This year's dinner theatre will provide an evening of mystery. The evening will begin with a candlelight buffet, consisting of Chicken Kiev, baked potato, salad bar, and cheesecake, followed by a short "mini-mystery" and then a full length comedy-mystery production.

"We are extending a special invitation to all Southwestern students, organizations, and clubs" said Delenna Williams. "The evening will provide many laughs, as well as a chance for the audience to solve a mystery."

Sherrie Sharp of the language arts department will be directing the mini-mystery. This short play entitled *Payment Overdue* was written by two Southwestern students, Mark Conley and Dan Heath. "Mark and Dan did an excellent job constructing this mystery. Anyone could have committed the murder, but *who* is for the audience to decide. There is a great twist at the end that will

shock the audience," said Sharp.

Conley will be portraying the leading role of Inspector Troften in his own production. "Every character has a good motive," said Conley. "The audience will actually get to decide for themselves who committed the murder." Other cast members in the "mini-mystery" include Dan Tomlinson, Michael Hawkins, Bennie Williams, Gayla Moneypenny, Kim Charles, Lynn Feil, and Dawn McGolden.

Following the mini-mystery, a full length comedy-mystery will be presented, directed by Delenna Williams. Williams would not reveal the name of the production. "This is a part of the mystery," said Williams. "The title will be revealed on the night of the production."

The cast of the "mystery" production includes Tracey Lyn Cagle, Stephanie Bayn, Jeffrey Askins, Katherine Waldon, Missy Clark, Dan Heath, and Lisa Tedlock.

Said Katherine Waldon about her leading role, "This show has been fun. I have a lot in common with my character...that's a scary thought!" Walden is a speech-theatre major from Anchorage, Alaska, who has had leading roles

in such productions as *The Odd Couple* and *The Nerd*.

Another cast member, Jeff Askins of Clinton, added, "This being the first college performance I've been in, I must say it has been an exciting experience. I know in the future I will remember this play, and believe me, so will you. Enjoy!" Askins has played the lead in many high school plays, including the part of Birdie in Clinton's production of *Bye, Bye, Birdie*.

"We have some talented cast members in this production," said Williams. One of the greatest assets of the show is Dan Heath. Dan first created laughter in the SWOSU audience as his role of the nerd in the production of *The Nerd* this past fall. Dan's creativity and humor keep the cast and director laughing."

Tickets for the dinner theatre must be purchased before March 1. Only 150 ticket will be available for each production. Tickets are

\$9, or \$7 with a student I.D. (Two tickets may be purchased with one I.D.) Tables may be reserved for couples and groups, and a special seating area will be provided for singles. Dinner will be served at 7 p.m. and the play will begin at 8 p.m.

"We want to invite all students to come and join the fun," said Williams. "Come and see your friends perform. You'll be sure to have a wonderful evening."

# Physics students to attend spring meeting in Texas

Dr. Garabed Armoudian and six physics and engineering physics students will attend the spring meeting of the Texas Sections of the American Physical Society and the American Association of Physics Teachers in Houston, Tex., on Mar 3-4. The meeting will also host the Zone 10 Society of Physics Students chapters, of which the SWOSU chapter is one of five nationally designated Outstanding Chapters. Zone 10 includes the states of Ark., Okla. and Tex.

Having done the original work on some of the highest temperature superconductors, Dr. Paul Chu of the University of Houston will deliver a talk on "High Temperature Superconductivity." For the last year, the SPS chapter at SWOSU has been making these superconductors and taking measurements on them.

Dr. Bob Sheldon, also of the University of Houston, is scheduled to speak on "Depletion of Atmospheric Ozone." The SWOSU chapter of SPS would like to make

measurements of gas concentrations in the stratosphere, and is currently awaiting word from the national SPS office on the possibility of funding the work through an Allied Award.

While in Houston, the group hopes to contact some of the numerous SWOSU physics alumni working for NASA. Among these is John Aaron, originally of Clinton, who has recently been quoted in national newspapers as an authority on the U.S. space program.

# Medical Records Administration Program accepting applications

The Medical Record Administration Program has announced that applications are currently being accepted for admission into the 1989-90 Professional Junior Class beginning the fall of 1989.

