### QUESTIONNAIRE RESULTS

A total of 449 of the Members' Questionnaire and Ballot were postmarked on or before November 7th 1976, received, and counted. In reviewing the results a distinction should be kept in mind between the membership of the Society and those who responded. It cannot be said that X% of the Society's members feel a certain way, but that X% of the respondents feels a certain way.

Volume 15

Age: 17 or younger - 13.52%; 18-21 - 15.15%; 22-25 - 20.28%; 26-33 - 25.64%; 34-45 - 15.15%; 46-60 - 7.93%; over 60 - 2.33%

Male - 57.81%; Female 42.19%

Level of Education: Less than H.S. graduate — 12.59%; High School graduate — 3.89%; Some College — 23.57%; B.A. or B.S. — 25.54%; M.A. — 22.43%; Ph.D. — 10.98%

Source of hearing of the Society: answers too numerous to list, save to say that 1/4 of those answering said "through friends."

Year joined Society: over 50% have joined since the beginning of 1973.

Rating features of <u>Mythlore</u> and <u>Mythprint</u> on a scale of 1 to 10, with 1 meaning like a lot, 10 meaning like very little. The averages are:

Which is preferred, the old system (a 16 page Mythprint monthly), or the present system (a 40 page Mythlore quarterly /equals 48 old Mythprint pages/ plus a 4 page Mythprint monthly)?

Old - 19.37%, Present - 80.63%

Approve of seeing humor (such as parody) appear. Yes — 66.91%,  $\,$  No — 33.09%

Seriously interested in attending a Mythopoeic Conference if held in Oxford, England.

Yes -38.01%, No -61.99%

Interest in such a Conference enhanced if a charter flight were available from New York.

Yes -44.47%, No -55.53%

Objection to the Society holding a 10 day Institute on C.S. Lewis (which would include the features of a regular 3 day conference, with attendance available for part of it as well as for the whole) in 1980 or before. Would object — 21.26%, Would not object — 78.74%

Reaction to four positions:

A. The Society should be almost solely interested in Tolkien, Lewis, and Williams, with some attention to the genres they wrote in, and with some attention given to kindred writers.

B. The Society should basically be interested in Tolkien, Lewis, and Williams, but should also give equal attention to myth and fantasy generally and to other authors.

C. The Society should be basically interested in the genre of myth and fantasy, while giving moderate attention to Tolkien, Lewis, and Williams.

D. The Society should completely be focused on the genre of myth and fantasy, with no, or next to no, special interest in Tolkien, Lewis, and Williams.

Those answering saw the Society as being closest to: A-48.35%, B-45.05%, C-6.13%, D-.05%. If we give A a value of 1, B a value of 2, C a value of 3, and D as value of 4, the total average is 1.59.

Those answering would like to see the Society as represented by: A - 28.95%, B - 52.56%, C - 16.70%, D - 1.78%, with a total average of 1.91.

Concerning the future of Mythprint:
29.20% would like to see Mythprint continue as one page with the Activity Calendar and news on a monthly basis.
70.80% would like to see the money spent on a monthly







### Activity Calendar

Membership, which is open to individuals, includes full participational rights, voting rights, and a subscription to both Mythlore and Mythprint. Dues are \$8 for a 12-month period, and are payable to the Society Treasurer, preferably in annual units (though they may be paid in installments of \$4 at a time): \$6 of this amount is for a subscription to Mythlore and Mythlore to \$12 months.

Two members resident at the same address may apply for joint membership, which will give all membership rights to each of the joint members, except that they shall receive one copy of each issue of Mythlore and Mythprint between them. Joint member's dues are \$10 for a 12-month period. The dues of additional members resident at the same address, under the same arrangement as joint membership, are \$2 for a 12-month period.

Subscription to Mythlore and Mythprint without Society membership is available to institutions, organizations, and individuals at \$8 for a 12-month period.

Those living outside the U.S.A. may send an International Money Order or a check or money order in their own national currency equivalent to American amounts. The dues may be paid, for example, with 9 Canadian dollars, 4.5 British pounds, or 35 Swedish krona. Those not living in the countries listed may inquire of the Society as to the exchange rate for their country. Due to fluctuations of International Exchange, rates are subject to periodic adjustment.

Persons may receive a free sample copy of Mythprint, after which the receiver must become a member or subscriber to continue receiving copies. Sample copies of Mythlore are \$2.25. Readers are invited to submit names of persons whom they think would be interested in the Society, and its publications, to receive a free sample of Mythprint and additional information about the Society.

