Jim is active in doing concerts and workshops for colleges across the nation. His ability to weave theology through song and story has left a deep impression on all who have heard him.

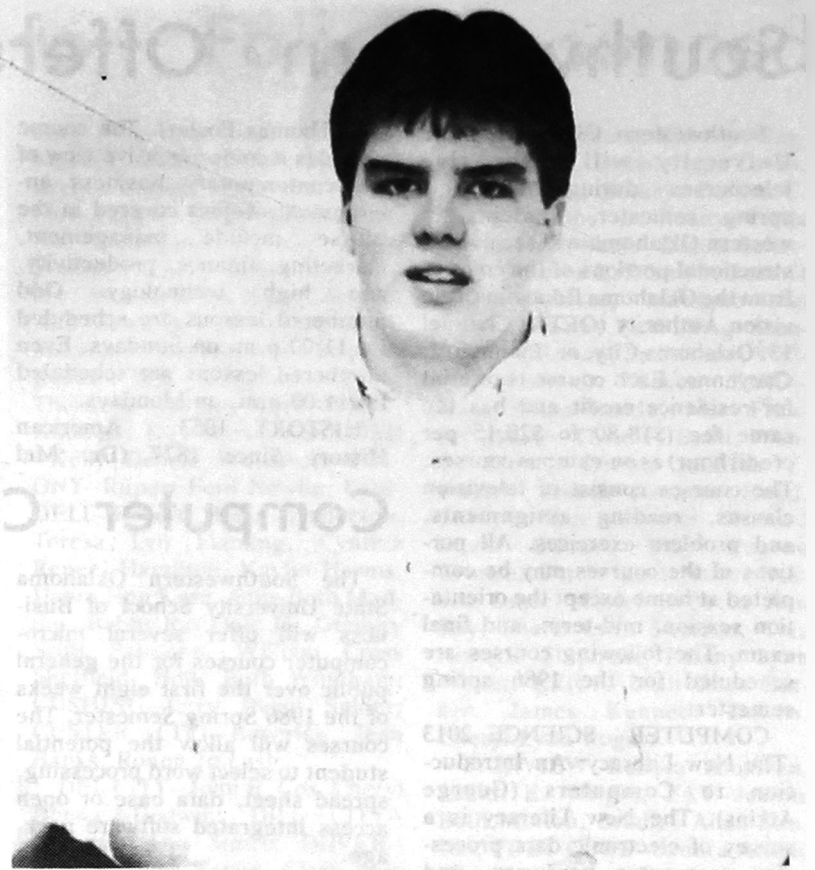

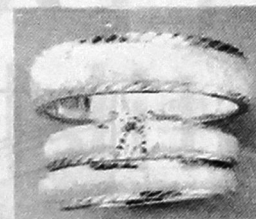
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Southwestern Offers Telecourses This Semester

Southwestern Oklahoma State University will offer five telecourses during the 1986 spring semester. Students in western Oklahoma will receive instructional portions of the courses from the Oklahoma Education Television Authority (OETA) Channel 13, Oklahoma City, or Channel 12, Cheyenne. Each course is offered for residence credit and has the same fee (\$18.80 to \$20.15 per credit hour) as on-campus courses. The courses consist of television classes, reading assignments, and problem exercises. All portions of the courses may be completed at home except the orientation session, mid-term, and final exam. The following courses are scheduled for the 1986 spring semester.

COMPUTER SCIENCE 2013 - The New Literacy: An Introduction to Computers (George Atkins). The New Literacy is a survey of electronic data procession, computer hardware, and software systems. Revised course material will be used to provide a less technical and more practical approach to computers. Odd numbered lessons will be telecast at 7:30 a.m. on Tuesdays and repeated at 7:30 a.m. on Thursdays. Even numbered lessons will be telecast at 7:30 a.m. on Wednesdays and repeated at 7:30 a.m. on Fridays.

MANAGEMENT 3233 - Principles of Management (Max White). The course provides an introduction to the concepts of management and business. Topics include planning, organizing, staffing, controlling, decision-making, motivating, communicating and applying managerial skills to business and other types of organizations. Odd numbered lessons will be telecast at 7:30 a.m. on Sundays and repeated at 7:30 a.m. on Mondays. Even numbered lessons will be telecast at 8:00 a.m. on Sundays and repeated at 12:00 noon on Mondays.

