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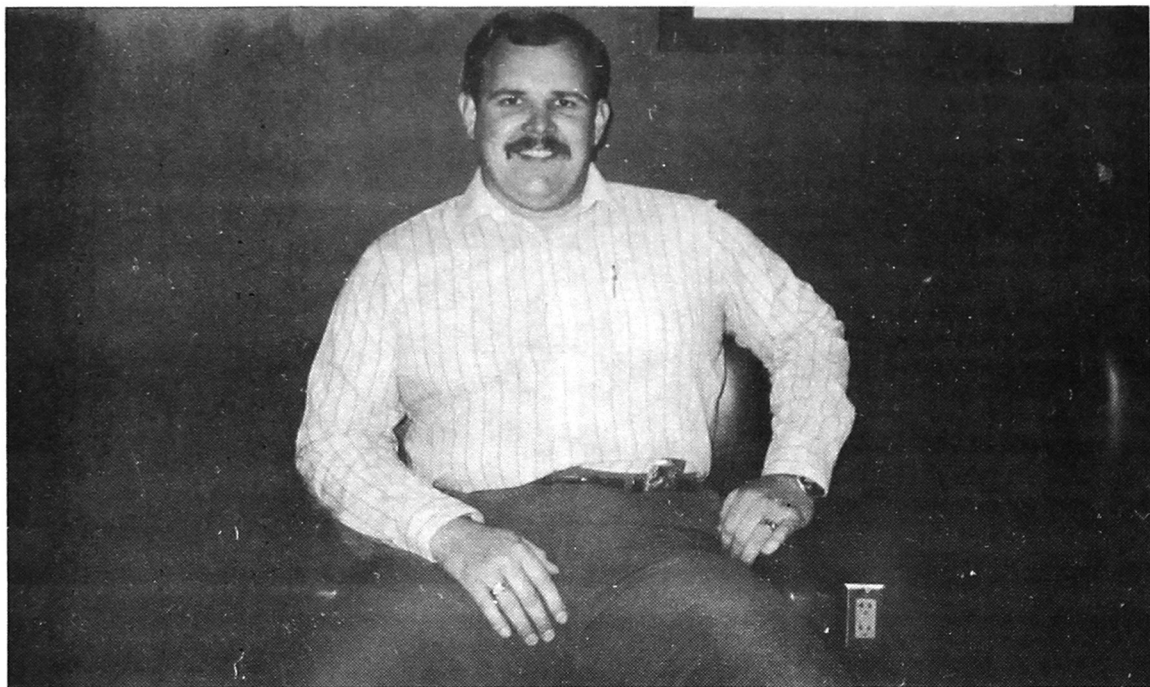
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New Campus Police Chief Enthused About Job

The Oklahoma NATS competition takes place every Spring in April. Southwestern has competed twice in the competition and 10 students have been placed in the finals. Five championships for five first places were awarded. "There is a preliminary and the final top five are chosen and they must receive a score of 90 or above," Andy Seigrist commented.

"It is really amazing that so many good singers have gotten together at one school at one time. We have some fine singers and there are excellent freshman and sophomore singers to take the place of the upper classman once they have left Southwestern," Seigrist added.

Over 200 singers participate at NATS every year, only the finest can make it to the top. Sophomore, Susan Croswell, made finals this year. The two lucky gentlemen who placed first in their division were Joey Martin, junior from Granite, in the junior men's division; and Andy

Seigrist, senior from Hollis, who placed first in the senior men's division. "The contest was very hard and there was some outstanding colleges there. Southwestern handled themselves well, and I thought Joey Martin handled the pressure and performed very well under stressfull conditions," Seigrist said.

First place competes at Regional contest and that will be in October on the campus of Stillwater at OSU. First place there then goes to the national convention in San Antonio, Texas in December.

Other singers who went to NATS in Edmond were Dorinda Stitt, Cherry Hamilton, Cheryl Fox, Earla Hopkins, Martin McGlamary, Gloria Banks, Michelle Taylor and Richard Balzar.

"We place 50 percent of contestants from Southwestern at first place, what other organization can say that?" Seigrist added. "The hard work and training of Dr. Chapman and Skip Kingman, along with the vocal faculty, has made all of this possible."

Seigrist went on to comment, "Next year Southwestern will try to go to the national convention, and just wait and see how everything turns out. We will take first place or we don't take anything!"

ty. The organization includes colleges and universities from six states in the area. It is a multidisciplinary group represented by professors primarily from literature, history, and the fine arts.

