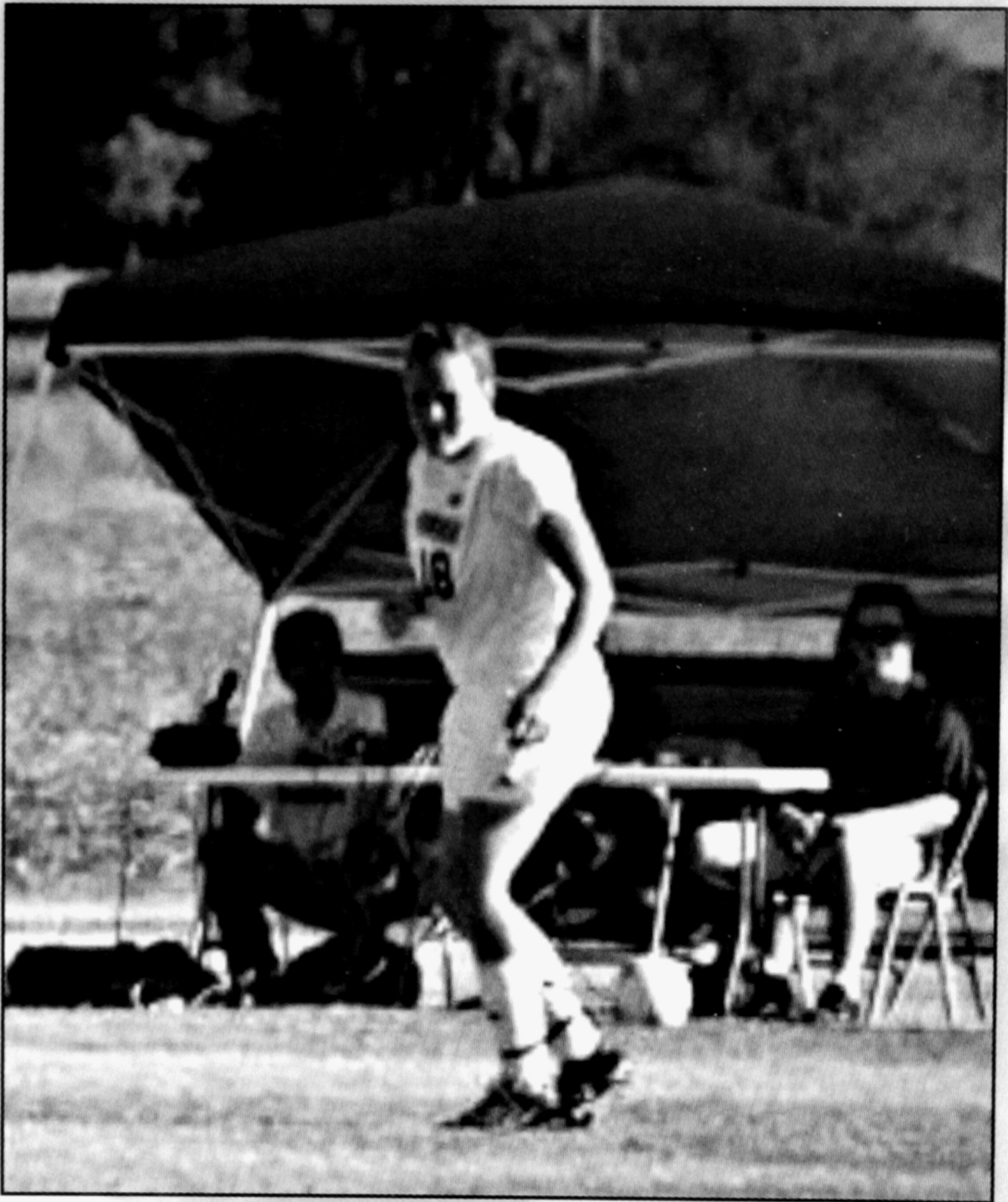

Southwestern softball got off to a fast start in the spring and at press time was 15-11 after a good showing at the Lone Star Conference crossover tournament.

The team put together its best-ever showing in the annual Lone Star Conference Softball Crossover Tournament winning three-of-five games in action played at San Angelo, Texas.

At the crossover, SWOSU was 4-2 losers to Texas A&M-Kingsville in the first game on Friday then bounced back with a 4-2 win over Eastern New Mexico. The Bulldogs split two games Saturday, losing 5-0 to Incarnate Word and then beating Tarleton State, 1-0. SWOSU won its third game on Sunday with a 3-0 shutout against Abilene Christian.

In the win against ACU, Katie Raines (who was later named LSC player of the week) tossed an eight-hit shutout of the Wildcats to improve her record to 9-5 on the year. Raines was the winning pitcher in all three games at the tournament. She retired nine of the first 10 ACU batters she faced and then got a bases-load double-play in the seventh to preserve the blanking.