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(Dr. Thomas Foster). The course provides a comprehensive view of the contemporary business environment. Topics covered in the course include management, marketing, finance, productivity, and high technology. Odd numbered lessons are scheduled for 11:00 p.m. on Sundays. Even numbered lessons are scheduled for 11:00 p.m. on Mondays.

HISTORY 1053 - American History Since 1877 (Dr. Mel

Fiegel). America: The Secondary Century begins with the centennial and ends with today. Along the way this course examines and interprets the economic, political, diplomatic, military, and social developments that have shaped and continue to shape the United States in the twentieth century. Odd numbered lessons will be telecast at 12:00 noon on Tuesdays and repeated at 11:00 p.m. on Tuesdays. Even

numbered lessons will be telecast at 12:00 noon on Wednesdays and repeated at 11:00 p.m. on Wednesdays.

POLITICAL SCIENCE 1103 - American Government and Politics (Dr. Clarence Petrowsky). The course includes case studies, dramatization of important events, and on-location visits. Up-to-date information on government policies, current political issues, and the 1984 presidential

campaign are features of the 1986 telecourse. Odd numbered lessons will be telecast at 12:00 noon on Thursdays and repeated at 11:00 p.m. on Thursdays. Even lessons will be telecast at 12:00 noon on Fridays and repeated at 11:00 p.m. on Fridays.