Henry, Convocation Speaker

Robert Henry, Attorney General of Oklahoma, will be commencement speaker of Convocation exercise at Southwestern Oklahoma State University on Friday, May 8, at 8 p.m. in Milam Stadium.

Approximately 750 Southwestern graduates will be recognized.

Robert Henry was elected Attorney General on November 4, 1986, in his first campaign for statewide elective office.

Public service, however, was long ago established as a tradition

in the Henry family. Robert Henry is a product of generations of deep Oklahoma roots, from his educator grandparents to his prosecuting attorney father, the late District Judge Lloyd Henry of Shawnee.

Born in Shawnee on April 3, 1953, Henry began his commitment to Oklahoma leadership early. He graduated from Shawnee High School as a William Randolph Hearst Scholar of Government, and was named the national winner of the B.P.O.E. Elks Leadership Competition by U.S.

Senators Fritz Hollings and Barry Goldwater.

A University Scholar at the University of Oklahoma, he completed his bachelor's degree in political science in three years, graduating with high honors. During his undergraduate program, Henry served as Attorney General for the O.U. Student Association. He then earned his Juris Doctorate degree from the O.U. College of Law, and entered private practice in Shawnee.

During his third year of law school, Henry was elected to the State House of Representatives. He was immediately singled out for leadership roles in the Legislature, and has served as Chairman of the Judiciary and Education Committees. He also was elected to a term as Chairman of the House Democratic Caucus, and served five terms in the House of Representatives, and was elected the last four terms without opposition.

A staunch supporter of education, he has served in adjunct professional roles at the University of Tulsa and Oklahoma Baptist University. He currently is Chairman of the Board at St. Gregory's College, and is a member of the Board at KCSC, an Edmond radio station owned and operated by Central State University.

Henry is also a businessman, having founded a sporting goods company which still operates internationally. He is a member of the prestigious National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws, and is a lifetime member of the Oklahoma Wildlife Federation.

He and his wife, Cindy are both from Shawnee, and divide their time among Shawnee, Oklahoma City and their family farm near Tishomingo.

A come-and-go reception to allow Southwestern faculty to visit with Southwestern education majors who have completed their student teaching during the past year will be held on Monday, May 4, from 9:15-9:45 a.m. in the Student Union Ballroom.

All Southwestern faculty are invited to attend and visit with these students.

Letter to the Editor:

For many students at Southwestern, especially those sophomores, juniors and seniors taking upper-level courses, a critical moment has arrived. Not only are finals rapidly approaching, but term papers requiring library research are soon due. For many of these students one fact is being made painfully clear: the library simply isn't open enough to meet their needs.

Living in a dorm is just not conducive to good studying. The library is the perfect solution to this problem. Unfortunately, the "haven" closes at 10 on weeknights and is open only eight hours on weekends.

In addition, a surprising number of students here either hold part-time jobs or are involved in extra-curricular activities. This

means that their access to the library is severely limited. Often weekends are their best time to really dig in and do the research necessary to complete their assignments. If they work on Saturdays also, then they are REALLY in a bind. Most of Sunday is gone before they can even get in.

Some of you are probably saying, "So what? Just check out the books you need or xerox copies!" I wish it were that simple. But that solution just isn't possible with long journal articles or reference books, neither of which can be checked out. The only real solution is to spend more time in the library.

Others will argue that there just isn't enough demand for the library to justify the expense of keeping it open longer hours. If

this statement is true, it certainly doesn't reflect well on our university. Beyond that, I would argue this: The ones who really want to learn are a very important group on this campus. The fact that Weatherford's population shrinks by a few thousand every weekend should not mean that others are deprived.

Finally, for those of you who still don't agree with this argu-

ment, what will you say when, on a Tuesday night at 10 o'clock or on a Saturday afternoon at five, you can't find that Xerox copy you ran off last week. I think I know. "That stupid library isn't open enough hours!"

I realize that we are restricted a great deal by state problems and national directives. It's a sad state of affairs when the President of the United States makes a public statement which can be inter-

preted as opposing increasing funds for education. But I would hope that next semester some enterprising member of our new student government will take up the cause of increasing library hours on weekdays and weekends for the last three weeks of the semester. During that period, we can analyze the cost and see if there is sufficient demand to justify some permanent changes.