Those wishing to receive their copies of Mythlore and Mythprint by First Class Mail within the U.S.A. may pay an additional \$7 for a 12-month period for this service. For those who would only wish Mythlore sent this way, the service is \$4. For those who would only want Mythprint sent this way, the service is \$3.

Advertisements may be placed in both Mythlore and Mythprint. Details are available by writing directly to the Editor.

In response to Joseph R. Fireno's question about the feeding of Sauron's vast armies: As such, Sauron did not import food. There were many acres of farmland in the region around Lake Nurnen which were tilled by armies of slaves. (Sam Gamgee was not aware of this either.) Substantion comes from p. 200 of The Return of the King (Allen and Unwin's collector's edition):

Neither he (Sam) nor Frodo knew anything of the great slave-worked fields away south in this wide realm, beyond the fumes of the Mountain by the dark sad waters of Lake Nurnen; nor of the great roads that ran away east and south to tributary lands, from which the soldiers of the Tower brought long waggon-trains of goods and booty and fresh slaves. Here in the northward regions were mines and forges, and the musterings of long-planned war.

As may be read from this quotation, food was brought in from outside lands, but I wouldn't really call it importing. However, I would tend to wonder how Saruman fed his armies. At the time of the WR, Isengard was a pit, filled with wheels and forges. No mention is made of farmland — and Saruman held no tributary lands that I know of. It is however, possible that his Orcs ate man flesh (they mention it in The Two Towers, chapter III: The Uruk-hai). I'm not quite sure where they got their other foodstuffs, including the fiery liquor. Any other answers?

Mythprint used to increase the size of Mythlore, with the Activity Calendar and news printed therein.

All Bylaw amendments passed and all Nominees were elected by large majorities.

#### EDITORIAL: ABOUT THE QUESTIONNAIRE

This questionnaire was very important since it was the first time the membership was queried since the new publications system of integrating subscriptions to Mythlore and Mythprint went into effect in the earlier part of 1976. I wish to thank all those who took the time to send theirs back; through your responses and comments we now have a clearer picture of how to proceed. Generally you seem to want a slightly less formal tone to Mythlore, while keeping its standards high. There are a number of ways this will be sought in the future. I think the photographs in issue 14 help as an instance of this. It seems that humor is approved, but with serious reservations as to its nature and quality, which is the editorial intent. The feature 'Bookworld' is popular with many members, and will be continued provided help is forthcoming to keep it going. It should reappear next month. Even though only 38.01% of those responding said they would be serious in attending a Mythopoeic Conference in Oxford, England (and some of those who did so really meant "Wouldn't it be nice....") this by no means rules out such a conference. Up until now the number of people who attend a Mythopoeic Conference has been less than 15% of the readership of the Society.

There were a number of comments on the questionnaires on what members would like to see added, deleted, increased, or diminished. Many would like to see <u>more</u> art, reviews and letters, and the inclusion of such material as poetry and group discussion reports. Please keep in mind that <u>we can not publish that which we do not receive</u>, and that the Society does publish a very high percentage of what it does receive. If you want to see group discussion reports in print, ask a group to write one and send it in. If you want to see more art, reviews, and/or letters, then submit such material! We will do our best to publish it, consistent with its quality and suitability.

On the Questionnaire approximately 1/3 of those responding want Mythprint kept monthly, while about 2/3 want the money that is spent on Mythprint used instead to make Mythlore larger. One of the members suggested a compromise that may, in a measure, please everyone. He suggested that instead of Mythprint appearing 12 times a year in addition to the quarterly Mythlore, that Mythprint appear 4 times a year inbetween issues of Mythlore. This would call for Mythlore to print the now separate features of Mythprint (Activity Calendar, news announcements, and Bookworld) in its issues (as a separate section, perhaps). The savings from eliminating 8 issues of Mythprint a year (which would be considerable in printing, postage and supplies) could be used to increase the size of both Mythlore (4 to 12 more pages, finances permitting) and Mythprint (from its present 4 pages to 6 or 8, finances permitting). The larger Mythprint could print material discussed above, and could carry on. an on-going letter column with Mythlore (which would increase the letter column from 4 to 8 times a year, and would see a faster response to previous material printed). The foreseeable drawback would be that the Activity Calendar would appear 8 times a year instead of the current 12, thus asking the Discussion Groups to submit meeting information covering a longer period of time.

The Council of Stewards feels that the decision for such a change should be made by the membership. The present Bylaws specify that Mythprint shall be monthly (Article VIII, Section 2, sentence 1), and therefore if the proposed compromise arrangement may be put into effect, a Bylaw amendment would be required. If you are not in favor of the proposed arrangement, vote No on the Ballot. If you are in favor of the change, vote Yes.