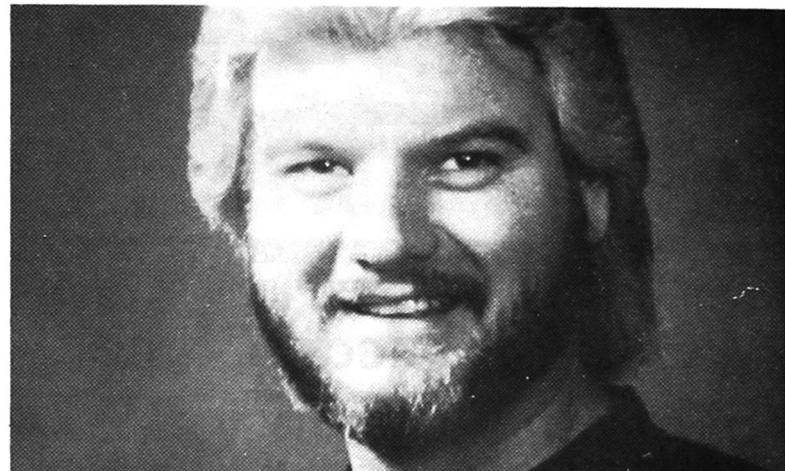
Dean Janzen To Lecture

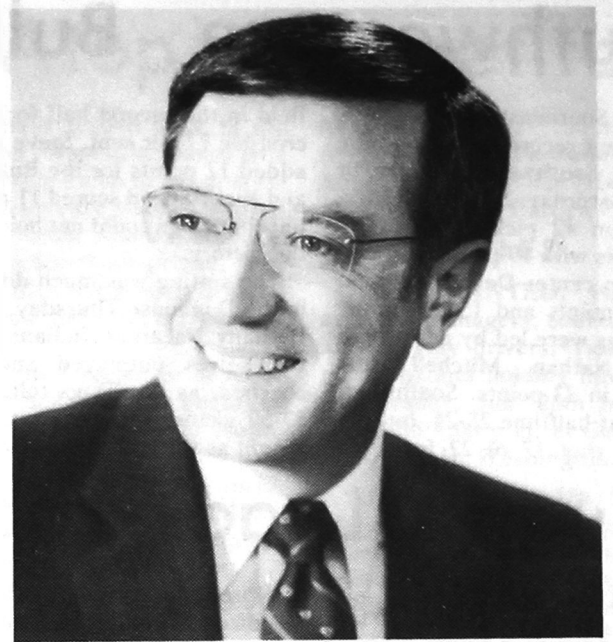

Blemaster To Speak

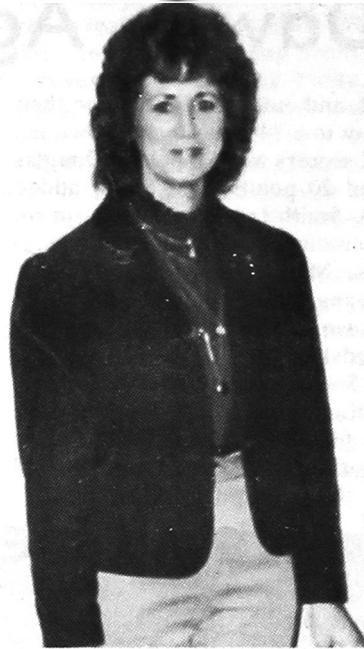

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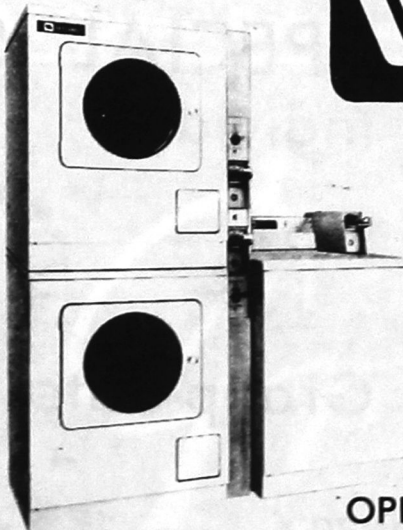
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Southwestern Bulldogs Enter Game 13-4

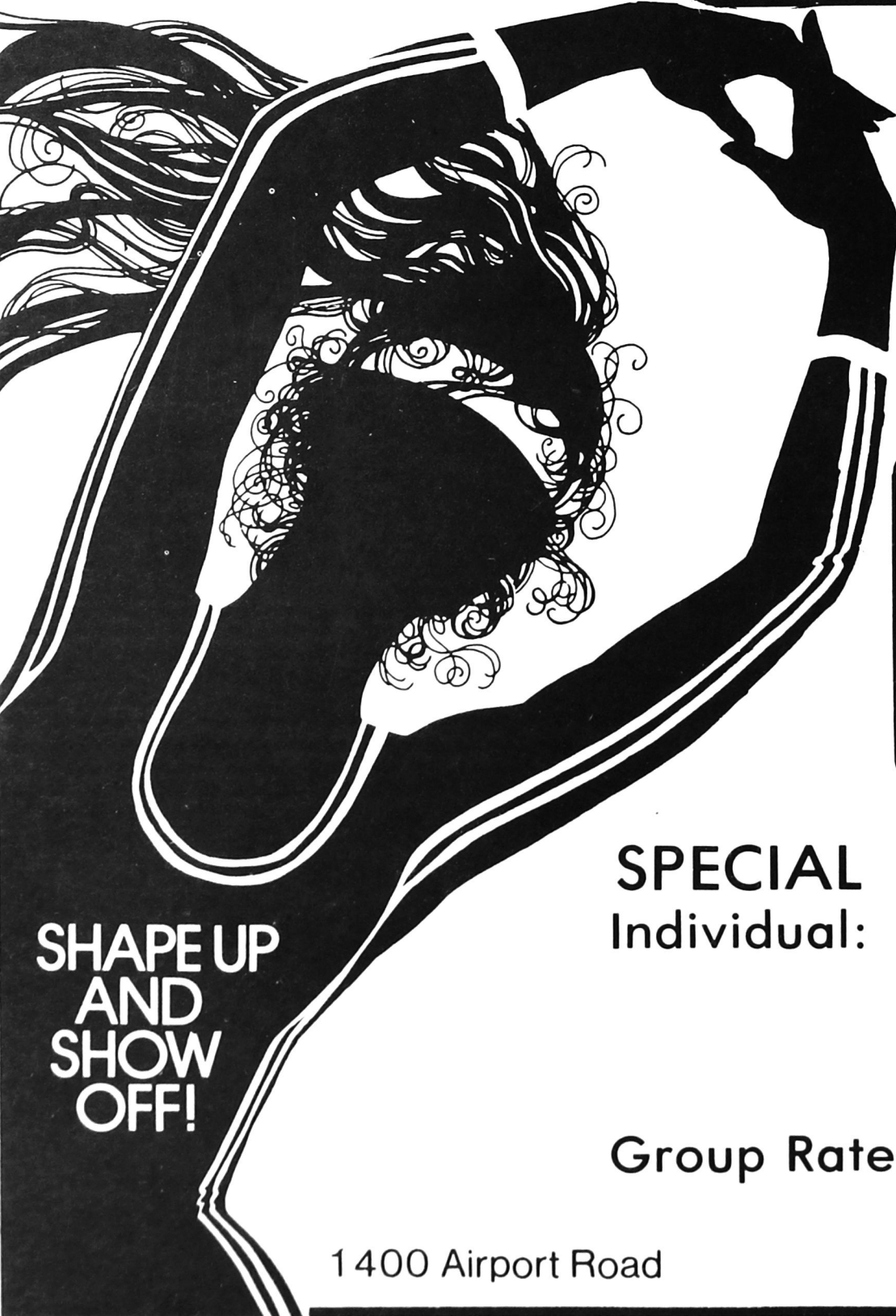
A product of Douglas, AZ, where he was an All-State football and baseball team selection, Sharp