Psychology Projects Presented

Two students, Wade McCoy of Reydon and Marilyn Van Leeuwen of North Attleboro MA, in the Psychology Department at Southwestern Oklahoma State University recently presented their research projects at state and regional psychology conventions.

Wade's project, which was co-authored by Dr. Jim Blagowsky of Southwestern, examined the role of speech in visual imagery. The study was innovative in that it employed a more refined method of measurement than in previous studies.

The Van Leeuwen paper, co-authored by fellow student

Michael Frizzell and Dr. Paul Nail of the Southwestern faculty, examined how males and females differ in their responses to various social situations.

Both projects were presented at the Oklahoma Psychological Association Research Conference on April 3 in Oklahoma City. In addition, the McCoy-Blagowsky project was presented on April 16 at the Southwestern Psychological Association Convention in New Orleans LA.

McCoy, a junior psychology major, became interested in imagery research after taking Dr. Blagowsky's course in Ex-

perimental Psychology. After graduating from Southwestern in May 1988, he plans to pursue graduate work in either psychology or biology.

Van Leeuwen, a senior psychology major, graduated from North Attleboro High School in Massachusetts and attended the University of Massachusetts for one year before transferring to Southwestern. She was recently awarded a graduate research fellowship to attend Texas Christian University where she will work toward a Ph.D degree in either physiological or social psychology beginning in August 1987.

Student Senators Attend OSGA

Several SWOSU Student Senators recently attended the Oklahoma Student Government Association OSGA meeting in Norman. Part of the Business attended to at the meeting consisted of the passing of three resolutions which had been drafted by SWOSU Senators.

The first resolution involves itemizing the activity fee on enrollment forms separate from tuition fees. The resolution stated

that this practice should take effect no later than Fall, 1987.

Another Resolution addresses the fact that currently diplomas do not mention the student's major field of study. The act, which is known as "The Titled Diploma Act:" would give students the option of receiving a diploma with only the degree received or a diploma which also lists the major field of study.

Drug testing is another issue which was discussed at the

meeting. SWOSU's resolution states that drug testing is a violation of basic human rights and often unreliable. Instead of drug testing the resolution suggests that "...an individual's performance should be sufficient evidence for an evaluation of that person."

Copies of these resolutions were sent to the Oklahoma State Board of Regents for Higher Education and to the administration of SWOSU.

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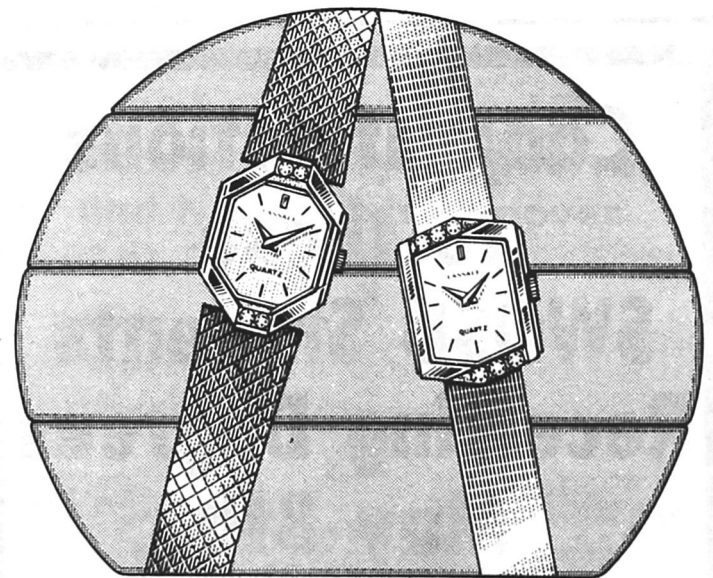
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'Summer Vacation'-What will you do this summer?

Southeastern, a perennial baseball power, had won the OIC title the past 12 years. But, this year the Bulldogs own the title.