It was the second consecutive shutout Raines had tossed. Earlier she blanked Tarleton State and then tossed zeros at Eastern New Mexico in her final four innings. She has thrown 18 consecutive scoreless innings and lowered her ERA to a paltry 1.85.

Kori Oord was SWOSU's offensive hero against ACU. Her two-run homer was part of a three-run sixth that put the Bulldogs in front to stay.

In the final game against Tarleton, Raines was again dominant on the mound. She allowed just four hits and retired 10 straight batters during the middle portion of the game. She struck out five and walked just two TexAnns.

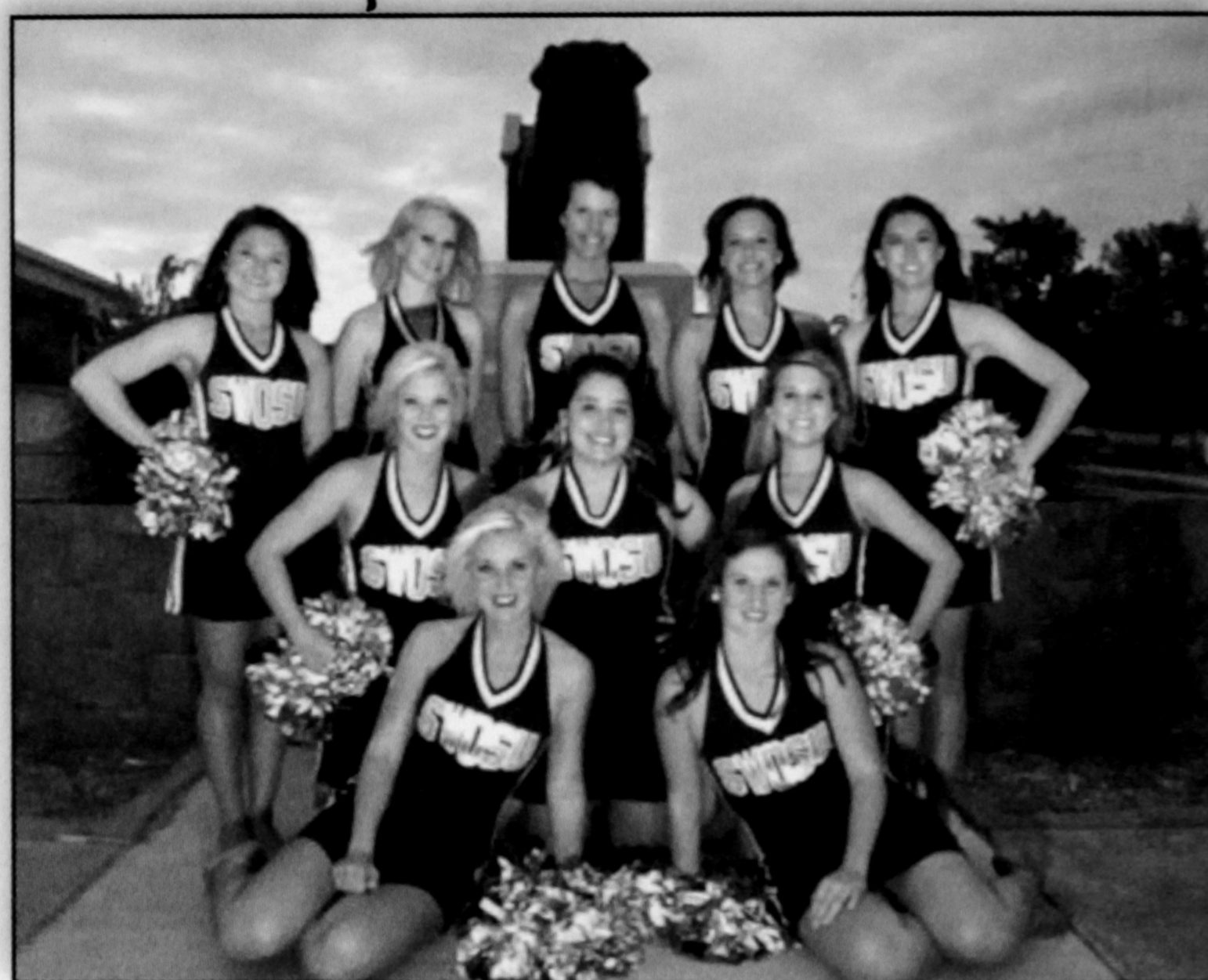

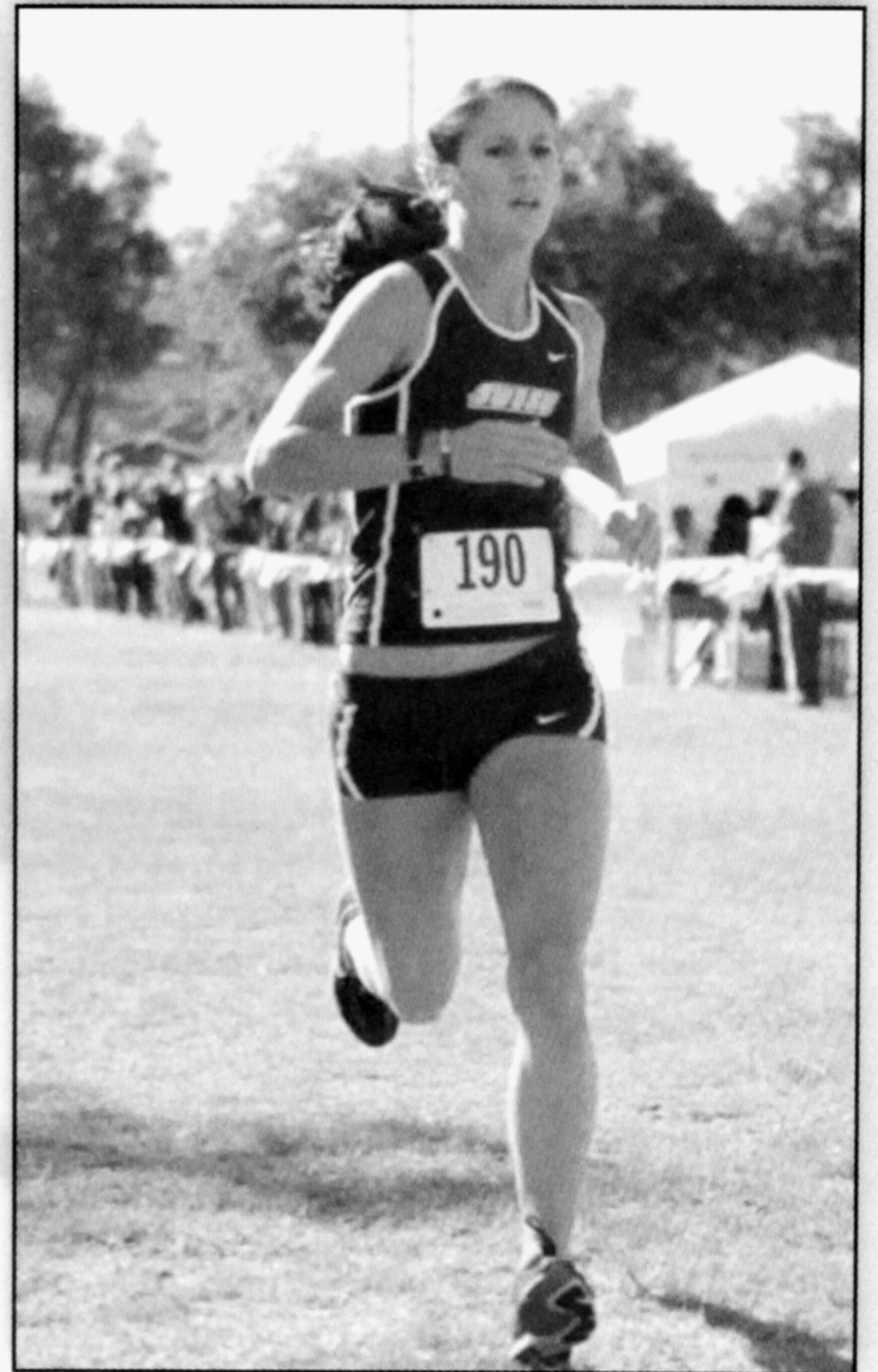

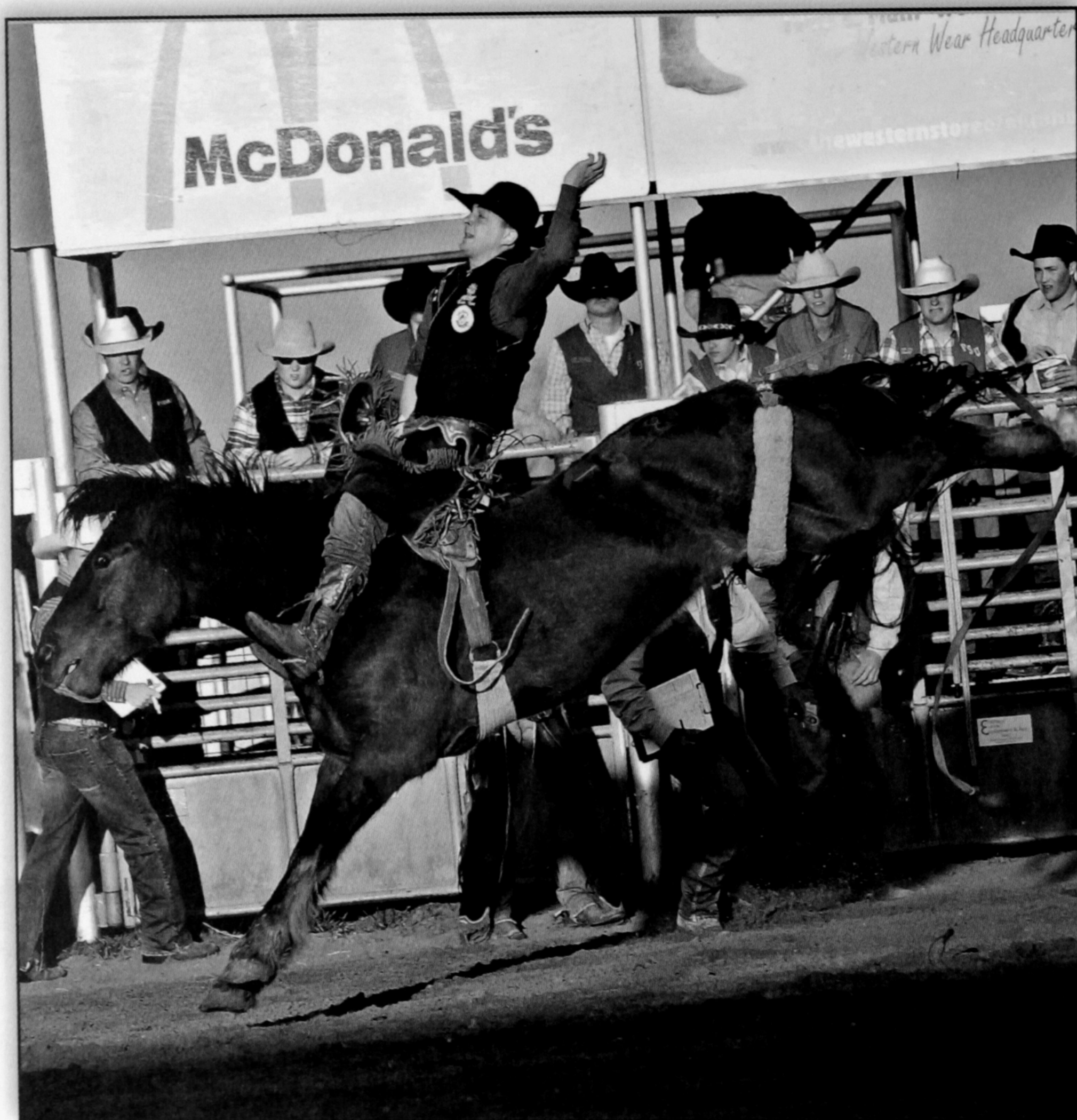

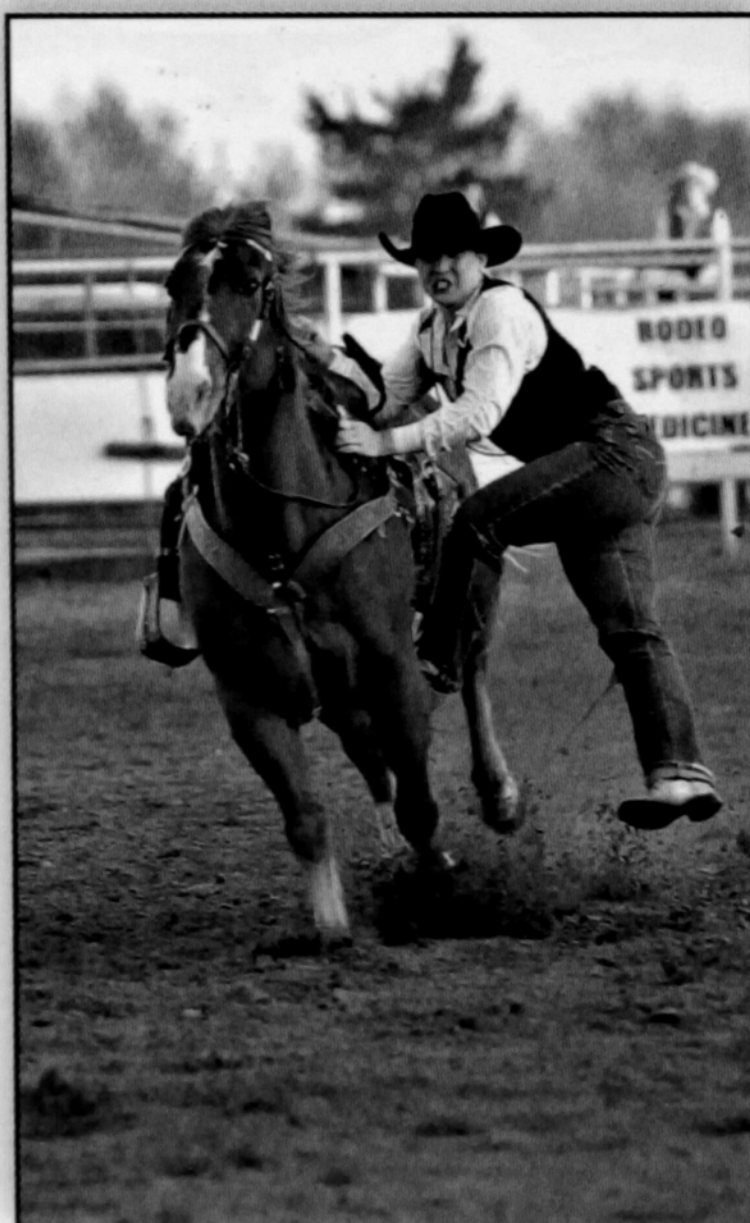

Outhier won the goats by turning in a pair of 7.3 times in both the short and long run to capture the average at Fort Scott, Kansas