

Tolkien Conference III - Mythcon I drew from 200 to 225 attendees at Harvey Mudd College in Claremont California. It was quite sucessful for a first con put on by The Mythopoeic Society. The programwas principally made up of papers given by various people covering Tolkien, Lewis, Williams and other fantasy literature, but there were enough events of a lighter nature that the con never lost pace and everyone's interest was captured firmly throughout the two and two-half days. There was a congenial attitude about, from high school students to college professors. They not only enjoyed the fun of being among friends but also appreciated the serious literary discussions.

The opening party on Friday night featured a colorful slide show of 2 1/2 years of Mythopoeic events. This was interrupted by the sudden appearence of the Emperor of Formenor (Bruce McMenomy) and his Imperial Guard brandishing spears. They had come to present chairman Glen GoodKnight with a copy of Gwyntystorm, a sort of good natured parody on the society's fanzine, Mythlore. Actually Gwynty, with its great Tim Kirk cover, is a very good fanzine on its own merit. (Copies may be had a \$1 each from David Ring,

That evening's program ended with a showing of the H.G. Wells' film, The Man Who Could Work Miracles.

After the official opening session on Saturday morning a busy

After the official opening session on Saturday morning a busy schedule began with many scholarly papers read. Saturday afternoon a panel on the revival of Adult Fantasy Literature included Katherine Kurtz, whose novel <u>Deryni Rising</u> is the first new fantasy novel to be published in the Ballantine Adult Fantasy series. She explained that she chose to write good fantasy as a reaction to the current rash of so-called realistic novels. Another panel discussed the upcoming film of The Lord of The Rings. All kinds of suggestions came from the audience on how to film Tolkien's masterpiece but we all had to admit the film studios would eventually have their way.

In the evening a program of songs from Middle Earth presented by the Performing Arts Workshop of the Society surprised most with its professional polish. Bruce McMenomy and David Sewell provided recorder interludes. Music written by Gracia-Fay Ellwood, Jon Lackey, Marvin Mossmond, Donald Swann, J.R.R. Tolkien, and Dale Ziegler, was performed by Gracia-Fay Ellwood, Glen GoodKnight, Marj Hoyt, Jon Lackey, Galen Peoples Rubetta Ridderhof, Paula Sigman, and Dale Ziegler. Following the musical program our Guest of Honor - C.S.

Kilby gave his talk. He is a professor of English at Wheaton College, Illinois, and he has written books on C.S. Lewis, articles on Tolkien, and has collected original manuscripts of Tolkien, Lewis and Williams. He is a good friend of Tolkien and the only American to have read parts of <u>The Silmarillion</u>. During his talk he told us of many interesting aspects in the lives and writings of the three Mythopoeic writers. The evening closed with a showing of <u>Lost Horizon</u>. Small parties were held in the dorms most nights after the movies.

At 5:30 am Sunday 40 Mythcon members huddled outside in a small alcove to hear Glen GoodKnight read "The Piper at the Gates of Dawn" from The Wind in The Willows by by Kenneth Grahame. Afterwards those who didn't go back to sleep gathered quietly and revently in an open empty field to watch the sun rise over the hills (6:35 am). This "Dawn Fandom" as it was called impressed Bernie as a scene like to be found in a Fellini movie.

Two separte tournaments took place during the convention: the first was the Punopoeic Tournament, with teams challenging each other to compete in out punning each other. Judges were King Gren Grandtime, Steve McIntosh, Sherry Shaw, and Bonnie Bergstrom as Mistress of the Lists. The second was a demonstration tourney by the Barony of the Angles, the new LA branch of the Society for Creative Anachronism, an attempt to recruit new members and get smashed up.

Sunday afternoon, Special Guest - Professor John Lawlor of Keele University, England, spoke on Tolkien and Lewis. He studied under Tolkien at Oxford. It was fascinating to hear about these writers from one of their countrymen.

The Art Show was smaller than most Westercon displays, but nevertheless contained a lot of glorious work from such fantasy nevertheless contained a lot of glorious work from such fantasy artists as Tim Kirk, George Barr, Bonnie Bergstrom, Kathy Hill, Barbi Johnson, and others. Awards were as follows:

The Masquerade was colorful and plentiful. Paj heard more than one LA sf fan remark that in general the Mythopoeic Society members seem to possess a greater feeling and enthusiasm for fantasy costumery than many other fans. Most Beautiful (Other Fantasy): Marj Hoyt as an Elf maiden from

Lorien. Honorable mention to Mary Ann Cappa as Succubus. Most Handsome: David Ring as Beregond of Minas Tirith. Honorable mention to George Barr as Crown Prince of Atlantis.