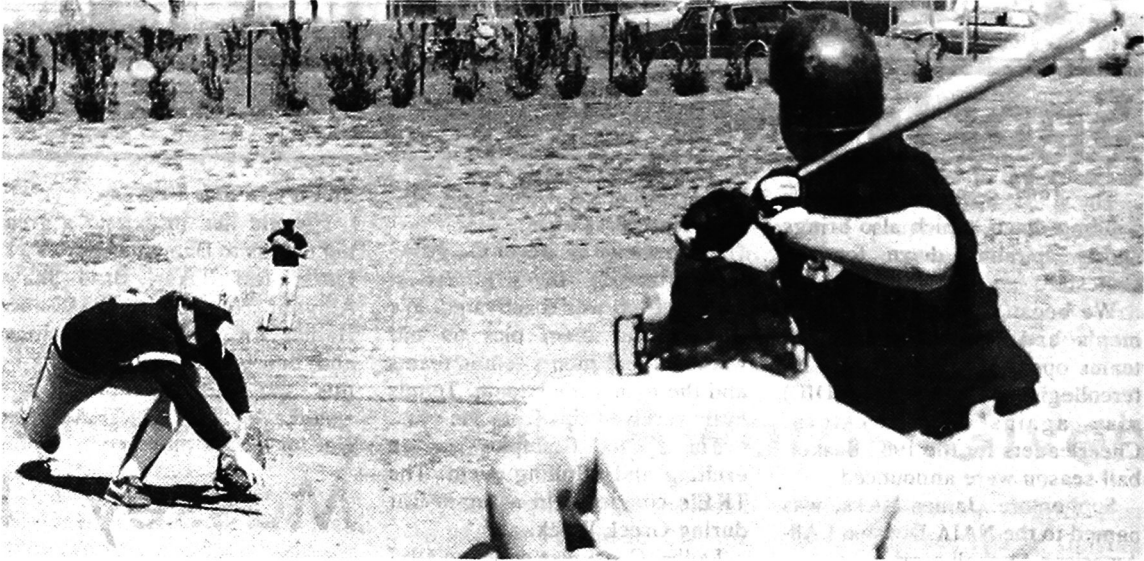

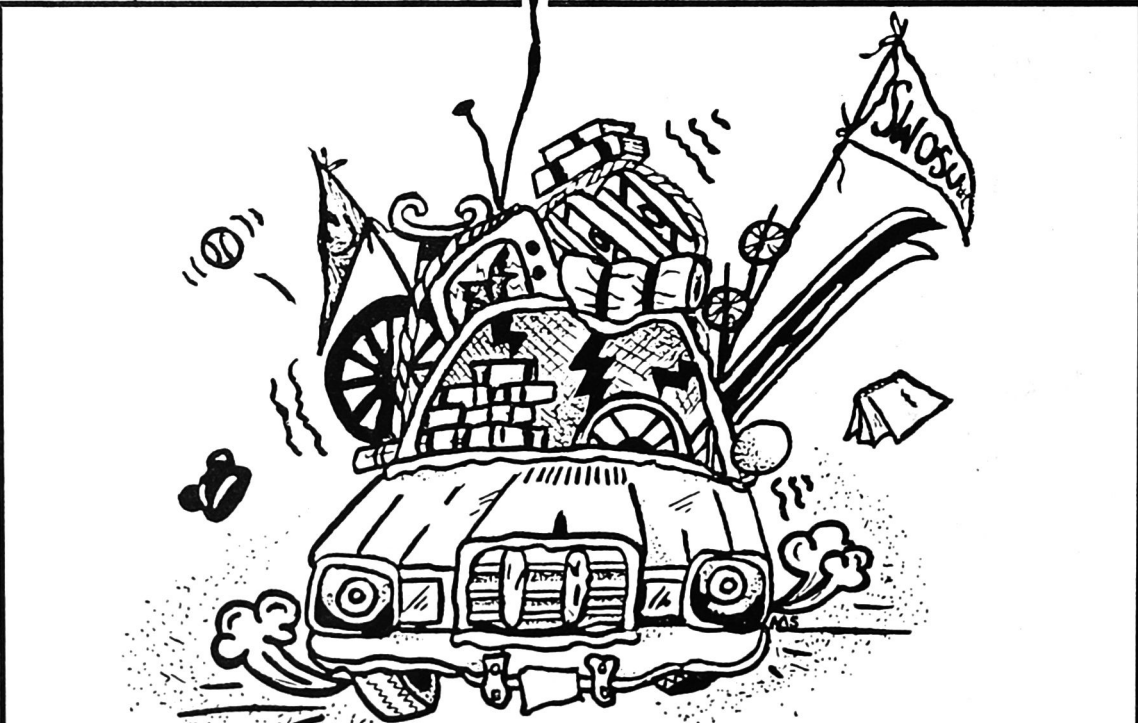