This will be the 15th group of students to enter the professional program at SWOSU since the program was developed as a 4-year

campus-based program in 1975.

Graduates from the program have found employment in a variety of health care settings. Designed primarily to train students to become directors of medical record departments in hospitals, the graduates can also find opportunities in many other areas.

According to Marion Prichard, RRA, Director of the Program: "A Medical Record Administrator is not limited to a certain professional role as in some careers. If a graduate is not interested in becoming a director, assistant director, or supervisor in a medical record department, they can go into consulting, teaching, or sales. Certain specialty areas are available such as utilization review or quality assurance.

The program is nationally accredited by the Committee on Allied Health Education and Accreditation of the American Medical Association in collaboration with the American Medical Record Association. Students are provided with a diverse background in business, management, medical science, law, and specific medical documentation requirements and practices to allow them to work with both administration and physician staffs of health care facilities.

Demand for qualified professionals is high. A new graduate can expect a beginning salary of \$19,000 to \$25,000 depending on job responsibility.

Anyone interested in obtaining more information should contact Marion Prichard, RRA, Director of the Program, or Faye Henson, RRA, Assistant Director. Their office is located in room 104 of the science building. Application deadline date for the 1989-90 professional class is March 3, 1989 with interviews being held on March 22 and 29.





# Educator receives three prestigious awards

Good things come in threes for Southwestern's Delores Russell. In the past two weeks, Russell has been given three prestigious awards. Not only has she received the "Friends of Guidance" award and KOCO-TV Channel 5's "Oklahoma's Best" award, but she has also recently been selected to represent the United States as a member of the women's group fellowship exchange team to the Philippines.

"I am just overwhelmed by the honors I have received this past month. Each is a great honor, and

I am extremely excited about my trip to the Phillipines. It will be a tremendous experience for me," said Russell.

Russell will be leaving on a four-week, expense-paid trip to the Phillipine Islands on April 18 to May 19. While abroad, Russell and her four companions will study the economic, social, and cultural aspects of the country through travel and discussion with participating Rotary hosts.

The group study exchange team is made up of business and professional women from the ages of 25 and 35. Although 20 finalists were nominated for the team, only

five were selected to participate in the study. Her selection was based on her dedication to the bettering of her career, community and nation, her willingness to learn about a new culture and an interview with 10 Rotary Club members.

"When I learned that I had been selected to the team, I also discovered that I was going to be the only educator in the group. This will be quite a challenge for me, because our team will not only be representing the state of Oklahoma, but we will be representing the United States as

well," emphasized Russell.

Joining Russell on her tour will be Anne Long of Oklahoma City, associate vice-president of Prudential Bache Securities; Marsha Flaming of Weatherford, director of pharmacy at South-

western Memorial Hospital; Laura Winchester of Oklahoma City, social worker for the OKC County Health Department; and Sheila Alexander of Yukon, marketing director for the Oklahoma Wheat Commission.

## Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship: Applications are being accepted

SWOSU students interested in a career in mathematics or the natural sciences are invited to apply to the Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship and Excellence in Education Program.

Established by Congress in 1986, the Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship and Excellence in Education Foundation operates an educational scholarship program designed to provide opportunities for outstanding U.S. students with excellent academic records and demonstrated interest in, and potential for, careers in mathematics and the natural sciences.

In April 1989, the Foundation will award 53 Scholarships to students who will be college juniors and 53 Scholarships to students who will be college seniors during the 1989-90 academic year. In order to be considered for an award, students must be nominated by their in-

stitution. The DEADLINE for all 1989 nominations is March 24, 1989. The DEADLINE for submitting completed APPLICATIONS to SWOSU is March 8.

The scholarship award covers eligible expenses up to a maximum of \$7,000 per year. Junior-level scholarship recipients are eligible for two years of support. Senior-level scholarship recipients will be eligible for one year of support with consideration for graduate fellowship support in the succeeding year.

To be eligible, a student must be a current full-time sophomore or junior and must be pursuing a baccalaureate degree, have a B average or equivalent, stand in the upper fourth of the class, and be a U.S. citizen or U.S. national heading toward a career in mathematics or the natural sciences.