Best Group (but not on authenticity): Loren de Phillips, Lisa Deutsch, and Craig Vaughn as Lord and Lady Sauron with Nazgul escort. Honorable mention to Glenn Sadler and Teny Rule as Curdie and Princess Irene.

The Masquerade was followed by a dramatic production of Tolkien's The Homecoming of Beorthnoth, Beorhthelm's Son. The excellent acting on an eerie dimly-lit stage left the audience spellbound. This time the Performing Arts Workshop received a

standing ovation. An excerpt of Fantasia and The Thief of Bagdad concluded the program around 1 am.

On Monday morning a panel about Charles Williams was very informal with a lot of audience participation. It was more like a Mythopeic branch discussion. The moderator, Dr. Glenn Sadler of Westmont College, Santa Barbara, is a former student of C.S. Kilby, and is quite knowledgeable about Williams, George MacDonald and Mervyn Peake. The multiple small group discussions followed, and seemed to go well. After lunch came the ceremonial awarding of The Bird to this year's deserving D.O.M. Bernie had been the 1969 winner, but lost it this year to Dave Hulan, who had been campaigning hard for the award. The Demure Young Maiden award was a surprise at the con. It went to Cindy Rebeck of Upland. The last panel "Whither Tolkien Fandom?" discussed the history of Tolkien's popularity in America and its present and future status. Nan Braude offered interesting bits of information about the early stages of the Tolkien Society of America. Glen GoodKnight stressed co-operation between TSA and the Mythopoeic Society. Alpajpuri, Garcia-Fay Ellwood and Bernie Zuber were also on the panel. Several people, including members of the audience, expressed and interest in tying together all the tiny Tolkien-oriented groups around the country, but just how this might be accomplished was never pinpointed. A business meeting closed the con. Suggestions for the site and date of next year's Mythcon II were discussed, but no final decision was made. The convention will probably be held at the Riverside Mission Inn on either the Thanksgiving weekend or a weekend in early August. Eventually the con drew to a close and members drifted away,

weary, but satisfied. The concom did a splendid job considering it was their first experience at running a convention; the few bugs that surfaced, such as auxiliary registration fees for the college and an excess of papers read, will undoubtedly be ironed out before Mythcon II.

Descent Into Hell

I, Glen GoodKnight, have a public confession to make: I have never completely read <u>Descent Into Hell</u>. I did try several times a few years ago, but couldn't get past the first two chapters. I think I had a mental block against it, primarily due to its title. It sounded too much like a fire and brimstone tract. This is the next to the last novel he wrote, and I was told that his style was very good. The Charles Williams authority in America (she would modestly disagree) — Mary Mc Dermott Shideler — considers it his best novel. I did read a passage from it last spring, where Wentworth creates a succubus substitute for the girl he wants and can't have - Adela Hunt. The passage was very subtlely and expressively written. This summer, due to the enthusiasm of several people who read it - it appears there is a real <u>Descent Into Hell</u> sub-fandom within the Society - I read the next to the last chapter "The Opening of the Graves." Powerful! Our old friend Lilith shows up in this book, but don' expect some lukewarm rehash of material about her. The book

Branch Reports and News

Mythprint will begin to print the written report of the individual branch discussions with the December issue. It will also print branch news, provided that it is real news. Branch Secretaries should see that the reports are typed up in the following format and mailed within a week of the discussion: The report should be typed single-spaced in colums not over 6 inches wide. If the report can be typed on an electric typewriter, that uses a carbon ribbon, thats the best. If you can't find use of a carbon ribbon, I strongly recommend buying a silk ribbon to put into the typewriter. Silk ribbons cost a little more than cotton ribbons, but are worth it for the sharper image you can get. Try to keep the reports to the point and well written. Do your own proofreading, since the copy sent will be the copy seen in print. I am asking the Secretaries to make this extra effort, so that the pasting up of the monthly bulletin will not require that much more work on this end.

EXCERPTS FROM A LETTER FROM THE GUEST OF HONOR OF MYTHCON - C.S. KILBY - DATED SEPTEMBER 8, 1970.

Talent everywhere apparent. Most of those present took part in the costume contest. Some are professional in artistic Did the reading of Lewis, Tolkien and Williams create such fine young people, or are already fine young people attracted to these writers? In either case I felt this group quite ideal. They are modest, gentle, naive in the best sense, without a trace of the hard sophistication so much seen in the young. think I've never seen a group able to have so much fun together fun sparked with enthusiasm, good will, coinherence and creativity.