Rodeo. SWOSU was the top finishing team with 280 points. Garden City finished second with 24 points while Oklahoma State finished third with 180 points.

With the strong finish at the Garden City, Kansas Rodeo SWOSU moved up one spot into fourth-place in the Central Plains Regional Standings. The Bulldogs have 1,596 points and trail OPSU (2,355) and Southeastern Oklahoma State (2,170) after five rodeos. The top two teams at the end of the regular season will advance to the College National Finals Rodeo (CNFR).

So far the SWOSU Rodeo Team has been doing very well in every Rodeo they have competed in, hopefully they will save their best performances for the 39th annual Southwestern Oklahoma State University Rodeo where more than 500 cowboys and cowgirls will be competing. 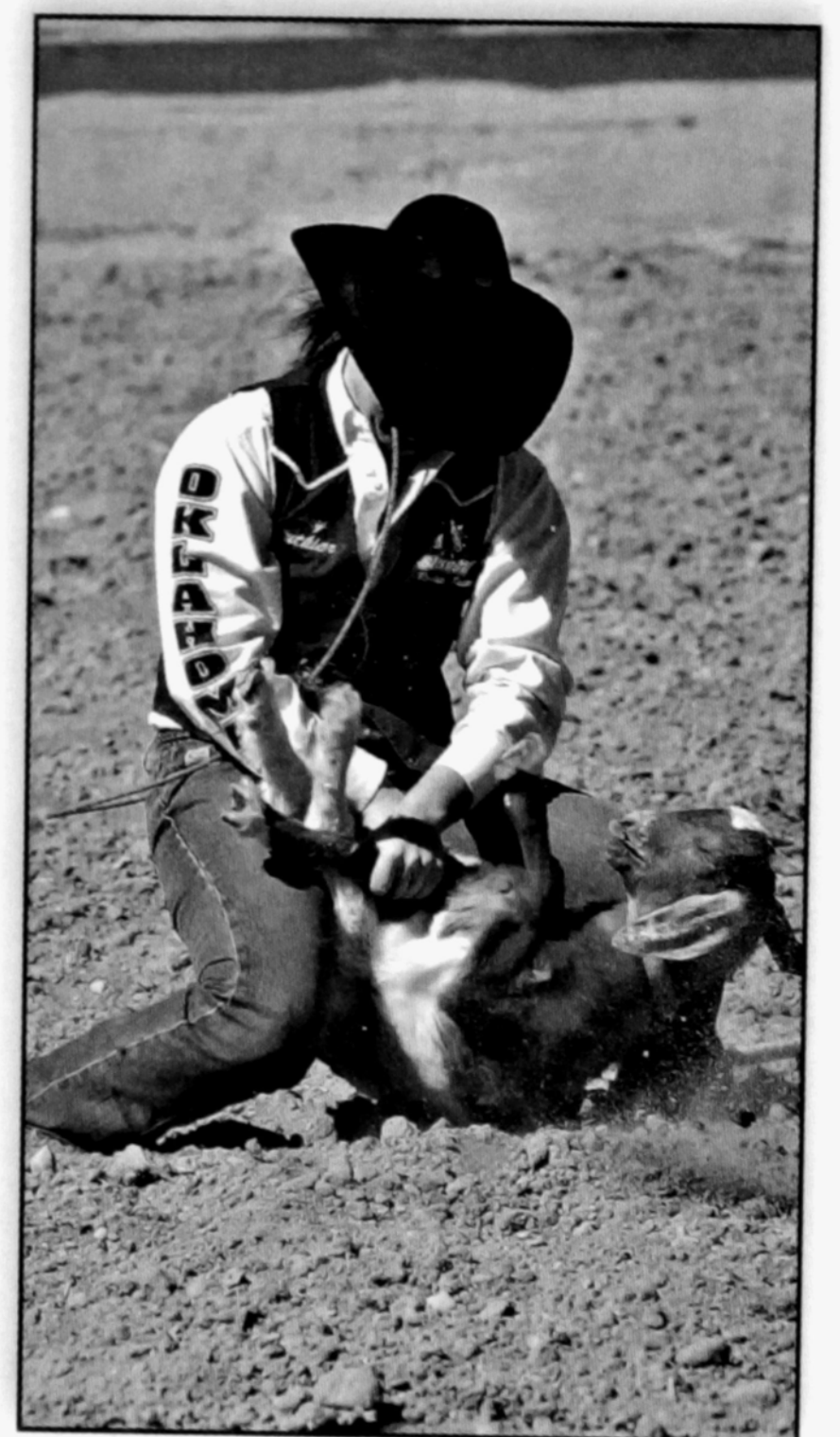
He will be replacing longtime coach Chad Ramirez who announced his resignation earlier this year.