and Kansas State University, the Southwestern men lead the Central Plains region with 485 points, with Fort Scott, KS, second with 458.3 and Panhandle third with 445. The women, with 360 points, are in front of Western Oklahoma College with 270 and Dodge City, KS, with 160.

Southwestern's Gene Palmer, Weatherford, is currently leading the bull riding event with 130 points after the two rodeos, while Marty Musil, Guthrie, leads the steer wrestling event with 220 points. In the team roping event, Southwestern places Rex Penry, Leedey, at second; Ed and Ray Holyan, Crownpoint, NM, in a tie for sixth, and Mack Ford, Clinton, in a tie for tenth. Ed Holyan is also listed as third in the steer wrestling.

The Southwestern women dominate their all-around category, taking three of the top four places. Leading the group is Charlottia Noble, Yale, who is currently ranked third in the barrel race, third in the goat-tying, and fifth in the breakaway roping events. Sandra Shipley, Still-

water, holds second place in the all-around competition based on a second place finish in the goat tying and a seventh place in the barrel race, while Monica Bernard, Leedey, is fourth all-around, after a tie for fifth in the barrels and a tenth place finish in the goat tying.

The second semester of rodeo action for Southwestern begins on March 13 with a trip to Northwestern. The annual Southwestern rodeo will be held April 10-12.

