The SWOSU College of Pharmacy offers a Doctor of Pharmacy (Pharm. D.) degree.

Students must complete two years of pre-professional study, including general education courses, as well as prescriptive courses in biology, chemistry, physics and math. The pre-professional courses are followed by four years in the COP, including courses in the pharmaceutical sciences, pharmacy practice and an academic year of full-time experiential education and training.

Admission to the Pharm. D. program is very competitive and approximately 85 students are admitted annually.

Established in 1939, the SWOSU College of Pharmacy continues to be dedicated to the tradition of excellence in pharmacy education. The college will celebrate its 75th anniversary in 2014.
