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# Discussion Report

A Travel Report, Book Review, and Group Discussion, all rolled into one, by Ken Burtness

In its 18th year Sammath Naur finally did it. We traveled to a neighbor island for a book discussion. Now, to you mainlanders and Con-goers this may not sound like much, but to Sammath Naurites it was weeks in the planning, hours in the executing and over way too soon.

So why did we suddenly take to mind to travel from our snug Oahu hobbit hole? No, no one was celebrating their eleventy-first birthday! We may be mature but not that mature. The reason was Carol Severance, a new fantasy/science fiction writer who lives on the Big Island, our island of fiery volcanoes and the goddess Pele. Her first two published books, Demon Drums, a fantasy, and Reefsong, science fiction, fit our bill of fare to a T. All of us liked both books, but clearly SF Sammath Naurites leaned to Reefsong while the rest of us listed toward Demon Drums. John gave her a call in December and she said she would be happy to get together with us. Saturday, June 5th, was arranged.

When the last of us had wended our way up a Hilo hillside to the home of Barbara Hastings and Mike Middlesworth we were seventeen strong, a large number for a Sammath Naur meeting. We sat circled around Carol in Barbara & Mike's living room as she spun stories, laughed, shared insights into her books and the writing process as well as reading to us from her new book, Storm Caller. It was one of the best meetings in our history.

Both Carol's books are exciting, page-turning adventures set in colorful locales and peopled by interesting characters. But the thread that holds both together is a strong woman warrior who mentors a girl, a young yet-to-be warrior with undiscovered powers of her own. Together they overcome an evil adversary. In both books the Pacific Islands and their cultures play an important role. Just as

Tom Robbins draws from the Pacific Northwest and Stephen King from rural Maine, Carol makes the Pacific part of her storytelling fabric, and she does it with knowledge and respect. It's the key to her characters as well. The reader cares about her characters because her characters care about each other. And respect each other. These books contain no ridicule or cheap humor. Instead they're rich in imagination and good writing. Read Carol and you'll run into a sea mimic who can ride along in another's form, be it fish, shark or sea gull, surgically altered humans with gills and webbed extremities; the Milli, a man and woman prostitute duo who protect the good guys and kill the bad guys with poisoned hairpins; and a living door mat (called Matt).

Both of Carol's books were so well received by critics and readers alike that Del Rey asked for trilogies of both of them. So, although both stand alone, Carol's new book Storm Caller is the follow up to Iuti and Tarawe's adventures in Demon Drums, and a third volume, Sorcerous Sea, will complete the trilogy in the fall of this year.

Despite her rising star, Carol, however, retains her perspective, her sense of humor, and her humility. Our afternoon together was filled with irreverences about fantasy/SF, writing, publishers, agents, book promotions, awards, conventions, and herself. At Sammath Naur we laugh a lot and try not to take ourselves too seriously. Carol Severance was the perfect friend to spend a day with. We wish her all the success in the world and highly recom mend her books to all our fellow mythies.

# Three Oz Books

Not everyone knows that there have been a good many Oz books written besides Wizard and the 39 sequels published by Reilly & Lee. (A lot of people don't know about the 39 sequels, but surely everyone reading this does...) There are at least three worthwhile new ones out this summer.

The Wicked Witch of Oz by Rachel Cosgrove Payes, published by the International Wizard of Oz Club ( ) is sort of a sequel to The Hidden Valley of Oz, featuring Percy the Giant Rat from that book along with Dorothy and the Wicked Witch of the South. She wrote it back in the Fifties after the publication of Hidden Valley, but at the time Reilly & Lee weren't interested in publishing another Oz book (the last few hadn't sold well); the IWOC has just published it, with excellent illustrations by Eric Shanower. (I consider Shanower the second best illustrator of Oz; I still like Neill better, but Shanower is close. He, like Neill and Kramer [who illustrated the two Snow books], has a "realistic" style, as opposed to the "cartoon style of Denslow, "Dirk", and Martin. He has written and drawn five "graphic novels" of Oz that are all quite good.) The Wicked Witch awakens after a hundred-year sleep (imposed by Glinda), and wants to be revenged on Dorothy for her destruction of the Wicked Witches of the East and West, Through an error in identification she first turns Trot into a piece of cheese, but later turns Dorothy into a statue. All comes out well in the end, though. I liked it better than Hidden Valley: it's definitely a real Oz book, not up to the better books in the series, but no worse than slightly below average of the Famous Forty. (320 pages; I believe \$20 in hardback to IWOC members. I forget if there's a PB.)

The Giant Garden of Oz from Emerald City Press (Books of Wonder,

, is both written and il-

lustrated by Eric Shanower. After 80 years of luxurious living in the Emerald City, Uncle Henry and Aunt Em decide to return to farming, with a little magical assistance from the Wizard to make things easier. But while Dorothy is visiting them their vegetables suddenly grow to giant size. Dorothy goes to get help (accompanied by Toto and Billina), but has some rather terrifying adventures along the way (being caught in a storm in a hot-air balloon; being trapped underground by evil giant moles; growing to giant size). It's an exciting story, and quite well-written, though it's much darker and scarier than any of the original series (even *Magical Mimics*). (178 pages, \$34.95 in hardcover; \$11.95 in paperback.)

Cory in Oz, from Buckethead Enterprises of Oz written and illustrated by Allison McBain, a Canadian Oz fan from Victoria, BC. Cory is a young orphan in America who finds her grumpy schoolteacher doing magic after school. The teacher tries to eliminate her memories of it, but her magic doesn't work on Cory, who turns out to have magical abilities of her own. The teacher and her mother are exiles from Oz, and with Cory's help return there to look for their missing father and husband. They have a lot of adventures on the way, including conflict with the Nome King's younger brother and an evil witch. McBain is a good writer and a fair artist; her illustrations are not really of professional standard, but they're decent amateur quality. The story is not as dark as Giant Garden, but more so than any of the originals except possibly Magical Mimics. I don't think I'd want a hardcover, but it's worth the cost of the PB; it's at least as good as Ozoplaning, Wonder City, Scalawagons, or Hidden Valley (130 8.5x11 pages, \$10 in PB only.)

I believe all of these must be mail-ordered; I've never seen them in a store, except that *Giant Garden* is available at the Books of Wonder stores themselves (2 in NYC, one in Beverly Hills).

# News Notes

The official publication date for Morgoth's Ring, this year's collection of posthumous Tolkien writings from Houghton Mifflin, is November 10th. The book consists primarily of texts of and about the earlier, or Valinorian, part of The Silmarillion written in the 1950s and 1960s, and includes material that did not appear in the final book.

\$24.95 + \$2 postage). *Metal Angel* by Nancy Springer, the latest rock music fantasy novel (Roc, appropriately). *Snow White, Blood Red II*, a sequel anthology edited by Ellen Datlow and Terri Windling (AvoNova).

Future reference books: The Encyclopedia of Fantasy, edited by John Clute (Little Brown), similar to, but shorter and more focused than, The Encyclopedia of Science Fiction. Peter Nicholls, co-editor with Clute of the latter, is also preparing a fantasy encyclopedia, with a broader coverage including horror and magical realism. The St James Guide to Fantasy Writers, edited by David Pringle (Gale/St James). All of these are scheduled for 1995 or later. A possible earlier arrival is a semi-scholarly study, Once Upon a Galaxy: Folklore, Fantasy, and Science Fiction by the fantasy author Josepha Sherman (August House).






#### **Submissions**