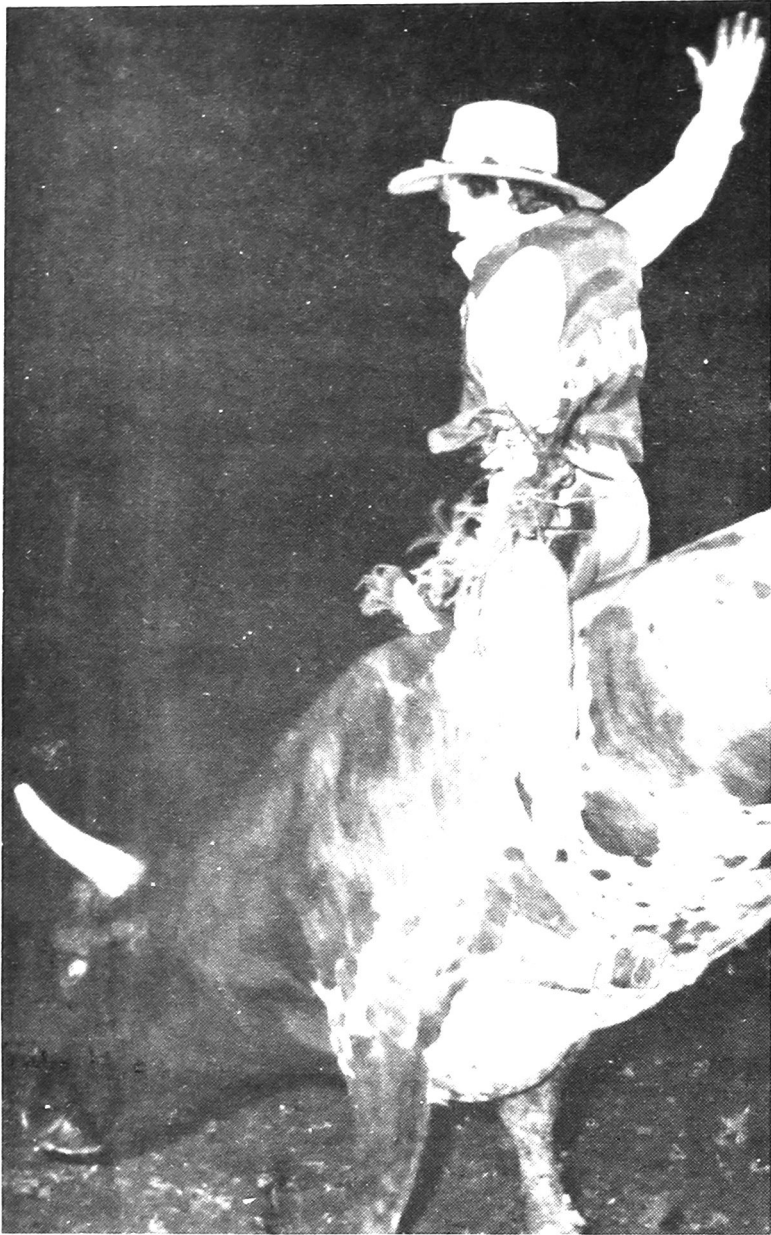

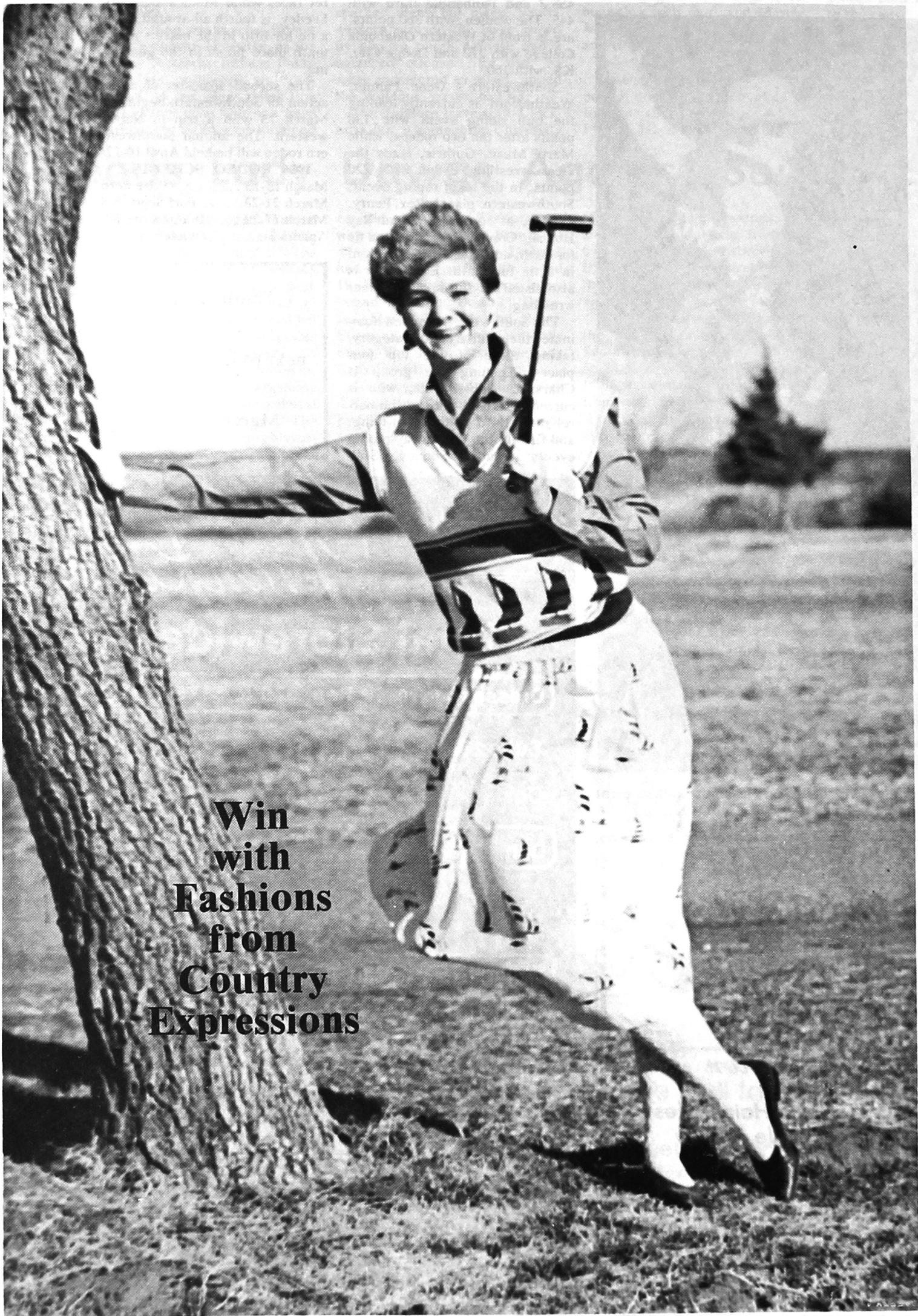