Interested sophomore- and junior-level students should sub-

mit a letter of application; a statement of career plans; a list of activities, achievements, and work experiences that demonstrate, among other things, a strong interest in their field of study and potential for contribution; a current transcript; and a 750-word essay presenting an abstract for a research project related to their chosen career.

## Students to tour New Mexico lab

On March 13, Dr. Benny Hill and 15 physics and engineering physics students from Southwestern Oklahoma State University will tour the facilities of Sandia National Laboratory and the Air Force Weapons Laboratory. Both of these laboratories are on Kirtland Air Force Base in Albuquerque, New Mexico. The group is scheduled to see a particle beam fusion accelerator, a radiation-hardening laboratory,

firing of a very high power laser, some of the world's fastest Cray computers, an ultra-fast switched large capacitor bank, and an electromagnetic test facility which can accommodate very large system tests at the Air Force Weapons Laboratory.

## Bulldogs win game

Daron Harrison had 21 points and eight rebounds and the Bulldogs shot 60 percent from the field to defeat Panhandle State, 81-74, in an important road win.

Stephen Joseph added 16 points, and Chris Hamilton and Michael Parks had 13 points apiece for Southwestern, 19-5. Hamilton also hit on all three of his three-point attempts.

In an earlier game against East Central, Southwestern gave up a Terry Winston layup with two seconds on the clock and lost the low-scoring game, 48-46.

Joseph led the Bulldogs with 11 points and six rebounds. The Bulldogs shot 34 percent from the field, including 21 percent in the second half.

Bobby Shelton was the top scorer for the Tigers with 13 points. Winston and Vernell Kemp each had nine points for East Central, 15-6.

Southwestern now plays at Northwestern for their final regular season road game of the season. A victory would most likely give the Bulldogs one of the top four seeds in the District 9 tournament.

A victory will not be easy, however, as Southwestern won by only three points earlier in Weatherford. Melvin Swift could pose a problem for the Bulldogs, since he scored 19 points in the first game.

Joseph is *The Southwestern* Player of the Week. In two games, he scored 27 points, including a team-high 11 against ECU. He hit seven three-pointers in the two games, and also had four assists and two steals.

A basketball tournament will bring to an end women's intramural basketball in two weeks.

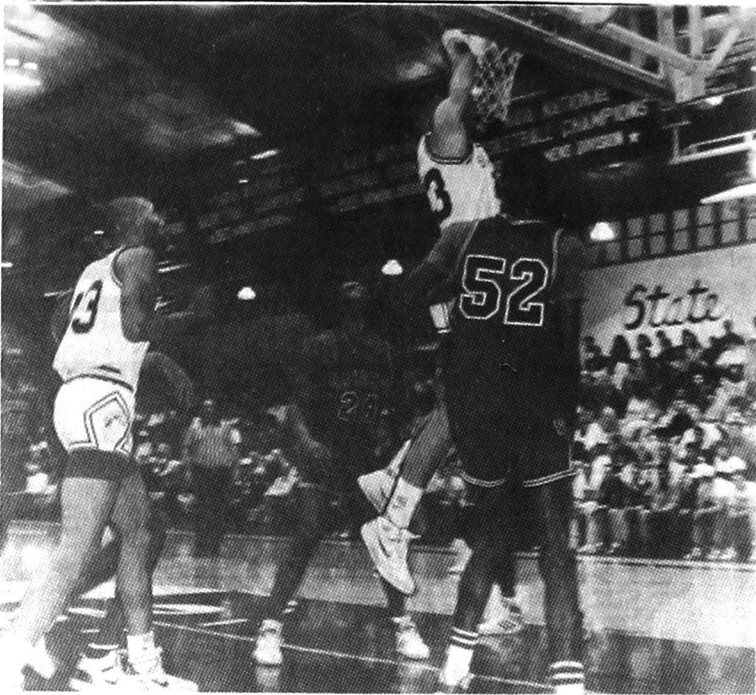
The tournament, which will involve all 10 teams, should be played the week before spring break. A conflict could arise, however.