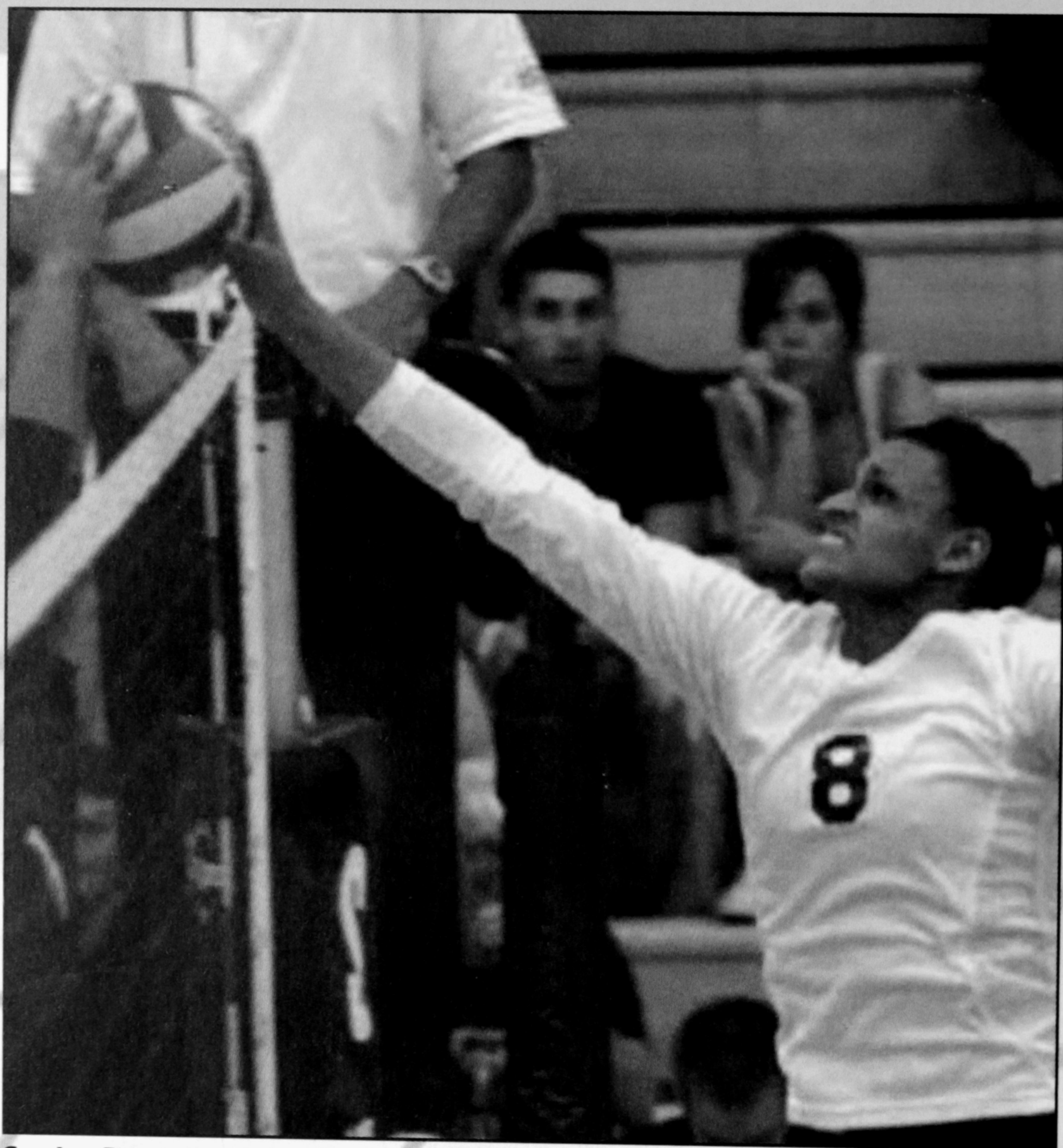

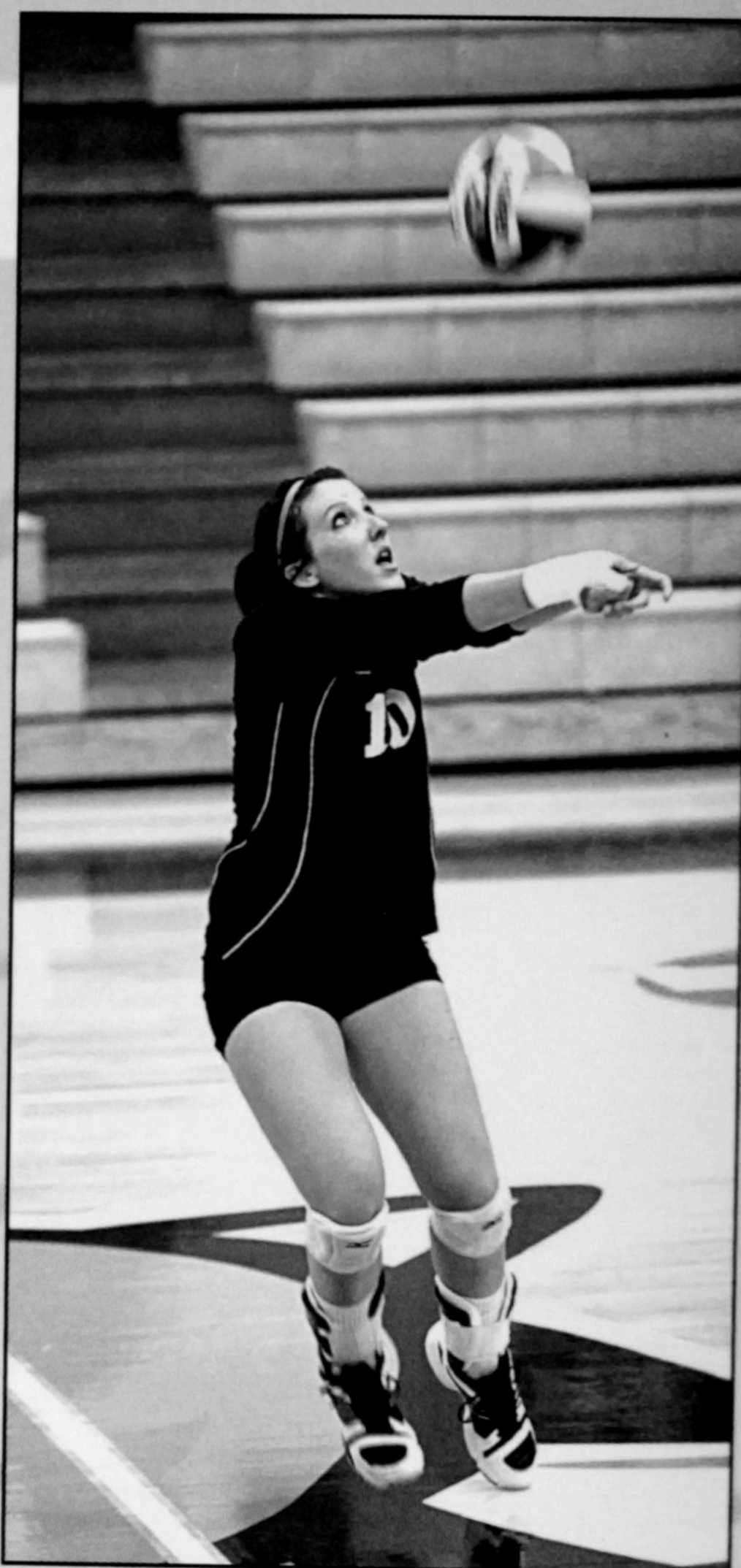

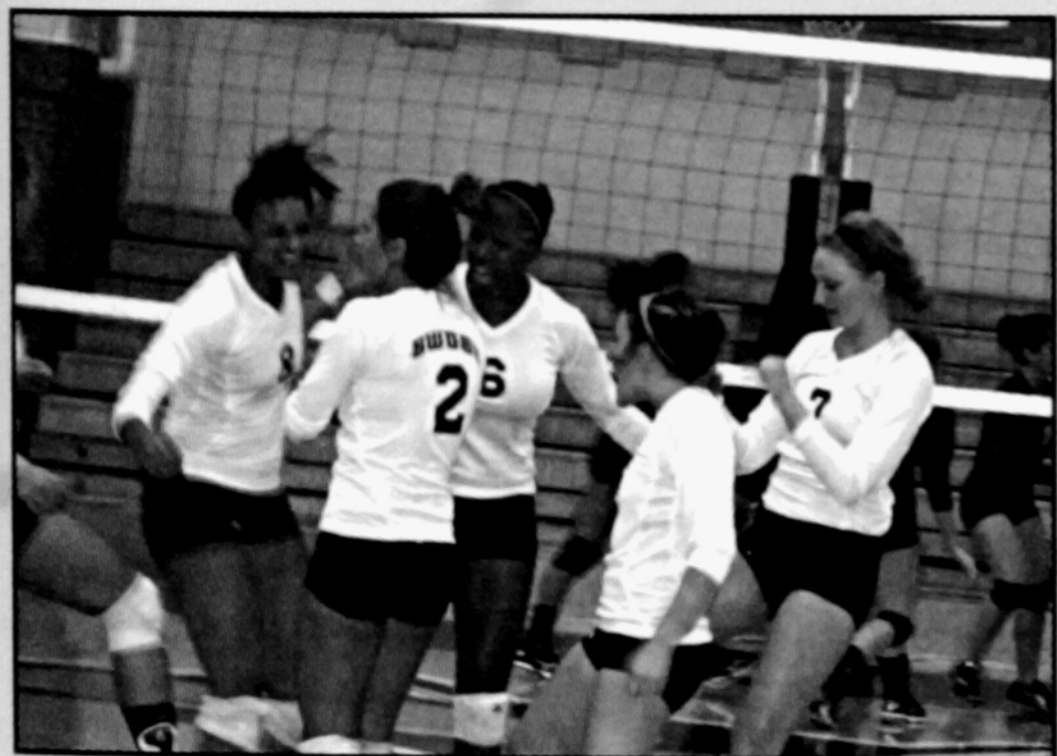

SWOSU looks to continue building on this years success in the seasons to come.



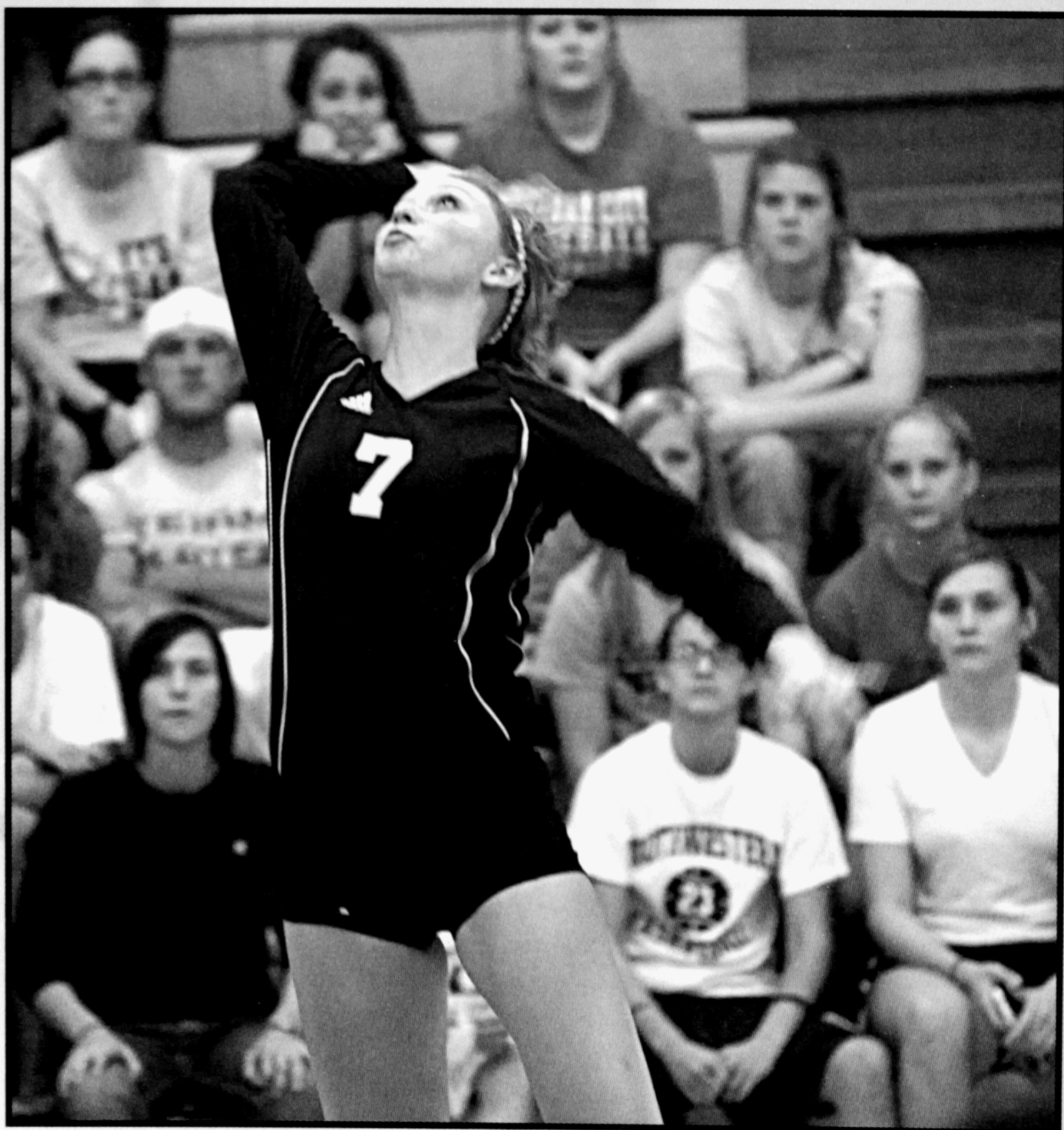
